Board votes to increase student fees

The low down: Trustees researching WRFL and SAB fees; Lee Todd's employment contract heard

Students will pay more in fees and room and board for the 2001-2002 school year.

Room and board in residence halls will be \$3,980, a \$198 increase. The increase includes an extra \$30 on the dining card fee. Housing at Greg Page Apartments and the

Sigma Alpha Epsilon House will increase to \$2,691, a \$174 jump.

Rates for other UK-operated apartments will increase between \$29 and \$32, and rates for summer session housing will increase between \$22 and \$55.

Student fees will go from \$168 to \$230.45. Trustees approved a \$9 jump in the technology fee for full-time students and a \$50 increase in

the student recreation fee for the expansion at the Seaton Center.

Requests for fee increases from the Student Center, WRFL and Student Activities Board were tabled for further research, said trustee and Student Government Association President Jimmy Glenn. An ad-hoc committee has been created to research the increases.

"We didn't want to overcharge the students," Glenn said.

Trustees also heard a report on the employment contract of incoming UK President Lee Todd.

Todd could make an annual salary of \$265,000, according to a draft of the contract.

Todd, who is away on business, has not yet signed the five-year contract. He will meet with Board Chairman Billy Joe Miles to discuss the deal.

The contract allows his salary to increase annually, based on the amount in the UK budget for salary increases for faculty and staff.

Todd can also earn more money through a performance-based incentive program. The bonus,

which cannot exceed \$100,000 per year, will be based upon predetermined institutional goals or strategic objectives, agreed upon between Todd and UK officials.

An evaluation process approved by the Board of Trustees will establish the amount of the performance-based payment.

"It is a contract that meets the institutional expectations and is comparable with benchmarks in terms of base salary and benefits," said Dan Reedy, board secretary and trustee.

Kentucky residents still sluggish from spill

Running black: Forum at UK will address effects of October coal sludge spill

INEZ — "It's more of a cover-up than a cleanup," said Monroe Cassady, a resident of Coldwater Fork, about the efforts of the Martin County Coal Company to restore the damage done by the collapse of one of its slurry impoundment ponds.

Coldwater Fork and Wolf Creek still run black.

An informational forum at 8:00 tonight in the W.T. Young auditorium entitled "What If This Was Your Backyard?" will address the spill and its effects on residents' lives.

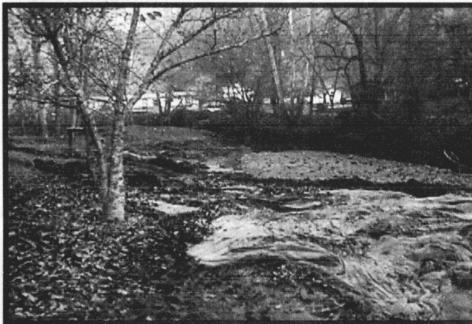
Just after midnight on Oct. 11, 2000, the floor of a 72-acre slurry impoundment pond of Martin County Coal Company broke, spilling some 250 million gallons of coal waste through the abandoned deep mines below. Within the mines, the slurry separated into a thinner "black water" that ran down Wolf, while a pudding-like sludge crept down Coldwater. The black water raced through Wolf Creek into the Tug Fork of the Big Sandy River (which empties into the Ohio River), temporarily disrupting water supplies to many parts of Eastern Kentucky and West Virginia. Called one of the largest environmental disasters ever in the southeastern United States by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the spill decimated the aquatic life of the affected waterways.

At Coldwater Fork, coal slurry blanketed the valley from creekbed to hillside in a flood that rose for three days. The great field of sludge stretched out of sight, eight feet deep in places, destroying cornfields, grazing land, arbors and yards where children's swing sets stood. The dark, metallic glare of the slurry reflected light in fascinating ways. In places, it dried in stiff, angular walls, twisted into fantastic shapes by machinery; elsewhere it was watery and lay in smooth, deep beds.

Coldwater Fork ran slow and black with the slurry. Workers dammed Coldwater Fork with gravel, turning the stream into a deep black pool. The regular course of the stream lay hidden, obscured by the flood of coal waste. Excavators squatted in the creek, scooping away loads of slurry and dirt from the stream to dump into waiting trucks. Bulldozers and Bobcats slipped in the muck on shore. All of this took place in people's backyards, just a few feet from their doorways. Houses were diked and sandbagged; sheds were surrounded entirely, marooned in a sea of coal waste.

Much has changed on Coldwater Fork since the spill first occurred. Most of the deep beds of slurry are gone and with them the heavy removal equipment, replaced by fields of straw and hydroseed. The native soil in many places has been removed and replaced by trucked-in rock, fill dirt and sand.

"This wasn't done in darkness" Several residents of Coldwater Fork have reported recently mishandled clean-up procedures of the spilled slurry on the part of Martin County Coal

Corporation.
"A lot of it on the banks, they just covered it with dirt and crushed sandstone," Cassady said. "They had no intention of doing it right."

said Greg Preece said, a resident of Coldwater Fork who filmed much of the clean-up work. "This was standard operating procedure, in plain daylight, in view of everything."

Residents also allege slurry and slurry-contaminated dirt had been flipped over by excavators, burying the contaminated dirt under "clean" dirt. Slurry has also been covered over by sand and rock or hay and hydroseed. Workers even use high-pressure hoses to spray the slurry back into the creek.

