UK starting NCAA compliance study

In compliance with a 1993 NCAA rule, UK has established a committee that will begin a comprehensive study of its athletic program, school officials amounced yesterday.

"It's similar to the process universities go through academically," said Joe Burch, vice president for University Relations and chairman of the committee.

dent for University Relations and chairman of the committee.

While academic accreditation is common at colleges and universities, the NCAA program is the first to focus on certification of athletics programs. The purpose is to ensure integrity in athletics operations, officials said.

"It's a self-study, it's not the athletics program looking at itself," he said. "It's the University taking a long hard look at the program."

The 18- to 24-month study will entail looking in four specific areas including academic and financial integrity, rules compliance and commitment to equity.



Kentucky has a history of producing great writers. The stories and essays of Robert Penn Warren, the poetry of Alan Tate and the Appalachian tale-spin-ning of Harry Caudill give readers a vision of Ken-tucky people and landscape that is full and rich in

But the Commonwealth is now in the midst of a literary renaissance, with Kentucky authors enjoying nationwide fame, drawing praise from critics and reaching bestseller lists.

The pen has been passed, to Bobbie Ann Mason, Ed McClanahan, Gurney Norman and Barbara Kingsolver, who form one of the greatest literary movements in Kentucky history.

WASHINGTON — Young men died from homicide and sui-cides last year at almost three times the rate of Americans in general, even as killings were declining nationwide, a federal health agency reported yesterday.

The homicide rate overall declined 8 percent last year, the third straight year it has fallen. Suicides increased.

Vice President All Gore, opening a three-day conference in Des Moines, Lowa, on preventing violence, called the reduction in homicides "encouraging news."

But the 23,730 slayings in 1994—down from 25,470 in 1993—"are still far too many," he said. Of those victims, 29 percent were young males. Gore noted that homicide remains the second leading killer for young Americans, ages 15 to 24, and the third for young children, ages 5 to 14.

The number of suicides, meanwhile, rose last year to 32,410, up from 31,230 in 1993. The rate was 12.4 per 100,000 people, more than double the overall rate and triple the rate for young males in the 1950s. The rate for females that age was 3.2 per 100,000 in 1994.

Several major cities, including New York, Detroit, Chicago and Los Angeles, have reported a sharp decline in their number of murders. New York has said its toll this year could be 48 percent below its worst year, 1990, when 2,245 people were killed there.

The national center didn't speculate on the cause of the falling homicide rate. Some police departments say that putting more officers on the streets in high-crime neighborhoods has paid off. But James Alan Fox, a North-eastern University criminal justice expert, argues it was due mostly to the aging of the baby boom generation, the youngest of whom are now in their 30s.

He cautioned that the numbers hide "a tremendous growth in the rate of killing among young adults and teen-agers. ... Right now, 4,000 teen-agers commit murders each year. Ten or 15 years ago, it was less than 1,000."





"Pretty much anyone has to assume that there is a potential for sexually transmitted infec-tions and HIV," Dorman said.
But Hall does not agree.
Ron Matross, a University admissions statistician, said about 74 of the nearly 37,000 University day-school students are infected with HIV.

A 24-year-old female Brown graduate student was hospitalized early Friday morning, after a man raped her, locked her in the bathroom and set fire to her apartment, Providence Police said.

The attacker had fled the scene when the Providence Fire Department arrived at the woman's apartment, located on Medway

Street near Wayland Square, around 5:15 a.m., said Lt. Jack Ryan of the Providence Police.

As firefighters battled through a fire engulfing the main room of the apartment, they heard the female resident crying for help. Moving a soft that was barricading the bathroom, firefighters found the woman, naked and suffering from smoke inhalation.

"This is a very isolated incident," Ryan said. "We've never

had something like this happen on the East Side before where an assailant has gone to such extremes, like lighting this woman's house on fire."

Ryan said the woman was treated and released from Rhode Island Hospital on Friday afternoon and is now assisting the police in their investigation.
