# Reserves, UK military face bottom line

Here today, gone tomorrow.

The sentiment has more meaning to many at UK since President Bush called Kentucky National Guard and Reserve units to aid troops serving in Saudi Arabia.

"The bottom line is anyone that is in the reserves, officer, or enlisted, if the President calls up the reserves, then ... they will go, "said Leutenant Colonel Gerald Lemons. Like others in the Guard and reserves, Lemons could be called at any time, since he is an active duty officer.

"I serve at the pleasure of the President of he United States. That's in my oath of office," Lemons said. "I could leave tomorrow.

others at UK could be called to active duty.

The Albert B. Chandler Medical The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center probably will show the highest number of employees in the reserves or Guard, administra-tors predict. Twelve employees from the Medical Center are on alert, in-

cluding a doctor, four employees from the College of Dentistry, two reserve nurses and five Guard nurses. One College of Pharmacy employee aiready has been deployed to Germany.

Two of four current pilot nurses with the UK Aeromedical Service were also on the list, but Mary Colliver, spokeswoman for the Medical Center, said the service will not be affected if they are absent.

"Our nursing staff is cross trained in transport," she said.

If the nurses are called to duty there will just be a staff reorganization, Colliver said.

About 85 reservists yesterday were tallied at the Medical Center and its five colleges, but the list is still growing.

# Gulf crisis requires 47,000 to be called

WASHINGTON — The armed services will call about 46,700 reserves to active duty over the next five weeks to strengthen the military forces opposing Iraq, and most will be posted in or near Saudi Arabia, the Pentagon said yesterday.

The first calls to members of

the National Guard and armod forces reserves will be placed as early as today, and about 9,800 part-time soldiers will have been called to leave their civil-ian jobs by the end of August, said Pete Williams, the Penta-goo press secretary. Those most likely to get early calls include pilots to help ferry men and supplies to the Persian

# Stage set for battle as Iraq threatens

The stage was set for a show-down in occupied Kuwait over Iraq's order that embassies close their doors by today, and Saddam Hussein drove home his readiness to play the hostage card as the Persian Gulf crisis entered its fourth week.

In scenes shown yesterday on Iraqi television, Saddam put foreign captives caught up in the crisis on display, ruffling the hair of 
one little boy and joking with the 
tense and uncomfortable-looking 
group.

tense and uncomfortable-looking group.

Although smiling and cordial, the Iraqi president strongly suggested the foreigners' fate depends on the outcome of the standoff. The State Department called the televised scenes "shameful theatrics" and British Foreign Secretary Douglas Hurd called the display "the most sickening thing I've seen for a long time."

About 21,000 Westerners, including an estimated 3,000 Americans, were trapped in Iraq and Kuwait by Iraq's Aug. 2 conquest of the emirate. Their situation looked even more perilous as Saddam even more perilous as Saddam

even more perilous as Saddam sought to cut their lifeline in Kuwait — foreign diplomatic mis-

wait — foreign diplomatic missions.

The United States, Japan, Switzerland, Austria and the 12 European Community nations were among those keeping embassies open, with reduced staffs. The Philippines, India and Lebanon said they would obey Saddam's order to close their embassies. Only about 60 countries have embassies in Knwait

Sophomore kicker Doug Pelfrey Sophomore kicker Doug Pelfrey led the kicking crew, as he seeming-ly breezed through his kicking duties with shost form 30 to 50 yards. Pelfry has had a strong fall and has secured the starting position. These offensive forces, along with a confident defense, finally over-powered the gritty scouts. And the climax was a sight to behold. Curry ended the scrimmage with a set of one-minute drills in which he created a game situation. After

the created a game situation. After the scouts failed to get a first down in the first imaginary situation, Cur-ry gave the ball back to the starters.