Portraying images of perfection

The cause: Today, the kernel takes a look at the causes behind eating disorders

Elizabeth Demaret graduated from the University of Richmond with three degrees and a minor — and she could have done it a semester early. Instead, the honor student who worked three jobs during all of her college years opted to spend her last semester working in Ireland as a legislative aide for the man who would become the country's prime minister.

When she left for Ireland in 1987, the high-achieving standout was a picture of perfection.

But when she returned, her own family was aghast at the sight of her. She had lost 30 pounds overnight, most of it in toilets. She carried 108 pounds on a 5-foot-9-inch frame, eating mustard packets and bowls of shredded carrots for meals.

"Whole carrots would be too much," she said.

Though she remembers Ireland as a "personal high," she also realizes that there she began the destruction that would lead to her personal low: bulimia and anorexia.

For high-achievers like Demaret, the psychological strain of perfectionism can result in eating disorders, said Gabriella Pessah, senior staff psychologist at UK's Counseling and Testing Center.

"You've got someone who is constantly struggling to create the perfect image," she said, "but internally they're not feeling good enough."

Not one thing causes eating disorders, Pessah said. A combination of psychological, interpersonal, social and other possible biological or biochemical factors are at the root of anorexia and bulimia.

"For each individual, it is different," she said, "it might be some combination of one or two or three or all of the above."

Mirror, mirror on the ... media?

Inside the magazine, a section called "Cosmo Diet" informs readers how to fend off "food-pushers" and how to "reject seconds in a sly way."

Has the media lassoed young women with a distorted measuring tape?

Some say yes.

While the media cannot be called the sole cause of eating disorders, it does encourage poor body image, which is one of the social factors that can lead to both bulimia and

The Low-down

Students say gunman warned of shooting

SANTEE, Calif. — Some classmates described the 15-year-old as a "nerd" and a "dork" and said he was taunted relentlessly. Others said the high school freshman told them he was going to bring a gun to school and shoot up the campus but they didn't take him seriously. On Monday, the student who authorities identified as Charles Andrew Williams allegedly opened fire at Santana High School, killing two and injuring 13 in this middle-class San Diego suburb. One student said he had a smile on his face as he fired away with a .22-caliber pistol in this middle-class suburb about 10 miles northeast of San Diego. Police Lt. Jerry Lewis said the teen-ager shot two people in the restroom, then walked into a quad and fired shots randomly. He stopped to reload his weapon as many as four times, getting off 30 or more shots, Lewis said.

Cheney expected to return to work

WASHINGTON — Vice President Dick Cheney should be able to continue in his job unimpeded by his latest heart problems, doctors say, shrugging off any suggestion that he should curtail travel or his intense workload. But Cheney also was given some tough news after he had an angioplasty to unclog a coronary artery Monday. Even if he sticks to his no-beef diet and rigorous workout regimen, there is a fair chance he will be back in the hospital facing the same trouble soon, his physicians said. Cheney, who has had four heart attacks, underwent the angioplasty after he experienced a series of subtle pains in his chest. Doctors said their best evidence indicated that Cheney, 60, had not suffered another heart attack.

Naval investigator outlines sub collision

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii — A series of mistakes by the crew of the USS Greenville paved a destructive path that led to the submarine's fatal collision with a Japanese fishing boat, according to testimony from a Navy admiral. The mistakes ranged from the submarine rushing to get back on schedule to vital sonar data not getting to the skipper. Rear Adm. Charles Griffiths testified Monday, the opening day of a Navy court of inquiry into the Feb. 9 collision. Griffiths, who conducted the preliminary investigation, painted a picture of a submarine crew so consumed with putting on a good show for 16 civilian guests that standard procedures fell by the wayside. The nuclear attack submarine was demonstrating an emergency surfacing drill for the guests when it smashed into the Ehime Maru. The boat, carrying 36 people, was on an expedition to teach high school students from Uwajima, Japan, how to fish. Four teens, two teachers and three crewmen never were found.



MORE PLEASE: The hit television comedy "Frasier," whose future was in doubt for months as NBC negotiated a new contract, will return to the network for three more years for as much as \$5.5 million per episode, NBC said on Tuesday. NBC and "Frasier" producer Paramount Television Group reached agreement on Monday, just days after a reported exclusive bargaining period for NBC to renew its contract came to an end.

New England managing March nor'easter

RYE, N.H. — Despite the direst predictions, the East Coast largely rode out a snowy March nor'easter although New Englanders watched a strengthening blizzard and feared the worst was yet to come. From Connecticut to Maine, shelters were set up, schools were closed, flights were canceled and offices shuttered Tuesday as an unofficial holiday for many people stretched into a second day. More than 20 inches piled up early Tuesday in Keene, in southwestern New Hampshire, according to the National Weather Service. Half of it fell during a three-hour period overnight.

Spy suspect ordered held in jail

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — A federal judge said Monday that the government's case against accused spy Robert Philip Hansen was "extraordinarily strong" and ordered Hansen confined to jail. Hansen, who appeared at a hearing wearing a green jumpsuit with the word "prisoner" printed across the back, did not contest his confinement under an agreement forged with prosecutors. A U.S. official, speaking on condition of anonymity, confirmed that law enforcement officials believe Hansen may have alerted Moscow to a secret tunnel built under the Russian embassy by American intelligence agencies for eavesdropping.

