LOUIS STAMPER FACES CHARGES

Student Arraigned In Owensboro

Owensboro, Ky., Dec. 4.—The ex-convict Louis Allen Stamper, 24, University student charged with the \$1,554 jewel robbery here and in Henderson on June 1, has been set for December 14.

Another man is being sought in connection with the jewelry theft which occurred last June 4.

Stamper, Vanceburg, freshman in the arts and sciences college, was arrested Sunday in connection with theft of jewelry valued at \$13,344 at Owensboro and Henderson, and was taken to Lexington.

Stamper was charged with completing the theft of \$3,800 worth of jewelry from the Grant Jewelry and Clothing store at Henderson, Sullivan stated.

Stamper was held at Jefferson on \$5,000 cash bond in the other jewelry case.

The 24-year-old student was arrested on a fugitive charge at Vanceburg Friday and brought to Lexington, but was released on \$1,000 bond.

Stamper was taken into custody again at Vanceburg, the officers stated, this time on storehouse breaking charges, after a member of the Henderson jewelry firm had identified the jewelry, part of which the officers said was found in Stamper's possession.

December of that year, and went into effect on January 1, 1932.

The first officers, elected January 6, 1912, were:  
(1) President—W. C. Harrison.  
(2) Vice-president—D. D. Felix.  
(3) Secretary—Miss Jessie Milton-Francis.

Although the idea reported the constitution as "functionary" remarkably well, all was not perfect, for two amendments were made which named Stonewall Jackson.

The first allowed for the dismissal by men of found guilty of cheating and of women by non-members. The other permitted ten members of the committee to pass by-laws defining definitely what constituted "dishonorable conduct."

Although the Executive Committee was the outstanding phase by far of the student government system, class officers were still elected annually. All elections were held in the University chapel in the form of mass meetings, as had been done by the preceding system. However, by this time, the secret ballot had come into use.

pollution. Stonewall was not only a typical example of the campus leader he was, from all indications, the most colorful personality of the decade 1910-1920.

But despite the efforts of the Stonewall Jacksons and other leaders, the student government gradually decreased in effectiveness and interest, and great interest.

The reason for this decline is pointed out by Dr. Merry Lewis Pease in his History of the University of Kentucky, as follows:  
"The organization is not mentioned in any school catalog after that of 1918. Its efforts did not result in satisfactory success, due in most part, it seems, to the fact that some of the professors and other instructors were reticent in reporting cases of misconduct and in taking for granted frequent punishment."
