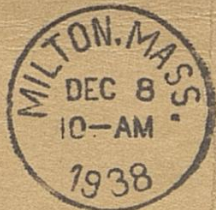

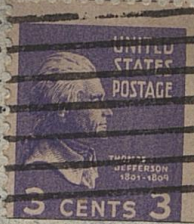

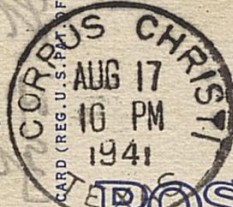

There seemed to be no telephones  
around and the police were not  
available so ~~to ask~~ the man  
who was less badly hurt said  
he would come in with us. It  
seemed very necessary to get one  
of the women to a doctor  pronto!  
At any rate, we took the ~~of~~ baggage  
out of the back and spread out  
the sleeping bags for the two women  
and the man sat back there with  
them. Another <sup>very nice</sup> Mexican followed  
us in with our suitcases. I don't  
believe this man realized how  
seriously his wife was hurt, but  
he was frantic anyhow and wanted  
to get her to his own doctor. After  
about 10-15 min. everything was set

Dear Mother + Daddy,

I cannot tell you how sorry  
I am at all the anxiety I put  
you to, and I really could bite  
myself when I think how easily  
it could have been avoided.  
When I left home I thought we  
had agreed on wiring every 3-4  
days. At any rate, we arrived at  
El Nante Sat. night just 30 min.  
too late to wire. Then last night  
(Sunday) we were about 40 kilometers  
(25 mi.) from Mexico City at 7:30 when  
we passed an accident on the  
road. A Mexican, his wife and  
daughter had run into the back  
of a truck (which had no lights).

and we started in towards the city. I knew  
there was an inspection stop at the boundary  
& told the man so but he begged ~~me~~<sup>us</sup> to drive  
on through & disregard the police. Of course  
we couldn't do this. After a long drive over  
many detours, with Char. ~~climbing~~<sup>at the wheel</sup> & Buddy  
holding the woman's hand we arrived at  
the police post where there was an ambulance  
waiting. (Someone had gotten to a phone &  
told them we were coming in.) It was then  
that the really horrible part of the business  
began. The man would not let them put  
his  $\frac{1}{2}$  wife in the ambulance but wanted  
to go directly to ~~the~~<sup>our</sup> his doctor. So there  
we ~~still~~ stood for at least 15 mins.  
while the police, various and sundry  
Mexicans, the ambulance men and this  
man argued! He was covered with blood  
and his wife was in the back of the ~~car~~ station  
wagon praying for dear life and bleeding  
something fierce. At last the policeman got  
on the running board & we drove to  
the District Police Station ~~and~~, the  
ambulance following us all the time,  
where another 15 min. argument followed.  
(It was obvious by this time that the  
woman should be taken to any hospital

We carried the badly hurt one  
into ~~an~~ <sup>treatment - operating</sup> room  
where the police doctor gave  
her an injection. Then the  
other doctor arrived and as  
~~the~~ while about a dozen  
crowded into around this  
woman they argued some more  
about what to do. (I'm not  
sure exactly what was wrong  
but she was very badly hurt and  
had a fractured skull.) At  
length they got hold of the police  
ambulance again - the same  
one that had met us at the  
city limits at least two hours  
before and took her to the hospital.

but the man would not let  
her go. At the Police <sup>Station</sup> we picked  
up a <sup>public</sup> doctor - who sat up front  
with me - and another policeman  
and started for the <sup>private</sup> doctor. You  
might have guessed it - he would  
be!! As we went to another. He  
wouldn't in either but they said  
they could get him immediately.  
~~As~~ At any rate, we carried  
both women up stairs to the east  
of private infirmary - (it was  
built around a court. The outside  
was dirty & unkempt enough  
to be a glue factory, but as with  
most of these Spanish houses the  
inside around the patio was very  
~~clean~~ attractive & clean as a pin.)