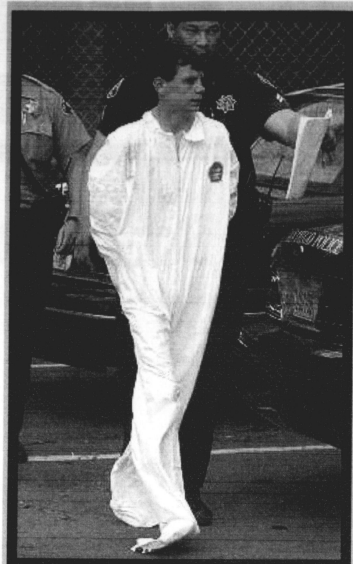
Remains of guardsmen recovered

UNADILLA, Ga. — A somber procession of military vehicles delivered the remains of 21 guardsmen to a central-Georgia air base as Army investigators scrambled over the site where their plane crashed, mapping and videotaping the charred wreckage. Lt. Col. Deborah Bertrand, a Robins Air Force Base spokeswoman, said the bodies were transported Monday to the base south of Macon. Local law enforcement officers escorted the convoy. The remains of the three Florida Army National Guard crew members and 18 passengers from the Virginia Air National Guard were to be flown Tuesday, weather permitting, to an Air Force casualty center in Dover, Del. The plane, a C-23 Sherpa was flying from Florida to Virginia when it crashed Saturday in a field. The recovery team had been slowed by 3 feet of mud caused by a 4-inch deluge of rain. Wind and sunshine helped dry the field Monday.

Court upholds freeze on Estrada charges

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines' Supreme Court on Tuesday rejected a request that would have allowed prosecutors to immediately file charges against ousted leader Joseph Estrada. The ruling, which means Estrada cannot be charged until March 23, was in response to a request by Ombudsman Aniano Desierto that the court lift its 30-day suspension of criminal cases against Estrada. The court said the suspension, ordered last month, cannot be lifted since its ruling Friday that stripped Estrada of immunity has not yet become final. Estrada had 15 days to appeal Friday's ruling.

Many others have questioned the effectiveness of the cleanup.

"When it rains, black water rises up through the hay, hydroseed and fill dirt," said Lilly Adkins, a Martin County Sun reporter.

"Martin County Coal thinks they can put icing on a big round rock and make it look like a cake and fool our government officials into signing off on their clean up," added a resident of Coldwater who did not want to be named.

Officials of the Martin County Coal Company insist they have handled the cleanup properly and effectively.

"The company has not been remiss in any way since the spill occurred. We addressed the problem quickly and with great vigor," said Baxter Phillips, vice president of A.T. Massey, the parent company of MCCC.

Bill Marcum, a spokesman for A.T. Massey, called the residents' complaints, "Not true. Period. There has been no attempt at a cover up on the company's part."

However, many residents feel their opinions and concerns have gone unheard.

"We had absolutely no control nor any input into the cleanup would take place, nor what level of clean up would be satisfactory. We have no control over our own land," Preece said. Several town meetings were held by the MCCC, where residents could pose questions to Dennis Hatfield, the company's president.

"The people had all kinds of opportunities to ask questions," Marcum said. "We feel the communication process was working."

Residents disagree. Con-

cerning the meetings, Cassidy said. "There is no relationship. It has been severed. They had a few town meetings. No questions were answered; they would say, 'I'm not sure, I'll check on that.' Few questions were really answered."

Other recent developments have added to the debate over MCCC's accountability in cleaning up the spill. Core drills performed by the Mining Safety and Health Administration show large inaccuracies in the company's mine maps. MSHA's core samples show the distance between the failed impoundment floor and old mine shaft tunnels was less than 10 feet, contrary to the 90 to 100 feet shown in maps submitted by MCCC in 1994 for a permit to enlarge the pond.

Despite MSHA's findings, MCCC insists that the maps are correct.

MSHA also issued citations for several other violations of the same slurry impoundment.

MCCC filed an appeal of these citations with the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet.

"Why they would reopen it remains a mystery," Preece said. "It failed in '94; it failed in 2000. Why risk lives to load it up again? It doesn't make sense."

Life on Coldwater Creek

A chaos of slurry and reclamation work has disrupted long-established patterns of life on Coldwater Creek.

"To see your community, something you've cared about your whole life, subjected to something like that, it's hard to describe what we've been through. It will never be the same," Preece said.

Four weeks into the cleanup, MCCC employees still worked around the clock, using tall halogen lights after dark.

"With that, and the buzz and grind of the machinery, we can't sleep a wink," said another resident of Coldwater Creek. "We won't leave, though. They tried to put us in a motel. But I don't want them running around on my land without anyone here to keep an eye on them."

KY 908, the road along Coldwater, is still slick with the black goop that spilled from the constant flow of oversized dump trucks.

"You proceed at your own peril to dodge the excavators and sludge trucks on the road, while you slip and slide on the thick black mud which is covering the roadway," Preece said.

Under the guise of public

safety, MCCC illegally blocked KY 908 for a short time, allowing no one through but residents.

"KY 908 has changed from being that pleasant drive home ... to the prison walk where you show your pass at the roadblock," Preece said.

Heavy machinery blazing through yards crushed the septic pipes of some residents' homes.

"We now have the constant smell of raw sewage in our backyards," Preece said.

"We are told by health department officials that we cannot replace our in-ground systems for a full year after the property has been restored."

The Preecees and other families have resided in apartments since they were displaced by this catastrophe, unable to return to their homes until their septic systems are fixed.

These are homeland people, with long memories and deep connections to the land.

"I would say most of the people will stay," said Cassidy, a lifelong resident of 60 years.

