Speaker ponders whiteness in society

People were sitting on the floor and crowding the isles of the West End Boardroom. All had turned out to listen to David Roediger give a speech on "Studying Whiteness: an African-American Tradition." In his 50 minute speech Friday, Roediger discussed the meaning of whiteness and what it means to people of different races.

the meaning of whiteness and what it means to people of different races.

Whiteness scholars like Roediger say they are working toward deconstructing white privilege and identifying whiteness as an artificial construction, not the biological fact it is often assumed to be.

These scholars are looking for more concrete ways for whites to identify themselves by taking the concept of privilege out of the equation.

He pointed out that whites have used the argument of biological origins of race to keep blacks out of social settings. Roediger contended race as a subjective qualifier can be used effectively against blacks but is not relevant for Roediger's speech: why whiteness is a construction only non-whites have to think about daily.

To emphasize his point, Roediger identified the black practice of watching and learning white ways. He argued the black community


"I have been looking forward to beating our rivals in my last season," Allen said. "Today I had fun playing. The key for me to do well is to have fun."

NEW ORLEANS — The Green Bay Packers finally have a present to go with their past.

The 35-21 Super Bowl victory over the New England Patriots on Sunday hardly brought back memories of Vince Lombardi's grind-it-out champions of the '60s.

Instead, it was a high-powered Pack — doing it with big plays, especially by MVP Desmond Howard — that returned Green Bay to NFL prominence and put the title back in "Titletown, USA."

It hink it's time that the Lombardi Trophy goes home to Lambeau Field, where it belongs." Packers president Robert Harlan said.

It was Brett Favre finding the duckwalking Andre Rison for a 54-yard touchdown on the Packers' second offensive play, then throwing an 81-yard TD pass to Antonio Freeman in the first minute of the second quarter to put Green Bay ahead for good.

It was Howard scoring on a 99-yard kickoff return then striking an abbreviated Heisman pose in the end zone, a dagger in the heart of the Patriots, who had closed to 27-21.

Howard, the first special teams player ever to win MVP, finished with a record 244 return yards.

Originality, zany performances and a dark brand of English humor made A Fish Called Wanda the second most successful British film ever made, grossing more than \$200 million. So when cast members and creative minds behind Wanda reunited to make Fierce Creatures, there is definite cause for excitement ... right? Not quite.

With the lofty expectations of a Wanda repeat all but gone, I entered the theater prepared for a fatal flesh wound and left thinking the reunion was a minor scrape. Owing everything to the comic genius John Cleese, Fiere Creatures comes off as a predictable, lightweight comedy done fairly well.

As a marketing strategy, Cleese looks to rid the zoo of cute cuddly animals in favor of fierce, fear-instilling beasts. Things become complicated when two other corporate excess (guess who arrive to take over Cleese's operation. From there, the trio engage in standard farcical laughs with its definite ups and downs.

The man identified with cult favorites Monty Python and the Holy Grail and The Life glbran uses his usual combination physical humor with occasional black, sardonic wit to provide the majority of humor. The same cannot be said, however for other cast mates, Jamie Lee Curtis and Kevin Kline.

Kline, in dual roles, manages to be overly annoying at times, out loud funny at others, but never agood as the Academy Award winning performance in Wanda. In addition, the character he's better at playing has about one-fourth the screen time of the other. Cur-



The entire three-day long celebration sparkled. "An American Journey," the great festival on The Mall, had everything. Music played from Irish bands and jazz greats, Native American dancers took the stage just after Better than Ezra.

The sounds of American The sounds of American History, screaming 6-year-olds; and something called buffalo stew. The fireworks on Saurday night turned us into 5-year-olds; as Becca and Heather said, "Thank you, Mr. President. This is the best rese of our tax money yet."

Playing the role of tourist, Ifinally got around to seeing all the cool stuff I've always hoped to see. I stood in line for the Hope Dia-

course. The Vietnam War Memorial surprised me. I had been unsure, not knowing what to

unsure, not knowing what to expect.
Yes, it is hauntingly beautiful; the earth truly does seem to weep for her children there.
But I have no ties to that war — few in my family fought there, and I was born in 1975 after the end. Instead, the Korean War Memorial touched me, for my grandfather served in the Air Force during that time. More than \$4,000 people died from the U.S. alone. That's a tremendous number for so brief a mention in history.

The sheer awe of the Inauguration overshadowed all else. There comes a point when you realize, "I am here. History unfolds before my eyes.

I have taken my place on the pages of the chronicle of the nation." For me, that feeling came twice: once on the Senate floor,

when I stood and touched the desk of Henry Clay, and when I stood on Capital Hill (in surpris-ingly decent viewing range), and watched William Renquist swear in Bil Clinton. Even if I weren't a political junkie, I would have frozen.

Historians will debate Clinton's speech and his place in history for decades to come, but to me, that will not matter.

What other nation freely allows its citizens — all its citizens, from school children to the famous, college students to business people — attend a turning point in time such as this?

How many other places give wide-ranging tours of a working house of government as in the Capital?

Other than the balls, there is no cost for the events. If one does not happily donate by way of the gift shops (as I did; the Smithsonian must love me) and purchase

souvenirs, then it is free. No charge to see a grand event, a peaceful change of power or an eaffirmation of belief.

As sappy as it sounds, it is true. The Inauguration reminded me, that America really is what we claim to be: a diverse, great nation that holds democracy in ideals as well as in practice.

We have flaws; all human creations do. But it is still remarkable.

The Washington Post interviewed a spectator from Argentina, who pointed out the stunning thing about America: there were no guns needed to prevent a hostile takeover of power, and people seemed to truly support the office and ideals, if not necessarily the man.

It is the perfect educational experience for most college students.

To register, you just show up at The Holy Grail and pay \$8 tuition. A cushioned chair before a desk stocked with plastic cups and an ashtray awaits each student.

Most classmates, eager to learn more about beer, are enthused to get a head start. A start into the world beyond Bud Light.

Beer 101 is an open enrollment course, not exactly affiliated with UK, but a common part of college to many. Oldenberg President David Heidrich came to pour his knowledge of fine ales and lager on an audience of students, business leaders and housewises.

As a few late-comers straggle in, Heidrich urges them to hurry. "You're missing some of my best lines," he says.

Heidrich, a former attorney turned microfrevery president appeases all by promising to make up the answer to any question.

"There are two rules in beer school," he begins, "Beer makes friends, and there shall be no beer faseism."


Beer is ubiquitous, according to Heidrich, Most of all, there is no snob appeal, like with wipe. So, to get on a personal level, Heidrich asks students what brought them to the class last. Thursday night.

Did you know that beer is the best source of Vitamin E2 Or that two beers a day leads to a longer life and lowered chance of heart disease? Pediatricians created oatmeal stout for lactating mothers. George Washington even recommended two quarts of ale a day to soldiers. Maybe that was because he brewed it himself.

When monks were brewing theirs, they noticed rats died and candles went out when held over brew tanks. This discovery of carbon dioxide, of course uncovered something as important as the beer itself, oxygen.

In the Wild Blue Yonder beer at the Holy Grail, the blueberries dance like a lava lamp because of the carbon dioxide.

Statistics, another ever important part of beer school, show that most will have a cold one. Every year 80 million people drink beer.
