
UK coach building a top team



Of book burning, religious tolerance, and world terrorism

The world has finally gone insane.

If people were to pick up newspapers the past few days and read only the stories about the recent death sentence placed on the author of a controversial book, they'd never believe we're living in the 20th century.

Salman Rushdie, an Indian-born English writer, is the author of *The Satanic Verses*, a novel that has been criticized by many Moslems as blasphemous to the Islam religion. Last week Rushdie and his family went into hiding after Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini ordered Moslems to seek and kill the author. Moslem clerics have offered bounties of \$5.2 million for Rushdie's death.

Many Moslems feel the book is blasphemous because of Many Moslems feel the book is blasphemous because of a character named Mahound, who is a representation of the Islam Prophet Mohammed. The novel portrays this fig-ure as having prostitutes for wives and suggests that Mo-hammed himself wrote the Koran, the holy book of Islam, instead of receiving it directly from God, as the Moslems believe

Rushdie offered an apology to followers of the Islam faith Saturday for any "distress" he may have caused. Although some members of the Iran government accepted the apology, the Ayatollah rejected it Sunday, saying it is "incumbent upon every Moslem to employ everything he has, his life and wealth, to send (Rushdie) to hell."

If this wasn't such a serious threat to life, freedom of speech and international relations, it would be absolutely ridiculous. It's scary to think any world leader would make such a blatantly terroristic threat. And it's even scarier to think of the response he will get from his followers.

It's understandable that some Moslems are upset by The Satanic Verses, since it challenges beliefs they take very seriously. But to put a bounty on the author's life and even threaten publishers and distributers of the novel goes beyond any justification.

Many U.S. bookstore chains have pulled the book from their shelves in fear of retaliation. While they do have a responsibility to protect their employees, it is unfortunate that they are bowing down to Khomeini's threats. If they had stood united against the Ayatollah's demands and supported Rushdie and the right to free speech, it may have sent a message that there is no tolerance for Khomeini's tactics in a civilized world. As it is, Khomeini's power has been strengthened by the response.

While many of those protest in themselves were unwarranted, at least no one threat ened the life of the movie's director or actors. It's wort the time to realize we should be grateful we live in a cour try where freedom of expression is allowed and supported.

It's also worth the time to stop and realize that there are many religious beliefs held throughout the world. Just because we don't necessarily understand the Islam faith doesn't mean we should dismiss or criticize the many Moslems who are sincerely offended by this book (although any terroristic refort of course warrants criticism). A Rushdie said in his apology, "This experience has served to remind us that we must all be conscious of the sensibilities of others."

Should Salman Rushdie have written The Satanic erses at all? That could be debated for hours. But some lel he is a brilliant author, and his book has been praised y many book critics. When writers' material is subject to tere acceptability among readers, then the world is in a ery sad shape indeed.

Europeans recall diplomats in protest of Rushdie threats

European Common Market governments decided yesterday to withdraw their top diplomats from Iran to protest Ayatoliah Ruhollah Khomeini's renewed order for Moslems to kill novelist Salman Rushlens in their sentire embassy staff.

Foreign Secretary Sir Geoffrey Howe said the death threats against Rushdie and the publishers of The Satanic Verses for allegedly blasphening Islam were "umwarranted interference" in Britain's internal affairs.

The 12 European Economic Community governments, in a sharp blow to Iran's hopes of improving relations with Western nations, decided to recall their diplomats for consulations and suspend high-level visits to and from Iran.

They said they also will restrict the movement of Iranian diplomats in their countries.

Howe told a news conference that the EEC foreign ministers, meeting in Brussels, had sent "a strong, concerted signal to the Iranian leadership that Khomeini's threats are an affront to international standards of behavior and will not be tolerated."