"Some may lock their places up and go. There's no such thing as selling your place. No one wants to live on Coldwater."

anorexia, Pessah said.

"The cultural pressures glorify being thin and place really high value on having the 'perfect body,'" she said.

Demaret is quick to say society didn't cause her eating disorder, but she's also the first to point out the negative image it is sending to adolescents. She said she worries about how to protect her daughter from the "thin is beautiful" societal messages.

According to an article in the Nutrition Research Newsletter, past research has shown that eating disorder patients and women showing high body dissatisfaction tend to overestimate their body size after viewing thin models.

Now a healthy weight, Demaret said she will never see her true reflection in the mirror. "I see rolls of fat and dimples. I have to use other mirrors — my husband and my children — things that will give me positive feedback."

It is difficult to find positive feedback about body image anywhere, said Jill Kindy, a

dietician at Student Health.

"We don't have too many good examples of someone saying 'I am OK the way I am,'" Kindy said, "and you are OK the way you are."

But UK advertising professor Denis Altman does not think it is up to the advertising industry to set an example.

"Advertising merely reflects what exists," he said.

"Size four supermodels are clothes hangers, not role models."

If American women are upset by the images they should speak up, but they don't, he said. "They just say 'what a pretty dress.'"

However, Stephanie Lucchese, an integrated strategic communications senior, doesn't just see pretty dresses when she scrolls through magazines and on billboards.

During both high school and college, Lucchese has known girls with eating disorders.

But the preoccupation with body image began for many of her friends in middle school. "When Lucchese looks at a *Cosmopolitan* she would like the cover to be a true reflection of American women. They are putting false ideals in the way we ourselves."

Reflections

Demaret's 4-year-old daughter loves to dance in front of full-length mirrors. But she can't do it at home — her mother can't stand the sight of her own reflection.

Demaret's husband finally convinced her to buy their daughter a full-length mirror. But Demaret hasn't hung it up yet.

Industry gets upper hand

Dr: Order gives industry control over Napster

SAN FRANCISCO — The music industry must catalog the copyright songs it wants removed from Napster Inc., a federal judge said in a ruling posted Tuesday, giving the highly popular file-swapping service three business days to block free sharing of that music.

The order, dated Monday, effectively gave the recording industry control over the immediate fate of the Internet-based clearinghouse that turned music distribution on its head and cultivated a following of millions.

Napster is fighting to stay online and retain its popularity while promising to shift over to a subscription-based service.

For that, it depends on the cooperation of the very music labels that sued the company to stop song swapping.

Napster, which has strug-

gled in the past few days to screen out some songs already identified by record labels, had no immediate comment on the ruling by U.S. District Judge Marilyn Hall Patel.

In issuing an injunction she reworked on the order of an appeals court, Patel said the record companies must notify Napster of the title of the song, the name of the artist and the name of the Napster file containing the infringing material.

But other parties also should take "reasonable measures" to identify the copyright-infringing music, she said.

Patel acknowledged that it might be difficult to identify all variations of a copyright song, even those Napster users could use code words or shorthand to identify different pieces of music. "It is difficult, however, does not relieve Napster of its duty," she wrote.

The judge said she would hear any disputes arising from her decision and appoint an independent technical expert if necessary.

Patel's ruling does not mean Redwood City-based Napster has to shut down or turn itself off, stressed Eric Scheiner, an analyst with Forrester Research.

"What it does is give the record labels a great deal of power over exactly what songs are going to show up on Napster, how long they're going to be there, and how usable Napster will be for the vast number of consumers that are on there now," Scheiner said.

Hilary Rosen, president of the Recording Industry Association of America, said the labels would comply fully with the court's order.

"We intend to provide the notifications prescribed by the court expeditiously, and look forward to the end of Napster's infringing activity," Rosen said.