He had the ball put on the first team's 20 yard line, and told the offense they had one minute to march up field and score a field goal to win the imaginary game. From there it was all Maggard. He smoothly passed and executed his offense 50 yards forward to the thirty with roughly 20 seconds remaining. Curry intervened here and told the team to gain seven yards, as that would set up a comfortable 40 yard field goal for Pelfry's strong leg.

After a two quick incompletions, eight seconds remained. "One more." Curry said over his bullhorn. Maggard, on third down, then hit Phil Logan with a sharp pass to the left sideline. With three seconds on

the clock, Pelfry lifted the forty-yarder through the goalposts.

It is just those kinds of situations that Curry is concentrating on. He said he is working out the kinks, fine-tuning the group of players into a stable, forceful team.

"But we are far from a polished football team," Curry said after the scrimmage. "We are going to have to polish like crazy, plus work on the fundamentals between now and game time to be able to beat any-body.

# Notre Dame's Holtz defends allegations of steroid abuse

SOUTH BEND, Ind. - Notre Dame is playing aggressive defense against stinging allegations of drug abuse that tarnish the university's carefully cultivated image of clean

Coach Lou Holtz and athletic de-artment officials have attacked, einted, given up some ground, and

fought fiercely for other territory.

The hasty but well-coordinated response was triggered by a magazine article written by a former player who claimed steroid abuse was rampant among Irish football

players.
Former Irish center Steve Huffman, who left the program three years ago, writes in the Aug. 27 issue of Sports Illustrated that Holtz must have known of, and by impli-

cation tolerated, the abuse of steroids.
"I did not come here to defend
myself," Holtz said Wednesday as
he began reading a lengthy statement denying Huffman's allegations.
He then grimly defended himself,
presenting testimonials from former
players and assistants, even offering
to show a bank check he had refused for helping an anti-drug edu-

tacking Sports Illustrated for failing to offer Notre Dame's side of the story. And Holtz fought for territory he believed he owned as a opponent of performance-enhancing drugs. "I think I've done everything to car to deter the use of drugs, both street drugs as well as steroids," he said. Huffman claimed nearly half the players who lettered were using sterroids and that two unidentified assistant coaches suggested that he take the muscle-building drug to get stronger.

"I totally deny unequivocally everything that was written," Holtz said. "I detest the insinuation that two of our coaches suggested that athletes take steroids. I, along with the university and the country, would like to know who they are." Huffman did not name the coach-

Huffman did not name the coach-es or any of the players who alleged-

said.

He said the university's testing program was bolstered in 1987, and concentrated on starting players. The five positives came from 466 tests conducted since then, he said. Rosenthal said data gathered before 1987 no longer existed, but that the incidence of steroid abuse was no higher then. The testing program is administered by Notre Dame's medical center.

Under an order signed by Cheney, as many as 49,703 Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard reserves could be activated by Oct. 1, but Williams said the Marine Corps was not planning to use the 3,000 reserves it is allowed to call.

The number of active duty military personnel already in the Persian Gulf area to help defend Saudi Arabia against a possible attack by Iraq is reported to be approaching 100,000, although the Pentagon has declined to confirm specific numbers.

Since the early 1970s the U.S. military has been structured to put increased war-fighting responsibility on the reserve forces. The purpose is to save money and to ensure that any large-scale military operation abroad would involve civilian soldiers, thereby testing public commitment to the military cause.

Today's military is highly dependent on reserves during any large-scale operation. More than half of the Army's combat forces, two-thirds of its combat support and 100 percent of its water purification specialists are in the reserves.

The Naval Reserve maintains 93 percent of the Navy's cargo handing battations and 82 percent of the mine warfare ships. For the Arreys percent of the crews for continental U.S. strategic interceptor planes are in the reserves.

basically because of the commitment of the employees."

Bosomworth cited improvements in curriculum and the development of additional facilities within the last five years, due to private and public funding.

