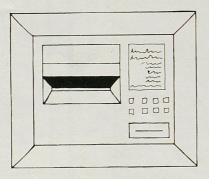
HON. JULIAN M. CARROLL governor

the honorable JULIAN M. CARROLL Governor of Kentucky

Julian Morton Carroll became Kentucky's 58th governor on Dec. 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll was elected to a full four-year term as governor in November 1975 and was inaugurated in December of that year. Born in McCracken County in 1931, Carroll attended Paducah Junior Collegafter graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956.

Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, the last four as Speaker of the House. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-67 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod. The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

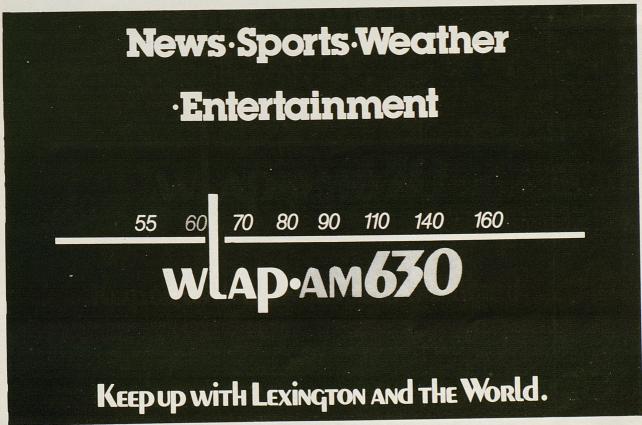
In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.



Athletics Director

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 follow-

ing Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in

Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tour-

nament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.



After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he high ranked among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in

the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a

regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

Athletics Department

FRANK HAM, Assistant Director of Athletics

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the athletic director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Mich., and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball

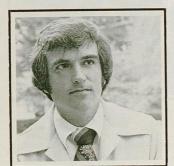
In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in

public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1956 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Mich. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, N.C., and Craig, a U.S. Army Captain, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Cassopolis, Mich., and Jennifer, 1978 graduate of UK.

Ham is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Ham of Edwardsburg, Michigan.





LARRY IVY Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Ivy, who came to the University of Kentucky as director of housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of the business operations, and helps to develop and initiate policies for accounting procedures and related financial management activities of the department.

A native of Alabama, Ivy graduated in 1961 from Huntsville High School, where he lettered in four sports. He is a 1967 graduate of the University of Alabama, and earned his MBA from Alabama in 1968.

He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Huntsville. They have one daughter, Kim. Ivy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack F. Ivy of Huntsville.

SUE FEAMSTER **Assistant Director of Athletics**

Sue Feamster joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

A former teacher and counselor, Feamster is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Feamster of Frankfort.





BOB BRADLEY Assistant Director for Academic Affairs

Bob is a native of New York who earned his M.A. at UK before serving as coordinator of counseling and head of finances at the Lexington Technical Institute. He joined the Athletics Association last year. Bob earned letters in football, baseball, basketball and track at Hornell High School (N.Y.) and played football at Salem College in West Virginia.

The Coaches

Fran Curci

Head Coach

Entering his seventh season as head coach at the University of Kentucky, Fran Curci has posted a 36-29-2 record, best for a Wildcat coach since Bear Bryant guided the "Big Blue" forces to a 60-23-5 record during the 1946-53 era.

Included in Curci's UK record are a Peach Bowl championship (1976) and a 10-1 record in 1977, best for a Wildcat team since Bryant's 1950 team finished 10-1 and won the Sugar Bowl.

Although the 1978 Wildcat squad, which was minus consenus All-American DE Art Still and four other All-SEC players, finished 4-6-1, Curci still produced three All-SEC players (LB Jim Kovach, NG Richard Jaffe, OG Dan Fowler) and two Academic All-Americans (Kovach and C Mark Keene).

Commonwealth Stadium, the 58,000seat stadium that is home of the Wildcats, was filled for the six home encounters, as were practically all of the five other stadiums where the Wildcats played on the road.

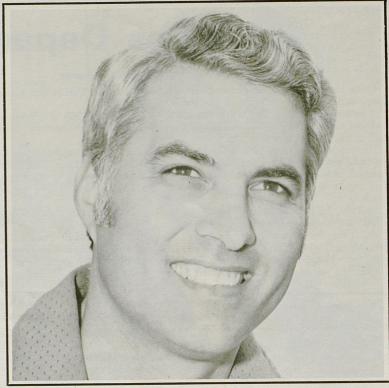
Curci's record at UK now includes a conference co-championship in 1976 and an undefeated (6-0) conference slate in 1977, when the Wildcats were not eligible for the championship. Kentucky's only other SEC championship was in 1950, when the Wildcats were 5-1 in the conference.

During his tenure at UK, Curci has been named SEC "Coach of the Year" by both wire services—UPI in 1973 and AP in 1977—and has finished high in the national balloting (1977).

the national balloting (1977).

He has produced four All-Americans and three Academic All-Americans at UK, which did not have an All-American of any type during the nine years before he came to Lexington. He also has produced 10 All-SEC players named 15 times to the honor squads.

Curci came to UK from the University of Miami, FL, where he was head coach two years. He started his career

as freshman coach there in 1962 after earning All-American honors as a quarterback for the Hurricanes in 1959 and playing QB for the old Dallas Texans in the AFL.

Curci went to Tampa as head coach in 1968, putting together a 7-3 season that included victories over Mississippi State and Tulane and earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association's "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 1969 team finished 8-2, while his 10-1 record in 1970 included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking. Curci was runner-up for College Division "Coach of the Year"

He coached the Hurricanes in 1971 and 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school football in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At Miami, where he was known as the "Mitey Magician," he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-American as a senior in 1959 after receiving All-America honorable mention in 1957.

He set Hurricane seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards completed and most yards gained passing. He was co-holder of the record for most passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades. He captained the Hurricanes his senior year and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset of Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year for the Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

Curci has been selected seven times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game five years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charlie McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-American game and has also appeared at the North-South Game, Japan Bowl, East-West Game and Hula Bowl.

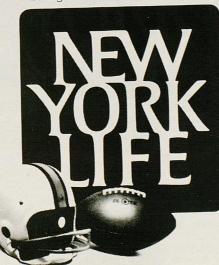

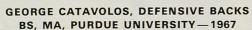
Assistant Coaches

Coach Fran Curci calls his current coaching staff the finest he has had since coming to Kentucky. Here is a brief biographical look at them.



CHARLIE BAILEY, ASSISTANT HEAD FOOTBALL COACH University of Tampa — 1962

Charlie came to UK in 1975 from Rice University where he served three years as defensive coordinator and was assistant head coach. A native of Poca, W. Va., he was a high school quarterback there, earning three letters each in football, baseball and basketball. As an end on both offense and defense, he lettered four years at the University of Tampa, being named outstanding lineman and team captain, among other honors. After graduating from Tampa, he coached one year each at Poca High and Brandon, Fla., High before serving as an assistant at Tampa from 1964-70. He was defensive coach for Curci one year at Miami before moving to Rice; served as UK defensive coordinator before being elevated to Assistant Head Coach this year.



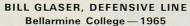
George is a native of Chicago and a graduate of Cleveland's West Tech High School, where he was All-City and All-Scholastic offensive end and safety, and a basketball letterman.

He earned his bachelor's degree at Purdue and his M.A. there in 1969. A three-year letterman, he earned the Noble E. Kizer Academic Award his senior year and was co-captain and outstanding defensive back on the Boilermakers' 1967 Rose Bowl team.

After being drafted and trying out with the Philadelphia Eagles, he returned to Purdue to serve two years as a graduate assistant and then was at Middle Tennessee and Louisville. He returned to Purdue in 1971, working with the secondary.