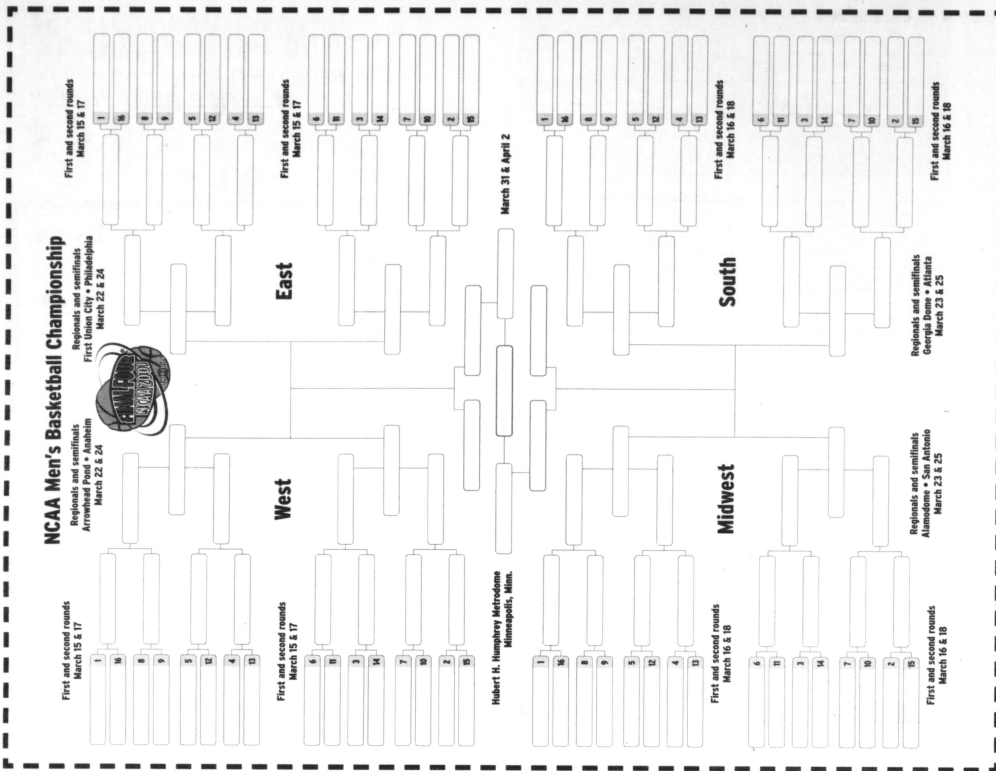

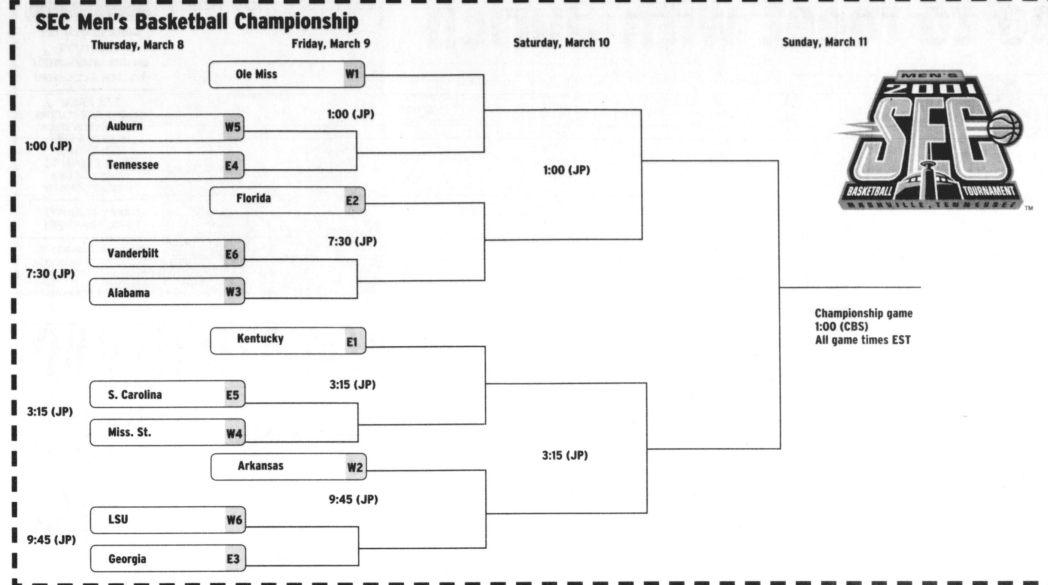

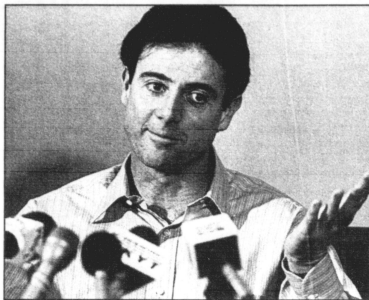

Pitino to meet with Jurich

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Louisville athletic director Tom Jurich said Tuesday that Rick Pitino was his top choice to be the Cardinals' next coach and they will discuss the job this weekend.

Denny Crum, who coached Louisville to two NCAA championships, announced his retirement last Friday, ending a 30-year Hall of Fame career. Speculation about Pitino — former coach of Kentucky and the Boston Celtics — began almost immediately.

Jurich said he did not try to contact Pitino until Sunday, when he called Brent Rice, a Lexington attorney and a mutual friend. Jurich said he and Pitino had not spoken at all.

"I will be meeting with Rick this weekend down in Florida," Jurich said at a news conference. Pitino said earlier in the day on ESPN Radio that

he was interested in the Louisville job. He took over a Kentucky program strapped with NCAA probation in 1989 and turned it into an NCAA champion seven years later.

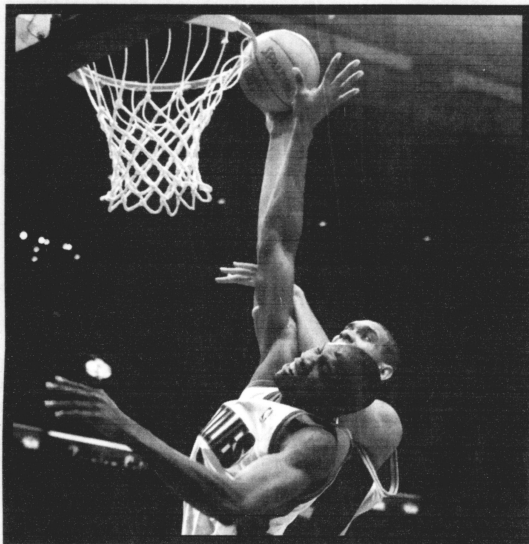
Pitino would have another rebuilding project in Louisville. U of L was one of the top teams in the 1980s, but has steadily declined in the past four seasons, going 62-61 with an 0-2 record in the NCAA tournament.

"What I've tried to focus on is who would be the best fit and who would do the best job and who I would enjoy working with," Jurich said. "I feel at this point, coach Pitino is really who I want to focus on. I want to go down and spend as much time as I possibly can selling the amenities of this program."

