BEATTYVILLE - Woody will have to wait

BEATTYVILLE — Woody will have to wait on woolly,
Actor Woody Harrelson's trial on charges of planting four industrial hemp seeds was scheduled for Oct. 25 in Lee District Court. But officials later realized that was the same day the annual Woolly Worm Festival begins.
Harrelson, who is charged with possession of marijuana, planted the seeds in Lee County in June to draw attention to the campaign to legalize industrial hemp. He wants to be convicted so he can challenge the laws that make no distinction between the hemp he planted and its psychoactive cousin, marijuana.
Harrelson was careful to plant only enough seeds to draw a misdemeanor charge, not a felony. As it is, Harrelson could get up to a year in jail and a \$500 fine.

Shirts promote healing process Several different colored T-shirts representing abused and assaulted women hung from a clothesline in the Free Speech Area in front of the Student Center yesterday. Each shirt provided a vehicle of emotional healing for the vicini Each shirt provided a vehicle of emotional healing for the victim. The shirts were color-coded to specify the type of violence each woman was a victim of. Some T-shirt colors appeared more than others: white, red, orange, pink, yellow and blue shirts were among the more prevalent colors adorning the clothesine. White shirts represented women who died as a result of violence committed against them, while pink, orange and red shirts were for women who were raped or sexually assaulted. Yellow, tan or brown shirts stood for battered women, and blue or green shirts represented survivors of incest or other childhood sexual abuse. The messages written on the shirts told vivid stories of the hardships experienced by female victims of violence. Inscriptions on shirts included words of abuse, such as "Abused by grandfather, father, brothers, neighborhood boys, adult baby sitter and husband." Aside from a tie with Louisville, the only bad example has been last Wednesday's loss to Xavier. The Wildest were shut out 1-0 at the Cage.



tion into FBI crime statistics (1977-92) proves the efficacy of concealed handgun laws. Fact: For counties that implemented the law, murders fell 8.5 percent, rapes fell 5 percent, and aggravated assaults fell 7 percent.

Why did this happen? Most likely because criminals fear armed citizens, especially when the criminal ends up looking down the barrel of Grandma's 3.57 Magnum.

The study also notes 1,409 accidental deaths occurred in 1992. Of these, 863 (6) percent) occurred in states without right-to-carry laws. Why? Most states require individuals to undergo a firearms safety training course, in addition to a 90-day background check, in order to get a right-to-carry lieves. Individuals who receive a license are trained, responsible, law-abiding citizens.

Please note there are physical limitations to the license. Courthouses, prisons, daycare facilities, airports, and bars are off-limits to

"We chose Dr. Teller because he's such a famous and historic person involved in nuclear energy," said Mary beth McAlister, publications and public relations assistant for the center.



Amendment targets SGA structure

Call the Student Government Association what you will, but this year has been a year for change. A month ago Michael Tomblyn, a graduate student senator, made waves by co-sponsoring a fiscal policy with SGA President Alan Aja. Tonight, Tomblyn hopes to change the structure of the SGA Senate.

In a constitutional amendment to be brought to the full senate Tomblyn proposes a change that he says will "make the senate more representative of the actual student body."

The bill proposes to elect one college senator for every 1,400 students enrolled within that col-students enrolled within that col-students enrolled within that col-students elimination.

The number of senators at large would shrink from 15 to nine, which Aja believes will make the elections more competitive.

"It's no secret that people always run for senator at large if they do not know enough people to win a college spot," Aja said.

As part of the bill, the distribution of the senate seats will be determined every four years according to the most recent college population statistics from the Office of the Registrar.

The amendment was brought up in the operations and evaluations committee meeting this week. The committee passed the bill with a vote of five to two.

Jim Noll, a College of Lawsen-ator, voted against the bill in committee because he said he felt the senate is fine in its current state.
