Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, July 19, 1957.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 9:40 a.m., CST, Friday, July 19, 1957, with the following members present: R. P. Hobson, Chairman; J. Stephen Watkins, Harper Gatton, Louis Cox and Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci. President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson met with the Committee.

A. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Executive Committee of May 22, 1957, were approved as published.

B. Agreement with Charles Pfizer & Company, Inc.

Mr. Peterson submitted a renewal of Agreement for cooperative investigation for Charles Pfizer & Company, Inc. The Experiment Station is to make a study in (1) "the effects of oxyletracycline and DES on fattening steers on an economy diet;" (2) "the value of implanting DES in steers on grazing pasture fed TM in salt." The investigation is to be made during the year June 1, 1957, to June 1, 1958. The contract is for the sum of \$2,000. Mr. Peterson recommended that same be approved and authorized.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University.

C. Agreement with Kentucky Department of Economic Development.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the University and the Department of Economic Development whereby the Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Kentucky will supervise and coordinate the research and field scale demonstration in Franklin County and will provide technical information and advice necessary for a program of controlling Johnson grass on a community, county or area basis. The contract will run for the fiscal year July 1, 1957 through June 30, 1958, and shall not exceed the sum of \$6,000.00 in costs.

Mr. Peterson recommended the contract be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in and the contract approved.

D. Injury to Jasper Mitchell and John S. Kenney.

Mr. Peterson submitted report on injury to Jasper Mitchell, an employee of the Experiment Station. The accident occurred May 31, 1957, at the tool shed on Coldstream Farm. Mr. Mitchell was putting a manure loader on a tractor when the pin slipped causing his finger to be caught and mashed between the bracket and arm of the tractor and loader. The University Health Service was called. No doctor was there and the nurse referred Mr. Mitchell to Dr. Sprague. Dr. Sprague submits an invoice for services rendered in the amount of \$35.00; the Good Samaritan Hospital submits invoice for \$37.00, aggregating \$72.00.

John S. Kenney, an employee of the Agricultural Experiment Station, sustained an accident on June 20, 1957, at the Kentucky Seed Stock Farms, Jessamine County. Mr. Kenney was harvesting seed of grass breeding work with a hand hook, and cut his finger. Because of the location, Mr. Kenney reported to a doctor in Nicholasville. Dr. Dewey E. Cummins, Nicholasville, submits an invoice for \$6.00 for services rendered.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the invoices in connection with the accidents to Jasper Mitchell and John S. Kenney be authorized paid, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in connection with either of these accounts.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation, and the bills submitted were authorized paid with the understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability in connection with payment of the invoices.

E. Contract with U. S. Quartermaster-Research in Handling Food.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the United States of America and the University of Kentucky concerning radiation, storage life of different kinds of foods, preservation and shipping qualities. The contract is to be terminated twelve months after date of award and may be cancelled by either party giving thirty days written notice.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the Agreement be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in and the contract approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University

F. Mr. Franklin P. Mayes Employed as Bond Counsel, Delta Delta Bond Issue Preparation.

Mr. Peterson recalled that the Board of Trustees and the State Property and Building Commission had heretofore approved contractual relationship

between the University and the Delta Delta Delta Sorority for an addition to the existing sorority house, and an issuance of revenue bonds to pay for the purchase of the addition and existing house. Mr. Peterson recommended that bond counsel be employed to prepare the bond resolution authorizing the issuance, sale and delivery of the bonds, and to do all things requested by the owner. He recommended Mr. Franklin P. Hayes, Louisville, Ky.

Members of the Committee recalled the commitment, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, authorized employment of Mr. Franklin P. Hayes as counsel.

G. Additional Grant for Medical Center.

Mr. Peterson reported that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare had approved the University's request for an additional grant from the National Advisory Council on Health Research Facilities in the amount of \$178,547, to be used for the purchase of movable scientific equipment. The report was submitted for information.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was authorized received and made of record

H. Honorary Degrees.

President Dickey submitted a recommendation of the Graduate and University Faculties for honorary degrees at the inauguration of the President of the University on September 24, 1957. He recommended, also, that the names of the persons approved for honorary degrees be authorized withheld from these minutes and put in the minutes of the Board of Trustees at its September meeting so as not to make public the names of the recipients until after each has been contacted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recipients were approved and the names authorized withheld.