"It's a program I feel is one of the top five jobs in America and I want the opportunity to tell him."

Rick Pitino, who led the Cats to a national title in 1996 before resigning to coach the NBA's Boston Celtics in 1997, is a candidate for the U of L job.

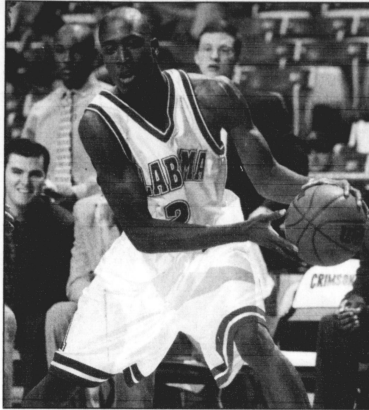

SportsDaily votes Prince SEC Player of the Year



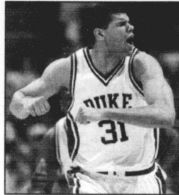

UK production of 'Earnest' a crowd pleaser

As my boyfriend and I made our way out of the Guignol Theatre after Friday night's performance of *The Importance of Being Earnest*, trivial criticism played like a scratched record, skipping to the beat of shuffling feet. "Too forceful," they pushed through their pursed lips. "Too much," they scoffed while donning their mink stoles.

It was perfect, paradoxical and just what Oscar Wilde would have wanted. "Only shallow people do not judge by appearances," he might have announced in his extravagant way, as the insincere shuffled their grumbling little feet past him.

I've always had a thing for this playful satire whose pun-filled title is amusing in itself. Yet, I have always had a thing for poking fun at the frivolity of the upper class as well. Written in 1895, the play was originally intended to taunt early Victorian society, but UK's theater department gave their performance a modern slant, setting the stage in London, 1953. So, we are given a play that taunts a more modern version of England's upper class, bored and prospering from the working class' efforts in the last of the World Wars.

When two of the main characters' only option for escaping the superficiality of their daily lives is to create fictitious "other selves" to evade their haughtily boring engagements (bril-

liantly coined "Bunburying" by the character Algernon, played by Bobby Diebold), it's quite obvious they have nothing better to do. But, having their shared pseudonym be named Earnest, why that's ingenious. Thus we understand the main theme and fitting sub-themes thrown strategically about in *The Importance of Being Earnest*.

I think Wilde would have been quite pleased with this production's adaptation of his work. The cast took the saying "there are no small parts" literally as each delivered a delightfully strong and individualized performance. Even the servants, with their snooty but well thought-out commentary and raised chins added significant laughter to the audience.

Miss Prism (Trisha Pfister) and Rev. Chausuble (Patrick M. Bentley) trespassed into an amusing forbidden love land of their own. When together, the two actors could do no wrong. Ellie Clark, with her many hats and aristocratic rules and regulations took center stage many a time with her commanding portrayal of Lady Bracknell.

The bright and lively performance of Lexie Kemper as Cecily could have stirred the flower bearing free spirit in even the prudish of the prudens. Surely it wasn't her inheritance alone that Lady Bracknell saw in Cecily's lemon-yellow presence.

The two protagonists, who go about with their "Bunburying," making the play a definite Wilde signature, had an intense on-stage chemistry, which flowed as steadily as the many

martinis the two poured for themselves between brisk banter. While in a silly little tisk with their respective "women," Cecily and Gwendolyn (Morgan Black), Moncrieff and Worthing perform a beat-influenced version of "Me and My Shadow" to fill in the "silence" of the night.

My favorite aspects of the production, however, were the scenery design and costume design, which placed the production uniquely above the many literal adaptations of *Earnest*.

From Moncrieff's London flat with its vintage vinyl, fake fruit, glass poodles, shiny wet bar and abstract jacks-influenced wall design, to Worthing's Manor House garden with its Japanese bushes, angular flower boxes filled with feckless white rocks, tawdry lawn furniture and pseudo Zen garden back-drop, the designers excelled in frivolity.

The costumes were equally excessive. Plush little slip-on

gloves, parasols, handbags, jeweled petticoats and wickedly tempting hats glittered the already elaborately dressed bodies of the actors. I was in fashion awe.

Wilde subtitled *The Importance of Being Earnest* "A Trivial Play for Serious People." Most of the audience got this without having it spelled out for them on the program. These lucky lads and lasses took the evening's performance in like a breath of "taken for granted air," and filled the Guignol with appreciative laughter.

The shallow few with their mild complaints and imaginations only created an ironic theme song for the rest of us. But like the broken records that they are, they persisted to skip over the theme of the production, thus tainting the song for a few of us.

Jazz music no longer silent

Jazz banned: Despite the greatness of Bird, Dizzie and Miles, jazz battled for early acceptance

In 1951 jazz was the sound of rebellion. Before Bill Haley rocked around the clock and Elvis wiggled his hips into the hearts of America's youth and the disdain of America's elders, jazz captured the pulse of America's youth.

Jack Fletcher and Byron Romanowitz had their fingers on this pulse, until the UK hierarchy decided to pull the plug and flatline the heartbeats of jazz enthusiasts throughout the Bluegrass.

Fletcher, who plays trombone, and Romanowitz, who plays tenor sax, were part of Phi Mu Alpha, a music fraternity at UK. The group was set to play a jazz concert on March 7. The concert never took place.

Fletcher and Romanowitz spent many of their Saturdays with jam sessions along the High Street bars. These jam sessions became quite popular, with musicians passing through town sometimes sitting in.

