Ticket lottery sparks student gripes

UK students outnumbered tickets by about 2-to-1 at Monday night's ticket lotter, and the crowd exceeded the fire code safety limits for Memorial Coliseum by more than 1.00 people.

The lottery's large turnout was because of the games the tickets were for the Dec. 3 North Carolina game and the Dec. 17 University of Louisville game. Students were lining up as early as 7:30 p.m., said staff support associate Lori Menter with UK Athletics.
"I arrived at about 7:30 p.m. and students were already lined up down the

AAA: Prices won't dampen holiday travel

In spite of higher gas prices and slightly fewer flight options, a greater number of Americans plan to travel this Thanksgiving than last year, according to Actional figures.
