

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, June 1, 1951.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:10 a.m., Friday, June 1, 1951. The following members were present: Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby, Chairman; R. P. Hobson, Carl Dempewolfe, Dr. W. M. Coffee, Judge Harry F. Walters, Guy A. Huguelet, Harper Gatton, Herndon J. Evans, J. C. Everett, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Paul M. Basham, H. D. Palmore, and J. Woodford Howard. Absent; Boswell B. Hodgkin and George M. Cheek. President Donovan and Secretary Frank D. Peterson met with the Board.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 3, 1951; and the minutes of the Executive Committee of May 18, 1951, were approved as published.

B. Report of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller made financial report for the period July 1, 1950, to and including April 30, 1951. He read the following summarized statement and submitted a detailed report to members of the Board.

My dear Doctor Donovan:

I submit herewith a balance sheet of University funds as of April 30, 1951, together with statement covering University fund transactions for the period of ten months beginning July 1, 1950, and ended April 30, 1951.

The income received during the period for general and plant fund purposes amounted to \$7,004,940.01, or 87.5% of the budget estimate of \$7,181,674.51. These figures are as of April 30, 1951. Since printing of the financial report, income received has been in excess of \$200,000.00, therefore the entire budget estimate of income for the fiscal year has been fully realized. The current general fund expenditures and encumbrances total \$5,775,585.22, which amount was 78.9% of the departmental appropriations of \$7,323,471.14. Plant fund expenditures and encumbrances amount to \$724,766.78, or 69.6% of the budget estimate of \$1,041,014.47.

The unappropriated general plant fund surplus for the Division of College and Agricultural Experiment Station was \$588,957.65 on April 30, 1951. The Division of Colleges had an unappropriated surplus of \$338,353.53. This entire amount, plus approximately \$150,000.00, which we anticipate under-spending in the current budget will be needed to supplement the estimated income for the ensuing fiscal year. It should be realized that we are reducing expenses currently whenever possible in order to carry forward a balance to approximate \$470,000.00 necessary to offset reduction in estimated income for the ensuing fiscal year. The unappropriated surplus consists of the following:

Members of the Board examined the statement and, after some discussion, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was authorized received and made a part of the minutes.

C. Approval of the Budget for 1951-52.

President Donovan submitted the proposed budget of the University for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951 and ending June 30, 1952. He presented in some detail the estimated unappropriated surplus anticipated for July 1, 1951, and the estimated income, proposed expenditures and summary of the General Budget as it relates to the Division of Colleges, Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Division. The following statement was presented to the Board:

COMMENTS

INTRODUCTION

The proposed budget of the University of Kentucky for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951, and ending June 30, 1952, consists of detailed and summary statements of estimated resources to be available during the year and an estimate of proposed expenditures for the same period. The budget is a compilation of departmental estimates and requests which has been recommended or revised by the various Deans or other administrative officers and approved by the President.

GENERAL BUDGET

Resources:

Resources to be available during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, will consist of the unappropriated surplus on July 1, 1951, together with state appropriations and other income to be received during the year from student fees, federal grants, the operation of Auxiliary Enterprises, and other miscellaneous sources.

The Unappropriated Surplus:

The unappropriated surplus as of July 1, 1951, should consist of the unappropriated surplus as of July 1, 1950, less the excess of expenditures, encumbrances and other charges and adjustments over the income to be realized and other credits during the fiscal year 1950-51. A calculation of estimated unappropriated surplus for the Division of Colleges, Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Division as of July 1, 1951, follows:

The estimate of surplus as of July 1, 1951, is conservative and is based upon figures available May 1, 1951. Due to our request to department heads to reduce expenditures during the last quarter of the current year, it is very probable that the surplus shown will be increased. This budget could not have been balanced except through frugal spending of current appropriations to make possible a large surplus to offset a loss in student fees and Federal government tuition for the training of Student Veterans. *The actual decrease in student fees as estimated in this budget is \$274,145.00. The difference is the collection for health and infirmary services aggregating \$36,300.00 which is included in the above estimate of student fees. The fee for health and infirmary services heretofore was estimated separately and handled in the Restricted Fund Section.

