Outreach: UK's commitment to community part of neighborhood revitalization project

Residents of Lexington's East End say the area has been neglected for a long time, and hope a \$400,000 community outreach initiative involving LIV will help change that.

The initiative, announced Friday, combines cooperation between UK, residents and more than 22 community organizations and government agencies. It aims at helping address family, educational, housing and neighborhood revitalization in the East End.

"This is what needs to happen to this area," said Betty Wilson, a second year social work student at LCC who lived in the East End all her life. The life of the initiative's "outreache of the initiative's "outreache of the initiative's "outreache and give feedback to others in the program." You can't come in and tell people what they need." Wilson explained. "The people have to tell others." The initiative focuses on the creation of the new Com-

Center, which will be used as the YWCA Phyllis Wheatley Center on Chestnut Street. Retia Walker, dean of the School of Human Environmental Sciences, said that the process began in 1999 when Jerry Bramwell, former UK vice president, brought a group of deans and representatives from the community together to discuss how UK could get more engaged in the community.

A proposal was twice denied by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. HUDD accepted the second revision of the proposal and provided \$400,000 to start the project.

Study says students most liberal since mid-70s

Leaning left: Report also finds trends toward interracial socializing, support for marijuana legalization and aversion to organized religion

After a steady decline in the early 90s, a recent report by UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute revealed that liberalism is gaining renewed popularity on college campuses. The American Freshman Survey, conducted annually since 1966, found that nearly 30 percent of first year students consider themselves liberal, an increase from 27 percent last year, and the highest number since the fall of 1975.

Many students say they have noticed the more liberal atmosphere on campus, espe-

cially among undergraduates.

"I think it's a time where they're simply more liberal because they have more freedom," said Darnell Anderson.
Though campus may seem more liberal, some say there is a large conservative presence.

"The majority of the people I know are conservative," said Jeff Graham, an engineering senior, "but I would say in my opinion, college students would be more liberal."


Of other students surveyed, 20 percent call themselves farright, and nearly half call themselves "middle of the road."

Pakistan — The Wall Strivet Journal appealed Saturday to the kidnappers of reporter Daniel Pearl to show evidence that he is still alive after an all-night search of Karachi graveyards turned up nothing. Pearl's wife and an American Muslim group issued separate appeals for his release, and e-malls purportedly sent Saturday by the kidnappers gave conflicting accounts of his fate. An e-mall received Friday by U.S. news organizations claimed Pearl, 38, had been killed and his body dumped in an unspecified cemetery in this city of 12 million people.



World forum addresses global issues

Seeking peace: Israeli-Palestinian conflict one of main subjects discussed by attendees

NEW YORK — Israell Foreign Minister Shimon Peres said he saw "a ray of hope" for Mideast peace Sunday, as the World Economic Forum focused on resolving long-standing global conflicts.

The 16-month Israell-Palestinian fighting took the spotlight at a panel which was supposed to be devoted to future political, social and economic trends likely to shape the world.

Participants at another session on the forum's fourth day talked about how to move the stalled Northern Ireland peace process forward of an equipment of the process forward of an equipment of the process.

Peres welcomed an opinion piece by Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat in Sunday's New York Times, saying it marked the first time he indicated a readiness to discuss key Issues and expressed determination 'to put an end' to the activities of terrorist organizations attacking Israeli civitians.

The believe that despite all the very pessimistic views, there is also with the Palestinians could lead to a cease-fire, Israeli recognition of a Palestinian state and Palestinian recognition of Israel's right to exist, Peres said. And eventually a final settlement could be reached on the most contentious issues of borders, refugees, settlements and Jerusalem, he added.

"The plan that we are now discussing is stop the war, then recognize immediately the establishment of a Palestinian state," Peres said, but he added that Arafat must first stop suicide attacks on Israelis.

In Israel on Sunday, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon announced he would continue cease-fire talks begun last week with the Palestinians.