DAN COUGHLIN, DEFENSIVE LINE University of Miami — 1962

A teammate of Fran Curci and a two-year starter as offensive guard and line-backer at the University of Miami, Dan cut his coaching teeth at Coral Gables High School, here he spent nine years with the perennially powerful teams there. During his tenure, the Cavaliers won 102 games, lost nine and tied one, registering nine shutouts in 13 games in 1967 and winning two national championships. A native of Cleveland, he played his prep football at Benedictine High. After graduating from Miami, he coached one year at LaSalle High there. Dan came to UK with Curci in 1972.



A native Kentuckian (Louisville), Bill came to UK in 1977 from Morehead State University, where he was defensive coordinator. He played offensive guard and linebacker at St. Xavier High School, in Louisville, and returned to St. X as an assistant coach after graduating from Bellarmine College. He became head coach in 1974. His teams won the state AAA crown in 1974 and the AAAA title in 1975. He was named Courier-Journal "Coach of the Year" in 1974, and in 1975 was selected to a similar honor by the Kentucky High School Coaches Association.

LARRY KIRKSEY, RECEIVERS Eastern Kentucky University — 1973

Larry, a native of Harlan, came to UK in 1977 from Miami of Ohio where he was coach of wide receivers and supervisor of scouting. He played split end at Eastern Kentucky University where he earned four varsity letters and was named to the "Outstanding College Athletes of America." While at Eastern, he had 82 career catches for 1,155 yards. He received his bachelor's degree in 1973 and remained at EKU as a graduate assistant until July, 1974, when he joined the Miami University

CHARLIE McCULLERS, OFFENSIVE BACKS
University of Tampa — 1960

Charlie joined the UK staff this year after serving as OB coach at Vanderbilt the past two years. A native of Plant City, Fla., he was a three-year starter at tailback for Tampa, earning MVP recognition and serving as co-captain of the Spartans in 1960, his senior season. He joined the Tampa staff as a graduate assistant in 1961, was elevated to the varsity in 1962 and moved in 1964 to Wichita State. He spent the next two seasons at Parsons College before going to the University of Kansas, where he was offensive coordinator from 1969 until 1973. He was offensive backfield coach at Ole Miss three years before going to Vanderbilt.

JON MIRILOVICH
Offensive Line—Miami (Fla.)—1960

Jon returned to UK this year after two years with bowl teams at North Carolina State. A former star end at the University of Miami, he was a teammate of Fran Curci at Miami's Archbishop Curley High, earning All-City and All-American honors. Playing as two-way end at UM, he lettered three years and was accorded honorable mention AA, teaming again with Curci. He played with the Dallas Texans before a leg injury cut short his career. He served successfully as assistant coach at Columbus High (1961-62) and Southwest High (1962-63), head coach at Columbus (1965-66) and assistant coach at Coral Gables High (1968-69) before joining Curci at Tampa in 1970. Jon went to Miami with Curci in 1971 and came to UK with him in 1973.

TOM TURCHETTA, TIGHT ENDS Miami (Fla.) — 1972

Tom moved up to a full-time assistantship this year after serving as a graduate assistant at UK in 1978. He came to UK from North Miami Beach Senior High School, where he served two years as an assistant and three years as head coach. A native of Pennsylvania, he was an All-Catholic offensive and defensive tackle and the Outstanding Athlete (1967) at Altoona Catholic. He was co-captain and JuCo All-American (1969) as a senior and LB at Taft Junior College in California. At the University of Miami, he was first team All-Southern Independent two years. Most Dedicated Player in 1970, co-captain and MVP 1971.

ED MIDDENDORF, PART-TIME COACH
Xavier University—1970

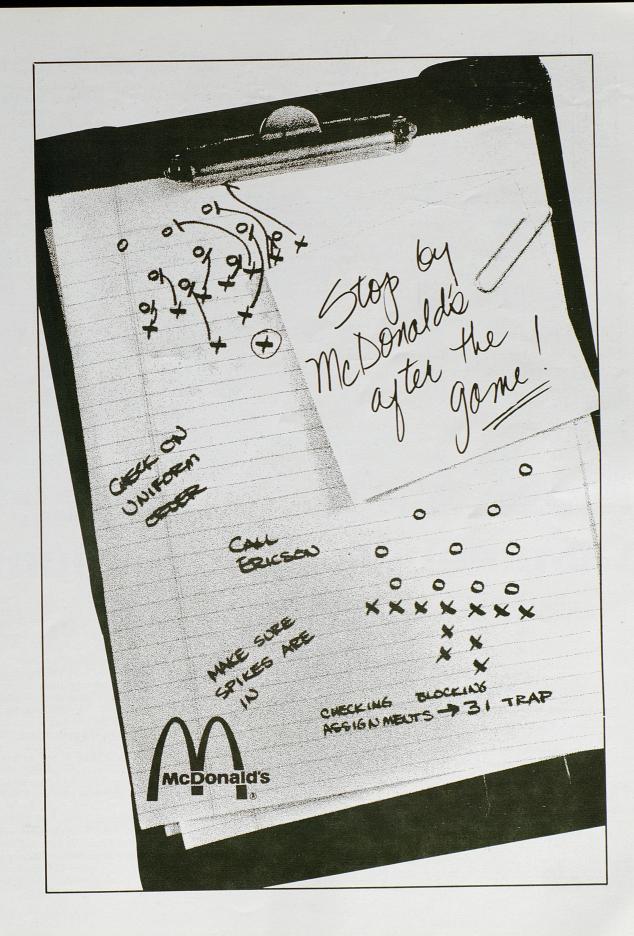
A native of Ft. Mitchell, Ky., Ed played high school football under Coach Tom Ballaban at St. Xavier in Cincinnati, and later returned to coach the defensive line as a varsity assistant. Ed graduated from Xavier in 1970 with a B. S. degree in psychology. While serving as a graduate assistant at UK, he received teacher certification in physical education and is currently pursuing a M.S. degree in sports administration.

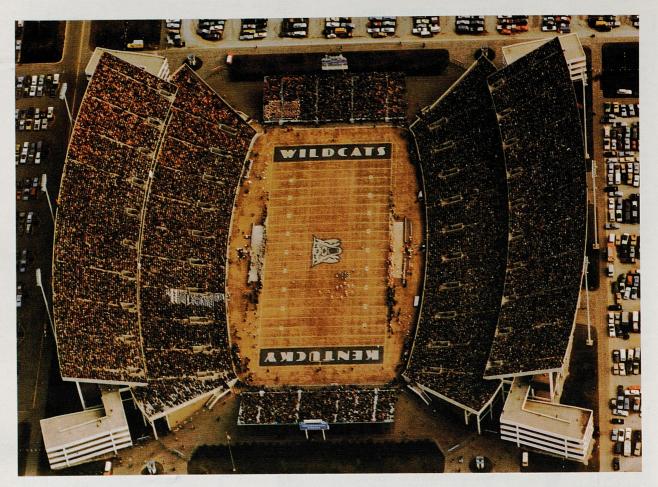

TOM KALINOWSKI Equipment Manager

A native of Middletown, Conn., Tom was manager of the football, basketball and baseball teams at Xavier High School. He served as student manager for the Wildcat football team, moved up to assistant equipment manager in 1977 and equipment manager last year.





Commonwealth Stadium

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972, and construction began

a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths

and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium.

Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July 1973, and this was replaced with Bermuda in 1974. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium — that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University. Soon after the first sections of the concrete stadium on Euclid Avenue were completed Sept. 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville Oct. 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium Nov. 1, 1924.