The major change in Estimated Income as compared with the estimate for 1950-1951 is a decrease of \$274,145 in the amount of student fees to be received. This decrease is partially offset by a net increase in other items and the inclusion of the health and infirmity fees to make the total decrease, \$214,819.87. The anticipated decline in student fees is due to the decreased enrollment of veterans which will reduce the amount of veterans' tuition to be received from the Federal Government.

The estimate of student fees for the fiscal year 1951-1952 is based upon a probable enrollment of 4,500 students including 500 veterans. Added to the compilation is \$100,000 which represents veterans' fees and tuition receivable in prior year but which will not be received until the fiscal year 1951-1952.

Proposed Expenditures:

Based upon Departmental Requests, the estimated, or proposed expenditures will amount to \$7,410,137.70. These recommended Departmental Appropriations equitably allocate the available resources to provide for the essential functions of the University.

All departmental budgets have been decreased, except the Agricultural Experiment Station. The Administrative and General Expense section of the budget herein prepared shows an increase of \$24,314.00. Actually, there is a decrease of \$29,716.60 in this section. The difference is accounted for through the inclusion of the health and infirmary appropriation. Heretofore, the health and infirmary fees were kept separately in an attempt to make this service self-supporting.

We found, however, that the cost of operating the service had exceeded the receipts and it was determined best to put the fees into the general income and appropriate for the services.

The Agricultural Experiment Station appropriation shows an increase of \$72,570.00. The appropriations exceed estimated income by \$58,625.96. However, the Experiment Station has ample surplus funds to cover the budget deficit as revealed by the following summary statement.

PLANT FUND BUDGET

The Plant Fund budget is included in the General Budget. The proposed plant expenditures provide only for payment of fixed charges for the fiscal year 1951-52. It is understood that the unexpended balance of 1950-51 Plant appropriations will be continued and carried forward to the year 1951-52.

RESTRICTED FUND BUDGETS

The Board of Trustees has authorized the establishment of various funds classified as Restricted or Trust Funds (Kentucky Revised Statutes 41.290). The Board directed that these "private funds and contributions" be retained and deposited in a local bank. Budgets are included herein for several of these funds. Those not included were omitted because sufficient data were not available. In all cases Restricted Fund budgets are submitted for approval at the time the Board considers the General Budget, or submitted to the Board at the time of receipt of funds. In the latter case, acceptance of the funds by the Board is considered to be authorization for spending the funds in accordance with the terms of acceptance.

The Restricted Budgets of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Division are included in the detail of the General Budgets of these divisions.

Each member was given a complete copy of the Proposed Budget which was made available for personal use.

After general discussion and examination of the Proposed Budget, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Budget was authorized accepted as a basis of maximum expenditures for the year 1951-52. The inclusion of the name of any person in the Budget shall not be considered as a contract of employment, and the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee shall be authorized to make such changes in the Budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary.

D. Establishment of School of Journalism.

President Donovan recommended to the Board of Trustees that a School of Journalism be created within the framework of the College of Arts and Sciences, and that Dr. Niel Plummer be appointed Director. He stated that the Journalism faculty will continue to be members of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences and that faculty appointments, promotions, the curricula and the budget will continue to follow the same procedures as before. He joined in the recommendation of Dr. M. M. White, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and read the following letter:

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President
University of Kentucky
Administration Building

My dear President Donovan:

I recommend that within the framework of the College of Arts and Sciences there be created a School of Journalism and that Dr. Niel Plummer be appointed Director, School of Journalism. These recommendations, which will not increase the administrative costs of the University, are made for the following reasons:

1. Our enrollment is among the top ten of the approved Schools of Journalism.
2. The Department has been accredited by the agencies in the field of Journalism for twenty years, and its graduates have records of sound achievement.
3. The Department has gained national recognition and is staffed by a well-balanced, competent and enthusiastic group.

4. Last year its professional program won high praise from the Southern Newspaper's Publishers Association.
5. There are very few accredited Departments of Journalism but quite a few accredited Schools of Journalism. Some outstanding Schools of Journalism operated in connection with a College of Arts and Sciences are Ohio State University and the University of Nebraska.
6. The completion of the new Journalism building affords an excellent opportunity to create a School of Journalism.
7. The creation of the School of Journalism will be a more accurate description of our program and will give journalism recognition among other schools of Journalism.

