





SEEING SPORT STUFF

Kentucky's Wildcafs will ring down the curtain on their home foot-ball season out on Stoll field tomorrow afternoon when they engage the Tigers of Clemono once again after a two-year lapse in relations. And many of the experts have been giving Clemson an excellent chance of de-feating the Wildcats.

Which leads us to believe that football has become a funny game-maybe funny isn't the word for it—but when the Clemson game was orig-inally scheduled or even as late as the middle of September, there wasn't a fan in these parts who would have conceded the Tigers a 100 to 1 chance of taking Kentucky.

Now with the actual battle looming on the morrow the South Carolina club has been named an even choice to win. And that isn't just newspa-per talk as is so often declared, but the selection is based upon past per-formances of both entries.

Probably the best exhibition the Tigers have given all year was against Georgia Tech—the same Tech team that started the Wildeats downhill with a 3 to 0 showe. Clemenon gained a 13 to 12 decision over the Engineers in a sensational ball game at Atlanta a few weeks ago.

The Tigers have won five games while losing three thus far this season. In addition to Tech, Clemaon has won over Presbyterian, V. P. L. South Carolina and The Cittodie. The losses were suffered at the hands of Alabama, Duke and Wake Forest.

It means anything, Clemaon was beaten by Alabama at Tuscalcoas, 32 to 0 and lost to Duke 23 to 0. Wake Forest eked out a 6 to 0 victory.

The Glemson record, then, is just about as good as Kentucky's as the Widdests have also won five battles while dropping three. However, the Tigers have counted in their last three stars while Kentucky has lost two in a row. One team is seemingly on the upgrade while the other may be on the toboggam. With the teams appearing to be pretty evenly matched, a close game

With the teams appearing to be pretty evenly matched, a close game may be anticipated and the rival backfields should furnish the customers with a whole load of thrills. The Glemons are well fortified in the ball-toting department with Mac Fogler leading the offense. Fogler, according to Coach Porter Grant, who has scouted the Tigers in two games, is probably the hards-hitting line-plunger in the South.

The burley fullback scored both of Clemson's touchdowns against Georgia Tech mainly through virtue of his own line thrusts which took the ball straight down the filed.

Captain Joe Berry will be remembered by local fans as a fine ball carrier. He was only a sophomore when the teams met here two years ago, but he turned in an excellent performance against the Cats. Winston Lawson is another of the Tiger backs who will bear watching.
