### Lohman, Foster trounce SGA field

### **Sophomores** sweep with 2-1 margin

When members of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity chanted a fraternity song, the more than 100 people who crowded into the Free Speech Area of the Student Center last night knew that Sean Lohman had captured the SGA presidency. And with the victory, Lohman along with runningmate Paige Foster became the first ticket in three years, and youngest in more than two decades, to capture the Student Government Association executive branch.

President-elect Lohman and Vice President-elect Tosler, both 19-year-old sophomores, not only won, but did so resoundingly, garnering 368 and 1,126 votes, respectively.

"It feels great to be the youngest

"It feels great to be the youngest president ever. I don't think age was ever a factor. If anything, it was to our benefit," Lohman said. "I felt we ran a really, really strong campaign. Our workers were out there working very hard, and we did everything we could to win.

"I came here knowing we did the best we could. I had a good feeling. Our sup-port was all over campus, I think that's what won it for us," he said.

"We had support from the residence halls, the greek community, we had people in wheelchairs out there cam-paigning for us. Our campaign was for the whole campus and our administra-

### Down, but not forgotten, youthful candidates battled back

Following Sean Lohman's and Ashley Boyd's unsuccessful bid for freshman senators in the fail of 1987, Chiman told his running mate that they would return to the Student Government Association—and in big ways.

"He told me the next time, the head-lines would read "Lohman-Boyd kick as," "Ashley said last night outside the Student Center, following her first-place finish in the senator-at-large race. "It took some time, but I guess it eventually came true."

And that it did. Last night in the Free Speech Area of the Student Center, Lohnan's prophecy was realized as he and his former running mate both enjoyed resounding victories.

After Lohman's and Boyd's defeat in the fall 1987 freshman senate race, the two became actively involved in Cyndi Weaver's administration. As Weaver remarked when Lohman announced his candidacy, many people in student government last year thought Lohman was a member of the Senate because he was so outspoken on issues. Boyd remained heavily involved in the executive branch.

### ANALYSIS

As Boyd said last night, "Hell I worked in (the executive branch) for two years. We deserved this."

Last spring, Lohman was one of the top five vote-getters in the senator-at-large race. Also finishing in the top five in that election was Paige Foster, a freshman.

By November, Lohman and Foster decided that they were going to run for the executive branch, and it was that early organization that catapulted them to victory last night as president and vice president, respectively.

When the election really began to heat up earlier this semester, many—including some in the Lohman-Foster camp—thought that Pi Kappa Alpha President Jeff Ashley and SGA Arts & Sciences Senator Keith Byers were the front-runners.

Foster's commanding 700-vote win was somewhat of surprise. Although she received GPAC's endorsement, it came somewhat lukewarmly, and minutes before last night's announcement several of her closest supporters were concerned that Hart might squeak by into first place.

But Foster's popularity apparently was more than enough to give her a convincing triumph.

In addition to Boyd's election, her three running mates also were elected to the Senate — Mark Rucker, Allen Putman and Christa Collins. Their ticket campaigned vigorously, and they also were strong supporters of Lohman and Foster.

A moment later, the man put his lips to the reed, tilted the sax to the roof and let loose a wash of sounds that blew the zudience away. That was Sonny Rollins in 1973 — one very hip musician who knew how to blow his ax.

Theodore Walter (Sonny) Rollins paid his dues in an apprenticeship served under jazz giants such as Thelonius Monk, Charlie Parker, Max Roach and Miles Davis.

Having cut his teeth under a number of jazz greats, Sonny Rollins will bring his own saxophone stylings to Memorial Hall Sunday.

### Courier-Journal wins Pulitzer Prize

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The Cou-rier-Journal received the Pulitzer Prize for General even yeslerday for coverage of a flery bus crash involving an alleged drunken driv-er that claimed 27 lives last May. "I think our pride and jubilation has to be tempered somewhat by the subject matter we covered." Publisher George N. Gill told about 100 newsroom staffers who gath-ered around the newspaper's copy desk after the award was an-nounced. Gill, editor David Hawpe and

Gill, editor David Hawpe and managing editor Irene C. Nolan led the staff in a newsroom celebration with non-alcoholic drinks and snacks.

The Inquirer's David Zucchino won in feature writing for his se-ries "Being Black in South Africa." described as "richly compelling" by the judges. The Pullizer Board had switched his entry from the in-ternational reporting category to features.

kans. The series won the public service medal. The Philadelphia Inquirer and Chicago Tribune each won two prizes.

Donald L. Barlett and James B. Steele of the Inquirer won the national reporting prize for a 15-month investigation of provisions in the Tax Reform Act of 1986 that gave special tax breaks to many politically connected individuals and businesses. The Pulitzer Board said the series aroused so much public indignation that Congress rejected such breaks.