If this recommendation is approved, the Journalism faculty will continue to be members of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences; the faculty appointments and promotions, the curricula and the budgets will continue to follow the same procedures as heretofore.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the list of candidates for degrees was approved and President Donovan was authorized to confer upon each at the Commencement exercises June 1, 1951, the degree to which each is entitled.

F. University Accepts Social Security.

President Donovan reported briefly concerning conferences held relative to the University accepting provisions of the Social Security Act. He read the following statement and recommendations:

"At the Special Session of the General Assembly last March, a law was enacted providing for the extension of the Federal Social Security program to the employees of all agencies and departments of the State Government and also making that program available to the political subdivisions and instrumentalities of the State. It was at first believed that our change-of-work plan, which was adopted in 1928, barred the employees of the University from the provisions of the Social Security Act, which provided for the exemption of any group that had a retirement plan already in force. In a recent conference with Mr. Vego Barnes, Commissioner, Department of Economic Security, Judge R. Campbell Van Sant, Department Counsel, and other representatives of Social Security, we were informed that in their judgment and that of the Federal Regional Attorney, our change-of-work plan, since it is not technically a pension or retirement plan, would not exempt us from the provisions of this act, and that the employees of the University are required to come under the provisions of this recent legislation.

"These conversations also revealed that it was the judgment of Commissioner Barnes and Judge Van Sant and other persons present that our change-of-work plan was in no sense in jeopardy and that it could and should be continued, and that Social Security was to be regarded as an additional guarantee of security for the employees of the University.

"We were advised that we might nevertheless bring suit against the Commissioner for a declaratory judgment on the issue of whether the Board might, as an instrumentality of the State, elect to reject Social Security, if we wished to have an interpretation by the Courts, but after lengthy consideration of every aspect of the problem, it is the opinion of the administration, shared by most of the faculty, that the University should not participate in a lawsuit to determine this issue, but that it should request the Board of Trustees at this time:

"First, that it reaffirm its policy, adopted in 1928 and subsequently amended, providing in general for a change-of-work for employees upon reaching the specified age, as a desirable and beneficial program for both the University and its employees, and further affirm that the total benefits to University employees are not to be curtailed by the adoption of Social Security as to employees heretofore employed, they being regarded as having contractual rights in said policy.

"Second, that it accept the provisions of Social Security for all eligible employees of the University, as provided for in recent legislation, that it adopt without modification the plan heretofore adopted by the State Government for employees of the various State departments, and that it direct the Comptroller to comply with the request of Commissioner Barnes that sufficient sums be

deducted from June salaries to pay the tax that may be due from eligible employees under this program for the period January 1, 1951, to June 30, 1951, and that thereafter the appropriate tax be periodically deducted from salary checks of each eligible employee.

"Third, that it authorize the Comptroller to pay out of the Revolving Funds of the University the tax imposed upon the University under the Social Security program for all eligible employees for the period January 1, 1951, to June 30, 1951.

"Fourth, that it authorize the President to draw up a plan, for submission to the next meeting of the Board, to cover employees who may be engaged by the University in the future, to supplement their Social Security."

Doctor Ward, head of the Department of English, and Doctor Pickett, College of Commerce, were invited to appear before the Board as representatives of the faculty and the AAUP. These gentlemen made themselves available to the Board, and a general discussion followed, after which, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of President Donovan was concurred in, and the Board reaffirmed its policy adopted in 1928 and subsequently amended, providing in general for a change of work for employees upon reaching the specified ages.

G. Department of Public Relations Unified.

President Donovan made the following statement:

"For many years the University has had someone responsible for the preparation of its bulletins and brochures furnishing information regarding the University which the public demands. As the University grew, this work increased and much information relative to the activities of the University was requested by the press, radio and other news gathering agencies. In earlier years someone would be assigned on a part-time basis to perform these services for the public. Finally it became necessary to have a full-time person assemble these data with the assistance of those persons usually on a part-time basis.

"Five years ago we brought Professor R. W. Wild, a former graduate of our Department of Journalism, from Michigan State College where he had been doing a similar type of work for that institution. Before going to Michigan State he was Instructor in Journalism at Ohio University, Assistant Professor of Journalism at West Virginia University, and University Editor at the University of Maryland.

