Corpus Christi

Corpus Christi, Terrence McNally's tale of a modern day messiah who happens to be gay, has sparked controversy wherever it has played since its premier at New York's Manhattan Theatre Club in 1998. ActOut Theatre Group will present Corpus Christi, directed by Bo List, at Lexington's Downtown Arts Center, 141 E, Main St. It will play Friday and Saturday nights, Jan. 6-7 and 13-14 at 8 pm and Sun. Jan. 15 at 2 pm. Tickets are \$15 or \$12 for Seniors and Students. Reservations can be made at (859) 225-0370.

In Corpus Christi, playwright Terrence McNally creates a Christ-like figure named Joshua who is born in a sleazy motel in Corpus Christi, Texas, the playwright's home town. Joshua hitchhikes across the desert having occasional conversations with God, performing miracles, and gathering disciples.

In contrast to the anger and hullabaloo it has inspired, Corpus Christi is a quiet. beautiful play that weaves in and out of the Bible and through the biography of the playwright himself, with theatrical liberty as needed. It contains the same amount of truthful elements that may be expected in any heartfelt work of fiction.

Kentucky Theater

Brokeback Mountain, will be opening at the Kentucky Theater on Friday, January 6th. Directed by Ang Lee, this film has had excellent reviews and is upsetting the right wing theocrates a good deal, two good reasons to see it.

Roger Ebert and several other reviewers have given it five stars. Part of Ebert's review follows.

"Brokeback Mountain has been described as "a gay cowboy movie," which is a cruel simplification. It is the story of a time and place where two men are forced to deny the only great passion either one will ever feel. Their tragedy is universal.

The story begins in Wyoming in 1963, when Ennis (Heath Ledger) and Jack (Jake Gyllenhaal) are about 19 years old and get a job tending sheep on a mountainside. Ennis is a boy of so few words he can barely open his mouth to release them; he learned to be guarded and fearful long before he knew what he feared. Jack, who has done some rodeo riding, is a little more outgoing.

After some days have passed on the mountain and some whiskey has been drunk, they suddenly and almost violently have sex. "This is a one-shot thing we got going on here," Ennis says the next day.

Jack agrees. But it's not.

Some years pass. Both men get married. Then Jack goes to visit Ennis in Wyoming, and the undiminished urgency of their passion stuns them. Their lives settle down into a routine, punctuated less often than Jack would like by "fishing trips."

Brokeback Mountain could tell its story and not necessarily be a great movie. It could be a melodrama. It could be a "gay cowboy movie." But the filmmakers have focused so intently and with such feeling on Jack and Ennis that the movie is as observant as work by Bergman. The more

specific a film is, the more universal, because the more it understands individual characters, the more it applies to everyone. I can imagine someone weeping at this film, identifying with it, because he always wanted to stay in the Marines, or be an artist or a cabinetmaker."

There have been gay comedies that were accepted by broad US audiences but this film is a drama and a story of life long love. If straight people can bring themselves to see a film which focuses on love and passion between two men, many will come away with a deeper understanding that our love for each other is powerful and as sacred as theirs. This will be another step forward in overcoming homophobia. We should support this film and the KY Theater -Go see it now.

Soulforce in Action

Soulforce has joined in a call for the IRS to investigate the political actions of James Dobson and Focus on the Family. On November 28, 2005, Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington (CREW) filed a complaint with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) against James Dobson's Focus on the Family. Naomi Seligman, CREW's Deputy Director, was delighted when Soulforce offered to launch a national drive to support this complaint. By signing the petition addressed to the IRS, you will join thousands of Americans who are concerned about James Dobson's growing political influence in Washington, D.C. and across the nation.

Focus on the Family is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization whose stated purpose is "to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ through a practical outreach to homes." In past years, Dr. Dobson has become increasingly shrill about his political beliefs (especially against GLBT people) on his daily radio program and through his fundraising letters.