"We've added the critical care unit to the University, we've added a research building to the cancer building, (and) we're building a residence image facility, which when it is finished will be almost a \$10 million project all funded by private funds," Bosomworth said. "The College of Medicine has recently been funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for the major upgrade in its curriculum. So lots of good

things have been happening here in the last five year period, and we'd really like to recognize that."
The long and short-term goals of the Medical Center include improving their service to the public, putting the institution in the top 30 percent of university research medical centers in the country, and having the best medical students Kentucky can prepare, Bosomworth said.
"We also aspire to achieve some outstanding success, particularly in the areas of our emphasis in program development, such as cancer center, aging, Alzheimer's disease, stroke, cardiovascular disease, Bosomworth said. "We're developing a major center in drug and alcoho abuse, which we think we've got some unique talent here that can make major forward thrusts in that area."

# Jurors argued over uncontested points

WASHINGTON — Jurors deliberating 14 drug and perjury charges against Mayor Marion Barry were so divided on a possible verdict that they even argued over points not contested by either side, a published report says.

Examining evidence in the trial that resulted in Barry being convicted on one misdemeanor occaine possession count, acquitted on an-

other and in a mistrial on the other 12 counts, the jury divided into a strong pro-conviction camp and an equally strong pro-acquittal camp, The Washington Post reported in today's editions.

In the third day of deliberations, the jury argued over whether the substance Barry was videotaped smoking from a pipe was really crack cocaine, or whether it was baking soda or sugar, the newspaper quoted jurors as saying.

One bloc of five middle-aged and older black jurors voiced a deep distrust of the government's case, agreeing with Barry's claims that he was "set up" by white government officials out to get black politicians. The other bloc believed the evidence against Barry was so overwhelming it had no choice but to convict. convict.

convict.

During the debate over the white rocklike substance in an evidence bag that even Barry's lawyer, Kenneth Mundy, did not dispute was crack cocaine, one juror walked away in disgust, the Post said.

"How do you change someone's

mind when they look at an evidence bag there's crack in, and they say it's not crack?" said one juror.
Although Barry's defense, as well as the pro-acquittal block of jurors, believed the mayor was on trial because of his race, the pro-conviction bloc of jurors included four black women, all 40 or younger. The two whites voted predominantly for conviction, the Post said.

On the deadlocked counts, the closest the jurors came to conviction was 10 to 2, the newspaper said. The closest they came to acquittal was 9 to 3. The remaining undecided counts split 6 to 6 and 7 to 5.

The United States tried to ad some teeth to U.N. sanctions imposed to punish Iraq for the invasion. U.S. Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering said Thursday the five permanent members of the Security Council had tentatively agreed on wording of a measure allowing use of military force to enforce the sanctions.

wording of a measure allowing use of military force to enforce the sanctions.

More U.S. troops and equipment poured into the troubled region, bolstering the biggest American military effort since Vietnam. The newspaper of Iraq's ruling party spote ominously Thursday of "flooding the Arabian desert with the blood of American solidiers."

U.S. forces make up the bulk of a multinational army protecting oil-rich Saudi Arabia since Iraq's invasion of neighboring Kuwait. Oil was at the root of the controversy that led to the invasion: Iraq had accused Kuwait of cheating on its OPEC production levels, thus driving down world oil prices and depriving Iraq of vital oil revenue. It also claimed Kuwait stole oil from a field that includes land both sides claim.

The Pentagon said Thursday that Defense Secretary Dick Chency had approved plans to call as many as 49,700 military reservists to active duty. Some members of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard reserve forces could get the call as early as Friday, it said.

As world markets fluctuated on

The most dramatic was a broadcast showing English-speaking adults and children gathered in an office, where Saddam told them: "Your presence here and other other places is meant to prevent the scourge of war."

That was an apparent reference to Iraq's stated intention to use trapped foreigners as human shields for key Iraqi installations.

The nationalities of those shown on TV were not immediately known, but some spoke with British accents. About 3,000 Britons are in Iraq and Kuwait.

