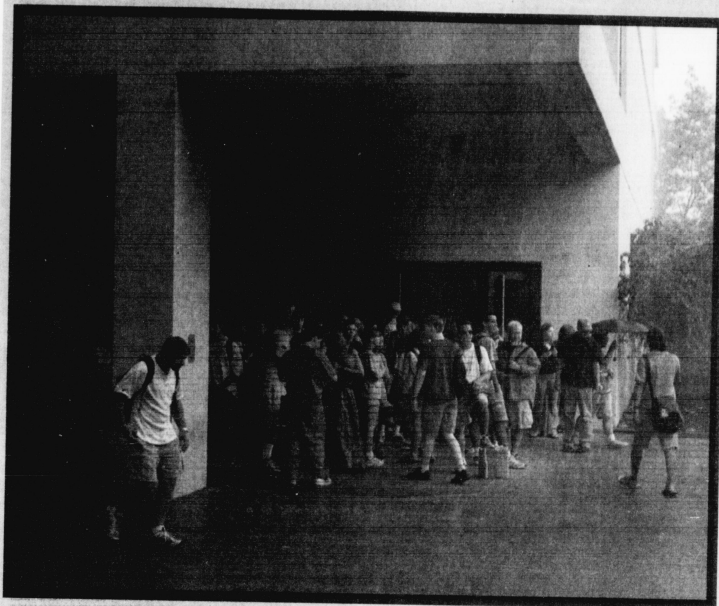

Tobacco settlement polls are in

The UK Survey Research Center released a survey this month showing that Kentuckians think tobacco settlement dollars should be spent to aid farmers and smokers. An overwhelming majority thought settlement dollars should be used to help farmers grow other crops, and most thought the money should be used to help current smokers quit. About half the participants thought that the funds should be used to prevent youth smoking. "If I had known smoking was this addictive, I would have never begun," said Carrie Thompson, an undeclared freshman and a

smoker.

"It's more expensive than I thought too," she said. Thompson supports education to prevent youth smoking.

Young adults are the most likely to attempt to quit smoking, according to the survey. "I have tried to quit three times now," Thompson said.

Almost two out of three young adults ranging from age 18-34 tried unsuccessfully to quit last year, according to nursing associate professor Ellen Hahn, a director of the survey. Another aspect of the survey revealed that minorities are also more likely to make an attempt to quit. Sixty-four percent of African-American smokers and 75 percent of Hispanic smokers tried to quit smoking at

least once, but failed.

The smoking rate among the low-income population is also much higher than the higher-income status, 36 percent as compared to 27 percent. Results also showed that almost one third on adults living in Kentucky are regular smokers and half of that number tried unsuccessfully to quit in the past year.

Those who responded were also asked if the money should be used for other purposes. Six percent said it should be used for health care of current smokers and another 6 percent said that it should be used for general education in Kentucky's schools.

The survey was conducted last March on 628 Kentucky residents who are 18 or older and there was a 27.5 percent re-

sponse rate. It should also be noted that one in three of those interviewed smoked cigarettes. Ten percent of those interviewed use another form of tobacco product such as cigars, pipes and 10 percent also own tobacco allotments. Kentucky will receive almost \$1 billion over the next 25 years from the recent tobacco settlement.

"Those who were involved are not too surprised at the findings," said assistant nursing professor Mary Kay Rayens, also a director of the survey.

The UK College of Nursing also gathered and analyzed data from the Kentucky Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

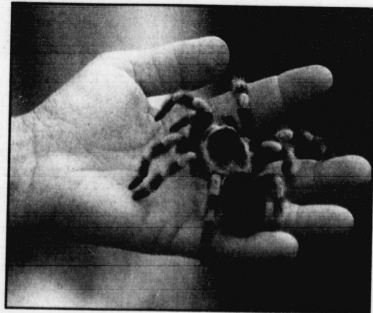

Resnet offers new services

Students living on-campus in UK's Residence Halls and apartments have a new way to check e-mail and watch television this fall.

ResNet provides University Housing residents with a cable television service and computer ethernet connections. This service is the product of a joint effort of UK Auxiliary Services, University of Kentucky Communications, University Housing and InterMedia, Lexington's cable provider.

Over a period of two months this summer, UK Communications and InterMedia upgraded the cable system within the resident halls and on-campus apartments, according to Ben Crutcher, Director of Auxiliary Services.