For example, on December 1, Focus on the Family announced that it would end its long time banking relationship with Wells Fargo because of the bank's "ongoing efforts to advance the radical homosexual agenda."

Earlier this year Dobson promised to dedicate his life to amending the U.S. Constitution with a Federal Marriage Amendment that would make second-class citizens of Lesbian and Gay Americans in committed relationships and deny them their basic civil rights and protections.

Although his non-profit status bars him from electioneering, Dr. Dobson continues to use his considerable political muscle to support anti-gay initiatives and to endorse candidates for political office. In early April, 2004, Dr. Dobson endorsed Republican Representative Patrick J. Toomey in his race for Senate in Pennsylvania. In addition, it was reported that Dr. Dobson actively campaigned during a rally for Rep. Toomey.

Other candidates that Dr. Dobson reportedly endorsed in 2004 include North Carolina Republican candidate Pat Ballentine for Governor and Oklahoma Republican candidate Tom Coburn for Senate.

"Failure is free. Changing hearts and minds is not. Advancing equality is not," reads the literature concerning the new membership program of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance: Friends & Family. KFA takes that statement seriously in its mission to insure fairness for all GLBTQ persons. The alliance hopes to advance equality not only through this program but also by embracing a new acting director.

Recently, Christina Gilgor took over as acting director of the state KFA. In said role, Gilgor has moved quickly to insure the continual growth and prosperity of KFA due to a strong personal commitment to the advancement of equality for all GLBTQ persons.

KFA feels confident letting Gilgor take the helm as her qualifications are paramount: an undergraduate degree in social work as well as a master's in public administration from UK. Furthermore, she and her partner of seven years, Julie Stephenson, set a strong example for everyone as they provide a happy home for their two small children. KFA strongly welcomes Gilgor's many contributions and talents.

One of the contributions in which Gilgor has been instrumental is the implementation of KFA's newest program rightly called Friends & Family. Gilgor has striven to see that this program succeeds in the hopes that it will develop a formalized membership club of GLBT Kentuckians as well as their friends and family.

In fact, Gilgor galvanized volunteers early in December to call people across Kentucky and encourage them to enlist in the program. One becomes a member by making a one time donation, thus becoming a "friend" or by donating a monthly, automated gift, thus earning the title "family member."

financial base that will increase the voice and visibility of GLBT Kentuckians and to insure a fair future for all. Members will also receive an ampersand lapel pin to symbolize their commitment to equality, a quarterly update detailing how proceeds are utilized, and invitations to Friends & Family cocktail receptions preceding major Kentucky Fairness Alliance events around the state.

Responding to Our Opposition

So read this if you want some information, otherwise, know that we need to continue to support all of those in our community that are on the front lines whether that be lobbying the legislature, speaking up to coworkers, or coming out in High School. The statements in italics came from the website of Open Door Ministries, a group active in the U.K community. (www.opendoorrministries.us/) They have links to the Baptist Student Group and to Southland Christian Church. They define themselves thus: "Open Door exists as an on-campus Christian community and safe haven for individuals struggling with homosexuality. We strive to offer hope and help to those who want to begin their journey to purity.

They really do believe that they hold the high moral ground. Therefore, oppressing GLBT people seems like part of God's plan to them. We can state that we do not believe that loving...

someone is ever a sinand point out that more than a few things listed in the Bible as sins, such as women speaking in church, weaving clothing made from a combination of fabrics or eating lobster, are not considered sinful by most people today. And we can remind people that we do have freedom to choose our own religious beliefs.

'To accurately discuss the roots of homosexuality, we must realize the inherent sinful nature of all people, whether they are gay or straight. Homosexuality, when put into its true and proper context, is no different than any other sin. No one has to make a conscious decision to enter into any sinful lifestyle. That tendency is bom into our being. The conscious decision that can and must be made is the decision to overcome that sin and begin living a pure and whole lifestyle, whether the sin in question is pride, lust, homosexuality, lying, gossip, adultery, alcohol addiction, etc."