Also Thursday, Japan's foreign ministry said about 245 Japanese had been flown from Kuwait and put under virtual house arrest in Baghdad. The move came as Japan debates measures to help enforce the U.N. embargo.

In an indication the "human shield" policy was being carried out, Polish workers arriving home from Iraq told the newspaper Gazeta Wyborcza that last week, as they left the Iraqi chemical factory where they had been working, about three dozen Americans arrived under guard.

On the brewing confrontation over the foreign embassies in Kuwait, the White House said Thursday that some embassy personnel were being evacuated.

# Death penalty reincarnated for some federal crimes

WASHINGTON — Charles V. Harrelson may owe his life to the United States Supreme Court. Hired to kill U.S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr. in 1979, Harrelson was convicted of murdre but never had to face the death penalty. Seven years before he shot Wood, the Supreme Court overturned death penalty statutes throughout the United States because they didn't safeguard defendants.

ed States because are, guard defendants. While three dozen states have passed new laws enabling them to resume executions, there still is no death penalty for most civilian fed-

eral crimes.

"If the death penalty had been there, I would have sought it," said Assistant U.S. Attorney Ray Jahn, who prosecuted Harrelson in San Antonio, Texas. "Clearly he would have been entitled to death penalty treatment had there been a federal death penalty."

This year, the full Senate and the House Judiciary Committee have House Judiciary Committee have passed bills that would reinstate the death penalty for some federal crimes, something President Bush

sought last year.

The Senate version covers 34 crimes —including killing any federal employee from the president to an egg inspector, or committing murder to aid racketeering.

The House committee's version is more limited.

If that version is approved by the full House, differences with the Senate bill would be resolved in conference committee.

Just two years ago, the death pen-

Just two years ago, the death penalty was reinstated for very specific drug-related murders, but no one has been executed.

Even if the federal death penalty is reinstated more broadly, it's not clear how often it would be used.

The last federal execution was March 15, 1963, nine years before the Supreme Court decision, when March 16, 1963, nine years before the Supreme Court decision, when lower than the supreme for the

states: Texas alone has executed 37 people since it resumed capital punishment in 1982.

That's because most people who are executed are convicted killers and most murder cases are prosecuted under state laws.

There are exceptions, of course. States cannot prosecute crimes that occur on federal property — an inmate who kills a guard at a federal prison, for example.

On Oct. 22, 1983, two inmates killed two guards in separate incidents at the federal prison at Marion, III., which houses the most violent federal most as the federal prison of Prisons spokesman Greg Bogdan.

The Senate bill also would increase the maximum penalty from life imprisonment to death for six crimes when death occurs: murder for hire, hostage taking, murder in aid of racketeering, kidnapping, murder of a foreign official and genocide.

Additionally, it would create five new death penalty offenses: murder by a federal inmate serving a life sentence; drug kingpins in a continuing criminal enterprise even if no murders occur; drug kingpins who try to kill to obstruct justice; drug felons who uninentionally kill with aggravated recklessness; and people who kill with a firearm during a violent or drug-trafficking crime.

The House committee version is more restrictive.

The House committee version is more restrictive.

For example, it would not allow capital punishment for such offenses as mail bombing, bank robbery, murder in aid of racketeering, murder by a federal inmate serving a life term or murder of a federal official's relative.

The House panel also dropped from the list the killing of horse, meat, poultry and egg products in-

meat, poutry and egg products in-spectors.

Some of the estimated 10,000
federal agriculture inspectors do face danger, said Tony Imhof, USDA's assistant general counsel for legislation.

#### UK will offer refunds of fee



# Watchdog panel looking for obscene artists

WASHINGTON — The National Endowment for the Arts is creating a special watchdog panel to investi-gate complaints from "any reliable

gate complaints from "any reliable source" that grant recipients are violating the law by using federal funds to produce obscene art. Plans for the panel were disclosed in a letter from NEA general counsel Julianne Ross Davis to the lawyer for the American Poetry Review, a Philadelphia-based literary magazine that subsequently rejected a \$10,000 endowment grant over the obscenity issue.

obscenity issue.