I. Sale of Small Items on Eden Shale Farm Authorized.

President Dickey reported a letter from Dean Welch requesting permission to sell small items at Eden Shale farm.

June 19, 1957

President Frank G. Dickey University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

Under date of September 10, 1952, I sent letter to President

Donovan, asking that we be permitted to sell small blocks of timber on a selective cutting basis, logs or lumber, not to exceed a value of \$1,000.00, without prior approval on the part of the President and that of the Board.

Following consideration, the request was passed upon as stated in the letter of September 10, 1952, which was reproduced in the minutes of the Board.

In essence, the justification was as follows: This request is made because we believe that such authority will facilitate making small sales that can often be made at certain definite times to our advantage and with very great difficulty if these specific opportunities are lost. We understand, of course, that we shall make full and complete reports to you on any sales that are made under the authority requested above, if granted.

This policy at the Robinson Substation has made it possible for us to expand and intensify our forestry work and handle small sales there to distinct advantage, sales that incidentally would not and could not be made if we had to go through the formality of bids. I am requesting that this authority be extended for the same procedure in handling small items for sale on our Eden Shale farm in Owen County.

If there is further information you need about this request, please let me know.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, authority was granted the Experiment Station to sell small items on the Eden Shale farm, making a report on same.

J. Home Economics Building Named.

President Dickey stated that a number of people had suggested that the building now housing the School of Home Economics be named in honor of Dr. Statie E. Erikson. He said that he was thoroughly in accord with the suggestions, and recommended that the Home Economics building be named in honor of Dr. Statie E. Erikson, in recognition of her long and loyal service to the University and the Commonwealth, and that the building be known as "Erikson Hall".

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Home Economics building was authorized named in honor of Dr. Statie E. Erikson in recognition of her long record of distinguished service, and will henceforth be known as "Erikson Hall".

K. Wenner-Gren Aeronautical Research Laboratory Transferred to the Supervision of the Dean of the College of Engineering.

President Dickey reported recommendation from Dean R. E. Shaver of the College of Engineering that the Wenner-Gren Aeronautical Research Laboratory be transferred from supervision of the Department of Mechanical Engineering to supervision of the Dean of the College of Engineering, directed by Dr. Karl Otto Lange as Associate Director of the Engineering Experiment Station. He explained that this recommendation was due to larger plans for development of the research laboratory and that the laboratory would be used not only in the aeronautical field but for almost everything in the related fields.

President Dickey recommended that the request be approved, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the transfer was approved and made effective as of July 19, 1957.

L. Budget Adjustments.

President Dickey recommended that \$3,400.00 be transferred from unappropriated surplus of the University budget to the Department of Mechanical Engineering; that \$2,080.00 be transferred from unappropriated surplus of the University budget to the College of Adult and Extension Education; that \$200.00 be transferred from the unappropriated surplus to the College of Education; and that \$4,100.00 be transferred from unappropriated surplus to the College of Arts and Sciences.

President Dickey stated that these amounts were necessary to take care of adjustments in programs.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budget increases were authorized and the Comptroller was directed to make the necessary budget adjustments.

M. I.C.A. Contract for Services at Bogor, Indonesia, Approved.

President Dickey submitted contract between the International Cooperative Administration and the University of Kentucky for services at Bogor, Indonesia, in connection with improving the agricultural program of Indonesia. The contract is for a period of three years and approximately \$1,200,000.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University of Kentucky.

N. Appointment of Dr. Olaf S. Aamodt as Group Leader.

President Dickey recommended the appointment of Dr. Olaf S. Aamodt, 4306 Woodberry Street, Hyattsville, Maryland, to the position of Group Leader of the Agricultural Contract Team in Indonesia. He stated that the appointment was for a two-year period, or for such time as his services are desired, beginning on or about August 15. Professor Aamodt's duties will be in accordance with the ICA contract. He further stated that Doctor Aamodt was familiar with work in Indonesia and would make it very convenient for the agricultural team from the University to work in cooperation with the Indonesian government.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in, and Doctor Aamodt was authorized employed and named Group Leader of the Agricultural Contract Team in Indonesia.

