

#### **NATION** House chairman awaits Morris' response

WASHINGTON — A House committee chairman says former campaign adviser Dick Morris has indicated he will respond by late Monday to questions about his reported statement that Hillary Rodham Clinton was behind the collection of hundreds of confidential FBI files on former Republican officials.

Rep. William Clinger, R-Pa., chairman of the Government Reform and Oversight Committee, said Morris has agreed to respond by 5 p.m. Monday.

Clinger said in a statement that he "was astonished to learn from news reports" that Morris 'has information linking the first lady to the improper

In a letter dated Saturday and made public Sunday, Clinger asked Morris to "affirm by sworn statement" the truthfulness of his reported con-tents and to supply all "correspondence, e-mail, memos, talking points, briefing papers, polling data, telephone records and other records" on the subject.

## Shalikashvili warns Saddam about

Shalikashvili warns Saddam about repairing missile sites

WASHINGTON — U.S. officials warned Saddam Hussein on Sunday that he faces further attacks if he tries to repair military sites hit by U.S. missiles. At the same time they indicated American forces are unlikely to intervene in fighting going on in northern Iraq.

Gen. John Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said signs have been detected that Saddam is trying to repair surface-to-air missile sites targeted by 44 American cruise missiles last Tuesday.

"We have warned Saddam Hussein that any attempt to repair those sites or reinforce them will be taken very seriously, and he must understand the consequences of such an act," the general said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

The United States attacked the sites in southern Iraq to retailate for the advance of Iraqi troops into a Kurdish "safe haven" area of northern Iraq. President Clinton also announced that the "no-fly" zone for Iraqi military planes imposed in southern Iraq after Saddam's defeat in the 1991 Gulf War was being expanded northward to Baghada's suburbs.

SIATE Uofl gets grant to further education for learning-disabled LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The U.S. Department of Education is assisting a University of Louisville professor in his effort to help learning-disabled students avoid the trap of educational failure and low-paying jobs.

The department announced last week that Uofl, will get about \$429,000 over three years to help learning-disabled high school students prepare for high-skill jobs or further education. The project will involve Jefferson County Public Schools, Jefferson Community College and Kentucky TECH.

Uofl. was one of eight universities chosen from among 88 applicants for grants under an Education Department program intended to produce better instruction for high school students with diabilities.

LAS VEGAS — Rapper Tupac Shakur and a record company executive were shot in a car as they rode down the city's busy casino Strip, and Shakur was in critical condition Sunday.

It was the second shooting in two years for Shakur, who has a history of violence and trouble with the law. Shakur, 25, and Knight, 31, were traveling in a convoy of about 10 cars late Saturday, apparently headed to a nightclub.

## UNIVERSITY HEALTH SERVICE FALL SEMESTER STUDENT HEALTH FEE PART-TIME STUDENTS DEADLINE—SEPT. 11, 1996

All UK students on the Lexington campus, including LCC students, are eligible to use the University Health Service for their health care. All full-time students pay mandatory fees which entitle them to use Student Health. Part-time students may elect to prepay the health fee or may use the Health Service on a fee-for-service basis. In addition, certain students who are not registered in classes but are actively engaged in programs leading to a degree are eligible to use the Health Service and pay the health fee. These students must obtain verification of their status from their department chairperson, dean or academic advisor each semester. Forms are available at the Graduate School Office and at the Health Service.

#### DEADLINE FOR PART-TIME STUDENTS

Individuals who elect to prepay the health fee (\$85.75) must do so by Wednesday, September 11, 1996. (Lexington Campus students should pay the health fee at Student Billings, Funkhouser Bildg. LCC students should pay at the University Health Service cashier's office. University Health Service is located in the Kentucky Clinic—hours are 8:00 a.m.—4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.)

# Cats sweep two weekend games

The UK men's soccer team entered this weekend with an 0-1 record and hopes for a home sweep of two non-conference foes. The Cats took care of business Friday, defeating Texas-Pan American 4-1 to even their mark at 1-1.

"Your goalkeeper is there to win games instead of lose games," Collins said, "and he came up big when we needed him."

"The striker was in the box and he went to my left," Muse said. "It was lucky to get a hand on it and push it out at least."

Muse said that the save made him feel good, but he was just happy he could contribute something which helped the team win.

The Kangaroos had only one other good scoring chance in the game when Randy Schnieder's shot on goal went off the post and Chris Little missed the rebound header, by putting it over the net instead of in it.

This was the Wildcat's first shutout of the year, and Collins felt that the team was lucky to get out of it so easily.

