Kentucky High School Forensic Tournament To Meet April 8 To 11

University Extension Bureau Will Supervise Contest Which Is To Open At 2 P. M. Friday

300 High School Students To Enter

Annual Tournament Dinner Will Be Held At 7 P. M. Saturday Night

Three hundred winners of 19 districts debate contests will participate in the 19th annual Kentucky high school forensic tournament to be held in the Training school auditorium at Lexington, Ky., Friday through Monday, April 8 to 11. The contests will be held under the supervision of the University Extension Bureau.

Competition will consist of debate, extemporaneous declamation, humorous reading, poetry reading, extemporaneous speaking, high school disputation contests, and seventh and eighth grade contests.

Those in competition will be winners of various district tournaments held in the following cities: Murray, Henderson, Hopkinsville, Shelbyville, Bowling Green, Louisville, Carrollton, Pleasureville, Lebanon, Somerset, Ludlow, Lexington, Richmond, Pineville, Midway, Mayfield, Hazard, Ashland, and Paintsville.

The program will open at 2 p. m. Friday with a series of debates among the contestants. Preliminary debates scheduled Friday and Saturday afternoon. Contestants in events other than debates will be held on Saturday afternoon beginning at 10 o'clock.

The annual high school speakers dinner will be held at 7 o'clock Saturday evening when high school speakers and their coaches will be guests of the University. Lee Harris, president of the High School Forensic Association, will preside.
