Hot water

Does not water freeze faster than cold water? People have told me if I fill my let trays with hot water, then I will have ice cubes faster them if I was cold tap water. The concise answer is that it all depends? You cannot put one tray of hot water next to a tray of cold water in the freezer and get a consistent result. There are too many variables. Let's move to something else then. What about a bucket of hot water vs. a bucket of cold water set outside? Which would freeze first? Other factors besides temperature, such as motion of the water, qas content, etc., effect the freezing of water. With these multiple parameters, any argument based on the hot water having to pass through the initial state of the initial state of the initial state of the initial state of the

to pass through the initial state of the cold water before reaching the freezing point will fail apart. The most important factor is evaporation is more important. If equal masses of water are taken at two starting temperatures, more rapid evaporation is more important. If equal masses of water are taken at two starting temperatures, more rapid evaporation from the hotter one may diminish its mass enough to compensate for the greater temperature range it must cover to reach freezing. The cooling effect of evaporation is twofold: First, mass is carried off so less needs to be cooled from then on. Also, evaporation carries off the hottlest molecules, considerably lowerin

on the hottest molecules, considerably lowering the average kinetic energy of the molecules remaining. This is why your soup cools when you blow on it. It encourages on it. It encourages evaporation by removing the water vapor above the soup. Thus experiment and theory agree that hot water freezes faster than cold for sufficiently high starting temperatures, if the cooling is by evaporation.

Swift to step down after semester

A storied career: Dean says it's 'time to turn the reins over,' plans to return to teaching classics at the University

LOUIS SWIFT NOW LOUIS

LOUIS SWIFT, dean of Undergraduate Studies, will step down from his post as at the end of the Spring 1999 semester. "I've been in the job nine years," he said. "It is time to turn the reins over to someone else." Swift cited what he called "cycles of life" and "cycles in institutions" for his stepping down.

Elisabeth Zinser, chancellor of the Lexington Campus, said the move comes at the natural time for administrators to return to the teaching side of university life. Swift is 66 years old, one year older than the normal rettiement age of University staff.

"We'd like to keep him from aging,"

she said, "but he has expressed the desire to return to the department and continue his research."

To honor the dean, Zinser said a committee has been appointed to put together a Lou Swift Day later in the spring.

"Actually, it will probably be more like a Lou Swift Week," she said. "It will probably be held in April. It will be an opportunity for students and faculty to honor him."

He was asked to stay an extra year after initially announcing the move more than a year ago, in recognition of his many accomplishments. Zinser said she sought special permission to keep Swift on staff for an additional year.

He has helped pull the campus togeth-

er, she said, and helped give the University guidance for the future.

That guidance has come in what has become Swift's main focus in the last years of his tenure.

"Lou Swift has worked very hard to improve the undergraduate experience, she said. The undergraduate experience has become important to the dean, as he said he realized the need for diversity in how undergraduate students learn. For years, Swift said, the concentration has been on classroom teaching.
"Diversity in learning is about promoting opportunities for students to have as much contact as possible with the outside world," Swift said.

"Diversible with Central Advising Office to help advice undeclared students, as well as the Central Learning Center,

and developed the Undergraduate Research Program.
"I am fond of the development of the undergraduate research program that provides students with funding for semester and summer research projects," Swift said. And he has received many wawrds for the educational innovations he has brought to UK. He is especially proud of the 1920 Distinguished Professor Award for Arts and Sciences.

"The faculty elects a professor each year for the award," he said." Iwas honored to be chosen in 1992."

Swift said he will now turn to his first love, the study of classics. Although he is proud of his time as dean, he said he wants to return to teaching and get closer to his colleagues in the classics department. Swift plans to take some time over the summer and fall to concentrate on his research before returning to the classroom full-time next spring.

Students concerned about plan

Some wondering if there will even be a surplus for federal government to allot

As Capitol Hill returned to the more familiar business of planning next year's federal budget, college-age voters are expressing concern over the new Clinton proposal for saving Social Security.

Under Clinton's plan, 62 percent of the federal surplus over the next 15 years would be given to Social Security to keep the program solvent. In addition, Clinton wants to invest one-fourth of those funds into the private sector. Although most agree that saving Social Security should be one of the country's top priorities, UK students are wary of funds being being invested into the stock market.

The same concern was voiced by Darryl Estes, a graduate student in the French department.