Israel has confined Arafat to the West Bank town of Ramallah for the past two months, and the United States has demanded that the Palestinian leader do more to crack down on militants.

At the forum, U.S. Sen. Hillary Clinton, D.New York, said the United States "remains not only an honest broker but an essential rober." But she said the Bush administration is not doing enough to push the process forward.

Former U.S. national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski echoed Clinton's assessment, saying the United States has pursued a policy of being "a very cautions mediator" and hasn't gotten to "the heart of the problem."

About 2.70 participants at the five-day economic forum ranging from corporate leaders to celebrities—are discussing U.S. forces, and the continued the demonstrations with a march supporting animal rights Sunday afternoon.

The panel on Northern Ireland included George Mitchell, and former U.S. senator who helped broker a historic 1998 peace agreement, David Trimble, leader of Northern Ireland's power-sharing government, and Gerry Adams, leader of Sinn Fein, the political party linked to the Irish Republican Army.

Sunday's round of demonstrations against the forum was expected to produce a much lighter turnout than the demonstration saturday, which attracted as many as 7,000 people.

About 70 people were taken into custody on disorderly conduct charges Sunday afternoon after they blocked traffic in lower Manhattan, 3 1/2 miles from the Waldorf-Astoria hotel where the conference is taking place.

Professor testing urban legends

To do the experiment, Krupa said he had to discover a way to emulate a bird's

As part of his experiment, he filled plastic bags of very lightweight material with 100 mL of water and rice, and twisted the bag tightly as if to represent the crop of a bird — the crop of a bird — the crop of a bird s near the bird's chest and is where rice would be stored. He watched the imitation crop for 12 hours to see if it would expand to the point of combustion.

He has fed rice to the birds, but none have exploded. In fact, he found that rice is a treat for the birds.

Although he has yet to find any truth to this myth, he does make a suggestion — throw birdseed instead.





Parking nightmare plagues community

It's quite arguable that one of the most stressful situations to deal with at UK is parking. If you don't have a UK permit, you can not legally park in a UK lot without expecting a \$10 fine to be awaiting your return. If you plan to stay on campus for more than two hours, it's in your best interest not to park at a city meter, as you will likely receive a \$15 ticket for overtime parking.

You can't park on residential streets near campus unless you have a Residential Parking Permit, which are only given to people who live on the street. Basically, you can't park anywhere around here without getting at ticket or being towed. While it's understandable that parking must be regulated, it's undoubtedly unfair to the UK community that there are so few places to park on campus.

UK has 15,789 official parking spaces with more than 20,000 people on campus. So, it makes sense that more than 72,000 parking citations were written in the 1999-2000 fiscal year and more than 3,000 towed cars. It's no secret that UK's parking situation isn't the most friendly, but it gets worse.

Officials of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government cite parking violators, too. And it appears that they may be getting ready to get a little stricter. Just recently, a proposal initially created two years ago reemerged before the Urban County Council. The proposal, close to its second reading, suggests that after a driver collects three parking tickets an officer can tow the car at the fourth violation. Subsequently, the driver must pay all three of the citations, which double after 10 working days, in addition to the towing fee in order to repossess the car.

After all expenses are paid, the potential grand total is about \$210. It is still uncertain, under the proposed ordinance, if the violator must pay previous citations. But those poor individuals who have been collecting tickets for years had better hope that the proposal seeks to forgive unpaid parking fines.

The new ordinance is not only ridiculous, but there is no reason for it other than to create another way for the government to make money off its citizens. Supporters claim that the policy will generate more parking space, when in reality there are only a minimal amount of spaces to accommodate a whole lot of drivers.

What is a driver to do? Perhaps everyone should just walk to school regardless of how far they live away from campus. Indeed, UK needs to at least offer enough spaces to accommodate the permits it sells, but the city should help, too. Would it be too much to ask that Lexington give up a couple of streets for parking or at least allow drivers to park at a meter for more than two hours without getting fined?