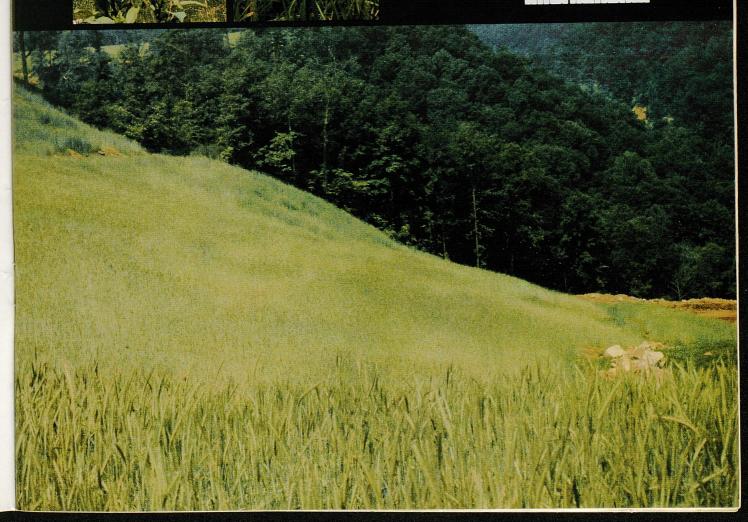

Kentucky's Felix Wilson made the decision late in high school to play football but natural abilities and hard work have made him one of the SEC's top pass catchers.

Somewhere in that great football stadium in the sky is a power building football player bodies. To watch a team like the Kentucky Wildcats pass by in a file, one would think that all the players were cut from the same basic mold. That is until the receivers lope past.

In the midst of their thick chested,

bulky thighed compadres, the sleek willowy receivers seem more like misplaced basketball players than football players.

If Kentucky's outstanding flanker Felix Wilson looks like he should be on a basketball court, it could be because football entered his athletic career late. Not until his senior year at Snyder High School in Jersey City, N. J. did Wilson play football as a flanker. Until then, he had concentrated on basketball, an activity with which he credits the development of his eye-hand coordination.

In describing Wilson's talents, UK receiver coach Larry Kirksey notes Wilson's quickness and his great hands. "He can do two things that are necessary for being a good receiver. He can get open and he can catch the football," says the soft spoken coach from Harlan County. "It takes exceptional quickness and good hands to do that."

Observers generally concur that Wilson lacks the blinding speed of some receivers but according to Kirksey, its not necessary if a receiver can cover 40 yards

quickly.

The majority of the pass routes run by receivers are no longer than 16 yards and are usually designed to have the receiver working back toward the quarterback. That is necessitated by the wide spread usage of the zone defense which gives area responsibility to the defensive backs instead of man-to-man cover-

age. The receivers therefore spend their lives trying to find holes in the zone.

Describing a pass route finds all the duties of a receiver coming into play. He must first get the defensive man off of him, meaning that he can be blocked and held up at the line of scrimmage. This season a new NCAA rule permits the blocking of an end only at the line and no further down field than 3½ vards. After that he can't be touched. Kirksey feels that the rule change should open up the college passing game since receivers on short routes can no longer be pushed toward the sideline out of the play. It should also help tight ends who used to get blocked at the line and again when they entered linebacker ter-

Wilson, however, is concerned that defensive backs will make more of an effort to stop the pass route at the line of scrimmage and that ends will find it tough to get the route started. However, he agrees that the new rule could be helpful once the end passes the magic 3½ yard gate.

After the end releases, he must get the defensive man "head up."

This is a cat and mouse game between the two adversaries. The back is trying to stay ahead of him on his route and the end is trying to get him out of position so that he can break free at the moment the ball is scheduled to arrive. Usually, the end has to be at an appointed spot in 21/2 seconds which means he must apply all his savvy in a hurry and get moving in the right direction.

Most pass plays do not involve the quarterback sailing a spiralling pigskin 70 yards and timing it to hit a receiver on the finger tips. Pass plays are a matter of timing and the quarterback is throwing

to a pre-designated spot.

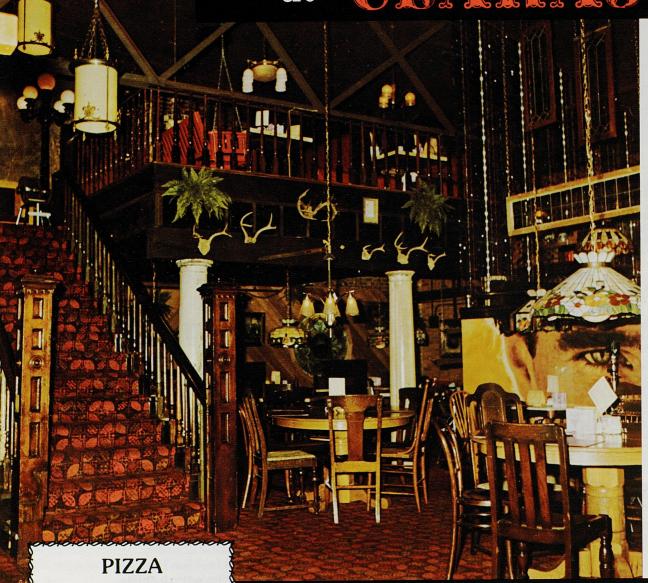

For example, an end's route is a short sideline pass. There may be a fake to a running back on a handoff and then the quarterback turns and fires behind the defensive corner back. The end from the time the ball is snapped must maneuver the closest defensive back to the inside of the field and break to the outside, looking up at the last second to grab the pass which was released before he looked back.

If there's one piece of advice that Wilson would give to aspiring young-sters aspiring to be receivers it would be to catch passes—lots of passes. Catch them in every conceivable form and fashion.

"Anyone can throw to you," says Wilson. "You don't have to have a starting quarterback, it can be anyone. I used to get my mother and sister out in the back yard and have them throw to me."

The hours of practice have paid dividends for Wilson who is a likely All-SEC pick this season. In 1978, he was second in the SEC with 43 catches for 727 yards and four touchdowns.

The catches and yards broke UK season records set by Rick Kestner, who had 42 catches for 676 yards in 1964. Wilson is within 37 catches of Tom Hutchinson's UK career record of 94 set in 1960-62 and within 508 yards of Larry Seiple's career record of 1422 yards set in 1964-66.

Not bad for a former basketball player.

Coach Fran Curci Searching Thin Ranks For a Winning Combination. Young, Spirited Players Will See Action Early in Their Careers.

When the University of Kentucky Wildcats take on the Miami Redskins this afternoon in Commonwealth Stadium, it will mark the end of a long period of cautious expectation that began last spring when the UK coaches began trying to regroup their forces. Heavily depleted by graduation, suspensions, and injuries, the Wildcats will be facing examination day for a large number of untried athletes.

Trying to contain Miami's experienced offense, which boasts two running backs who gained more than a combined 1,700 yards for the Redskins last season, will put Kentucky's new defense to the test.

The defense, where the only starters returning from last year are Richard Jaffe at noseguard and Larry Carter and Greg Motley at defensive backs, will have a quick introduction to collegiate

The linebacking corps, which was hit heavily by graduation with the loss of Jim Kovach and Kelly Kirchbaum, will be anchored by Lester Boyd who was last seasons second leading tackler despite being overshadowed by the likes of Kovach and Kirchbaum. Joining Boyd will be Chuck Smith, a 6-0, 207 pound junior letterman who played in all 11

games last year.

Though Kentucky shows marginal experience in its first team lineup, the question mark is its depth. After you go past the starters, Kentucky shows a lot of freshmen entering the game.

There is a lot of promise on the offense and even some signs of future greatness in the backfield but again the question remains how the players will perform under actual game conditions.

"I think the fans will love this team," says Curci. "It should be a fun year because I think this team will give a big effort. It will be a scrappy team. It has already shown signs of being willing to do what it takes to win."

Kentucky will not be able to overpower its opponents this year and has gone to the I formation as an additional offensive weapon. It's the first time the formation has been used at UK since Curci has been here. The offense, it is hoped, will show more dash and daring. It will give the opponents' defenses more variables to consider and hopefully keep them off-balance.

Kentucky, thin both in numbers and experience, will have more than half of its scholarship ranks filled with freshmen this afternoon.

