State Dept. official, retired U.S. general disagree on SALT II

Deputy Assistant Secretary of State William Dyess and retired U.S. Army Gen. Richard Stilwell debated the treaty before the approximately 750 people who attended a \$5-per-person luncheon in the Lexington Center Ballroom.

The luncheon was sponsored by the Greater Lexington Chamber of

The luncheon was sponsored by the Greater Lexington Chamber of Commerce.

Dyess, the former chief of the U.S.-Soviet Bilateral Affairs Staff at the State Department, spoke in favor of the treaty, while Stilwell is opposed. Stilwell's 39-year army carer included assignments as chief of long-range planning at the North Atlantie Treaty Organization and commander of U.S. Forces in Korea, from 1973-76.

"Ratification won't prevent us from doing anything we're doing now plan to do," Dyess said. "Defeat of SALT II would not solve any problems the United States is facing."

The Senate needs to assess the U.S. position in the arms race, Stilwell said. "It's later than we think, ladies and gentlemen," he said. "The Soviets are in a position to move forward faster than the United States."

Stilwell disagreeing with Dyess, added, "What will hurt us is (fatat) our allies will perceive that our nuclear more of the said of the States."

"I have dealt with them—or rather, against them—more than has been good for my health."

Dyess said, "We must continue to be rivals with the Soviet Union."

There are three reasons why it has been important to maintain relations with the Soviets, Dyess said, First, to allow unrestricted travel between the allow unrestricted travel between the countries; second, to maintain the trade of U.S. grain; third, to avoid nuclear holocaust.
"The desire to survive is universal," he said.

The Salt II treaty restricts the United States and the Soviet Union to 2,400 nuclear missile launching systems each. This number would be

approved, the Soviet Union will have to dismantle 270 launchers.

If the treaty is not approved, the Soviet Union will have over 3,000 launching systems in 1985, compared with 2,300 in the United States.

The treaty also places a limit on developing and deploying new types of nuclear weapons. Dyess said, including the number of warheads currently packed into the nosecones of missiles. The Soviets will be permitted a maximum of 10 warheads on these heavy missiles

a maximum of 10 warheads on these heavy missiles.

Because they use larger missles, the Soviets could put as many as 30 individual warheads in one missile's nosecone without the treaty's limits, he said. The U.S. Minuteman III missiles can have only one warhead.

"The fact is, in major provisions, this treaty is not verifiable," Stilwell said, explaining that the United States can't detect the number of warheads in the missiles.

Carter gives explanation to Kennedy, but talk goes on

WASHINGTON — President Carter called a brite Cease-fire yesterday in his stepped up verbal assault on Sen. Edward Kennedy to send his potential rival a note swijne remarks he made in New York were not intended as a reference to Chappaquiddick.

In the hand-written note, Carter said his statement Tuesday night at a "town meeting" in Queens had been "grossly exaggerated" by the press.

Asked by reporters about the note, Kennedy sid he did not consider it an apology but added, "I was just glad to get it."

Carter had told the audience in Queens that as president he had to deal with several crises and "I don't think I panicked."

White House press secretary Jody Powell said Carter had sent the note after reading "erroneous press reports saying his comments were a veiled reference to Chappaquiddick." White House press secretary Jody Powell said Carter had sent the note after reading "erroneous press reports saying his comments of Kennedy to Emborate would not make an issue of Kennedy to Emporters," I appreciate his sending it (the note; to me and were I to be a candidate I be talking about the issues which are most in the minds of the American people and I think that's also what he'd want."

University Senate Council should be applauded for approving a withdrawal policy Tuesday that changes

approving a withdrawal policy Tuesday that changes the time a student can drop a course without receiving any mark from one to three weeks — but that's only the beginning of the battle.

The policy, which was introduced by Student Government Senator Mike Breen, will go before University Senate Oct. 8 where many expect the it to die. If it does, it will be an unfortunate setback for the students of this institution

students of this institution.

University Senate's initial decision to give students only seven calendar days to withdrawal from class without having a "W" grade appear on their transcript occurred last April when a 49-45 majority passed the policy. And if U Senate fails to change their present stand, the "seven-day" withdrawal policy will be

stand, the "seven-day" withdrawal policy will be implemented at the beginning of next semester.

Supporters of the "seven-day" period say it is necessary as a way to include more information about a student's academic career. However, information contained in a single "W" is not a precise indicator of that career. A "W" doesn't tell why student dropped out of a class, does not even tell whether the student was passing or failing, and probably discourages students from trying out new subjects and from leaving classes they should not be in.

And with the shopping that goes on during drop-add, many students might attend a course only once or twice before the deadline expires.

