





#### Hopkins files nerve-gas inquiry

FRANKFORT - Rep. Larry Hopkins told Gov. Martha Layne Collins yesterday there is no need for her to seek a congressional inquiry into the disposition of obsolete nervegas rockets in Kentucky because he has already done so.

NEW YORK - Bernhard Goetz, who shot four teen-agers on a subway train last December, pleaded innocent Wednesday to illegal weapons possession charges before a judge who lowered his \$50,000 bail to \$500.000.

Goetz, 37, a self-employed electronics calibrator, is charged with one count of felony weapons possession for the gun he used to shoot the four youths, and two counts of misdemeanor weapons possession because of two handguns police allegedly found in his apartment.


### Chernenko appears in public