"At the time Professor Wild came to the University all persons

handling publicity material were placed under his supervision except those who were doing this type of work for the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension. I am now requesting your authority to extend Mr. Wild's supervision to the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension, with the view of securing a better integrated program in the dissemination of information which the public expects from the University through newspapers, radio, brochures, lectures, et cetera.

"This recommendation has the full approval of Dean Frank J. Welch, with whom I have discussed this matter. I am asking your permission to make this policy effective as of July 1, 1951."

Board members, being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, concurred in the recommendation of President Donovan and directed that the policy be made effective as of July 1, 1951.

H. Stock Pavilion Authorized.

President Donovan made the following statement:

"After the destruction of our Service Building on Limestone Street just opposite the main campus, we secured from the Federal Public Housing Authority a very large hangar, which was moved to the campus by the Authority and erected as a temporary Service Building. With the completion of the new Service Building, across Limestone in front of the Administration Building, this temporary building is no longer needed by the Division of Maintenance and Operations. We have had under consideration for some months the question of what is the best disposition to make of this building. Many people in the livestock industry have been urging that it be used as a livestock pavilion and made available for sales and shows of registered livestock from time to time, and also used as a building where demonstrations of livestock may be held when large crowds need to be accommodated, such as are frequently present at Farm and Home Week, and on other occasions when many groups visit the Experiment Station Farm to see what is going on there.

"Dr. W. P. Garrigus, Head of the Department of Animal Husbandry, and Professor Don Cash Seaton, Head of the Department of Physical Education, are also anxious that it be used as a riding stable and as a pavilion for instruction in equitation courses.

"This building, with some alterations, which will require the removal of partitions and the installation of steel beams, can be made an ideal stock pavilion where both projects can be provided for. It is my opinion, and the opinion of some of my associates, that if these alterations are made, which should not be too expensive, this building can become one of the most valuable

structures on the Experiment Station Farm, and that it will render a great service to the livestock industry as well as serve the equitation courses throughout the year.

"I have also discussed the question of the best use of this building with Dean Welch and he agrees with Dr. Garrigus and me that it is highly desirable that we use this building for the projects which I have outlined."

Judge Walters raised the question of whether or not this would interfere with the stock show at the State Fair Grounds, and was advised that it was not so intended. Judge Walters said he had heard it discussed in another meeting. Various members of the Board expressed opinion as to the use of this building for demonstration of live stock and related activities to the College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

After some discussion, upon motion made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President, with Judge Walters requesting to be recorded as voting "no".

I. Football Practice Field.

President Donovan stated that, for several years, Mr. B. A. Shively and Coach Paul Bryant had been requesting a practice field for the football team. Our players are greatly handicapped because of the size and composition of the soil of the present practice field. Most of it is bare ground, almost as hard as concrete, and when there is rain it is extremely muddy. The time has come when this handicap should be removed and better practice facilities provided for the coaches and the team.

President Donovan recommended that the Board permit him to appoint a committee of three to survey the Experiment Station farm and select a plot of level land that will be satisfactory as a practice field. He expressed the thought that some four or five acres would be sufficient and it should be selected so as not to interfere in any way with the proper functioning of the Experiment Station Farm. The expense of fencing the land and erecting a small bath house will be borne by the University of Kentucky Athletic Association.

The recommendation of President Donovan was well received, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, he was authorized to appoint such a committee to select a site acceptable to President Donovan and the Dean of the Experiment Station.

J. Appointment of Associate Directors of the Experiment Station and College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

President Donovan made the following statement:

"For many years there has been an Assistant Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics. Mr. L. J. Horlacher has held this position since 1939. I am recommending that the title of this position be changed and that he be made Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, effective July 1, 1951.

"Mr. Thomson R. Bryant has been Assistant Director of Agricultural Extension since 1914. The title most frequently used by land-grant colleges and universities is that of Associate Director. I am recommending that Mr. Thomson R. Bryant be designated as Associate Director of Agricultural Extension, effective July 1, 1951.

