

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE  
October 11, 1937

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, October 11. President McVey presided.

The minutes of the meetings of May 10, June 2, July 6 and August 18 were read and approved.

New members of the Senate were introduced by President McVey.

The Committee on Duplication of courses presented the following new courses, which were approved:

College of Agriculture

Farm Engineering 12 - Farm Structural Engineering. A combination drawing and shop course in the construction, care and repair of farm buildings and equipment, especially designed for students preparing to teach vocational agriculture. Lecture 1 hour, laboratory 4 hours a week. Three credits; first semester.

Farm Engineering 13 - General Farm Shop. A course in metal work and tools, including plumbing, soldering, hot and cold metal and the repair of farm machinery. Lecture 1 hour; laboratory 4 hours a week. Three credits; second semester.

(The above courses to replace Farm Engineering 8)

College of Education

Education 112 - Determining Teaching Content in Distributive Occupations. This course is planned to meet the needs of persons engaged as instructors in the field of distributive occupations. It will cover the analysis and course construction in the field of distributive occupations. 2 credits. (Drop Education 212-Library Science)

Education 267.- Directed Supervision in Home Economics Education. This course includes teaching home economics classes for observation, directing student teachers under the guidance of a supervising teacher, visiting schools with the itinerant teacher trainer in different sections of the state, and organizing teaching materials. 3 credits.

College of Arts and Sciences

History 175 - The Succession States. Three credits. A political, economic, social, and cultural study of the nationalities and post-war states formerly a part of the

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Austro-Hungarian Empire; Austria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Roumania and Poland; and of their international relations.

The following recommendations from the College of Agriculture were approved:

Home Economics 34 - Dietetics for Nurses changed from three to four credits.

In the Home Economics curriculum change the English requirement from English 3b to either English 3a or 3b.

Colonel Brewer made the following report for the committee appointed by President McVey to outline the duties of faculty advisers to student organizations:

"Last spring a committee composed of Dean Jones, Dr. Downing and myself drafted certain recommendations covering the handling of funds by student organizations. Our recommendations were approved by the Senate but it seems that they were not sufficiently clear to justify the Registrar in taking the necessary steps to place them in effect. I am offering therefore a clarifying amendment reading as follows:

That all funds, collected by student organizations be turned in to the Business Agent of the University as soon as possible after they are collected and that these funds be disbursed on order from the officers of the organizations with the approval of the Faculty Adviser.

That the Dean of Women and the Dean of Men specify the organizations to which this will apply."

Professors J. Holmes Martin and L. S. O'Bannon were elected faculty members of the University Council.

Professor Neil Plummer, reporting for the committee on the State of the University, indicated that the committee would have ready for the November meeting of the Senate a summary of the broader problems to be proposed by this group.

President McVey called attention to the next convocation, the date to be announced later. The speaker at this convocation will be Senator Logan. The President also announced the Women's Club reception to be held Tuesday evening, October 12, and the Educational Conference, scheduled for October 29-30.