They are saying that we mistakenly think we were born gay because we do not remember making a conscious decision to be homosexual. According to them, that is because we are all born with a tendency to sin and our identities as GLBT people is really a gradual giving in to our sinful desire to be gay. They argue that even if we are born with "homosexual tendencies," our giving in to those tendencies is a choice, a choice that is bad for us and bad for society. Therefore, making laws about homosexual "behavior" is justifiable, including sodomy laws, anti-gay marriage amendments, or laws limiting our right to parent.

In this same vain they continue:

From a scientific/psychological perspective, there seems to be a strong correlation between the development of homosexual feelings/tendencies and dysfunctional relationships. Early in life, unhealthy relationships with family members (including parents and siblings) ...continued on next page

and with peers leave deep emotional wounds. There are a number of prominent factors that are known to influence sexual development including: Abuse (sexual, emotional, physical, spiritual) - Parental dysfunction (absence, detachment, overbearing control, lack of gender affirmation) - Betrayal - Ridicule or teasing from peers - Sexual play w/ samesex peer - Rejection - Abandonment - Lack of nurture - Loneliness.

There is so much on this list that it would be difficult to find anyone that had none of these negative experience in their lives. So why isn't everyone gay?

This list also provides an ostensible scientific/psychological basis for arguing that LGBT people need to be "cured." If identifying us as sinful doesn't convince some people, then saying we are addicted or emotionally damaged may be appealing.

Providing several ways for us to be considered impaired also makes it seem compassionate to offer us help in leaving the "homosexual lifestyle." All the major professional organizations, AMA (doctors),(APA) psychologists, social workers, etc. say that homosexuality is not a disorder and does not need to be "treated." Offering a "cure" is, in fact, seen as unethical.

There are other factors to be considered as well. One strong possibility to consider is generational sin. There are many instances in both the Bible and in studies of human psychology where sin (Biblical definition) or disorder (psychological definition) is passed from one generation to the next. We all inherit a sin nature from Adam. Likewise, we inherit much more specific sinful behaviors from our parents or other more recent ancestors.

Which is one of their arguments for outlawing GLBT foster and adoptive parenting. The fact that most of the children we raise are heterosexual seems to have eluded them.

Some other factors leading to the

development of homosexual tendencies include societal pressures, pornography. masturbation, demonic influences, and an amoral belief system... These are, by and large, factors that the individual cannot control. But despite these factors. the decision to yield to homosexual temptation is still the individual's to make. It doesn't usually happen overnight, but rather it progresses over years." It is typically in (the teen years) that the enemy (Satan) will have his best opportunities to convince someone that he or she is "gay", that they were born this way, and that there is nothing they can do about it.

Our long held belief that we are born different is now supported by scientific research. However, the fact that we are born different is not what we base our rights upon. People also have the right to chose to be gay, bisexual or whatever.

In the Declaration of Independence it states that all people are endowed by their creator with inalienable rights including life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We have some rights because we are human, and we have additional civil rights because we are citizens. Equality and fairness are basic American values, and is increasing number of people understand that we have the right to live our lives as we see fit.

We need to focus some attention on the repeated use of moral arguments, and the assumption that we have a negative effect on our society. They obviously think that homosexuality is inherently sinful and dangerous, but that is less obvious to other people. Many people are willing to listen to our point of view.

2005: A Gay Year By: Marc K. Blevins

With all respect, the year 2005 was gay. In fact, the gayest year yet. Even with redundant setbacks of discriminatory anti-gay legislative bills, homosexuality is increasingly accepted and displayed in mainstream life and entertainment.

