Mideast cease-fire Is threatened

JERUSHLEM — In a five-hour shootout, Israeli combat helicopters, attempting to rescue Jewish settlers trapped on a rocky West Bank hillside, traded heavy fire Thursday with Palestinian gunmen. Two people died and at least 18 were wounded. Both the Palestinians and the Israelis said the other side fired first. The firefight on Mount Ebal, overlooking the West Bank town of Nablus, came on the eve of the deadline imposed by both sides for ending three weeks of violence, which has left more than 100 dead, the vast majority Palestinians.

U.N. commission condemns Israel

U.N. commission condemns Israel
GENEVA — The top U.N. human rights body
voted Thursday to condemn Israel for "widespread, systematic and gross violations of human
rights" and set up an international inquiry into
violence in the West Bank and Gaza. Nineteen
nations approved the resolution put forward by
Arab nations. The United States and 15 others opposed it, while 17 abstatined. The resolution approved by a special session of the U.N. Human
Rights Commission strongly condemned "the indiscriminate use of force in violation of international humanftarian law by the Israeli occupying
power" during recent outbreaks of violence in
the Palestinian territories.

"It will give New York an opportunity to be even more arrogant." he said early Wednesday. "We'll be able to go around and say we have the two best teams in baseball."





First, your endorsement of the use of this variety of corn is based on a fallacious argument; i.e., the false dichotomy of choosing between insecticide-laced corn and genetically modified corn. You ignore the possibility of using corn that is neither pesticide-treated nor genetically modified. Second, you oversimplify this issue and frame it only in terms of food safe-ty. Your analysis ignores numerous ethical concerns regarding the patenting of organisms and the ecological impact of genetically

modified organisms. Third, you trivialize a scientific approach to testing and monitoring our foods, in particular the policies of the Food and Drug Administration, the institution that did not approve the use of this corn for human food. Your claim that the Bt gene is not harmful to humans is only an hypothesis, one that has not been thoroughly tested.