"I'm always glad, obviously, when we don't give away any goals," Collins said. "But on the other hand. I'm very dispapointed that we gave up some scoring chances. It didn't translate into goals today, but we were fortunate."



FRANKFORT, Ky. — Larry orgy, a former UK vice-presi-Forgy, a former UK vice-president and candidate for governor, has decided to give the state a real estate investment at the center of last year's election controversy. Forgy has long contended that Patton illegally won the gubernatorial election last fall by buying votes.

A grand jury recently subport and the personnel files and campaign records of three of Patton's top aides, including his chief of staff, Andrew "Skipper" Martin.

Larry Forgy has offered the state his interest in a 445-acre tract of land in western Kentucky that emerged as one of the pivotal issues of the November election.

There are a number of questions about the land deal, however, including whether the state can legally become a partner with the two coal companies that also own shares in the land in Hancock County.

two coal companies that also own shares in the land in Hancock County.

Forgy offered the land to settle a lawsuit in which the state is seeking \$650,000 from the family of Harry LaViers Jr., a friend and former employer of Forgy.

The Labor Cabinet wants the money to pay wages to about 300 miners who didn't get paid after LaViers' South East Coal Co. went out of business in 1993.

'The deal could bring some money to the miners if it goes through.

South East valued the land at \$648,000 in a bankruptey petition.

The land became an issue in the governor's race because LaViers' son, Donald, gave Forgy an interest in it to repay a \$50,000

loan from Forgy. Forgy's Demo-cratic opponent, Paul Patton, accused Forgy of getting his money while the miners lost out. Forgy said last week he is will-ing to give up the land to help the miners and the LaViers family, pressed by the cost of defending the state lawsuit. "I want to help the people in this company that I worked with so long," Forgy told the Lexing-ton Herald-Leader. Forgy once headed South East's sales subsidiary and repre-sented the company as an attorney for several years. Denis Fleming, attorney for the governor's office, said Patton is serious about exploring the offer from Forgy. "It's interesting to note that

is serious about exploring the offer from Forgy.

"It's interesting to note that Mr. Forgy is now admitting the land belongs to the miners, and not to him." Fleming said.

But Forgy said the interest in the land is his and that he obtained it legitimated.

He said he's tirred of the false perception that he benefited at the

perception that he benefited at the miners' expense.
State officials were taken by surprise when Forgy and LaViers offered the land to the state in June in return for the state's dropping its efforts to get money from LaViers.

Forgy did not make the offer in writing and has not responded in writing to the state's request for more information, causing officials to question whether he was

## **New ways to register**

November's national election is approaching, and, for many UK students, it will be the first election they are eligible to vote in.

In order to cast a ballot for Dole, Clinton, Perot or whoever, all voters must be registered.

Though the process is unfamiliar to first-timers with elections, it is really fairly simple according to Kitty Ware in the voter registration office at the Fayette County Clerk's office.

"Students are a very special

tion office at the Fayette County Clerk's office.

"Students are a very special group," Ware said and, therefore, get, special privileges when it comes to voting.

Two options exist for those registering. The first is to call the voter registration office at 255-8683 and ask for a voter registration card which will be mailed to the applicant. This card allows students to register to vote in Fayette County, even if the student is from out-of-state.

Unfortunately, this cancels current registration, which means students from West Virginia, for example, already registered would no longer be eligible to vote in their home state.

Students who register in Fayette County are only be allowed to vote here while they go to school here, Ware said. Once they graduate, if they leave Lexington, it is up to them to re-register in their home state.

Students registering in Fayette County must do so before Oct. 7.

absentee ballot. Ware said students voting absentee must call

ask for one to be mailed.
Ware said Fayette County residents can get an absentee hallot
until one week before the election.

However, Ware said the party change does not take place until the next election. In other words, if an affiliation is changed between November and May, a voter will not be allowed to vote for the new party in the May primary.

A national effort to encourage student voter registration developed by 1-800 Collect and Rock the Vote is also underway.

The country's first national voter registration hot-line, 1-800 Register, has received nearly 100,000 calls through its first month of operation in August, according to Ricki Seidman, executive director of Rock the Vote.

"It's as if a capacity crowd at the Super Bowl all picked up the phone and registered to vote. Imagine the impact these new voters can have on our political system, "Seidman said.


When the hot-line is dialed, a voice-automated system prompts the caller for the needed information.

Within days, a completed reg-

Within days, a completed reg-istration forms is received to be reviewed and mailed, stamped and addressed to the appropriate voter registration office.

The service will also mail out cards a week before the election to remind newly-registered voters to head to the polls.