The three editors of the 24,000arre editors of the 24,000-circulation publication said they found the NEA's obscenity guide-lines "restraining and damaging to the process of selecting material for the magazine, as well as to poets and writers."

the magazine, as well as to poets and writers."

Davis told the magazine in late July that the panel would include herself, a deputy NEA chairman and program specialists in theater, literature and other arts discriptines.

The panel will "make initial determinations with respect to allegations of obscenity" based on "a complaint from any reliable source," she said.

Davis was unavailable for comment Wednesday, but NEA spokes-woman Virginia Falck said the term 'reliable source' referred primarily to members of Congress, the major source of obscenity complaints.

She said it might also include individuals as well as such conservative NEA critics as the Rev. Pat Robertson and the American Family Association.

Since the obscenity ban was en-

Since the obscenity ban was en-acted last October, the endowment acted last October, the endowment has fielded dozen: of inquiries from members of Congress about possible violations, but none has resulted in withdrawal of grant awards, accord-ing to Falck. Davis said that if the panel deter-mines there is a "substantial basis" for the allegations, the grant recipi-

If the recipient persists in violating a congressional ban on use of federal funds for obscene art, the NEA says it will demand return of grant funds.

Falck said the committee, patterned after a similar panel in the Federal Communications Commission, would be established soon, she stressed that its primary function would be to investigate complaints and not to engage in an anti-obscenity which hunt.

"This is not an attempt to roust out all obscenity," she said. "It's not Big Brother coming in."

In a related development, NEA chairman John E. Frohnmayer served notice that he will continue to require grant recipients to sign a controversial anti-obscenity pledge until a New York federal judgerules on a lawsuit charging that the pledge violates the Constitution's free speech guarantees.

Frohmmayer instituted the pledge last fall after Congress voted to prohibit federal support for works that "may be considered obscene, including but not limited to depictions of sadomasochism, homoeroticism, the sexual exploitation of children or individuals engaged in sex acts and which, when taken as a whole, do not have serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value."

The obsentity ban was tacked onto the NEA's current \$171 million appropriation after Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., and other conservative lawmakers complained that some images.

At a tumultuous meeting in early August, the National Council on the Arts, the presidentially appointed advisory body to the endowment, urged Frohnmayer to eliminate the pledge, which has prompted widespread protests in the arts community.

As I read the accounts of what is happening in the Persian Gulf, I sense a widening war coming that may change the face of our everyday lives in ways we cannot imagine now.

Iraq has moved an unknown num-

ber of Western hostages to military installations and other potential targets for use as human shields against attack by U.S. forces, Hussein calls upon Arabs "to purge out the infidels," making himself a hero to the poor in the Arab world. President Bush speaks to the Veterans of Foreign Wars annual convention, calling on U.S. residents to prepare to make "personal sacrifice" in our coming battle against an Arab leader who holds our citizens and key Mideast toil fields hostage. Both sides have painted themselves as martyrs, whipping up support for war. What they're not saying is that this war is the price of greed. Oil is the commodity we would fight over, and suffering is our battle cry.

In our own lives, we often play the martyr, even if it's only in our thoughts. We see ourselves without power in many situations, dwelling on how

vents when life seems most unfair. We know when we're in pain.

There's nothing wrong with feeling that pain, and asking for help to work through it. But the goal is not to get stuck. The goal is to move through our pain, and to share those solutions with others.

If someone tries to prove to us how much they hurt, or say that we're to blame for that hurt, we can


we're to blame for that hurt, we can say, "it sounds like you're huting," Maybe all that person really wants is validation of his or her pain.

If we find ourselves whining about our own pain, we may need us, "Am I learning what I need from this situation to find happiness?" 