As a memorandum from SG Senators Breen and Vincent Yeh to Senate council pointed out, "the one-week withdrawal period inversely stultifies a student's week windrawal period inversely stutilities assudent is academic status. Students would be penalized with unnecessary 'W's,' which leads to competitive disadvantages. Furthermore, one week does not allow a student enough time to arrange and assess his schedule with regards to the academic benefits and liabilities a particular course offers."

So, if U Senate wants to truly act in the interest of the students, it should follow the steps of the University Senate Council and withdraw the "sevenday" withdrawal policy.

The treaties turn most of the Panama Canal Zone over to Panama at the stroke of midnight Monday. Other canal property will be turned over to Panama in stages, concluding with the transfer of the canal itself at the end of the century.

Got to go disco?

A catalog of where to go, where to learn, how to dress

The music is controversial. but always equally popular

Even before Donna Summer belted out "Last Dance" for the first time, disco music and the movements prescribed for dancing to it were already creeping across the land. Today, disco seems to produce a reaction in everybody — be it delight

disco seems to produce a reaction in everyously — be it oeignior of sigusts.

Two weeks ago, the Kernel ran an article headed, "Poll shows disco on the downbeat," citing a recent Lexington radio poll in which WKQQ (which doesn't play disco) reted highest. Michael Christopher, UK student and disc jockey at Smuggler's Inn, claimed this was just one of the many rumors about the death of disco that are proliferating — and, according to Christopher, one of the totally false rumors. "Disco music sales went up 40 percent in the last two months," (Christopher said. He objected to the poll because "there's no way to measure the difference between disco and other music in Lexington."

"There is no all-disco station," he added, "and the polls don't cover the DJ (the discotheque DJ) and his audience."

For those who like disco, the following is a guide to Lexington's dance-spots and dance studios, along with suggestions for dress.

Where the dancing matches the music

Circus: Idle Hour shopping center off Richmond Road. For late-night dancing on Fridays and Saturdays. It's a non-alcoholic teenage disco from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., but after that "Afterhours" begins. You pay S4 cover, bring your own bottle, and the music lasts until 6 a.m.

Flaherry's III: New Circle Road at Palumbo Drive. Features live music of all kinds. Main attractions play from 9 p.m. to 12-45 a.m. nightly. Fairly large dance floor that's often crowded. Herman's Hermits will perform here Tuesday, Gary Lewis and the Playboys on Oct. 16 through 18. Cover is usually \$1, but it hasn't been determined for these shows.

Johnny Angel: Main Street next to the Kentucky Theatre. Despite the rumors, Johnny Angel is worth checking out. Probably Kentucky's biggest claim to fame in the disco realm, it offers a huge dance floor, computerized lights, fog machines, mirrors upon mirrors, a marble bar, and an excellent sound system. Videotape monitors flash scenes every 60 seconds showing clientele the downstairs bar, the DJ booth, and both sides of the de-eff of the computer of the com

of the dance floor.

"Most people in Lexington do not know what a discotheque is,"
Mike Ruffner, general manager, said, looking around him. This
is. These seats (actually carpeted tiers of steps along the dance
floor) are to get into the music. A discotheque is not a laid-back
type of atmosphere.

they of atmosphere. Ruffner said Johnny Angel accomodates 700 people easily — it had a crowd of more than 650 a week ago.

"This is not a gay bar," said Ruffner. "This is a mixed bar."
Johnny Angel's plays both disco and new wave music and the management is planning to bring in at least one big-name disco act exerce month.

orary: University Plaza on Woodland. Dancing 9 p.m. to I a.m. nightly. It is currently featuring an amateur dance contest, Mondays through Oct. 8. On Thursdays, the dress code (shirts with collars, no hats) is dropped for a new wave costume ball, with prizes. The Library has two dance floors, often crowded. No cover with UK ID, otherwise 33.

Max & Erma's: Patchen Village off Richmond Road. Has great hamburgers, but the dance floor is small, usually crowded, and only open weekends from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

O'Riley's: on Lansdowne Drive (former location of John Barleycorn's). Scheduled to open Oct. 1, this branch of the O'Riley's in Richmond will have a disco format with occasional

Pier 99: on the Kentucky River off of 1-75's exit 99. A fancy set-up. Upstairs, a large, raised dance floor with computerized lights. Downstairs, you dance "on water" (Actually an "aqua-floor" with 5,000 gallons of bubbling water underneath — lit by colored lights.) Usually, there's a live band playing on one of the floors. Rock music salternated with Gitso. Open 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. nightly. No cover on weeknights, 52 on Fridays and Saturdays.

Smuggler's Inn: Wilhite Drive off Niciolasville Road, Fairly new, it tends to attract an older crowd on weekights, except for Wednesdays when drinks for fadics are free aso's features diamer and album give-aways. The dress Yell, crebs or fambor jets shirts with collars, but dresses and surt-coast are new commendatire. No cover charge.