"In nearly all of the land-grant colleges and universities there is also an Associate Director of the Experiment Station. Dean Cooper has never recommended the establishment of this position but has through the years handled all of the problems of the Experiment Station himself. I am confident that the time has come when the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and Director of the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension, should have an Associate Director of the Experiment Station who can relieve him of many of the details of the work of the Experiment Station, with the view of giving the Director more time to work directly with the public and to formulate and administer the policies of the total program of agriculture in Kentucky. Dr. Welch and I have discussed this problem at length and he desires that we create the office of Associate Director of the Experiment Station. He also joins me in recommending that Dr. W. P. Garrigus be appointed to this position, effective July 1, 1951. Dr. Garrigus will for the present continue as Head of the Department of Animal Husbandry."

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Mr. L. J. Horlacher was named Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, effective July 1, 1951; Mr. Thomson R. Bryant was named Associate Director of Agricultural Extension, effective July 1, 1951; and Dr. W. P. Garrigus was named Associate Director of the Experiment Station, effective July 1, 1951. Doctor Garrigus will continue as head of the Department of Animal Husbandry.

K. Dairy Products Building Named.

President Donovan stated that Dr. Thomas P. Cooper would retire as Dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and Director of the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension, on June 30, 1951. He has held this position at the University for 33 years.

His services have been outstanding. His work as an agriculturist has made this state a richer commonwealth. The value of his contribution to our economic wealth could not be estimated. The University will always look upon him as one of its most distinguished educators.

President Donovan suggested that the Board of Trustees pay Dean Cooper the compliment of naming one of the most important agricultural buildings in his honor and recommended that the building previously known as the Dairy Products Building be called the Thomas P. Cooper Dairy Products Building.

The recommendation of the President was enthusiastically received, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Dairy Products Building was officially named the Thomas P. Cooper Dairy Products Building.

L. Dean Frank J. Welch Approved as Director of Cooperative Extension Service.

President Donovan reported that he was in receipt of a letter from the Hon. Charles Brannan, Secretary, Department of Agriculture. He read the following letter:

Dear President Donovan:

We regret to learn of the retirement of Dean Thomas P. Cooper at the end of the academic year June 30, 1951. Dean Cooper is one of the outstanding leaders in agricultural education in the United States and has rendered very valuable assistance to the Department in its various programs with farm people for many years.

We realize how difficult it is to find a worthy successor to Dr. Cooper, but believe that your selection of Dr. Frank J. Welch, at present Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Experiment Station of Mississippi State College, to succeed Dr. Cooper is an excellent one.

We have a high regard for the work of Dr. Welch in Mississippi and believe he will carry on the cooperative extension program of this Department and the University of Kentucky in a manner befitting the splendid example set by Dean Cooper.

We will, therefore, be pleased to approve the appointment of Dr. Welch as Director of Cooperative Extension Service in Kentucky effective July 1, 1951.

The President requested permission to report Secretary Brannan's approval of the appointment of Dean Frank J. Welch, and have same made of record in the minutes. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the request was granted.

M. Professor R. R. Pickett to Do Outside Work.

President Donovan requested approval for Professor R. R. Pickett to do outside work. Professor Pickett has been requested by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky to prepare testimony on the "Cost of Money and Rate of Return" in the Ashland Home Telephone Company and the Kentucky Telephone Corporation cases. The Commission was willing to subpoena Professor Pickett for this service, but Professor Pickett, considering the public nature of the assignment and the fact that the University is associated with an agency of the state, did not feel it proper to insist upon a subpoena, and requested permission to do the work requested. He stated that the amount involved would be small, and that the services are of a unique professional character and not easily available elsewhere in the state. The assignment will not interfere with Professor Pickett's duties as Professor of Economics at the University. Dr. C. C. Carpenter, Dean of the College of Commerce, joined with President Donovan in the recommendation.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President.

N. Property at 250 College View Avenue Purchased.

President Donovan reported house and lot at 250 College View Avenue for sale. He stated that the lot has a front footage of 25 feet and depth of about 90 feet. The house is weatherboarded,

with new composition roof, three large-size rooms and two small rooms, and a bath. He recommended that the property be purchased for \$4,300.00.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was authorized to complete the transaction, receive deed to the property, and make the purchase from Haggin funds, with the understanding that the amount will be amortized over a number of years through rental of the property.