O. \$7,500.00 of Hanger Fund Transferred to Medical Foundation.

President Dickey reported that he was in receipt of a letter from Mr. Arnold Hanger requesting that \$7,500.00 of his gift to the University be transferred to the Kentucky Medical Foundation to be used in connection with the work of the Foundation in the interest of the Medical Center at the University. President Dickey stated that the funds had heretofore been received by the University and recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Treasurer was authorized to transfer \$7,500.00 from the Arnold Hanger fund to the operating fund of the Kentucky Medical Foundation.

P. \$7,503.00 of Hanger Fund Transferred to Expenses of the Medical Center.

President Dickey reported that there was a balance of \$7,503.00 in the Arnold Hanger Fund and recommended that this sum be transferred and used for expenses of prospective medical staff brought to the University for interviews and for the furtherance of the Medical Center program.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in and the Treasurer was authorized to make the necessary transfer.

Q. Schedule of Break-Down of Fees Approved.

President Dickey recalled that the Board of Trustees had heretofore approved registration and incidental fees of \$80.00 for in-state students and \$180.00 for out-of-state students. He reported that it was necessary to break this semester fee down into fee for credit hours, and submitted a schedule.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following schedule of fees for each hour of credit was approved and authorized made of record.

President Dickey presented check for \$1,200.00 from The Upjohn Company, Kalamazoo, Michigan, given in further support and cooperation in the Experiment Station's project Parvex Suspension in Foals. He recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank officers of The Upjohn Company.

From: The Ralph E. Mills Foundation, Frankfort, Ky. -- \$1,000.00.

President Dickey reported that he was in receipt of check for \$1,000.00 from the Ralph E. Mills Foundation, made payable to the Kentucky Research Foundation. He explained that this check was given in support of two scholarships Mr. Ralph E. Mills has been supporting during the past years. He recommended acceptance of the gift.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted, and President Dickey was requested to thank Mr. Mills.

From: Messrs. Reed and Spalding, Bourbon Stock Yards, Louisville, Ky. -- \$1,000.00.

The President presented check for \$1,000.00 from Messrs. Reed and Spalding, Bourbon Stock Yards, Louisville, to be applied to the lamb feeding research program of the Experiment Station. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$1,000.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donors.

From: Aubrey Feed Mills, Louisville. Ky. --\$2,000.00.

President Dickey reported that the Aubrey Feed Mills had presented to the Experiment Station \$2,000.00 to be used for continuation of work on physiological, nutritional and environmental factors affecting formation of the chicken egg. He stated that this area of investigation held promise of fruitful returns and recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President.

From: The Fund for the Advancement of Education, New York -- \$10,000.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$10,000.00 from the Fund for the Advancement of Education, New York, representing the initial payment on a grant of \$20,000.00 for the utilization of college teaching resources program. He stated that this experimental program is one which holds great promise and recommended that the grant be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$10,000.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank officials of The Fund for the Advancement of Education.

From: Research Corporation, New York--\$2,220.00.

The President reported that he had received a check for \$2,220.00 for continuation for one year of the Frederick Gardner Cottrell grant of Dr. John F. Steinbach. He explained that one of the objectives of this research is to study the stability order of chelates in anhydrous solvents. He recommended that the grant be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of the Research Corporation in the amount of \$2,220.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank the donors.

From: Keeneland Foundation -- \$8,000.00.

President Dickey stated that he was in receipt of check for \$8,000.00 from Keeneland Foundation, to cover four additional four-year scholarships to be assigned to freshmen entering the University in the fall of 1957. He recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$8,000.00 was ordered accepted and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to Keeneland Foundation.

From: Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., Brooklyn, N. Y. -- \$2,000.00.

President Dickey reported that he had received a check for \$2,000.00 from Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., to be used for a grant-in-aid on the Experiment Station's project on an economy supplement and investigation of diethylstilbestrol implantation of grazing steers which receive terramycin in their salt ration. He recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$2,000.00 was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the Company.

From: The Ridgewood High School Home and School Association--\$100.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$100.00 from The Ridgewood High School Home and School Association on behalf of William Desmond, graduate of the Ridgewood High School. He recommended that the gift be accepted and used for the intended purpose.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$100.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank the donors.

From: Spencer Chemical Company, Kansas City, Mo. -- \$2,500.00.

President Dickey reported that he was in receipt of check for \$2,500.00 from Spencer Chemical Company for continuation of research project on the study of Nitrogen Fertilization of Kentucky 31 Fescue Pasture. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$2,500.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to officials of the Company.