The NCAA limit is 95 scholarship athletes on a squad, but due to eight players on suspension, some drop-outs and no-shows, and some injuries, Coach Fran Curci has only three-fourths of that number on hand as the Wildcats completed their pre-season practices.

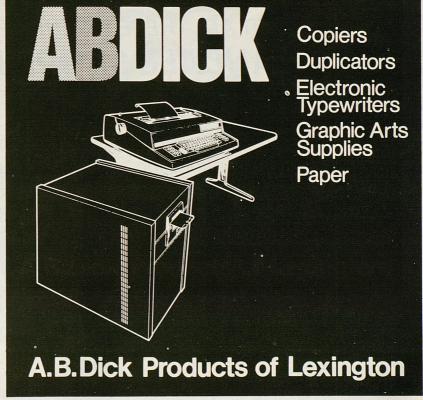
The scholarship group includes 25 incoming and 12 redshirt freshmen for a total of 37 players with no collegiate game experience, as compared to only 12 seniors, 13 juniors and nine sophomores on the able-bodied and available list.

The injured players include junior linebacker Mark Meenach of Ashland, who hurt a knee while running before the practice season got underway and freshman defensive ends Dan Chase of Corbin, who had a back operation for

a non-football related injury, and Richard Abraham of Paducah, who will be out for four to six weeks with a collapsed lung.

Among the players who did not show or left after summer practice began are freshman signee George Rudd, freshman running back Ron McGahee, a sophomore kicker Jeff Fletcher, junior defensive tackle Andy Jermolowicz, sophomore linebacker Sam Simpson, senior defensive tackle Rollie Skur and freshman offensive guard Gary Van Deusen.

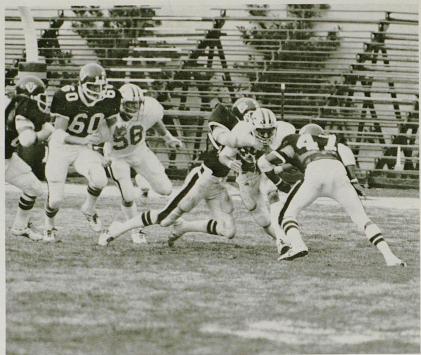
Nine of the 22 starting positions are currently manned by seniors, six by juniors, four by sophomores and three by freshmen. The punter is a freshman, the placekicker a sophomore. Half the second-line players are freshmen.

Leading the offense is quarterback Mike Shutt, backed by freshman Randy Jenkins of Pennington Gap, Va., whose emergence moved sophomore Juan Portela to wide receiver and redshirt freshman Rob Mangas to tight end. Freshman Terry Henry is the No. 3 quarterback.

Shutt's favorite target will be senior Felix Wilson, who was the No. 2 receiver in the Southeastern Conference last season. Redshirt freshmen Brian Allen and Bill Prewitt join Portela in backing Wilson.

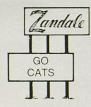

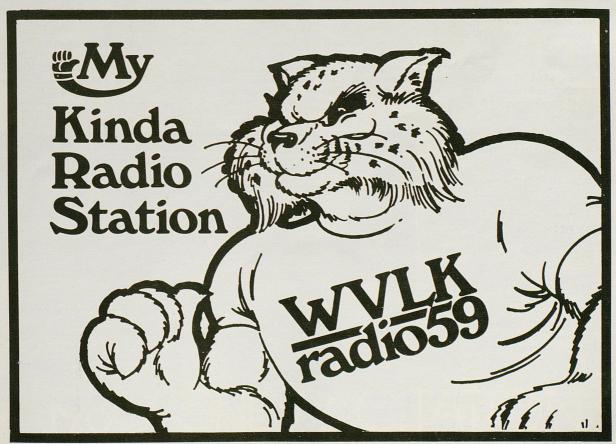

Fans can expect to see the Miami Redskins field a ball control team but not overpowering with huge running backs. Their backs are generally under 6-0 and 200 pounds but are quick. They carry the ball 75-80 percent of the time but have the capability of being a good passing team.

Last season, the Redskins featured large tight ends and therefore threw a lot of short passes over the middle and in the flats. This season the Redskin coaches feel they have quicker wide receivers and the fans should see more sprint out passes.

Quarterback Larry Fortner is now with the Miami Dolphins but this year's starter Chuck Hauck has the capability of being a better passer. However, Hauck isn't the runner that Fortner was and probably will not be carrying the ball as

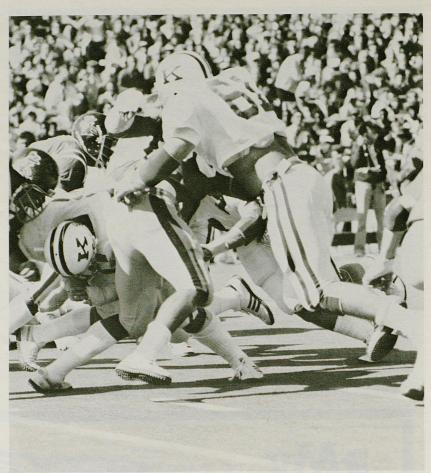
The Redskins have confidence in their offensive line where they return four seniors in the middle. The defensive line is in the opposite situation with newcomers at the tackle slots.

A big question for Miami is whether running back Mark Hunter, the team's leading rusher last season with 1,046 vards and 11 touchdowns, will be physically able to play in its' first two games. Hunter suffered a shoulder separation two weeks ago and has been listed as a doubtful starter against Kentucky.

Hunter at 5-7, 175 pounds is a quick back with a knack for finding the open hole and getting through it in a hurry. He is also a threat as a kick-off returner and is a capable pass receiver. He was the team's MVP in 1978.

Defensively, the Redskins operate out of the basic 5-2 Oklahoma styled alignment with some stunting but not much. The defense's strength lies in its veteran backfield where five starters return. The defense also has one of its linebackers back from '78 and its defensive ends, which Miami terms outside linebackers. The weakness appears to be at defensive tackle and Coach Tom Reed hopes that while they are gaining experience in this season's early going that too many tackles won't need to be made . . . in the defensive backfield.

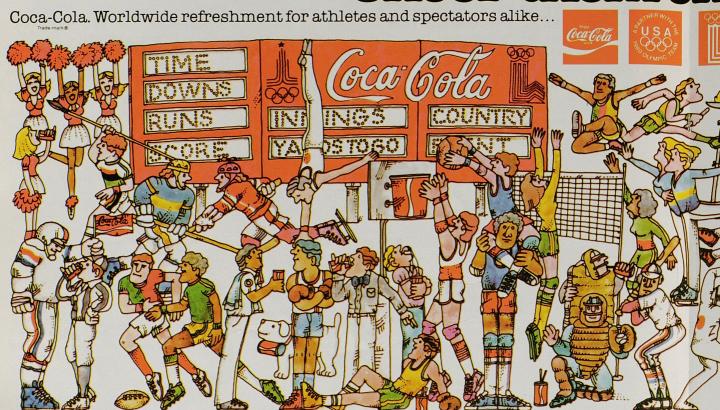

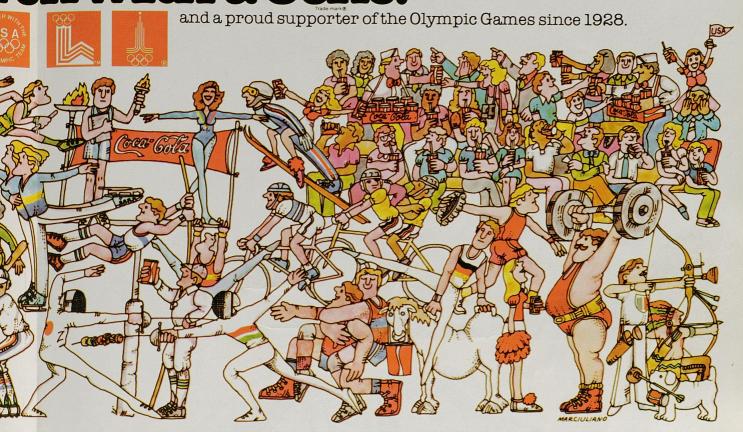

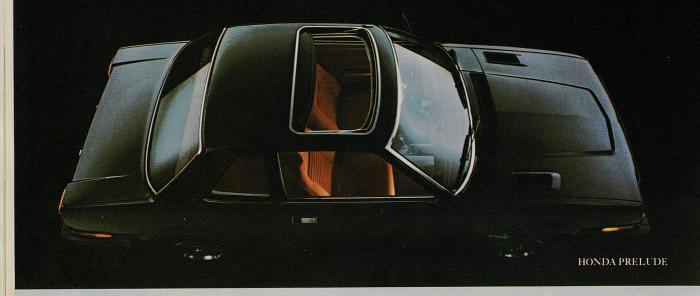

The Redskins' number one booster since he became Miami's 17th president in 1965, Dr. Phillip R. Shriver is senior in terms of years of service among the state university presidents of Ohio. He came to Miami from the deanship of the College of Arts and Sciences at Kent

