Forty U.S. and British warplanes and an armada of warships and submarines struck Afghanistan Sunday with cruise missiles and 500-pound gravity bombs

WASHINGTON — American and British forces unleashed punishing air strikes Sunday against military targets and Osama bin Laden's training camps inside Afghanistan, aiming at terrorists blamed for the Sept. 11 attacks. "We will not waver, we will not tire," said President Bush, speaking from the White House as Tomahawk cruise missiles and bombs found targets haifway around the globe. "We will not failer, and we will not fail."

The opening of a sustained campaign dubbed "Enduring Freedom," the assault was accompanied by airdrops of

thousands of vitamin-enriched food rations for needy civillans — and by a ground-based attack by Afghan opposition forces against the ruling Tailban.

Within hours of the attacks, Bush drew public support from foreign leaders around the world.

The initial strike involved 50 Tomahawk cruise missiles, launched from American and British ships. Gen. Richard Myers said 15 bombers and 25 strike aircraft, both sea- and land-based, also were involved. The assault came at 12:30 p.m. EDT — nighttime in Afghanistan.

Myers, sworn into office as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff less than a week ago, said the attacks included B-

After being informed the Kernel planned to file a lawsuit against UK in Fayette County Circuit Court last week, university officials decided to release information they previously denied to the Kernel



America's new war: Some students support U.S. retaliation, while others are wary

In the wake of the U.S. military strikes on Afghanistan Sunday, many students across campus had plenty to say about their feelings concerning U.S. retaliation.

"It was right. You have to let them know that they can't come over here and do that." said Creth Boyd, an undeclared sophomore, expressing his agreement with the attacks against Afghanistan and its Taliban government.

The demonstration of Western firepower was the first wave of an anti-terrorism cam-paign promised after the Sept. 11 suicide hijackings in the

Some students supported the U.S. attacks but were also wary about the possibility of having to go to war in the future or of knowing someone who might have to go.
"I just don't want to get drafted," said Sanchez Jones, a biology freshman. "And I don't want innocent people to die, either."

Laurie Lyons, a communication freshman, said she was worried about her friends and

family who might someday be drafted. Despite her concern, she expressed support for the U.S. strikes.

"I think we should retallate, but I don't really want us to go to war. I know a lot of people who could go, and I don't want them to die," Lyons said.

One student simply hopes the attacks will not return to the United States, hoping the conflict will stay in Afghanistan.

"I think it's good as long as we don't go to war here in the United States because that wouldn't be good at all," said Shaun Cowherd, a computer sciency of the sucks."

Vamsee Nalamothu, a computer science graduate student, summed up her feelings in a few words. "We stand united."

Afghan Council calls for holy war

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Some of Pakistan's most influential cherics swiftly denounced U.S. strikes on Afghanistan's capital Sunday, calling them an attack against Islam and grounds for holy war. One organization summoned Muslims to "extend full support to their Afghan brothers."

Pakistan's government, which has thrown its support to the U.S. led coalition against terrorism, said it regretted that diplomatic efforts old not succeed and called for the U.S. action to remain "clearly targeted."

There were scattered anti-American protests in major clies, but no violence was reported.

The influential Afghan Defense Council, based in the eastern Pakistani city of Lahore, issued a call for holy war.

"It is the duty of every Muslim to support their brothers in this critical hour," council leader Riaz Durana said. "We will support the Taliban physically and morally against the aggression of America."

Munawar Hassan, deputy chief of Jamaat-elslami, Pakistan's most powerful religious political party, called the strikes the United States has no quaresident Baish has emplasted that the United States has no quaresident Baish has emplasted that the United States has no quaresident Baish now the terrorists and those who harbor them.

Condemnation also came from the militant group Harakat ul-Mujahedeen, one of several organizations whose assets were frozen by the United States, Pakistan and other countries as part of a campaign against movements linked to Osama bin Laden, the suspected mastermind of the Sept. 11 suicide hijackings.

An attack's consequences

Impact: UK experts say U.S. military strikes will have little effect on al-Qaeda operations

The United States' simultaneous attack on Afghanistan and humanitarian mission Sunday has led many people to consider the consequences of the

day has led many people to con-sider the consequences of the action.

UK experts on terrorism and diplomacy say the attack will have little immediate effect on terrorism and the al-Qaeda network and could complicate diplomatic relations. They also question the effectiveness of the drop of food and first aid.