"Just look at what happened in the Asian market last year. We don't know what the economy is going to be like 10, or even five, years from now," he said.

Comments like these reflect a fiscal conservatism by voters of all ages. Michael O'Hara, a 55-year-old student in the English department, said. "The success of Clinton's plan depends upon being able to predict the outcome of a number of variables. I would opt for a safer plan to save the program.

In addition to the perceived risk of investing in private stocks, many students are safer plan to save the program.

Although Clinton has said he will work with Congress to "devise a mechanism to ensure that the investments are made independently and without political interference," many students are concerned that the abuse of funds is inevitable.

"It lawmakers are given the power to invest Social Security funds, at some

Interies the management of the power to invest Social Security funds, at some point, somebody will abuse this power in order to further their political career." Blackburn said.

O'Hara also pointed out that Clinton's plan to hold back a percentage of the projected surplus assumes there will, in fact, be a surplus.

"The possibility exists that the actual surplus may be significantly less than what Clinton's proposal projects," O'Hara said. "I think it is unwise to rely so heavily on a prediction that may or may not come true."

James A Francis, a professor in the classics department and Honors Program, is for the idea of using surplus funds to help sawe Social Security to repair the Social Security program, rather than giving everyone a big tax cut," he said. With so much opposition among voters to the Clinton proposal to invest Social Security funds, some say the plan will likely face some adjustments before the final budget is drafted.

WASHINGTON — A Baylor College of Medicine scientist says a London newspaper misinterpreted her study about a possible link between an early polio vaccine and cancer, a university spokesman said. Dr. Janet Butel has not proved that a monkey virus that contaminated an early form of polio vaccine is responsible for cancers in humans, said Baylor spokesman B.J. Almond. The London Sunday Telegraph said the monkey virus in pre-1963 polio vaccinations was "cancer-causing."

Wholesale prices jump

WASHINGTON — Flukey price hikes in January for gasoline at refineries, pork at meat packing plants and oranges at fruit growers temporarily pushed up wholesale costs at the fastest rate in more than two years. Prices paid by wholesalers to producers jumped 0.5 percent, the most since October 1996, the Labor Department said today. Economists saw it as a onetime hike and said little will get passed on to consumers.

NEW YORK — Stock indexes moved higher yesterday, supported by consumer shares and financial services. The Dow Jones industrial average ended up 103.16 at 9,298.63. On the NYSE, gainers led losers 1,767-1,217. The Nasdaq composite was up 11.60 at 2,290.51.



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

Amongst male violence

Nolte and Coburn earn Oscar nominations for chilling portrayals of men plagued by violence

In the production notes to Affliction, Russell Banks, who wrote the novel on which the film is based, comments "if a kitten doesn't have human contact in the first two weeks of its life, it will become a feral cat and will never be able to contact human beings in an accommodating and comforting manner."

commodating and comforting manner."

Affliction asks the question of what happens to the same cat who experiences human contact, but contact that is abusive, debasing and demoralizing.

The film, written for the screen and directed by Paul Schrader, tells the story of a small town New Hampshire sheriff Wade Whitehouse (Nick Nolte), who turns out to be the cat in this analogy.

"I got a feelin' like a whipped dog. Someday I'm gonna bite back," says Wade early in the film. Affliction builds its tale around the day wade finally bites back and artfully describes the events leading up to it.

Schrader's film opens with postcard images of a bleak, snow-drenched New Hamp-wrong. In a series of grainy,

home-movie-like flashbacks, the film documents a few child-hood memories that introduce his father.

Played to grim perfection by 70-year-old James Coburn. Wade's father is a nasty, overhearing alcoholic who lives for the power he exerts over his family. He attempts to pass along his warped view of being a man to his abused sons.

Years later, we can see their father's legacy of drunken, male violence has yet to exape them. This is the "affliction" the title refers to. It is an affliction that creates detachment as the only means of dealing with what you're afraid to become.

Schrader, who wrote the similar screenplays of male violence in Raging Bull and Taxi Driver, directs his best film to date. His adaptation of Banks novel is somewhat comparably to the Sweet Hereafter, Bank's other novel recently made in the standard of the standard for the solution of the standard for the isolation its characters embody.

More importantly, though, both films deal with cataclysmic events that could either be a fatal bus crash, or in this case, a life raised on neglect and violence. Their impacts haunt, linger and, like all good films, do so with tactful artistry.