Author or co-author of several books, he is a teacher, administrator and historian of wide experience. Regardless of his administrative duties, Dr. Shriver continues to teach a Miami course in his specialty, Ohio history, to maintain communication with students and to preserve his feel for the classroom.

He is the only institution president on the ten-member NCAA Classification Committee named in 1976 for the task of choosing a tentative list of institutions



for Division I recognition in football, hearing appeals from the listing, and making final recommendations to the NCAA board. He was also chairman of the Mid-American Conference Council of Presidents for six consecutive years

until May of 1977.

Born in Cleveland, Dr. Shriver attended John Adams High School. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Yale in 1943, the Master of Arts degree from Harvard in 1946 and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Columbia in 1954. Dr. Shriver's honorary degrees include Doctor of Letters from the University of Cincinnati; the Doctor of Humanities from McKendree College; the Doctor of Laws from the Ohio State University, Heidelberg College and Eastern Michigan University, the Doctor of Public Service from Albion College, and the Doctor of Humane Letters from Central State University.

Now in his 15th year as president, Dr. Shriver has presided over a Miami period of self-examination and deliberate "reform through channels' resulting in a considerable degree of consensus on increased student and faculty voice in university governance, liberalization of conduct regulations and greater flexibility of academic requirements.

Dr. Shriver and his wife, Martha, have four daughters and a son.



RICHARD SHRIDER **Athletic Director**

Now in his 16th season as Athletic Director Richard G. (Dick) Shrider has guided Miami University's athletic program to 38 championships and nine Reese Cup Trophies, indicative of the Redskins' athletic excellence in the Mid-American Conference.

Shrider became Athletic Director in March of 1964, succeeding the late John

Tom Reed, 34, became Miami's 28th head football coach last year and guided the Redskins to a record of 8-2-1, including seven straight victories to finish out the season.

A native of Delaware, Ohio, Reed earned 11 letters in football, baseball and track at Hayes High School. He earned three varsity letters as a halfback under Coach Bo Schembechler and helped Miami capture two Mid-American Conference co-titles in 1965 and 1966. He stayed on at Miami to serve two years as a graduate assistant in football.

From 1969-72 Reed was the defensive line coach under Gordon Larson at Akron and helped compile a record of 28-11 and three national small college rankings. He originated the "Executioners Club" award for defensive excellence which is still in existence.

Reed spent one year as defensive back-

field coach under Jim Young at Arizona and received credit for helping the team gain an 8-3 record and a Western Athletic Conference co-championship.

The last four years for Reed have been spent as the defensive line coach at Michigan under Schembechler. In addition to compiling a record of 38-7, three Big 10 co-championships and national ranking, Michigan has played in the Orange Bowl and twice in the Rose Bowl during the last three years.

While at Michigan Reed has served as the strength and conditioning coach in charge of developing, maintaining and testing programs and as the recruiting coordinator.

Miami is known as the "Cradle of Coaches" because of such famous graduates as Ara Parseghian, John Pont, Schembechler, and Bill Mallory. But Schembechler may be called the "Father of Coaches" because his recent assistants include head coaches Jim Young at Purdue; Gary Moeller, Illinois; Larry Smith, Tulane; Chuck Stobart, Toledo, and Elliot Uzelac, Western Michigan. Reed is now a member of both groups.

Miami Faces Tough Slate



Coach Tom Reed's Miami University Redskins have begun the school's 91st year of intercollegiate football and the season promises to be one of the toughest schedules to date.

The Redskins opened at home last week (after this publication went to press) against the defending Mid-American Conference champion Ball State. Today's game in Lexington is the first of a three-game road swing that takes the Skins to Michigan State, Central Michigan, and Marshall.

On October 13 they will stage their Homecoming festivities while hosting

Ohio University, the second of only four home games that they will play this season. Ball State, Toledo, and Cincinnati are the opponents for their other home stands. Their season is rounded out by games with Bowling Green, Western Michigan, and Kent State.

Miami has 35 lettermen, including 13 starters, returning from last year's team which won its last seven games to finish with an 8-2-1 record for Coach Reed's first year in Oxford.

Reed's biggest challenge has been to come up with a replacement for Larry Fortner at quarterback. "We wanted Chuck Hauck to gain some experience this spring but he didn't because he sustained a severe injury to his thumb during the first week of practice and it required surgery," stated Reed. "But Hauck is our quarterback because he has the most quickness and is a good passer. As a backup we have John Mc-Intosh and Mark Kelly and we will try several incoming freshmen."

Hauck is a junior who has never played any varsity football. He suffered a broken leg his freshman year in a junior

varsity game at Kentucky.

While quarterback could be a problem due to a lack of experience, there is no lack of experience or depth in the backfield, among the wide receivers and on the offensive line.

Returning are the top two running backs from last season in Mark Hunter and Greg Jones. Hunter led Miami in rushing with 1,046 yards, scored 11 touchdowns and averaged 25.7 yards on 11 kickoff returns. Jones gained 718 yards and scored four touchdowns on runs of 50 yards or more. Also back after missing last year due to a knee injury is running back Kaiser Holman, who rushed for 581 yards and scored seven touchdowns in 1977. Adding depth are Paul Drennan and John Conerty. Possible problem could be that Hunter and Jones missed the spring game due to a broken leg and foot, respectively.

Although the Redskins lost their top two receivers to graduation, Coach Reed feels there will be more speed this season with Don Treadwell, Curt Custer, Tom Jones and Mark Mattison.

The offensive line is anchored by seniors Dave Crowder, Doug Lantz, Andy Botting and Matt Mazur.

The secondary will have to be the strength of the defense in the early part of the season with the return of veterans like Kirk Springs, Alvin Hall, Rick Hyde, Joe Pequignot and Tim Dillion. "We must replace four of the top seven on the line and there are some big holes to fill," remarked Reed. "But we must develop our up front attack if we are to have any success.

As for the schedule, Reed stated: "Sure we know we have as tough an opening schedule as any Miami team has ever had. But we must win the MAC games and we play two of the top contenders

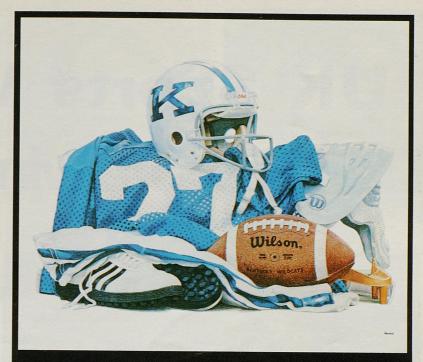

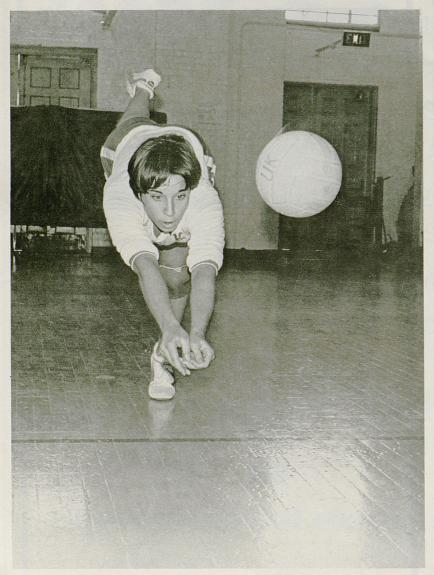

UK Sports Varied Despite Growing Costs

Despite the complex, interwoven state of changing athletics, the University of Kentucky Athletic Association continues to improve its facilities.