"This is the first step in a fairly long campaign," said Michael Desch, assistant direc-tor of the Patterson School of Diplomacy. While the strikes did target known al-Qaeda camps, Desch said it is unlikely the attacks will have much im-pact.

"I doubt many people were in those facilities," he said. "They understood it would come."

Thomas Preston, a part-time UK instructor and CEO of the Versailles anti-terrorism firm Preston Global, said the U.S. strikes will not affect al-Qaeda operations.

Stuart Kaufman, an associate professor of political science, called the bombing of the training camps "a pretty meaningless thing to do."

"There's not much to blow

"There's not much to blow up," he said. "Today's air strikes were meant to pave the way for more air strikes," said Kaufman.

The strikes against Afghanistan also complicate U.S. diplomatic relations in the Middle East and elsewhere, Kaufman said.

While few negative responses have occurred thus far, opposition may increase as time goes on, he said. "The longer these strikes go on, the more pressure will mount to stop them."

Desch and Kaufman said an area to closely watch is Pakistan.

"There is a substantial number of pro-Taliban supporters in Pakistan," he said. "Though I believe General Pervez Musharraf (Pakistan's president) has a pretty firm handle on the country right now, we

"There is a limit to what
you can do with air drops. It
must be a long ground effort because the refugee population is
so huge," he said.
Instead, Desch said the

drops may prove more effective as a public relations effort—the United States is "worried that the strikes will seem like an attack on Muslims in Afghanistan."

The drops will "demonstrate that the American goal is not against the Afghan people, but against the Taliban and terrorism," Kaufman said.

"Two airplanes can only have a very limited effect," he said. "It is better to do it than not, but it probably will not do much good."

"It's deplorable anywhere — especially on an university campus," Nietzel said. "We will not tolerate these attacks."

Nietzel said if the perpetrators are determined to be UK students, criminal prosecution would be sought first, and university policies would be put into effect later.

Security has been tightened near the Young Library area.

"UK Police have stepped up its patrol in the area and asked metro police to assist," said Travis Manley of UK Police. Manley said when the campus escort service, Cat Walk, is unavailable, UK Police will escort

people within a one- to two-mile radius of campus.

Last week Loay Elbasyouni, a Palestinian student, was assaulted near the Young Library. The scuffle ceased when Elbasyouni told the attackers he wasn't an Arab. Sachin Nagane, an Indian graduate student, was attacked the same day.

Nagane was walking by the Young Library when a truck stopped. The passenger punched Nagane in the face. He suffered no major injuries.

THE USUAL SUSPECT

Since the Sept. 11 suicide hijackings in New York City and Washington, D.C., the question has been asked repeatedly: Why? Why would people commit such devastating acts against the United States?

The answer may lie in the words of Saudi exile Osama bin Laden, who U.S. officials believe is the man most likely responsible for the Sept. 11 hijackings. Few beside bin Laden have articulated the reasoning behind terrorist attacks against U.S. targets. On Aug. 23, 1996, bin Laden issued a declaration of jihad, or holy war, against U.S. troops in the Middle East. The declaration was expanded in a Feb. 1998 edict to kill Americans, including civilians, "in any country in which it is possible to do it."

We believe that the worst thieves in the world today and the worst terrorists are the Americans. Nothing could stop you except perhaps retaliation in kind.'

The specifics of al-Qaeda's operations remain enigmatic and elusive to U.S. officials, who believe the network has "cells" operating in dozens of countries with considerable assistance from other like-minded terrorist organizations. Much of what is know about al-Qaeda comes from court testimony of suspected terrorists connected to the group. The most notable testimony is from former al-Qaeda high-level operative Jamal Ahmedal-Fadl, who testified in the recent trial involving the U.S. embassy bombings in Kenya and Tanzania.

When approached to join, new members make a bayat, a pledge of allegiance, to al-Qaeda and Osama bin Laden. According to al-Fadl, this means. "You agree about agenda, jihad. You obey orders, whatever they ask you to do. You have to be ready all the time ... They ask you tog on anywhere in the world for a specific mission or target, (you) have to."

a) have to." After swearing to a bayat, new members get a nickname and an ignment, which al-Fadl says can range from administrative work urther military training and preparation.