Under the ResNet service, students will be provided with a 60-channel cable television service by the University. In previous years University Housing residents would be charged normal cable installation and service rates. Under the ResNet contract with InterMedia, students will no longer have to worry about these rates.

Of course, University Housing residents are also wired via ResNet's ethernet connections to the campus computer network. Each resident hall or apartment room will have two data connections for each cable television outlet.

University Housing students will have access to electronic mail, student records, most academic computing programs and on-line library databases, some computer lab services and connections to the Internet through ResNet, according to UK's IT/IS NewsWire on-line publication.

Each student using the ResNet ethernet connections will have a bandwidth of 1 megabit for downloading information, and a band width of 256 kilobits for uploading information, said Doyle Friskney, assistant vice president of Information Services and project manager of ResNet. Students wanting to use the ResNet ethernet service should have a Student Novell Directory Services (SNDS) computing account and a Eudora (POP) e-mail account. For account creation or maintenance, students can go on-line at any UK Student Computing Services lab or stop by the Information Systems Help Desk in room 110 McVey Hall.

In order to connect to the ethernet, University Housing students must obtain an ethernet card for their personal computers. University of Kentucky Auxiliary Services is distributing free ethernet cards for students owning personal computers with the Microsoft Windows 95 or Windows 98 operating system. Students with laptop PCs or Macintosh computers will be offered different ethernet cards at reduced prices.

Inquiries about ethernet cards should be directed to the Food Storage Building near Donovan Hall from Monday to Friday between 8 a.m. and noon, or 1 to 5 p.m. Students wanting to receive an ethernet card should bring their student IDs with them.

The ResNet installation and service costs are covered by a \$180 increase in Student Housing fees, which is comparable to what students would pay off campus for these services, Crutcher said.

"We were fortunate to find a competitive price for the students," he said. The fee covers all aspects of the service, including the television channels and internet connections.

Student consultants have been trained to help potential ResNet ethernet users during installation and setup. These ResNet consultants can be reached at 257-1591.

According to J. W. Mills, ResNet Consultant Supervisor, students should be patient when calling ResNet consultants because he expects a large volume of calls.

"We're working as hard as we can," he said.

FBI Admits Using Tear Gas at Waco

WASHINGTON — The FBI, reversing a 6-year-old course, admitted tonight its agents may have fired some potentially inflammatory tear gas canisters on the final day of the 1993 standoff with the Branch Davidian cult near Waco, Texas. Cult leader David Koresh and many of his followers died during the fire that broke out during the FBI's final assault April 19, 1993. "We continue to believe that law enforcement did not start the fire," said FBI spokesman John Collingwood. "But we regret previous answers to Congress and to the public (about possible use of inflammatory devices) ultimately may prove to be inaccurate."

Colombian Indians Expand Territory

BOGOTA, Colombia — An embattled Colombian Indian tribe has won a huge expansion in its territory near the Venezuelan border, but appears to be losing its fight to prevent a U.S. oil company from exploring near its ancestral lands. The 8,000-member U'wa nation today applauded the government's decision a day before to double the size of its forested reservation. But the tribe says it will keep fighting an expected government ruling to grant Los Angeles-based Occidental Petroleum Corp. the rights to conduct exploratory drilling just outside the territory now 543,000 acres.

CARACAS, Venezuela — A constitutional assembly controlled by supporters of President

Hugo Chavez declared a legislative emergency in Venezuela today, usurping most of Congress's functions. The move takes away the Venezuelan Congress's right to pass laws and limits its duties to a narrow range of activities such as budget oversight. It is the latest development in an ongoing confrontation between the assembly - established last month to write a new constitution for Venezuela - and the legislative and judicial branches of government.

Prehistoric Man May Not Be Very Old

NEW YORK — Scientists say the frozen remains of a prehistoric man found in a Canadian glacier is a rare and intriguing discovery, but may not be old enough to help resolve the intensifying debate over how people arrived in North America. Three teachers were hunting for sheep in a remote corner of northwestern British Columbia when they found the well-preserved body Aug. 14 in a rapidly melting glacier just south of the Yukon-British Columbia border.

Walking May Deter Heart Disease

NEW YORK — You don't have to get all sweaty to avoid heart disease - brisk walking is just fine. Either three hours of brisk walking per week or half that time spent working up a sweat at jogging, aerobic dance or other vigorous exercise reduced the risk of heart disease 35 percent to 40 percent in a study of 72,488 women. The study was to be published in tomorrow's New England Journal of Medicine.