Michael Christopher, Smuggler disc jockey and UK a flor claimed Smuggler's attracts a classier clientele than most Lexington discos.

"The seats are arranged so you can hold a conversation," he said, (Many discos are impossible to talk in)
Smuggler's spends \$20 to \$30 weekly on newly-released discosingles, according to Christopher, "because disco is constantly changing." Inn: Wilhite Drive off Nic olasville Road. Fairly

Stingle's: on Euclid. Habitat of many UK students. For those who prefer rock 'n' roll, this is the best bet, although it is not a total escape from disco. Live music almost every night from 9 m. to 1 a.m. No cover for ladies Monday through Thursday, usually \$1 for guys. Weekends, cost runs between \$22 and \$2.50 each. Floor is medium-sized, often crowded. Not for serious disco devotees.

Where to learn how to move ...

Although many disco moves are simple and reminiscent of the jitterbug, you might want to take lessons for the confidence and polish they can give to your dancing style. Lexington offers many opportunities







Candidate Jerry Brown gets advice from a number of people, but . . .

Is he really listening or just stroking egos?

By DOUG WILLIS

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. does not — as some think — spend all of his time getting advice from an odd bunch of gurus, actresses, ex-astronauts and counter-culture folk.

The would-be president's circle of advisers includes all of those people.

But it also includes powerful, conservative

business executives, politically seasoned campaign aides and an array of nonpolitical cholars, authors and activists.

Tom Hayden, the aquitted Chicago Seven defendant and anti-war activist of the 1960s, and his wife, actress Jane Fonda, are among people Jerry Brown often turns to for advice and ideas.

and ideas.

So are Rusty Schweickart, the philosophical Apollo 9 astronaut; Stewart Brand, publisher of the Whole Earth Catalog: and Jesse Jackson, the black political and religious leader.

Brown also spends time, however, listening to some of California's most influential businessmen such as A.W. Clausen of the Bank of America and Ben Biaggini of Southern Pacific Co.

And he spends long hours, at irregular intervals, discussing the nature of man with nonpolitical figures such as anthropologist Gregory Bateson and San Francisco Zen Center abbot Baker-Roshi.

For Brown, a 41-year-old Democrat, this quest for a broad range of advice is a part of what he calls his "canoe theory" of politics: "You paddle a little bit on the right side, and then straight down the middle."

Critics view Brown's canne theory as a political ploy aimed at crassly stroking various interest groups and playing one-byone to the prejudies of each group. But those who represent various ideas say Brown



is receptive to them.

Clausen, who visits Brown every six to 12 months for a lunch of cold cuts and a discussion of business, describes the governor as a fiscal conservative open to advice from businessmen but "a bit unpredictable."

Hayden, too, says he finds Brown receptive to his left-leaning politics, adding." I think we get more out of him than the Bank of America gets."

The result of Brown's "canoe" process is usually a synthesis — a favorite Brown word — of ideas from rival factions.

For example, he supports a constitutional

convention to balance the federal budget—a goal of the far right — but argues that as well as imposing fiscal displine, a balanced to budget would force Congress to make hard choices about such things as excessive defense spending.

Hayden and Fonda are Brown's most controversial advisers, mainly because of their opposition to the Vietnam War. Brown has appointed Hayden to three non-paying posts and Fonda to the California Arts Council, but her appointment later was veteod by the State Senate after debate over her Hanoi visits during the war.

Hayden, who heads the 7,500-member

On the right are people like Clausen of Bank of America and members of the California Montable, an association of chief executives of California No Ilargest companies who meet with Brown.

Clausen says of Brown. He has sought the business point of view. But he's got another side of him. His political appointments kind off ly in the face of his fiscal conservativism. He's a bit unpredictable."

Biaggini, president of the roundtable and chairman of Southern Pacific Co., says Brown is "a good listener."

"We get a fair hearing, but the end result is going to be the product of a lot of different viewpoints and it... may not be at all like the business viewpoint," Biaggini said, adding he was disappointed at Brown's adament opposition to nuclear power.

Some roundtable members have become disensanted with Brown. For example, industrialist Justin Dart, who says of the governor: "He listens, but he doesn't histen... I can't figure out what he really believes in, or whether he really believes in anything."

Jacques Barzaghi, Brown's staff liason officer, describes how Brown seeks advises: "You are talking about a huge number of people, hundreds."

"He will seek out anytone whose views he thinks might add something. Then there are books. He swallows books like a vacuum cleaner. And we may have to find the author for him to answer more questions."

And some of Brown's sessions even with people not in politics have led to appointments in state government.

The governor, for example, met 75-year-old anthropologist Bateson four years ago and they talked about eybernetics, the study of the control mechanism of the brain and nervous system.

A year — and a half-dozen similar conversations — later, Brown appointed Bateson a University of California regent.