Assistance and training

Al-Qaeda members may receive a salary anywhere from \$200 to \$1,500 a month depending on their status within al-Qaeda as well as their citizenship is tatus, al-Fadl said. He testified bin Laden pald more to members with citizenships in Western countries as an incentive because of their higher earning potential at a "regular" job. Al-Qaeda members were also supplemented with supplies of tea, sugar, oil, cooking oil, free medical care and travel expenses, al-Fadl said. Members also received bonuses for completing missions successfully. Al-Fadl said he received a \$10,000 "good job bonus" from al-Qaeda after organizing a purchase of uranium from Sudanese mill-tants. In Somalia, al-Qaeda members involved with the ambush on U.S. servicemen were given bonuses large enough to buy property upon returning to Sudan.

Cash flow

Bin Laden is believed to have inherited up to \$300 million from his family's construction business in Saudi Arabia. U.S. authorities say this initial sum helped the former finance student to start several legitimate businesses that support al-Qaeda is activities. When the Qaeda headquarters were in Sudan, bin Ladea dis activities. A recent report by the Center for Policy Studies in Russia said bin Laden also owns a company in Sudan, which produces 80 percent of the world's supply of gum arabic, a material used in products ranging from cough syrup and pharmaceuticals to soups and candy.

The report said in addition to his numerous legitimate businesses, bin Laden is believed to be siphoning money from Islamic charities such as the Muslim World League, International Islamic Relief Organization and the Qatar Relief Fund. Other intelligence reports show bin Laden may additionally be receiving money from the sale

organization and the Qatar Relief Fund. Other intelligence repshow bin Laden may additionally be receiving money from the and distribution of illicit drugs — as much as \$1 billion a year.

Al-Qaeda shuns communicating via cellular or standard phones, preferring to use encrypted messages through Internet chat rooms, letters, radio, satellite phones and personal meetings, al-Fadl said in his testimony.

The report says further evidence exists that bin Laden launched a campaign in 1988 to obtain "suitcase bombs," also known as small tactical nuclear weapons, through organized crime connections in Chechnya, Russia.

al Jihad, Eyypt – Made a reciprocal agreement with al-Qaeda to help with its agenda and vice-versa. Members also help train prospects at al-Qaeda's Afghani camps. Reportedly al-Qaeda members have recently complained about the number of Egyptian members as well as how powerful they have become in the group.

al-Gama'at al-Islamiya, Egypt – Formerly a rival, this group made a reciprocal agreement to help al-Qaeda in 1992. Al-Gama'at's leader, Shelk Omar Abdel Rahman, was convicted in 1995 of conspiracy to assassinate Egyptian President Hosni Mubarek in addition to the bombing of the United Nations headquarters and other New York Iandmarks. Many of its al-Qaeda-affiliated members were enraged when al-Qaeda did not retaliate after Rahman's imprisonment.

Hizbollah, Iran – Headed by security chief Imad Mughniyah, Hizbollah is suspected of supplying explosives and masterminding the 1996 attack on an apartment complex in Saudi Arabia. Hizbollah is suspected of giving expertise on explosives in the 1998 U.S. embassy bombings in Kenya and Tanzania and the 2000 USS Cole bombing in Yemen.





United States needs to stay focused, patient

Immediately after the Sept. 11 suicide hijackings our country was thrown into a fervor. There were cries for retaliation and pleas for revenge. Some public opinion polls reported that as much as 80 to 90 percent of Americans supported direct attacks on Afghanistan. Others begged for patience and understanding. After all, many people made the same cries against terrorism after the Oklahoma City bombing, only to find it was a crime perpetrated at the hands of the former American soldier. Tim McVeigh. A hasty and possibly misdirected retaliatory attack would be no more intrified then the misdirected retaliatory attack would be no more justified than the actual attacks.

On Sunday, nearly four weeks after the planes crashed, the United States retaliated by bombing Afghanistan.

This came after repeated ultimatums from President Bush to Taliban officials. His intentions were clear: Either give up Osama bin Laden and shut down the terrorist training camps, or face certain military action from the United States and its allies. Certainly, Bush wasn't shy about his demands and objectives.

Then, after these ultimatums, the American people (and, indeed, the world) waited for the inevitable. The Taliban asked bin Laden to leave, but did not give him to U.S. authorities. The training camps remained open. And Sunday, U.S. forces responded with military action.

U.S. officials moved cautiously, and for this they should be commended. They didn't cave in to the cries for Afghan blood. Instead they were methodical about making sure of bin Laden's involvement and the safe-haven the Taliban was providing. Sunday's strikes were calculated and aimed at Afghanistan's military, rather then its innocent civilians.