Saudi Princess May Be From Missouri

DENVER — A self-proclaimed Saudi princess who tried to buy two professional sports teams is actually a former Missouri businesswoman once sought for writing bad checks. The Denver Post reported today. The woman, who goes by Thara Baselia al Saud, is in reality Latonette W. Hollander, the Post reported, relying on four acquaintances of Mrs. Hollander who viewed photographs and videotape of Ms. Saud. Ms. Saud denied misrepresenting herself, or being Mrs. Hollander, who is married to David Hollander of Wilton, Conn.

Dow Sets New Record

NEW YORK — The Dow Jones industrials closed at a new high today. The Dow finished up 42.74 at 11,326.04, topping its previous record close of 11,299.76, set Monday. Advancing issues on the New York Stock Exchange led decliners 1,612-1,388. The Nasdaq was up 53.23 at 2,905.60.

Student's death ruled suicide

A University of Kentucky graduate student found unconscious in a lab at the College of Pharmacy has died and his death ruled a suicide, officials said.

Zuber Deshmukh, 25, of Bombay, India, died Monday from asphyxiation due to cyanide toxicity, the Lexington-Fayette County coroner's office said Tuesday.

No evidence of a chemical spill, hazardous gases or vapors was found in the area where Deshmukh was found Sunday, school officials said.

No other details about Deshmukh's death were released by campus police or the coroner's office.

Deshmukh was buried Tuesday following a brief service at the Blue Grass Memorial Gardens. A remembrance service is scheduled for Friday at the College of Pharmacy from noon until 12:30 p.m.

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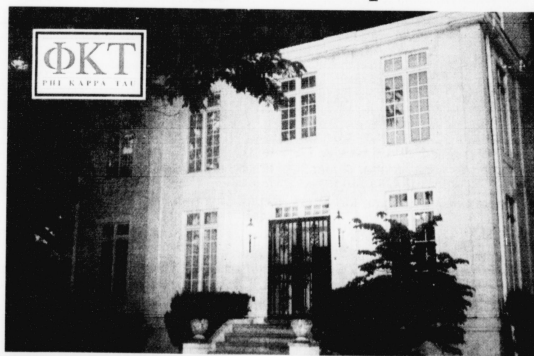

Looking for a new leader for UK

It's up to you: Committee formed to determine what people want from the next college's next President

In the next couple of weeks, the campus will be asked what kind of person should lead the University.

The futures committee, appointed last fall, is gearing up again, and will soon draft a series of questions to kick off the process of looking for UK's next president. The current president, Charles T. Wethington Jr. will step down in 2001.

"We're getting organized on what we're going to ask people and how we're going to ask it," said George Herring, a history professor and chair of the committee.

Once it has finished gathering information, the committee will send a report to UK's actual search committee when the search for President Wethington's successor begins next year.

The kinds of questions the committee will pose are open-ended and philosophical: "Where are we going? What should our central goals be? What should we do to get there?" Herring said. "And then, most importantly, given the goals, what kind of person do we need?"

But the questionnaire won't be treated like a public opinion poll, he

said. "We're not trying to get public opinion." Herring said. "We are trying to get people to give us their views and air their opinions."

The futures committee was created last December by the University Senate Council, the governing body of the University Senate, to draw up a description of what qualifications the next president should have, and what kind of person he or she should be.

Student representatives on the committee could not be reached for comment.

The committee was in the middle of some administration fireworks earlier this year when it called for the Board of Trustees to reevaluate the extension of President Wethington's contract to 2003.

"We worked through last spring just sort of brainstorming, talking to some people who have some expertise in higher education," said Herring.

With a report from the futures committee scheduled to be submitted by the end of this year, and the presidential search starting early next year, the futures committee's work will be relatively short-lived.

"Once the actual process starts," Herring said, "we'll be out of business."

Gary and Bowie return to secondary

Willie Gary can tell you all about his thwarted plans.

He can go on and on about that September day in Florida when a season-ending knee injury flushed away his hopes of becoming an All-Southeastern Conference safety.

But the UK football junior and starter-to-be isn't one for getting lost in "let's remember." In fact, even while Gary was sidelined after his fourth game of last season, he immediately began to look ahead towards the "Next Mission," which will feature one of UK's finest and fastest defenses in recent years.