O. Suit on Patterson Will Authorized.

President Donovan reported that the Executive Committee, at its meeting on May 18, discussed provisions of the Patterson will and recommended to the Board that a court action be instituted to have the rights of the University clarified. It was recalled that the Board had previously discussed the grant under the will and the possibility of it being made available to the University for the establishment of a School of Diplomacy, or some similar arrangement to comply with the provisions contained in the will of President Patterson, and since there is definitely a difference of opinion as to whether or not the intent of the will can now be carried out, that the Court should be requested to advise this Board its rights and duties.

After general discussion, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, legal action was authorized, and the Executive Committee was authorized and requested to employ counsel to represent the University's interest.

P. Comptroller Authorized to Lease Crane.

The Comptroller stated that the University had acquired, through war surplus, a large crane which it could not sell until after a period of five years. He reported that the Wides Scrap Metal Company desired to rent the crane, with the understanding that the University could have access to it at any time it had need, and when the rental has equalled the amount of \$7,000.00, the Company could continue to use the crane without cost. The problem was submitted to the Board for direction.

A discussion followed. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was authorized to rent the crane for the sum of \$1,500.00 per year with the understanding that the University would be permitted to use it without cost when in need of its services.

Q. Injury to Dan Welch.

The Comptroller made the following statement:

"Mr. Dan Welch, painter in the Division of Maintenance & Operations, was working August 30, 1947. While he was standing on a ladder in the Stock Pavilion, the ladder slipped and Mr. Welch fell to the concrete floor, suffering a fractured sacrum.

"Various doctors have worked on Mr. Welch, including Dr. Chambers and Dr. Ernest E. Myers. In December, 1948, Dr. Myers was authorized to operate and remove a small sliver of bone which was thought to be causing irritation of the flesh near the tip of Mr. Welch's spine. In March 1951, Dr. Myers recommended a back brace to alleviate the pain. The Board authorized the brace purchased and Dr. Myers paid for his services.

"Mr. Welch continued to complain of severe pain, and recently was admitted to the Good Samaritan Hospital, where he was examined by Dr. Ralph Angelucci. Dr. Angelucci made various tests and is sure there are two ruptured "discs" and recommends another operation. His lowest fee for this type of operation is \$250.00."

President Donovan and the Comptroller recommended that an operation be performed and that the University authorize same, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President, with the expressed understanding that the action on the case was without commitment as to future action of the Board and it did not establish a precedent and did not admit negligence or liability in paying this bill.

R. Gifts.

From the Lexington Herald-Leader, Lexington, Kentucky -- \$500.00.

President Donovan reported receipt of check for \$500.00 from the Lexington Herald-Leader, to be used to hold an Institute of Politics under the auspices of the Department of Political Science during the month of July. He stated that this contribution will make it possible to bring to the campus some distinguished speakers and fits in well with the emphasis in our summer session on "Perspectives on Contemporary Life." He requested authority to accept the gift.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$500.00 from the Lexington Herald-Leader was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to thank Mr. Wachs, through whom the contribution was made.

From Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, Lexington, Kentucky -- \$500.00.

President Donovan reported receipt of check for \$500.00 from the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, to be used in further development of the Speech Clinic in the Department of Psychology under the direction of Dr. Charles F. Diehl. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$500.00 from the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to thank the donors.

From Mr. Harry Schacter, Louisville, Kentucky -- \$250.00.

President Donovan reported receipt of \$250.00 from Mr. Harry Schacter, Louisville, Ky., which Mr. Schacter wished to be used for the purpose of aiding the University of Kentucky Community Service Bureau in holding a conference of national leaders in community work. The President stated that Mr. Schacter has been very liberal in his contributions to this work and he recommended acceptance of the gift.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President, and authorized acceptance of \$250.00 from Mr. Harry Schacter, Louisville, Ky., to be used as stated above. The President was requested to express to Mr. Schacter the appreciation of the Board of Trustees and the University.

From Lexington Council of Jewish Women -- \$100.00.