Iran's charge d'affaires in London, Mohammad Basti, will be summoned to hear "the reasons for this action along with the implications for Mr. Basti and his mis-

tions for Mr. Basts and his mission," Howe said.
Asked if that meant closing the Iranian Embassy, he replied: "I leave it for your own conclusions." Rushdie, 41, apologized Saturday for any distress the publication of his book caused to Moslems, after Iranian President Ali Khamanei indicated that could lead to a pardon.
On Sunday, however, Iran's official Islaime Republic News Agency quoted Khomeini as ruling out any reprieve for Rushdie and urging Moslems to "send him to hell" for his writings.

nor IRNA referred to Khamanei's comments, reflecting a widening rift in the Iranian hierarchy over the Rushdie affair. "There plainly is confusion amongst the Iran authorities," Howe said. He added, however: "If the

Iran's deputy parliament speaker, Meholi Karrubi, reaffirmed Moholi Karrubi, reaffirmed to the serious order Mondon Robbides in Indian-born Moslem, has been in hiding, reportedly under armed police guard, since Khonneini decreed Feb. 14 that he should be killed, and two Iranian religious leaders put a \$5.2 million bounty on his head.

Moslems say The Satanic Verses

Moslems say The Satanic Verses portrays the prophet Mohammed's wives as prostitutes and suggests that he wrote, rather than Allah, the Koran, Islam's holy book.

The novel is banned in Pakistan,

Bangladesh, Iran, India, Egypt and South Africa. Publishers in France, West Germany, Greece and Turkey have canceled plans to publish it.

An anonymous caller claiming to represent the Guardians of the Islamic Revolution telephoned news agencies in London and threatened to kill Howe and Home Secretary Douglas Hurd, and bomb British airlines, pubs, discos and government offices. The caller also threatened a British TJ anchorman for exchanging sharp words with Basti on the air.

The Guardians of the Islamic Republic also have claimed responsibility for the bombing of Pan Ambright 103, which killed 270 people when it exploded and crashed in Lockerbie, Scotland, on Dec. 21.

Complaints raised about WKU's football program

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. — Some Western Kentucky University faculty members contend that academics are being left on the sidelines because of funds spent on the football program.

lines because of funds spent on the football program will be considered soon, said Senate President Fred Murphy.

The program spent more than it was budgeted every academic year this decade, according to figures provided by the Faculty Senate and Dr. Paul B. Cook, executive vice president for administrative af-

fairs.
Records show that during 1984-85 and 1985-96, football spending at the university overran its budget by more than \$132,000. In 1986-87 that overrun dropped to \$75,412, but in 1987-88 it was up to \$98,987.

in 1987-88 It was up to \$98,967.

Before Western hired a new football coach earlier this month, the senate told Athletics Director Jimmy Feix of its concern about football spending and "what has appeared to be an inability of that program to stay within the confines even of an increasingly generous budget."

the budget is strained. Faculty have to teach constantly-enlarging classes, he said, and out-of-date equipment is being used for instruction.

Feix said each coaching candiate was told what the team's resources were and budget confinents "so they would know exactive without a question what they had to work with."

Background checks on Jack Har-baugh, the new coach, revealed that "he was able to work within the framework of allocations," Feix said.

In 1985, the senate urged university administration to study the feasibility of moving to Division III in football.

Division III schools offer no scholarships, which would free some of the money budgeted for athletics for use in academics, according to a senate report.

Western President Thomas Mere-dith said the football program would not change divisions, even if the Faculty Senate makes that sug-gestion this year.

room. After receiving assurances from Independent Counsel Lawrence Walsh, the department on Wednesday dropped efforts to delay the trial.

The jurors have one thing in common: They had almost no exposure to North's nationally ledevised congressional testimony in 1987 in which he admitted, under limited immunity from prosecution, many details touching on the crimes with which he is charged.

The jurors include an electro-

The jurors include an electronics technician, a cashier, a clerical worker who says, "I don't like he news," and an unemployed former office manager who says she recalled that North was "selling something to Iran."

North, a decorated former Marine colonel, is accused of 12 criminal charges.

Five include alleged lying to Congress in 1985 and 1986 by dehying he was assisting the contras. Four other counts allege that he lied to Congress and the attorney general, and that he destroyed documents in November 1986.
