The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, October 14, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of May 31 were approved as read.

Professors Roberts and Webb were reelected Senate representatives on the University Council.

The following new courses recommended by the Committee on Duplication of Courses were approved:

- ↓ English 36. Book Selection for High School Teachers of English  
Two hours a week; 2 credits.
- ↓ Art 116a,b. Advanced Etching. Eight hours a week; four credits each semester.
- ↓ Music 26 High School Music. Two hours a week. Two credits.
- ↓ Journalism 109. Critical Writing. Three hours a week; three credits.  
(To replace Journalism 6)
- ↓ English 37. Advanced Dramatic Production. Two hours a week; two credits. (To replace English 35).
- ↓ Physics 119. Principles of X-Rays. Three hours a week; three credits.
- ↓ Political Science 255a,b Comparative Government. 2 hours a week. two credits.
