Ways and means toward providing an adequate library for the Kentucky Houses of Reform at Greendale were discussed at a meeting Friday of men and women interested in that work. The meeting was called by the project committee of the Lexington Council for Social Planning. A committee, composed of Mrs. Dugan, chairman; Miss Lena Noefer of Frankfort, state director of libraries; Mrs. Waller Bullock, Miss Margaret King, Miss Carrie L. Hunt, Mr. McElfresh, Mr. Braden, Colonel Dunn, Miss Susan Miller and Miss Nan Lacy, was named to work with other persons in formulating plans for the establishment of a library at the school for use of the boys and girls. The group adopted a resolution deploring the inadequacy of the library and expressing the hope one could be raised to the standard of the state board of education.