President Donovan stated that he was in receipt of check for \$100.00 from the Lexington Council of Jewish Women, which the donors wished used in connection with Dr. Charles F. Diehl's work in the Speech Clinic of the Department of Psychology. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$100.00 by the Lexington Council of Jewish Women was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to thank the donors.

From Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs -- \$75.00.

President Donovan reported receipt of check for \$75.00 from the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs. He stated that this sum had been intended as an art scholarship for the second semester of the 1950-51 school year, but the check had come too late to be

used for that purpose. He recommended that this award be given to Mr. Louis Eads for his outstanding and creative work in art, and be used by Mr. Eads during the 1951 summer session.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$75.00 from the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs was ordered accepted and used as an award for Mr. Louis Eads during the 1951 summer session, and the President was requested to thank the donors.

S. Change-of-Work for Dean Cooper.

President Donovan reported that Dean Cooper was eligible for a change-of-work status and made the following statement:

"Dr. Thomas P. Cooper, having passed his 70th birthday, is recommended for a change of work, effective July 1, 1951. It is recommended that Dr. Cooper's new title be Dean Emeritus, College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and Director Emeritus, Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension, and that hereafter he be designated as Professor of Agricultural Economics.

"Dr. Cooper has completed thirty-three and one-half years of active service at the University of Kentucky and is entitled to fifty-three and one-half per cent of his salary at the age of sixty-five, which was \$7,000. Under the new assignment he will receive a salary of \$3,745 per annum."

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President, and Dean Thomas P. Cooper was ordered placed on change-of-work status at an annual salary of \$3,745 per annum.

T. Change of Work for Dr. Charles McChord.

President Donovan read the following communication from Dean Kirwan:

"Dr. Charles McChord of the University Health Service entered the employ of the University in September, 1943, and has been continuously employed since that time. He will, therefore, on August 31, 1951, have completed eight years of service to the University. Dr. McChord is now 67 years of age, having attained his sixty-fifth birthday on May 5, 1949. Dr. McChord has given valuable service to the University over the past eight years and is fitted to render further service. In view, however, of the anticipated decrease in the student body for next year there is no need for the employ of three full-time physicians in the Health Service. As a matter of economy and efficiency, therefore, I am recommending that Dr. McChord be placed on a change-of-work status as of August 31, 1951. On May 5, 1949, the date of his

sixty-fifth birthday, Dr. McChord's salary was \$5,300. His salary under the change-of-work status should be 28 per cent of this sum (20 per cent base plus 8 per cent for years of service), or \$1,484. Dr. Chambers and Dr. McChord have agreed upon the duties which Dr. McChord shall perform. He will do research on the History of Medicine in Kentucky."

President Donovan stated that he approved the recommendation of Dean Kirwan, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board directed that Dr. Charles McChord be placed on change-of-work status, under the conditions outlined above.

U. Leave of Absence for Dean Stahr.

President Donovan reported that he had approved and was recommending a leave of absence without pay for Dean Elvis J. Stahr, Jr., for July and August, 1951. Dean Stahr will be Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of the Army.

President Donovan recommended that Professor William L. Matthews, Jr., be appointed Acting Dean, with adjustment in salary, for July and August.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried; the leave of absence for Dean Stahr was granted, and Professor William L. Matthews, Jr., was appointed Acting Dean in the absence of Dean Stahr, with adjustment in salary.

V. Honorary Degrees Authorized.

The Board of Trustees, at its meeting on April 3, 1951, authorized honorary degrees conferred upon the following:

Murray Raney
Engineer and Scientist

Famed authority on catalysis, discoverer of Raney nickel, successful business executive and distinguished alumnus of this University.

Born at Carrollton, Kentucky, he was educated in the public schools of this state and in 1909 received the degree of B. S. in Mechanical Engineering at this University. After a year as a college teacher he entered the industrial field and in 1915 became the research engineer for the Chattanooga Research Company. Through his work a new catalytic agent now known as Raney nickel was developed, through the use of which the cotton hydrogenation process was reduced to less than one-fourth of the time previously required. A number of other patents have also been issued to

him, all pertaining to his efforts on catalyst alloys. Upon his retirement last year, he had served more than twenty years as president of the Gilman Paint and Varnish Company. Member of many learned scientific societies, he has remained a member of the Advisory Committee of the Industrial Research Institute of the University of Chattanooga, and he now maintains a private laboratory where he carries on research in his favorite field.