That is Mexico for you - argue, argue,  
argue. We have not been able to  
find out what hospital she is at but  
I would say the chances of ~~not~~ pulling  
through were only about 50 - 50. No wonder  
after what she went through. At any  
rate ~~I~~ finally had time to call  
the City where they said on telegram  
of Wednesday had come too late and so  
we pulled into this place at about  
midnight. I immediately thought of  
writing you all but when I saw the  
time I did not want to ~~wake~~ <sup>alarm</sup> you  
by waking you at 1 AM and didn't  
think that you would be worried as I  
had worried Hel. evening and Char.  
only 3 days previously on Thurs. (Needless  
to say we were all sick as it was quite a  
bloody affair and so we turned in and  
I thought I would write this morning.)  
When I went to the City for my mail ~~this~~  
<sup>a bit</sup> ~~morning~~ - that was <sup>a bit</sup> after I had talked  
to you - I got a note saying you had  
called & left word that you had  
not heard since Monday so I thought  
possibly our wires of Thurs. & Hel. had



is frightfully expensive (4.00 min.)  
and there is no collect service  
and if you could possibly manage  
it would be better to revert to  
the 3-4 day system. Again I  
apologize for any anxiety of mind  
I might have caused you and  
can assure you that it was  
purely unintentional on my part.

As matters stand now we  
expect to leave here Friday for  
Acapulco where we will be Friday  
night, Sat. + Sat night at El  
Mirador Hotel. (If you want to get  
me then I suggest wiring as we  
will always get a wire within a  
few hours, whereas telephoning is

not gotten through. (Did they?)  
You see we called at every single  
place where we left word we would  
for telegrams + such and there  
was none and it was just  
impossible to send wires at the  
times we got into town. ~~to~~ Be  
that as it may you may always  
reach us within a day by wiring  
any of those addresses and you  
may rest assured that if anything  
went wrong at this end of the line  
we would call you immediately.  
However, Charles + I will wire you  
on alternate days after leaving  
Mexico City (i.e. once a day) until  
we reach the border again. But it

uncertain and there are two telephone systems in some of these cities.

After Acapulco you may follow the old schedule, but two days late \* and this should all put us home about the 17-18 Aug.

\* (i.e. steps up each date 2 days.)

In case daddy is worried about legal complications from last night's accident we made it very plain to the police — and they understood — that we were not in it we did see it. We also called at the Embassy today and were assured that there was nothing to worry about. Incidentally, we saw Ambassador Daniels + chatted with him for some 10 minutes.

The trip down has been perfectly elegant and I might add that you must see this country to believe it. It is far more foreign than any country in Europe and full of interest + contrast and color. In Monterrey we met up with some very attractive girls (and boys) and so stayed over a day which was well spent from a great number of points of view. We took the girls out

It is a real education  
to walk through these little  
Mexican towns, even though  
they be only a few hundred  
yds. off the highway, and of  
course the church is always  
twice as big as the town. It is  
sometimes really tragic to go  
into these churches and see all  
the gilt, and glitter, and gold,  
and terrible looking electric light  
bulbs, but the faith of some of these  
people is terrific.

I had intended telling  
you all about the trip in this  
letter but I wish to take a nap  
before dinner and so will write

~~The~~ Fri. night, but only until  
10:30!! Don't forget something!  
~~The~~ ~~The~~ They spoke excellent  
English as well as French and  
it was a most delightful and  
stimulating evening. Chas. girl  
was from the U.S. and not so  
sharp, but Buddy had a very  
hot number named Gene  
and mine was Caroline Guena.  
We hope to pay a return visit  
on the way home.

We have not slept out since  
crossing the border but did  
so <sup>in</sup> the U.S. despite <sup>whirling</sup> "squadras"  
of mosquitoes and stray dogs.

Please accept my apologies  
once again for my recent previous  
omissions, but above all don't worry  
because as I have said we get any  
wires you send almost immediately  
and in an emergency we can get you  
right away <sup>by phone</sup> even if the telegraph office  
is closed. Also if by any hook or crook  
Chas. + I should miss a daily wire  
don't worry — please! Love to all.