"After the injury, all that was going through my head was getting ready for the '99 season," Gary said. "I watched other teams to see what they did and I learned from my teammates' mistakes to not let it happen to me this season."

In his shortened-sophomore showing, Gary managed 24 tackles and three pass break-ups. He shined as a freshman, making the Sporting News' Freshman All-American team and the SEC All-Freshman

team.

UK coach Hal Mumme made it clear to everyone he wouldn't hesitate to redshirt his safety if it was necessary, but Gary busted his way through a summer of hard work and training after missing out on spring practice.

"I worked on a lot of drills from the training room (rehabilitating) to the weight room getting stronger," Gary said.

And although he hasn't played in an organized game in almost 12 months, Gary says he'll be ready to take the field when the Cats meet Louisville next weekend.

"I'm probably one of the most experienced backs on this team," Gary said. "Every game is going to be a tough battle."

Gary isn't the only Wildcat coming off a major injury. He and junior Jeremy Bowie were in the same predicament for spring practice after Bowie injured his shoulder. Coaches were set to redshirt Bowie, but his speedy recovery has made him one of UK's tops returning cornerbacks.

Bowie said missing out on spring practice hasn't put him at too much of a disadvantage.

"I think it's more mental than physical," Bowie said.

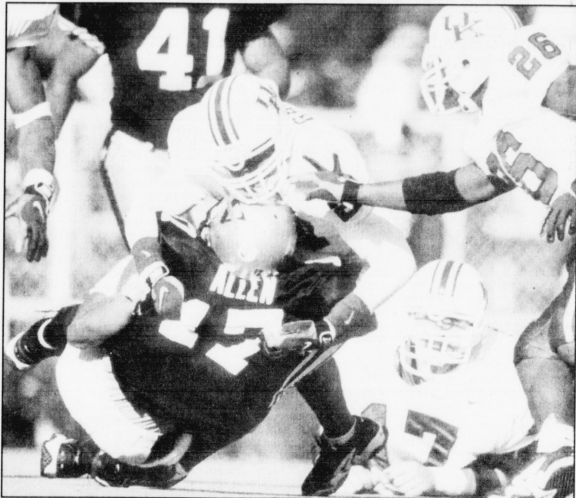
"I've never really had a significant injury like that before. I've sat out and watched a couple of practices coming up through high school, with just nicks and bruises, but this is my first big one."

Bowie played in every game last season, starting four games and making 18 tackles, including a career-high five stops against Indiana.

He jumped out to a fast start, picking off a pass from Louisville's Chris Redman, and then broke up two passes against Eastern Kentucky.

The highlight of Bowie's career may have come in his freshman season when he recovered Alabama's overtime fumble that set up the Cats' game-winning touchdown. He played in all 11 games his rookie year and chalked up 12 tackles.

Gary and Bowie help bolster an improving UK defense. Several of the nation's preseason sports publications have ranked the Cats schedule among the 20 most difficult college schedules. Combined with veteran linebackers Marlon McCree, Jeff Snedegar and John Rader, their experience can only help Mumme and his squad battle through a brutal schedule.

New Cats handle the transition

Freshman deal with class, tutors and practice in busy week

Freshman members of UK's football team entered a whole different ionosphere on Wednesday.

Besides the everyday grind of hitting the gridiron, brand new shoals set in on the new blood of Cats.

"They had to go to school. Before starting classes, all our concentration was on waking up, eating well and going to football practice," said freshman Sylvester Miller, an offensive lineman. "We didn't have much to worry about."

And being thrown into UK coach Hal Mumme's unique style only makes adjusting that more difficult.

"It's a whole different experience from high school," Miller said. "Where I come from, we ran the ball a lot. Now I have to drop back and set up for this pass-type offense."

Mostly in high school, we'd run the ball and our pass protection would be done on the line — you wouldn't have to worry about droppin' back," Miller said.

It's hard to think anything could be too onerous on the 6-5,

290-pound He-Man after you hear what his nickname is.

"Not too many people call me Sylvester anymore," Miller said. "I'm just known as the 'Big Cat.'"

Tagged after former Chicago Bears star, "Big Cat Williams," Miller said he was given the name from his windy-city high school coach, because of Miller's quickness on the field and notable size.

"Even when I was getting recruited, the letters came to my house addressed 'Big Cat,'" Miller said.