For his leadership in the development of science and industry in the South, and for his brilliant personal contributions to scientific research and engineering, the University of Kentucky, his Alma Mater, is proud to confer upon him the degree of Doctor of Science.

Dr. Emmet Field Horine
Physician

Eminent heart specialist, distinguished scholar in the history of medicine, and noted collector of books on medical history and cardiac disease.

Born at Brooks, Kentucky, graduate of the old Kentucky School of Medicine, trained at the National Heart Hospital in London, the University College Hospital in London, and the Allgemeines Krankenhaus in Vienna as a heart specialist, he returned to Louisville, where he served for many years on the faculty of Medicine of the University of Louisville and on the staff of a number of Louisville hospitals, as well as a director of the American Heart Association and a member of the Central Society for Clinical Investigation. He is one of the outstanding scholars in the field of Kentucky medical history and has contributed steadily through the years to state, regional, and national medical journals. In the meantime he has built up a virtually complete collection on cardiac disease, circulation of the blood, and related subjects, from the ancients up to modern times, and his collection on the history of medicine in Kentucky is exhaustive.

For his noble contributions to the fight against one of mankind's most fearful enemies, and for his achievements in the field of scientific scholarship in his native state, the University of Kentucky is proud to confer upon him the degree of Doctor of Science.

Albert Kocourek
Professor of Law Emeritus of Northwestern University

Native son of Kentucky, internationally famed scholar in the field of jurisprudence, distinguished lawyer and teacher.

Born at Louisville, Kentucky, educated at Lake Forest College and the University of Michigan, he began the practice of law in Chicago in 1897. In 1914 he accepted a professorship of law at Northwestern University and served in that capacity until his retirement a few years ago. He has acquired an international reputation as a legal scholar, particularly in the fields of jurisprudence and comparative law. A mere list of his books and learned articles and of the important legal works for which he has served as editor, compiler or translator would run to many pages. He has been recognized by the legal profession in France, Great Britain, Germany and the Netherlands as one of America's and the world's leading scholars, and has served in important capacities many of the world's great legal societies and associations. Through the years he has collected an outstanding library in his special fields which he presented some ten years ago to the Law School of this University, where it is now housed as the Kocourek Collection. Through his long years at Northwestern and abroad, he has never forsaken his loyalty to his native state.

For his great contributions to the prestige of American scholarship, to the administration of justice and to international cooperation and understanding, the University of Kentucky is proud to confer upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws.

Fred B. Wachs
General Manager of the Lexington Herald-Leader

Successful publisher, civic leader, farmer, and long-time friend of this University.

Born in Covington, Kentucky, graduated from high school in that city, he did not attend college but early in life became a member of the Fourth Estate. For thirty years he has been general manager of the Lexington Leader and is now general manager of the Lexington Herald-Leader. Quietly and for the most part behind the scenes, he has played an important and constructive part in the affairs of this city and this Commonwealth for over a quarter of a century. He has given generously of his time and effort in literally hundreds of movements, projects, and campaigns looking to the betterment of the Lexington community. On a wider front, he has served as president of the Kentucky Press Association, president of the Kentucky Mountain Laurel Association, director of the National Editorial Association, director of the Boys Clubs of America, and director of the National Hygiene Society, to mention but a few of his interests that transcend the local. He was honored a few years ago by selection as Lexington's Outstanding Citizen.

For his civic leadership, for his long and constant devotion to the ideals of service and charity, for his staunch friendship for this University, and for the encouragement he has given to many of its graduates who have begun their careers under his supervision, the University of Kentucky is proud to confer upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws.

I wish to recommend that all staff members of the Agricultural Extension Division, of whatever position as listed in the June 30, 1951 payroll, except those whose resignations become effective on or before that date, be continued in service, subject to proper performance of duties, availability of funds and approval of the budget by the Board of Trustees.

Also I wish to recommend that the secretarial and clerical staff of the Agricultural Extension Division as listed in the June 30, 1951 payroll, except those whose resignations become effective on or before that date, be continued in service, subject to proper performance of duties, availability of funds and approval of the budget by the Board of Trustees.