The day that forever changed the course of jazz at UK, singer Jan Cornett was in town and singing with some members of Phi Mu Alpha.

In fact, it was the popularity of these creative jam sessions that doomed the upcoming jazz concert.

Such a buzz was created that a writer from the Lexington Leader ran a front page story about the musical get together, complete with a picture that featured Romanowitz.

One problem: Their usual location, The Zebra Lounge, was being repaired. So the picture captured them playing at the Drake Hotel, a notorious bar frequented by prostitutes.

When Edwin Stein, head of UK's music department, and A.D. Kirwin, dean of students and eventual UK president, got wind of the story they sprang into action, barring the upcoming concert and writing an article in the Lexington Leader vilifying jazz.

But the group did find a way around the ban.

"We backed up gymnasts," Fletcher said with a laugh.

Instead of a recital hall, Phi Mu Alpha played a limited set at a UK gymnastics meet.

The plight of the musicians didn't go unnoticed. Noted poet Langston Hughes was in town shortly after and left a signed book of his poetry for

the group. The inscription read: "To all the cats who play jazz at the University of Kentucky."

The canceling of the concert was the only hardship that befell Romanowitz because of his love of jazz.

"I quit playing for almost 20 years when I wanted to establish my own architecture firm. I discovered that people didn't want to hire an architect on Monday who they saw playing jazz on Saturday night," Romanowitz said.

But over the years peoples view of jazz has changed. It is now considered perhaps the only true American art form. Sculpture, painting, literature, these had all been perfected and explored long before America became a nation. But jazz, that was ours.

And half a century after their proposed concert, Jack Fletcher and Byron Romanowitz will finally take the stage with a jazz orchestra to play the show that never was.

And after all this time, after successful careers for both (Fletcher is an analytical chemist in South Carolina and Romanowitz an architect who received his masters from Princeton and actually designed the building that the concert will be held in), they come together for UK's Jazz Spectacular to play the music they love.

For Romanowitz, who still lives in Lexington, the reason is simple. "It's fun."

Consumer jitters: Looking for a new computer not the impossible chore it seems to be, experts say

Whether you're a computer science major or someone who doesn't want to hoof it to the library every time you have to type a paper, computers are needed in college more than any other time in your life.

However, most people don't know what to look for when buying a new computer, making the decision quite frustrating.

While most people are hesitant to make their way to an electronics store to be attacked by commission-seeking salespeople, most stores are trying to combat that attitude by taking a low-key approach.

"Honestly, I haven't noticed any problems [with fear of commissioned salespeople]," said Amy Arnold, a business junior and Solutions Adviser at the Lexington Gateway Country store. Arnold works on commission, and says most people she sees don't really find a problem with it.

"I've had people ask if I was on commission just to make sure that I got credit for it," Arnold said.

There's also the option of not working on commission. Michael

Jones, a supervisor in the computers department of Best Buy of Lexington, said Best Buy is the only store in Lexington that doesn't have its sales people work on commission.

Jones said this leaves a greater comfort level with the customers and gets them to trust that the salesperson is really trying to find them a good match, not trying to get a bonus.

The next problem that the average student runs into is what kind of computer to buy. Arnold said she has seen students come in and buy too much, usually with their parents.

Some of the extravagant things she's seen?

Surround sound speakers, 19-inch monitors and extremely large hard drives tend to be the front runners.

On the flip side, Arnold said she's also seen students scrimp on things they really shouldn't. Most of the time it's RAM, or random access memory, that is trimmed.

Another thing most students think about when it comes to computers is support and service. While Best Buy advertises a one, two or three-year service plan on its com-

puters for an extra amount. Gateway advertises an included plan that includes three-years parts and labor, one-year, on-site assistance and lifetime phone technical support.

Other peripherals can also sweeten a deal when buying. Most places will throw in a printer or a year of Internet access free of charge if you buy at the right time. So, part of looking for a computer might just be looking at the right time.

Finally, the last question a student asks is, "How much will this set me back?"

Jones's recommended system, a 700-800 megahertz processor with 64 megabytes of RAM, a CD-writer for making custom CDs, a 20 gigabyte hard drive, 17-inch monitor, printer and one year of MSN Internet service will run a person around \$1,000, with service running extra.

Arnold, whose system included a one gigahertz Pentium III processor, 128 megabytes of RAM, DVD/CD drive, CD-writer, 16 megabyte graphics card, 17-inch monitor and all the aforementioned support, would cost around \$1,500.

These investments, while not cheap, are good systems that will fight the technology curve for, at the current rate, at least five years. Which leaves you at a good time to pay for it — just as you get your degree.

Gaming systems push the limits of consumer interest

High-priced toys: Technological discoveries and need for eye candy up the stakes in today's gaming systems

Sony's PlayStation 2 took America by storm during its release — and video game excitement is far from over as two new gaming consoles prepare for equally impressive launches.

The release of the Microsoft Xbox and Nintendo Gamecube, tentatively set for October 2001, will force die-hard gamers to make a serious choice between two state-of-the-art platforms.

Robert Hines, an LCC computer science sophomore, plans to wait and see the games that each system offers before he pulls out his wallet.

"The question is whether they can compete with PCs," Hines said. "If the games are revolutionary, I would consider picking one up."

The Xbox has a revolutionary set of features that distinguish it from the competition. For instance, an Intel-built 733 MHz Pentium III processor powers the system. The speed more than doubles that of the PlayStation 2.