He was a two-year starter at Mt. Carmel, the high school of former hoops Cat Antoine Walker. Miller started two years at offensive tackle, helping his team to a perfect 14-0 record and a Class 5-A state championship in his senior year.

Wide receiver Ernest Simms envisions things to really pick up come next week.

"We've got a lot of free time right now," the freshman said, "but when C.A.T.S (UK's tutoring service for student athletes) starts next week, it's going to be a lot different."

"When we leave class, we go to tutors, then we have practice," Simms said. "Then I

have a night class, go back to tutors and I might find a way to get some sleep."

Simms was an all-state running back at his Georgia high school. He led his region in rushing and set his school single-season rushing record. Simms caught the eye of UK recruiters as a wide receiver by catching 19 passes for 271 yards and three touchdowns his senior season.

Super-fresh Brad Pyatt, also a wide receiver, has moved all the way up on the depth chart next to starter Quentin McCoop.

Pyatt was an All-American at his high school in Arvada, Colorado, where he averaged over 23 yards per catch. He had more than 20 Division I scholarship offers and chose UK over the likes of Miami of Florida, Southern California and Colorado.

"I'm happy where I'm at right now," Pyatt said. "If I get a shot to get in behind Quentin, then I'll give it my best."

As for getting in the true college flow of things, Simms said it shouldn't be a problem.

"It'll take us while to adapt, but we'll eventually get used to it," Simms said.

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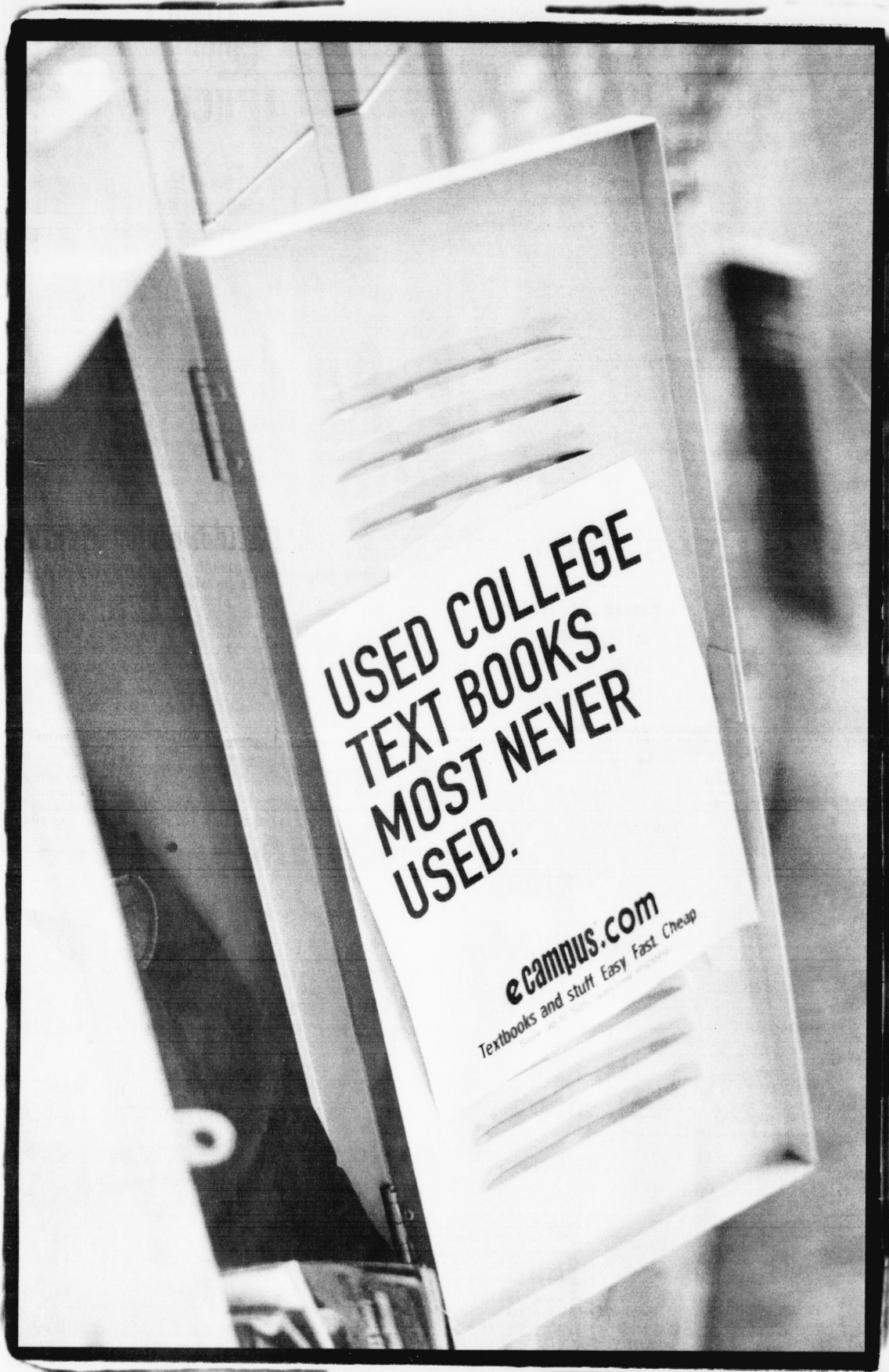
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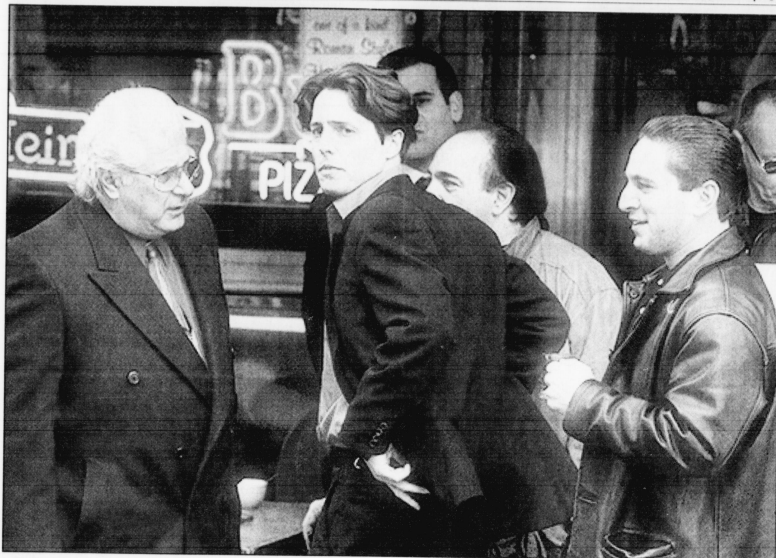