Dear Mother and Daddy,

Only two more weeks and  
I'll be home and see again  
I'm getting to that stage where  
I can hardly wait!! Well, it  
won't be long now.

This past week I have  
been experiencing a moderate case  
of diarrhoea, grippe, headache  
etc. which had possessed me.  
In fact a gripe of some sort  
seems to be going the rounds, I've been  
lying pretty low. Right now I am

home for a week and looked rather lonesome.

I guess I told you that I am acting commander of "I" Battery, i. e. for a few weeks while the regular cadet officers learn the 105's, which they in turn will teach to us. These 105's are really beautiful guns and give me some hope for the success of us and our Allies in this new war. They have an ~~800~~ 800 m horizontal traverse ( $\frac{1}{8}$  of a circle) and elevate to about  $60^\circ$  and have a ~~full~~<sup>fold</sup>-proof breech. I didn't get to drill my battery <sup>last</sup> Thursday as I had the quins but I ~~was~~ am sure

I'll be out there on the firing line next Thurs. Speaking of the firing line it don't look like everything in North Africa is going as sweetly<sup>and sensibly</sup> as we had hoped. If it's true that the Germans have only 20-30,000 troops in Tunisia they must have on L of a god general - Rommel no doubt - and be good troops to boot! Moreover, Gen. Montgomery shows no signs of further activity in eastern Libya. I don't think he ~~is~~ has been stopped - just a little breathless - but then again I have a hunch the Germans pulled a good part of their best troops out of his "trap" and although the threat to Alexandria is removed it still

victories. True we are in a position where it is possible to deliver some hard blows at the enemy but when you take a look at what he has accomplished the job we have to do is appalling. In Russia for instance people are going batty over the great trap closing on Stalingrad. will and divert great ~~Italian~~ number of divisions to other fronts without ~~losing~~ losing any of their strong points.

North Africa which has always been ~~in~~ in the nature of a side show for Hitler — I've never seen Rommel credited with more than 4 Bermer divs. — we are attempting to turn into a main ~~area~~ arena, and yet by doing so we offer the Axis the opportunity to take the whole ~~thing~~ <sup>business too</sup>, a thing they have hitherto hesitated to do; and if old Adolph does decide to really make a fight here he's a ~~lot~~ lot of a lot closer to it than we are; and if what he's been able to do so far is any indication we have a real fight looming.

Then there's all this loose talk about Italy "cracking". I don't <sup>know</sup> much about that; they may be stories planted by Axis propogand; but the ~~by~~ speech Mussolini made to the Italians last week was certainly not one of a man on his last legs. He not only announced what appears to be a complete casualty list, admitting 260,000 Italians held prisoner by England ~~as~~ against only 60,000 English held by the Italians, but told them

Dear Mother and Daddy,

Tonight I am Officer of the Guard down here at the stable which means that I'm on duty from 6:P.M. to 6:A.M. and must inspect the guard at hourly intervals.

It is now 11:30 and I should say most of the enlisted men have been in bed for about three hours — what a life! I have been out on an RSOP (Reconnaissance, Selection and Organization of Position) today from noon till three, so with this guard business I am having a pretty busy day. Also last

night I didn't get to bed until  
three A.M. & I went to a  
birthday <sup>party</sup> for Adele Squitt out  
in Weston. At the RSOP today  
I was chief of section which was  
very luck as I had originally  
been put down for instrument  
corporal. However, one of the chiefs  
didn't show up so I took his  
place. I had a very good  
section except for one corporal who  
was acting as #1 and as soon  
as we got into position started  
"running" the section. However, I  
told him off right away and  
thereafter everything went very  
smoothly — very a mistake.  
I have also been pretty lucky  
in "K" Otry & when we went on on

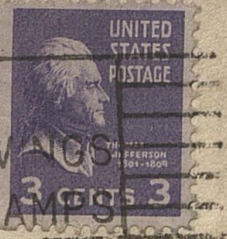