From: Eli Lilly and Company, Indianapolis, Indiana -- \$2,500.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$2,500.00 from Eli Lilly and Company to support the Experiment Station's project entitled "The Effect of Diethylstilbestrol, Erythromycin and Fat Supplementation on the Digestibility and Utilization of Fattening Rations by Lambs". He recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of Eli Lilly and Company was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank the Company for their kindness.

From: Kentucky Association of Highway Contractors -- \$500.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$500.00 made to the Kentucky Research Foundation by the Kentucky Association of Highway Contractors, given in support of one highway scholarship for the school year 1957-58. He recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$500.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank representatives of the Association.

From: Southwest Potash Corporation--\$2,000,00.

The President reported that he was in receipt of \$2,000.00 from the Southwest Potash Corporation, for a grant-in-aid in research directed toward the field tests of certain potash salts for use in the fertilizing of burley tobacco. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$2,000.00 was accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to officers of the Corporation.

From: Mr. Henry H. Knight, Almahurst Farm, Nicholasville, Ky. -- Almahurst Myrtle 2nd 2854-995.

President Dickey reported that Mr. Henry H. Knight had presented a very valuable addition to the herd of the Experiment Station, Almahurst Myrtle 2nd 2854-995. He stated that this gift represents the very highest

quality and gives to the Station an opportunity to build a first-class Shorthorn herd on the farm. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President, and requested him to express to Mr. Knight the appreciation of the Executive Committee and the University.

From: Society for Crippled Children, Inc. --\$4,354.00.

President Dickey reported receipt of check for \$4,354.00 from the Society for Crippled Children, Inc., to be used by the Audiology Clinic during the fiscal year 1957-58. He stated that this is the fourth and final year for the grant authorized by the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, and it would not have been possible for the University to have developed the clinic without the help of this society. He recommended acceptance of the grant.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the grant was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank the donors.

From: Coburn Family of Georgetown, Ohio, and Miami, Florida -- Two Portraits.

President Dickey reported receipt of a gift of two portraits from members of the Coburn Family of Georgetown, Ohio, and Miami, Florida, and explained that these portraits had been restored at the expense of President Emeritus H. L. Donovan. The President submitted transmittal letter and biographical sketches as follows:

July 17, 1957

President Frank G. Dickey Administration Building Campus

My dear President Dickey:

Over the past weekend the Coburn family of Georgetown, Ohio and Miami, Florida were guests in our home. They visited the campus and were very much impressed with the University. They approved the gift of the two portraits which the late James Emerson Coburn of Georgetown, Ohio indicated before his death he wanted given to the University of Kentucky.

There is a tradition that has come down through the Coburn family that these portraits were painted by Matthew Jewett. I am sorry that I can not furnish any documentary evidence of this fact but I am convinced in my own mind that they are Jewett's. They are at least 125 years old and may possibly be

somewhat older.

I promised my late cousin, James Emerson Coburn, before his death last January that if he wished to give them to the University I would have them restored at my own expense. The restoration has proven more successful than I thought possible. They look as if they might have been painted only recently.

If the Board accepts these portraits and I hope it will, I would be greatly pleased to have a sort of Who's Who biographical sketch of both Judge John Coburn and Dr. James W. Coburn which I am enclosing made a part of the minutes of the Board.

When Judge Coburn served on the Board of Trustees of Transylvania Seminary he prepared a petition to the legislature of Virginia for a plan to raise money for Transylvania. This petition was approved by the Virginia legislature. I am enclosing a copy of it with a suggestion that you might want to use the plan sometime in the future in financing the program of the University; however, I would prefer not to have this petition copied in the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

I hope that you will write Mrs. Coburn a note of appreciation of this gift.

Dr. James W. Coburn

Born 1789, Lexington, Ky.; died 1850, Newport, Ky.

Son of Judge John Coburn and Mary Moss Coburn. Lived in Lexington until his parents moved to Washington, Ky. in 1794.

Dr. Coburn was twice married. His first wife was Susannah Smith Doniphan, daughter of Dr. Anderson Doniphan, Germantown, Mason County, Ky. They were married September 6, 1809. Mrs. Coburn died April 25, 1825. She was the mother of six children.

