YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

YOUR MONEY'S WORTH
Each sensester, 50 cents of every
student's tuition fee is allotted to
the university dispensary. Appropriations from the university general fund take care of the bulk of
the dispensary expenses. For the
small sum of money paid by them,
health service, diagnosis, and medicult treatment is given the students
by the dispensary personnel including four competent physicians,
a bacteriologist, a nurse, and a
secretary.

During any given year, two-thirds
of the students in the university
receive medical attention at the dispensary. Nearly all students visit
the dispensary sometime during
their four years in college. Physical
examinations are made of all freshmen, and if defects are noted, newcomers are given special treatment
and correction. In cases of serious
disorders, students are referred to
competent physicians and specialists
downtown.
