#### Active Directory to synchronize accounts for all campus users

UK is looking to implement a new computer system that will help students avoid a virtual dilemma.

The Active Directory system has been put in place with one eventual goal in mind; for every campus user in the system to have access to all their university accounts with one synchronized username and password.

Active Directory already allows access to important financial and academic resources available online through the university, such as tuition payment and Blackboard.

Registering for classes, paying tuition, checking grades and class assignments, accessing the wireless network around campus and even the Medical center accounts for UK medical students are now online through active Directory.

It was the modern and the state of the provides access to resources and information to support the above-mentioned applications," said Doyle Priskney, associate vice president and chief technical officer for the Office of Information Technology and Human Services.

"Active Directory will support Microsoft-centric applications, such as Blackboard and the upcoming Campus Management system... that will replace webUK."

The university has been investing in Active Directory for the past three years, and by now, virtually every student and faculty member at UK should have an Active Directory account.

But making Active Directory a normal part of life is a process, Priskney said.

"It has to be naturally absorbed by the students," Friskney said.

"So I think people will do what they did the last time: They'il download the singles, and they'il buy the album as well. Iran really does appear to be on the road to producing nuclear weapons, whereas nukes merely danced with the sugarplum fairies in the dreams of Iraq's Saddam Hussein. Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad is a religious fundamentalist who has made frightening anti-Semitic comments, including the requisite Holocaust denial. Hussein, by contrast, ran an essentially secular dictatorship that was despised by more reactionary religious forces in the region.

But there's one crucial similarity on the home front. Conservative politicians are ready to let politicar rump sensibility in the foreign policy decision process, and the Saddam overly hasty military action.

It would be much better if Iran weren't developing nuclear weapons, of course. The last thing the world needs is a nuclear state in the middle of its most unstable re-

munity as an expanation for why
the former should be allowed to
have nukes and the latter should
not.

What the United States needs to
do is to work with the United Nations and the international community to monitor Iran and slow its development of nuclear weapons. Unnity to monitor Iran and slow its development of nuclear weapons. One
unit of Washington will give Iran
negotiations while retaining credibility. The United States can't allow
that to happen.

That's where the campaign-season politicization of the issue becomes problematic. Republicans
will play on age-old perceptions of
Democrats as weak on national security by pushing them to take a
harsher stance on Iran. The Democrats will, of course, play along, and
suddenly air strikes will become
the "middle" position.

Such a course of action would
be swell and dandy for getting the
GOP to win another election, but it
wouldn't do much for the auxiliary
issue of, you know, peacefully halting Iranian nuclear development.
Tehran, extrapolating from the outcome of the Bush-Hussein plissing
contest of 2008, will figure the United States is just going to invade
anyway and thus will have no incentive to stop making nukes. The

#### We should keep nuclear weapons out of the Middle East - in both Iran and Israel

Right now, it appears that the best possible outcome would be for Iran to have nuclear energy plants, but with monitoring from the United Nations' International Atomic Energy Agency to ensure that they aren't used for unsavory purposes. We have to figure out how to convince Iran to abide to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty without military occretion.

Non-Proliferation Treaty without military coercion. Here's my (obviously amateur) suggestion. The Western state could have Israel come clean about its nuclear weapons, ratify the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty and begin to reduce its nuclear arsenal—in exchange for Iran halting its own nuclear development and allowing IA.E.A. inspectors. Presumably the Arab states would be quite pleased to see this development, so there would be great regional pressure on Iran to take the offer. Perhaps the threat of sanctions could be added as greater disincentive to turn down the deal, though I worry that they would wind up hurting the Iranian people more than the corrupt leadership.

Moreover, it would be a step to ward a wholly non-nuclear Middle East and an end to the nuclear double standard. It's too bad that peace and problem solving don't help Republicans win elections, and that Democrats are all too happy to plate it geams.

# Carton tax not the only way to keep tuition down could look to legalize "sin" (in the form of gambling) instead of taxing it (in the form of cigarette carrions). Taxes on gambling revenues could fill state coffers, not to mention bringing in business from Indiana and other gaming friendly states. We also worry that the money from the increase won't go entirely toward education. According to a Jan. 31 story in the Cincinnati Endorse of the control tax might help pay for an expansion of Big Bone Lick State Park and lower taxes for small businesses. Taxing things that aren't good for people is taking the political back way out; it's the path of least resistance, because people who don't smoke don't care about the tax.