Open for business

Wethington's contract issue did much harm to this University

The powers-that-be thought they'd get away with it. And, for the most part, they did.

The decision to negotiate and vote on UK President Charles T. Wethington Jr.'s contract without notifying the UK community first deserved the repercussions that it eventually received.

The ensuing fiasco was embarrassing, from the UK community's fizzling dissatisfaction about being left out to the watering down of the disputed contract.

Board members complained they were unaware the president's contract would be discussed. Of course they didn't know it wasn't on the agenda!

The media sued. They called contract negotiations of a major land grant university's president newsworthy, so they tried to cover it. How could this event be covered in a closed session, with no advance notices of the important business?

The people most affected by administration — faculty, staff and students — had no clue their president's contract was going to be renewed.

So, former Gov. Ned Breathitt and a few others got together one day and decided the fate of UK in terms of leadership.

Dubious move, boys. How about some healthy public comment? The kind there would've been plenty of had the board and the media known in advance what would be happening at the meeting.

Instead, UK was treated to an uproar, mainly from faculty and media who felt they'd been left out of the process unfairly. Their displeasure was understandable. The ferocity with which they showed their disappointment was laudable. For a while, at least.

A board meeting on June 6 featured a capacity crowd of concerned members of the UK family. Heads shook in a mixture of disgust and disappointment when the vote to reconsider Wethington's contract was a tie.

Faculty board member Daniel Reedy and a few others came up with a new contract, specifically, one that had Wethington retire by age 65, as state rules usually dictate. No protest, no discussion. The anger became a whimper, and then a snore.

The faculty should be more demanding and follow up on their dissatisfactions. The solution to the problem of a closed process was to make a minor concession, allowing only a couple of people from the crowd play in the sandbox.

We hope that from now on, when the board does something as serious as they did this summer, UK's faculty, staff and students will pursue them like hawks on mice — and won't let up until they're satisfied.