The track is being resurfaced with an artificial substance and to incorporate metric distances being used. The baseball field has a new outfield fence, dugouts, storage, and press facilities. Alumni Gym is being renovated, adding offices for the coaches of Category III sports and sprucing up the gym for sports like volley ball.

Offices in Memorial Coliseum and Alumni Gym are being shuffled and renovated to accommodate an increased staff. An assistant director of athletics for women's sports has been added as well as a full time person in sports information to work with women's athletics. Also hired has been a full-time assistant basketball coach and a secretary.

Sue Feamster, assistant director of athletics for women's sports, is encouraged by these efforts. "By providing a chance for these young people to participate competively in their fields of expertise, the University is able to provide financial help for a large number of talented individuals and is able to further serve the needs of its student body," she comments

With the issuance of proposed guidelines by the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the University merged the men's and womens's athletics associations in July 1978. The University felt that a single path was the best direction to follow in order to comply with those proposed guidelines. Next, Kentucky began trying to meet the needs of women's athletic teams by adding administrators, coaches and by improving facilities and equipment.

This fall, Congress will be faced with the delicate problem of whether or not

(Continued,

to make those guidelines Federal law. Once the bill reaches Congress, the law makers will have 45 days to decide whether or not to act. If they do not take direct action on the guidelines, they will become law.

The University administration and that of the Athletic Association concur with Title IX of the Equal Education Opportunity Act, however, both bodies see problems with the guidelines that have come out of bureaucratic interpretation of the Act. Those guidelines base athletic funding on the number of athletes that participate and say that an equivalent amount of money must be spent on both women's and men's sports.

spent on both women's and men's sports.
"It appears unworkable as it stands," says Clifford O. Hagan, UK Athletics Director. "Our proposal was to exempt the large revenue producing sports like football and basketball."

If the guidelines are made law and an equivalent amount of money is spent on women's athletics, then budget expenditure could balloon to around \$8 million, with only \$5 million revenue."

This year, the Athletic Association will have to reach into its reserve funds and go to the University's General Fund in order to meet its combined budget of approximately \$5.5 million as a result of Title IX.

The Association will have to use about

\$230,000 of its reserve funds and about \$185,000 from UK's General Fund in order to meet its increasing obligations.

Hagan is excited about UK's program of intercollegiate athletics. Women's athletic teams are becoming more prominent in competitive sports and interest in a wide range of sports is growing.

"We are in a thrilling time in intercollegiate athletics," says Hagan. "They are constant but changing."

If that sounds contradictory, it is because intercollegiate athletics are at a point where they are emerging from one period and moving into another while at

the same time finances will not allow

vast changes in sports programs.

Hagan has been predicting that adjustments would have to be made in the Category II and III sports due to growing expenses. Category II sports are those that could become self-sufficient such as women's basketball and Category III are those that produce little or no income such as golf and tennis.

One of the necessary budget adjustments in the non-income producers this year has been the cutting of one scholarship from the larger men's teams such as baseball, track, swimming and wrestling. Golf and tennis were not affected.

Until recently, Kentucky has offered the maximum number of full scholarships allowable to men under NCAA regulations for these sports. Now, rather than eliminate a sport, it is not offering its full complement of scholarships. How-ever, the men and women are being funded equally in these categories.

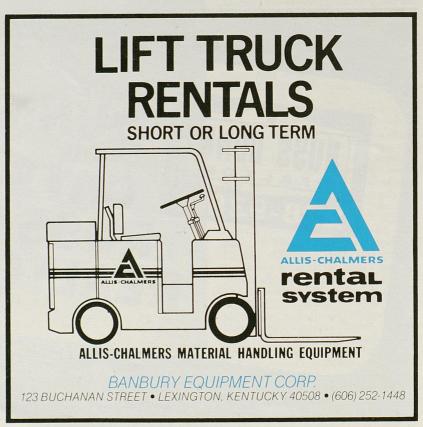
Kentucky is not in this boat by itself, according to Hagan. Title IX has affected other Southeastern Conference schools and as an example, he cities Florida and Alabama where wrestling has been dis-

continued in order to conserve dwindling

Hagan feels that the Category II and III sports are not the places to cut funds since they are relatively inexpensive to operate. At the same time, funds should not be cut from the large income producers since they represent UK's source of revenue for all sports.

"We don't want to start loping off sports," says Hagan. "That would be counterproductive.

So sports at the collegiate level are at

Running some two and a half hours three times a week during football season and twice a week during basketball season, practices include work on cheers, sideline and dance routines, pyramids and double stunts.

Male members of the squad also work with weights to keep in shape and strengthen muscles needed to lift their female partners. Most are athletically talented in other sports such as football, basketball and track.

Most women on the squad have training in dance and/or gymnastics.

Each UK cheerleader on the 1979-80 squad is a Kentuckian, a true BLUE sports fans. Here's the 1979 cheerleader line-up:

CATHY CAUDILL, team captain from Louisville, is a senior majoring in special education. This is her second year as a UK cheerleader (fifth year in all). A cheerleader at Louisville's Atherton High School, she is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs, W. N. Caudill. This summer Cathy worked for Universal Cheerleading Clinic and traveled around the country conducting cheerleading camps. After her graduation from UK, she plans to work with physically handicapped elementary-aged children.

Cathy's cheerleading partner is JIM-MY MORTIMER, a junior business ma-

jor from Glasgow. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Mortimer, Jimmy played football at Glasgow High School.

Cats' Must Stay Healthy

Kentucky head coach Fran Curci has repeatedly told pre-season interviewers that due to the lack of depth, his Wildcats will have to stay healthy in order to have a respectable record in 1979.

"If we have a (Richard) Jaffe hurt, a freshman will take his place," warned Curci.

One of the keys to keeping players

healthy and to rehabilitating injured ones is having a capable, professional training department.

Heading the Kentucky training activities for the first time this season is Al Green, who served last season as head assistant trainer at the University of Michigan.

Green joined the UK staff shortly be-

fore the practice season began and quickly started organizing the training room to suit his methods. He also gained a green light to purchase several pieces of equipment that will aid in the diagnosis and treatment of injuries and fortunately they began arriving on the first day of practice.

A trainer in a football program is concerned with a wide range of duties. The most frequent ones are taping, emergency care of injuries, the rehabilitation of injuries, making special protective padding and the maintenance of the training room.

training room.

To accomplish his duties, Green is assisted by a large staff including as-

sociate trainers Walt McCombs and Mimi Porter and graduate assistant Wayne Drummond. There are also nine student trainers.

At Kentucky there is a large staff of community based physicians as well as university physicians that are involved. There are a total of 25 medical specialists that help to keep the players healthy in-

cluding orthopedic surgeons Dr. George Gumbert and Dr. William Wheeler. Dr. John Perrine is the most often called on internist and Dr. Robert Atkins helps with dentistry.

The trainer is a catch-all medical person that looks after the players from taking temperatures when they have

colds to providing emergency care for injuries. The job carries a heavy responsibility and can be demanding. During the first week of practice this year, Green literally lived in the training room around the clock while trying to organize for the upcoming season.