Dr. Coburn's second marriage was to Mary Walton, January 1, 1826. She was the daughter of Edward Walton and his wife, Elizabeth Black. She was the mother of ten children,

Dr. Coburn was educated for the practice of medicine. He practiced in Washington, Germantown, and Maysville.

James W. Coburn was a lieutenant in the War of 1812. He was in the Battle of Lake Erie, June 1813. He was one of the young men from Kentucky who rode up to Lake Erie to help Commodore Perry. They were called the "Horse Marines" because they had ridden through the wilderness from Kentucky to the Great Lakes on horseback. None of them had ever been on a ship before but they were armed with long barrel rifles and knew how to shoot straight. Commodore Perry had them hidden in the rigging of his ship and they picked off the gunners and the officers on the British ships and in this way contributed greatly to Perry's victory. After this battle they were called the "Horse Marines", the first time these words were ever used to describe a marine. Lieutenant James W. Coburn's name is inscribed on the monument erected by the United States Government at Puttin Bay on Lake Erie. He shared in the prize money given by the United States Government for those who participated in this victory. Some of his letters to his family describing his observations of the country through which he passed and his activities are in the families of his descendants.

Dr. Coburn served in the House of the Kentucky General Assembly 1816-1818.

The following editorial was published in the Maysville Eagle July 13, 1850:

"Death of James W. Coburn, Esq.

We are deeply pained in announcing the death of one of our most estimable fellow citizens, James W. Coburn, Esq. He died of cholera on yesterday at Newport, whither he had gone on a brief visit among his friends and relatives. Mr. Coburn was the eldest son of the late Judge Coburn. He was distinguished for his gallant services in connection with Perry's victory on Lake Erie; and after his old friend and Commander, General Harrison, came to the presidency, he was appointed postmaster of this city. We hope to be furnished a memoir of him by the hand of some friend."

Dr. Coburn had been summonsed to Newport by the family of General Taylor, who had married his aunt, because there were some members of the family who had been stricken by cholera in the great epidemic that occurred in 1850. He went on a mission of mercy to give aid to the family, contracted cholera himself and died from this malady. He was buried in Newport because victims of cholera were buried wherever they happened to be at the time of their death. Otherwise the body would have been taken to the family burial ground in Maysville, Kentucky.

Judge John Coburn

Born 1762, Philadelphia, Pa., died 1823, Maysville, Ky.

Educated for the bar under Luther Martin. Married Mary Moss 1786, Fayette County.

Pioneered in Lexington 1784 to 1794. Opened mercantile store in 1784 with George Gordon, his brother-in-law, at Mill and Main Sts. Acquired 400 acres in 1776 "which lay to the north and west of Main and Jefferson Sts.", Lexington.

Admitted to the bar at Harrodsburg Mar. 9, 1785.

Member of the Danville Convention 1785.

Trustee of Transylvania Seminary.

Trustee of Lexington 1788-1791.

On committee to secure press for Kentucky. Purchased press for John Bradford in Philadelphia on trip to that city to bring his two sisters and their families in 1786 to Lexington. The press was brought overland from Philadelphia to Pittsburg and down the Ohio River on a flat boat to Limestone and by wagon to Lexington. Delivered press to John Bradford.

Member of Kentucky Society for Promoting Useful Knowledge, 1787.

Member of Governor Isaac Shelby's staff.

One of three Commissioners to run line between Virginia and Ken-tucky.

Commissioner to locate first state penitentiary for Kentucky.

One of first District Judges of Fayette County, 1791.

One of three First Judges of Court of Ayer and Terminer, Fayette County, 1792.

Judge of Circuit Court, Mason County, 1802-05.

Appointed Federal Judge of Louisiana District with headquarters in St. Louis, 1805-1809.

Declined appointment of Supreme Court of Territory of Orleans, 1805.

Declined appointment of Judgeship of Territory of Michigan.

Charter trustee and one of the founders of Franklin Seminary. Washington, Mason County, Kentucky.

Signed eight petitions to Virginia relative to pioneer problems such as:

Incorporating Lexington-prepared petition

Power to tax for community needs for Market House and Streets.

Power to raise funds by Lottery to build needed buildings for Transylvania Seminary.

Known as "a powerful and prolific pamphleteer".

Elector in Presidential Election 1797, 1801, 1805.

Collector of the revenue for the fourth district of Kentucky. Appointed by President Madison 1809.

