Planning for a greener community

A little piece of nature: Proposal will incorporate greenways into city to provide walkers, bikers with a refreshing alternative to busy streets

UK students will soon have the chance to walk or bike their way to campus on a little piece of nature instead of busy roads.

Lexington is incorporating greenways — corridors of open space that may be stream or river paths or old railroad beds — into the city. Walkers, hikers and bikers may use the paths.

"There will be linkages from "

"There will be linkages from downtown that will work out

through the suburbs," said Horst Schauch, chairman of the Landscape Architecture Department. "So linkages will go from downtown to campus and on out." Rural areas will primarily have hiking and biking trails, and some inner-city trails will be handicap accessible. Greenways will connect parks and other green areas in Lexington, like the UK Arboretum. "Our long-range goal is to have a metwork connecting the community," said Dag Ryen, of the Kentucky League of Cities. "Col-

lege students will be the most active users. They are younger and are the more active segment of the population."

Final plans for the greenways are incomplete, and a workshop on Jan. 29 will show the public apresentation of findings from previous workshops and meetings with community groups.

There is still time to present comments and ideas to the Greenway Committee, and Ryen said he hopes students will take advantage of the opportunity and attend


"I hope by [the year] 2005 Lex-ington will have a choice of green-ways they can use," he said.

Clooney breaks loose in new Coen comedy



Tales of brave Ulysses: New Coen Brothers film takes Homer's epic story to a much different, much funnier level

In 1942 director Preston Sturges re-leased the classic Sulliton's Travels about the journey of a filmmaker who tires of making empty fluff and decides to set out and witness the poverty of the depression as research for a socially conscience pic-ture. The film he dreamed of making was to be titled O Brother, Where Art Thou? It's safe to say that the Coen Brothers' film of the same name is not what he had in mind.

That goofy screwball lunacy the Coen Brothers so often bring to the screen is in fine form as chain gang members Ulysses. (George Cloney), Pete (John Turturro) and Delmer (Tim Blake Nelson) break loose into an adventure all over Mississippi in search of a buried treasure and Cloney's

journey (in the form of a blind railroad-man), an eye-patched giant (Bible salesman and Coen regular, John Goodman) and seductive Southern Belle sirenes.

If these adventures sound vaguely familiar it's because they re taken from the epic Greek poem "The Odyssey" taken from the their filmmaking hats to classics of the past like Sallikum's Travels, it's more likely the film is based on the 1954 film version (with Kirk Douglas playing the weathered hero) than the actual poem by Homer.

The Coens are directors whose efforts directly respond to films of the past — reinvented and restructured genres toyed with and expanded. Whether it's gangster movies (Miller's Crossing), Hollywood self-reflection (Barton Fink) or kidnapping movies (Raising Arizona, The Big Lebous of Style, atmosphere and quirk that only they possess.

The Coens twist genre assumptions, mixing in visual virtuosity and colorful characters. But they also enjoy having a good time, and that's all this movie is.

The film features flavorful characterizations from some usual Coen cohorts in the form of Goodman, Turturro and Holly Hunter, but the new actor on board and the best part of the film is George Clooney.

His hair-obsessed, smooth talking comman persona breaks Clooney out of the quistes mixing, tough guy role he's inhabited since "E.K." made him a star. His delivery makes the role as much as the dialogue, and no film character has had grander schemes with more diasstrous results since Butch Cassidy decided he and the Sundance Kid should head for Bollvia.