There are three routes a person can take to become a trainer. There are colleges that offer degrees that certify graduates as Athletic Trainers or a person can complete 1,800 hours of apprenticeship under a certified trainer or a person can first become a physical therapist and then acquire 800 hours of experience.

then acquire 800 hours of experience.

The reason a physical therapist must gain on-the-job training is that the clients are different from civilian clients and their needs are different. Football players are in prime physical condition, are highly motivated toward recovering rapidly and are accustomed to enduring more discomfort than the average client. Where a physical therapist might utilize

one procedure per treatment with a civilian, one might be able to use three procedures per session with a football player.

The trainer's skills are varied and in-

clude knowledge in anatomy, physiology, psychology, hygiene, nutrition, taping, conditioning, prevention of injury methodology, and protective equipment. One of the key skills is as a diplomat, maintaining rapport between the team physician, the coaches, the administration, and the athletes in order to carry out the physician's instructions and to keep the coaches informed on the players' conditions.

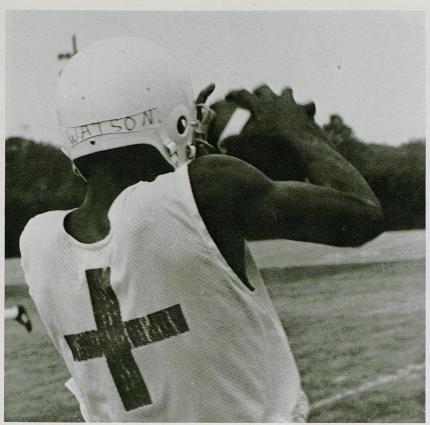
The training room is located at UK's Shively Sports Center adjacent to the team's dressing rooms. It is a bright and spacious facility with the typical aroma of ointments and salves, with piles of adhesive tape and bandages, with whirlpool baths and treatment tables.

It is a busy place in which all ankles are taped for each practice and game and where care and treatment of injuries from a coach's upset stomach to a running back's sore thigh muscle occurs almost continuously. It contains scales for measuring height and weight and also equipment for measuring the location of injuries, the degree of seriousness of the injury and how it occurred. The same equipment also can be used to de-

termine when a player is ready to return to action.

Excellent measurements and records are kept on the players to help the trainer and the physicians make recommendations concerning the player's health.

Two guidelines used to determine when a player is ready to play are to press the injured spot and watch the player's eyes and the range of motion that the injured limb has. If a player's eyes still indicate there is pain in the area or if the limb can not move as it is supposed to, releasing him to play could lead to more serious injury.

"They are more likely to be injured

"They are more likely to be injured if they are in pain or if they can't manuever fully," says Green. "And it is sometimes difficult to make an accurate determination because the players are so motivated to return to action."

Another key guideline to playability is the person's motivation. If a player says that he can't play, then he could be injured if he plays without the desire.

"If he says 'I can't go'," says Green.
"He's better off not being in there but
we also have to watch for those that
are not ready but are over-motivated
and willing to risk it."

The most common injuries treated by a football team's trainer says Green are muscle strains particularly in the groin and hamstrings, soft tissue injuries such as bruises, ankle injuries and knee injuries.

The trainer also becomes involved in the diet of the team. "We recommend and try to see that the players eat three solid meals a day," says Green. "In addition we feed them a powdered food supplement that provides additional carbohydrates and protein but the most important factor is seeing that they eat three squares a day. If they eat junk food," he continues, "they have less endurance and energy and tend to suffer more from the heat, especially early in the season."

Football is a team sport and this season at Kentucky that fact will be even more apparent. The coaches will be trying to provide as many young players the skills needed to play the game and the physicians and trainers will be trying to provide the coaches with as many superbly conditioned, healthy players with which to work. The success or failure of the season hinges on that teamwork.

Trease, Bell Call TV Network Games

COOKING WITH MICROWAVES

VHF and UHF ... probably everyone knows that depending on the area in which they are located, the television stations transmit on one or the other frequency. But when you talk "network", whether it be national like CBS, or regional, like the University of Kentucky Wildcat Football Network set up by WKYT-TV in Lexington, Kentucky, you are talking microwaves . . . and we don't means ovens!

The University of Kentucky Wildcat Football Network is made up of a number of television stations in Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio. As members of the network, these stations receive the game on a delayed basis, from WKYT-TV who, is the network "originator station," tapes the live action. The taped game is transmitted to these network stations via microwaves and therefore cannot be picked up by consumer television sets which are designed to only receive UHF and VHF transmissions. The stations in

the network rebroadcast the football game (which they received via microwave) on their station's frequency—either UHF or VHF—into viewers' homes.

What's the first step in setting up a television network? To contact commercial television stations in various market areas to determine interest in belonging to the network. Ideally, the network originator (WKYT-TV for the University of Kentucky Wildcat Football Network) wants to interest those stations which can deliver the largest number of viewers and sign them as members of the network. After the selection of network stations, AT & T sets up the microwave lines necessary to transmit the football game from WKYT-TV in Lexington, to each of the stations in the network. This step is further complicated by the fact that microwaves are "line-of-sight" waves; that is to say, they cannot be transmitted through mountains or any other solid object and must be routed around all obstacles.

BROADCASTING

Preparation for the actual broadcast of any Wildcat sports event begins weeks ahead of the game. Game announcers, WKYT-TV Sports Director Denny Trease and former NFL official Tommy Bell, must research players on both teams, memorizing names and jersey numbers and basic facts and statistics. "It's not too difficult memorizing Wildcat ball players but trying to quick-study the members of each week's visiting team is sometimes pretty tough," said Denny Trease.

Color commentator, Tommy Bell adds, "I try to study the background of the coaches as well as the players. And rules, too. I would hope that I can really add to the information of Wildcat fans. And working with Denny and WKYT Productions is a thrill."

In addition to the research the announcers must do, statistics on each play-

er must be gathered and programmed into what is called an "electronic graphics generator." This equipment allows the director to superimpose the statistics and related information over the live action.

A couple of days prior to the game, the engineers from WKYT-TV, the station which will be transmitting the game to the network stations, arrive at the event location and begins the tedious job of wiring and placing cables for the equipment which will be used during the taping or televising of the game. Approximately two miles of various sizes and types of cable will be strung, some of it weighing as much as 100 pounds.

The day of the game, production crews work closely with the engineers and the director to finalize plans. Camera angles and sideline shots are discussed and in some instances practiced, to determine the very best camera coverage for every inch of the playing field. The entire crew is at their place, with headsets to receive directions from the director at least an hour prior to game time.

During the game, the director will preview on monitors the pictures from each camera and call out the camera whose picture will be taped. If a shot play is missed, there's no second chance; directors have to make snap judgments and even anticipate plays to record the best of all the action on the field for the home television viewer.

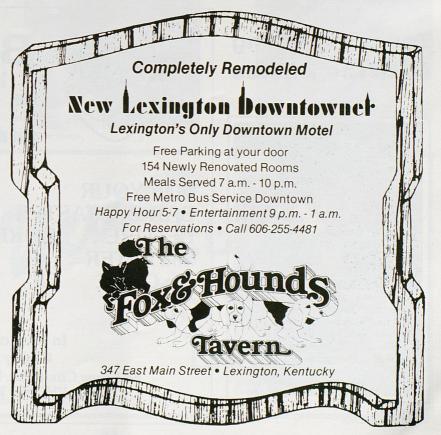
The taped game, or live game, is then transmitted to the network stations via the microwave lines set up days before. The network stations then rebroadcast the game to their own market audience.