Microsoft has a wide variety of game developers signed on to the system including Acclaim, Capcom, Midway and THQ. The company hopes to launch between 15 and 35 games with the system.

Possible launch titles include Tony Hawk's Pro Skater 2x, Crash Bandicoot X (formerly a PlayStation exclusive), Metal Gear X, The Matrix and Jurassic Park 3.

Start counting your pennies, though, because Microsoft representatives have said the Xbox will be com-

petitively priced, which could mean the \$300 price tags that accompanied the Sega Dreamcast and PlayStation 2.

Jared Brice, a FuncoLand game adviser, said the video game retail outlet has stopped taking preorders for the Xbox because they already have 14,000 reservations nationwide.

"We had to put a halt to it because we don't know how many we'll get at each store," Brice said.

The competition for the Xbox is Nintendo's newest offering, the Gamecube. The Gamecube is Nintendo's first system to abandon cartridges as it will use 8-cm optical discs.

The noticeable difference between Gamecube and the competition is that it does not include a DVD player, but Howard Lincoln, a former Nintendo chairman, has confirmed that a DVD player that plays Gamecube games will be available.

Games under development for the Gamecube include sequels to Wave Race 64 and Star Wars: Rogue Squadron and a new installment in the Zelda series. But the game that is creating the most buzz is Metroid 4, the first Metroid game since the Super Nintendo.

Both systems are likely to make parents pull out their checkbooks next Christmas season, but Brice expects more people to save their money for the Xbox than the Gamecube.

"The demand for the Nintendo 64 just hasn't been there the past couple of years," Brice said.

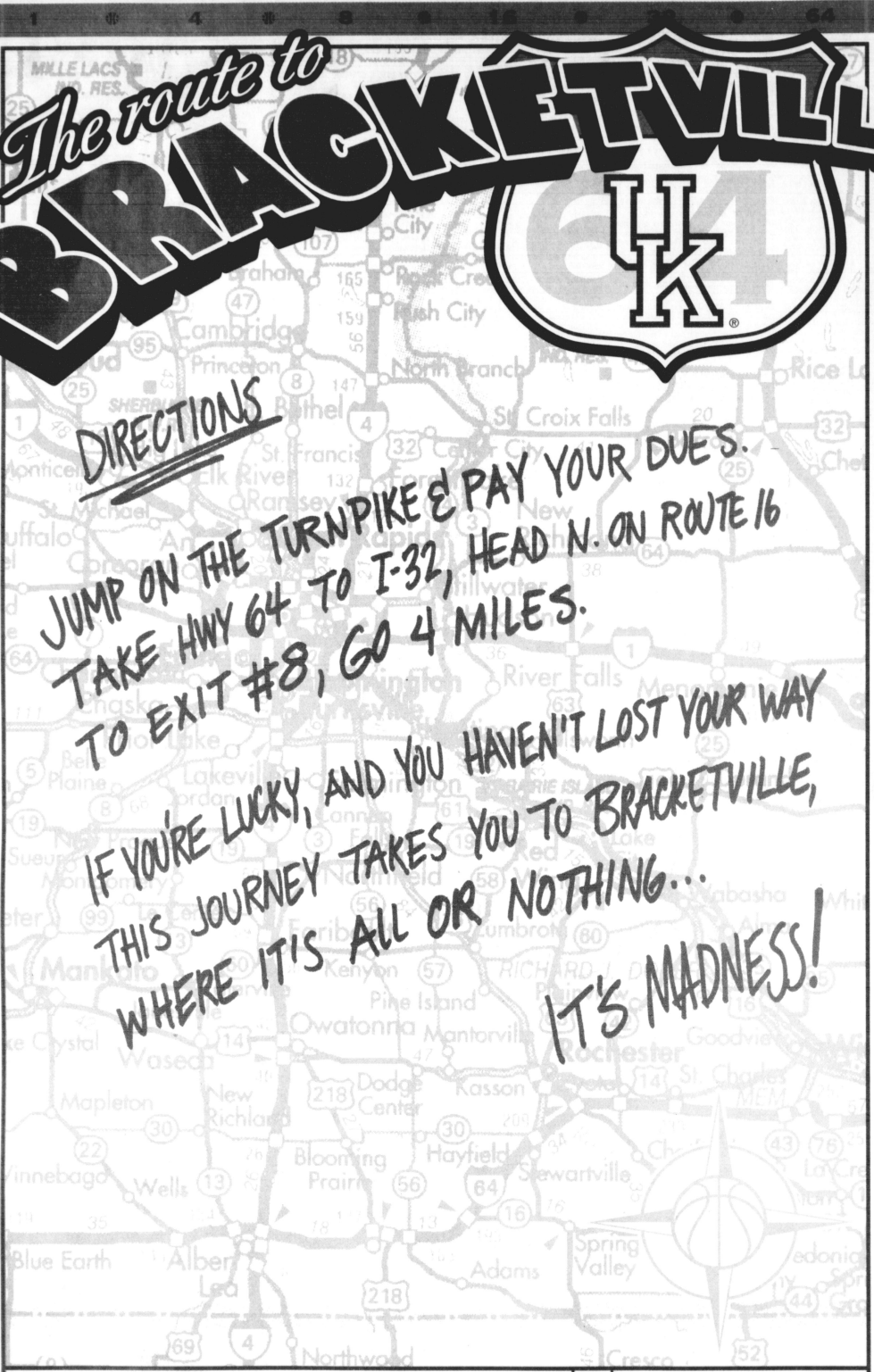