The award winning NBC hits, the Ellen DeGeneres Show and 'Will and Grace,' continue to gather massive audiences. Also, a fulfilling year for 'gay' films, 2005 brought us a pleasant bouquet: RENT, Transamerica, Brokeback Mountain, Be Cool, Crutch, The Dying Gaul, Kenia and Her Family, Queens, Venetian Heat. According to Village TV, there were more homosexuals portrayed in television, movies, and literature during 2005 than any previous year.

The effect of recurrent, improved depiction of homosexuals is obvious through government actions. Legislative and Judicial bodies throughout the United States progressively accept and affirm basic human rights of homosexuals to advance the movement for civil rights and equality. While some states passed same-sex marriage bans, 15 states defeated attempts to write discrimination into state constitutions. Most notable of amendments was Proposition 2, the Texas amendment that passed with 3 out of 4 Texans voting in favor. Texas lawmakers claimed diverse support including the Hispanic and Ku Klux Klan communities.

California became the first state to approve same-sex marriage through legislation. Unfortunately, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger vetoed the marriage bill, saying: "If the ban of same-sex marriage is unconstitutional this bill is not necessary. If the ban is constitutional, this bill is ineffective."

Civil Rights groups assailed Schwarzenegger as being on the wrong side of history. Schwarzenegger has previously claimed to be supportive of LGBT rights. According to a Human Rights Campaign report, Equality from State to State, more anti-discrimination bills passed in 2005 than in any other year. The report highlights 11 Bills passed in state legislatures around the country, which established or strengthened statewide anti-discrimination protections, especially for LGBT communities. The United States House of Representatives also passed an upgrade to an antiquated hate crimes prevention law.

A California judge ruled that a school cannot "out" a student without permission. The ruling also said a school is liable if the revelation of the student's sexual orientation affects the student's life in any way.

The Forum for Academic and Institutional Rights (FAIR) and the Society for American Law Teachers brought a legal challenge to the Solomon Amendment. The Solomon Amendment denies federal funds to any university of a law school that bars military recruiters. Most law schools require any recruiter to agree to anti-discrimination pledges, which the military, currently, cannot agree to because the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy that refers to homosexuals.

Canada legalized same-sex marriage through Bill C-38, on June 29. The law made Canada the third country in the world, after the Netherlands and Belgium, to officially recognize same-sex marriages. Britain legalized same-sex civil partnerships a short time later.1200 couples were wed throughout Ireland, Scotland, and England. On December 21, Elton John joined his 12 year partner, David Furnish, in a civil partnership ceremony.

UK's Woman's Place

In December, Woman's Place published Vol. 1 of its newsletter, **The Green Dot.** Dorothy Edwards, the Director of Women's Place, explains the choice of this name as a concept of how they to confront violence against women in the U.K. community. Imagine a map of the campus with a red dot representing an act of violence against women, (a physical assault, sexual assault, or stalking), or a choice to tolerate, justify or perpetuate this violence. A red dot may represent a rape, a punch, a threat, a "blame the victim" statement or even a choice to do nothing in the face of a high risk situation.

Edwards writes: "Violence against women at the University of Kentucky is not a huge, solid mass that can simply be removed with one swift action or policy. Rather, it is the accumulation of individual decisions, moments, values, and actions made by the students, staff, faculty, and administration of our university."

Edwards then suggests we imagine a green dot on the UK map for any behavior choice, word, or attitude that promotes safety for women. "A green dot is pulling our friend out of a high risk situation - a green dot is responding to a victim blaming statement with words of support - a green dot is volunteering a few hours at Women's Place... A green dot is simply your individual choice at any given moment to make our campus safer."

UK Women's Place collaborates with people of all genders, backgrounds, races, classes, ages, sexual orientations, political positions, religious beliefs, ethnicities, nationalities, and abilities to create a save pace for all women.

MAVAR@UK, Men Against Violence and Rape at UK, understand that violence against women is an issue that all of us, need to act on. They are planning activities to encourage men to become active in the fight against violence, rape, and sexual assault. You can contact them at mavaruk@yahoo.com