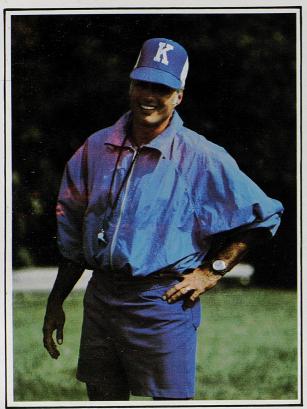


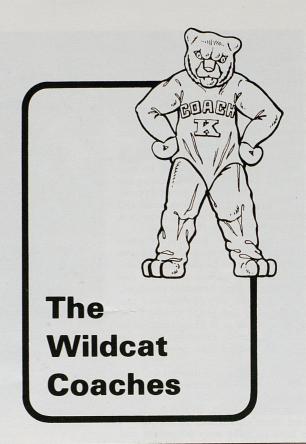

Old Blue Serves UK Visitors

A University of Kentucky coed was recently overheard saying, 'I couldn't imagine UK without Old Blue."

The Old Blue she is referring to is not an affectionate hound trotting in front of Memorial Hall. This Old Blue provides free tours of the UK campus each Monday through Friday at 2 p.m.

It is the English double-decker bus that has transported nearly 20,000 UK visitors since it was purchased in 1974 by the UK Alumni Association and presented to the University.

The bus, with its 14-foot high frame, was originally a part of the London omnibus fleet. It was built more than 20 years ago, and has been completely overhauled since arriving at UK.

In addition to the regular, daily tours beginning at 2 p.m. near the Administration Building, Old Blue is also used for special tours.

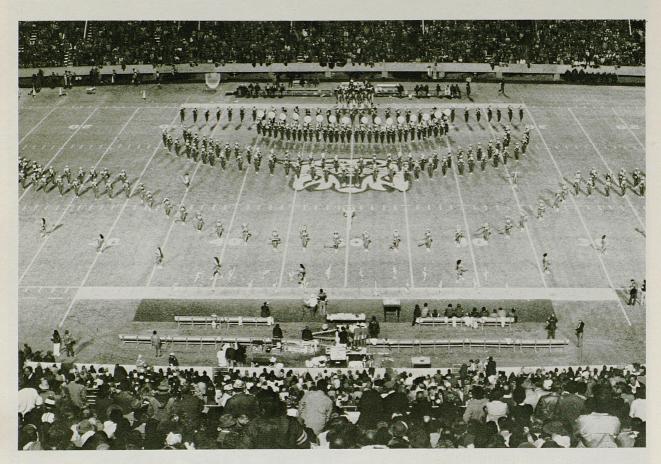

Wildcat Marching Band

The 1979 University of Kentucky "Wildcat" Marching Band numbers some 200 members from almost every college of the University. The members come from each geographical area of Kentucky and from the states of Ohio, New York, Michigan, Connecticut, N. Carolina, New Jersey, W. Virginia, Georgia, Massachusetts, Tennessee and Indiana.

With the exception of the directors, the band is largely student run, with group leaders and a section leader for each instrumental unit, and a group of fifteen marching assistants, a head flag bearer, head majorette, and an Executive Board of elected officers.

The band began its rehearsal on August 19 with a week of intensive practice, 9-10 hours per day, reverting when school began to a one hour rehearsal each day at five o'clock.

PREGAME

The music for Pregame includes "If You Believe," "This Could Be the Start of Something Big" and "Buckle Down, Winsocki," as well as the traditional Marching "K" and "On, On, U of K."

HALFTIME

The "Wildcat" Band opens a new season with a variety of musical idioms. The entrance is a medley of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" and "Brand New Day" from The Wiz. In concert the band presents the vibrant brass section in Chuck Corea's "Spanish Fantasy."

Vincent DiMartino, UK trumpet professor, joins the band for a nostalgic medley of "The Great Trumpet Players of the 30's," featuring Harry James' "Ciribiribim," Bunny Berigan's "I Can't Get Started" and Ziggy Elman's "And the Angels Sing." The bands' expanded percussion section is then featured in a drum solo with many colorful effects. The exit is Offenbach's exciting "Can-Can."

This show will be presented again next week when the "Wildcat" Marching Band accompanies the football team to Bloomington for the Indiana game.

RUSSELL RICE Sports Information Director

Russell Rice was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhl, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1969), and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriter of the Year" award. As a newspaperman, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He attended a national sports editors seminar at Columbia University and reported

the activities of such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for Time-Life-Fortune magazines and was Kentucky editor of Tobacco Magazine and Religious News Service. For the past 11 years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He authored "The Wildcats: A Story of Kentucky Football," and "The Big Blue Machine: A Story of Kentucky Basketball." His latest work is the Kentucky portion of a "History of the Southeastern Conference," scheduled off a New York press this fall. He edits the K-Men's Newsletter and has been named an honorary member of that organization. He also was honored by WAVE-TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." He was the first member of the Southeastern Conference Publicity Directors Association to be elected to a two-year term (1977-78) and recently completed his second year as president of the Blue Grass (Kentucky) chapter of the U.S. Harness Writers Association, which was organized in 1977. He is married to the former Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Louisville, Mrs. Mike Covington of Georgetown and Russell James and Kim of Lex-

AL GREEN, TRAINER

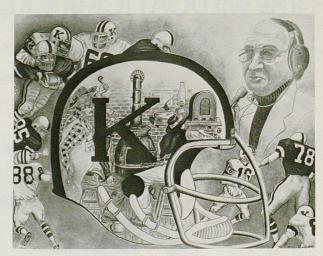
Al Green is in his first year as head trainer at the University of Kentucky having joined the Wildcats following a tenure at the University of Michigan.

Stadium Information

FIRST AID—The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section of the stadium and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two goft cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

CARDIAC CARE—In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

LOST AND FOUND—Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of public safety (305 Euclid Avenue) and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

CROWD NOISE PENALTY—Uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and official's signals for quiet.

NO HORNS—Horns are not permitted in Commonwealth Stadium and will be picked up at gates. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION—All gates are open two hours before game time. Parking lots are open three hours before game time. All stadium exits will be opened after the game. Please do not leave the stadium during the game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

FIELD REGULATIONS—Spectators must keep off the playing field at all times and after the game. Spectators must use the stadium ramps for exits.

LIQUORS—Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the stadium as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

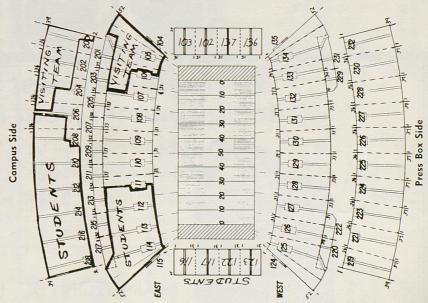
PUBLIC ADDRESS—Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at the Press Box.

SIGNS—Signs and barriers are restricted for Commonwealth Stadium in accordance with University regulations and policies established by the Public Safety Division.

PARKING—More than 5,000 parking spaces are located in four lots around the stadium, along with a bus-camper lot. Some areas are set aside for Blue & White Fund members, handicapped persons, staff and the press. Located nearby on the campus are many free parking spaces in University lots. Shuttle buses carry passengers to and from the campus lots and the stadium.

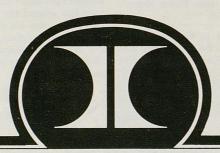

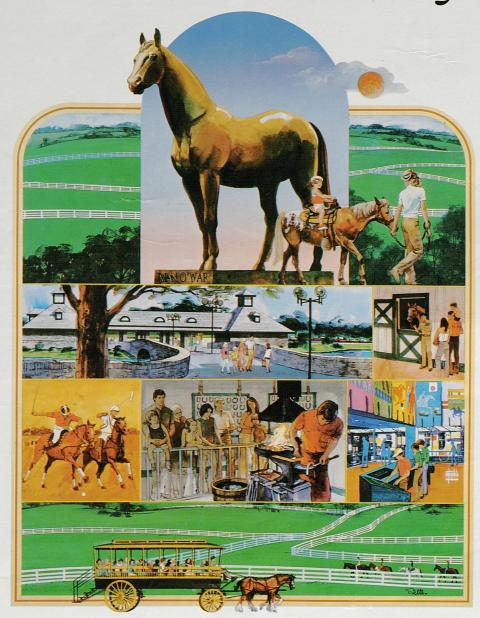