Friend of Daniel Boone--prepared petition to Congress for pension for Boone which was granted.

Moved to Washington, Mason County, in 1794, because he believed with Jefferson that it was the proper location as the capital of the United States.

Practiced law and operated store with Basil Duke in Washington. Ky., later moved to Maysville and built New Liberty east of Limestone Creek on the Ohio River, now a part of east Maysville.

Father of twelve children.

Died February 10, 1823, buried in the Maysville Cemetery.

Judge John Coburn

Judge John Coburn, 1762-1823, was a native of Philadelphia, where he received an excellent education, and was bred to the bar. In 1784, under the advice of the distinguished Luther Martin, Esq., of Baltimore, who cherished a deep interest for him, young Coburn emigrated to Kentucky. Abandoning the profession to which he had been reared, however, he located himself in Lexington, and commenced the mercantile business, which was at that time very lucrative. In August, 1786, he married Miss Mary Moss of Fayette County. He seems to have been successful in mercantile operations and remained in Lexington till about the year 1794, when he removed to Mason County; and in partnership with Dr. Basil Duke, continued his mercantile pursuits.

Shortly afterwards, he was appointed judge of the district court of Mason; and upon the reorganization of the courts, became a judge of the circuit court, which office he held till the year 1805.

He was appointed, by Mr. Jefferson, judge of the territory of Michigan, which office he declined, and was subsequently appointed to the judgeship of the territory of Orleans, and held his courts in St. Louis. This office he resigned in 1809, and was afterwards appointed, by Mr. Madison, during the late war, collector of the revenue for the fourth district of Kentucky. This office, which he held for several years, was his last public employment.

Judge Coburn was a man of most decided political principles, and stood high in the confidence of the democratic party. As early as 1785--a few months after his arrival in the State, --he was elected a member of the convention, called at Danville in that year, to take preliminary steps to procure the admission of Kentucky into the Union, and for other purposes. In 1796, he was appointed a commissioner, in conjunction with Robert Johnson, to run and settle the boundary line between Virginia and Kentucky, upon which subject he made a very able report. Upon its being intimated to the citizens of St. Louis that Judge Coburn intended to resign his office as judge of the Orleans territory, they addressed him a petition complimentary of his "talents, industry, and conciliating manners", and urging him to relinquish the idea of resigning his office.

In 1813, Governor Shelby wrote him an urgent invitation to accompany him and become a member of his military family, which was accepted by the judge, although he held that post for only a short period.

To the able and indefatigable efforts of Judge Coburn is to be attributed in a great degree, the act of Congress appropriating one thousand acres of land to Col. Daniel Boone. The judge was an ardent friend of the old pioneer, and addressed to Congress some powerful appeals in his behalf.

Judge Coburn never practised law, although he took out license in 1788. He was one of the most indefatigable, efficient and accomplished political writers of his day, and was in close correspondence and intimate relationship with the leading democratic statesmen of Kentucky. So high an estimate was placed upon his ability, that, as early as 1800, he was spoken of in connection with the exalted station of senator in the congress of the United States; but he declined his pretensions to that office in favor of his friend, the distinguished John Breckinridge, who was elected to the senate at the succeeding session of the legislature.

Judge Coburn died in February, 18 23, aged about sixty years.

President Dickey recommended that the two portraits be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President and requested him to thank Doctor Donovan and members of the Coburn family for their generosity.

U. Free Fee Scholarship to He Bong Kim.

President Dickey recommended that free fee scholarship be granted to Mr. He Bong Kim, Korean student in the College of Engineering, for the second semester, 1956-57 school year.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Executive Committee concurred in the recommendation of the President.

V. Free Fee Scholarships to Three Hungarian Refugees.

President Dickey recommended that free fee scholarships be made available for three Hungarian refugees recommended to the University by the Hungarian Student Program operating through the Institute of International Education.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was approved and the free scholarships granted.

W. Candidates for Degrees

President Dickey submitted a list of graduates for the August Commencement and stated that the University Faculty had not yet made its recommendation. He advised that a few changes would be made in the list submitted and suggested that the Committee approve the names, subject to the recommendation of the University Faculty.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the list of graduates recommended by the University Faculty was approved and the President was authorized to confer upon each the degree to which he or she is entitled, at the August 3 Commencement.
