Such an exchange is definitely needed by UK students. But before we condern Dr. Donovan's action as unfair and detrimental to students, it might be well to examine the situation more fully. SGA actually presented no concrete plan for the operation of an exchange. In the past, two book exchanges have been tried on campus, and both have failed because of lack of a concrete plan of exceeding.

Unless a definite procedure is established, an Unless a definite procedure is established, an exchange is open to mismanagement. This is what happened to the others. The last attempt, in 1940, called for selling of memberships to students for 50 cents each. Before the year was over, the business manager of the exchange was called before the SGA Student Standards Committee and charged with improperly handling the funds. He was ordered to return all membership fees, and was placed on probation for a year.

Although Pete Carter, who proposed the 'exchange, and SCA no doubt lad good motives for
asking the establishment, they really had no concrete plan to present. The only advantage shown
over previous exchanges was that this one would
have the backing of SCA. But that would not insure its survival.

All this seems to make the picture appear dark,
but there is a ray of light which we believe offers a
real solution to the problem.

Most Students Brought To University By Prospects Of Good Employment

The prospect of a good job is the reason most UK students have come to college. The desire for more knowledge rates second, according to a recent poll of 132 students in connection with the National Poll of Student Opinion.

In comparing the local results to that of the national poll we find that there are practically no percentage differences.

College students from all parts of the country were asked to pick either one or two choices which came closest to their reasons for attending college. The results: a good, job after college, 53 per cent, desire for more knowledge, 36 per cent, to find a mate, 2 per cent, it was "the thing to do," 5 per cent; the parents wished it, 4 per cent; none of these, 2 per cent.

Oddly, only six UK coeds admitted that they came to college to find a mate, while nine males chose this reason. The two reasons given by students who disagreed with the given choices said that they had come to college for the social life and to escape the draft.

Many of the students commented that their choice of professions—such as law, education, medicine—required them to go to college.

A senior coed in home economics said, "Men want a job, women want a man."

Students were then asked: Which of these reasons do you feel fits best for the majority of college students?

Following the national trend, the second choice at UK was that "it was the thing to do," and next "to find a mate," with the former having a substantial edge.

"A good job after college" was the choice of 72 of the 132 interviewees, and was chosen by 60 per cent of all the students interviewed nationally.

The big drop was in the percentage of students who thought that their fellow students had come to college with the "desire for more knowledge." At UK, only four chose this reason, and they were all

The Students Speak: Teacher Defends Education College

Dear Editor:

I should like to state at the very beginning of this letter that I am not taking issue with either "Alumi" or 'Joe' who seem to have struck up such a happy correspondence relative to the College of Education and its program of teacher preparation. I am merely seeking the opportunity to state a point of view which ordinarily would be presented to those most vitally concerned with such remarks—namely, the professors with whom my major work was done. However, it appears that our two chums mentioned above have by-passed the usual channels, so I am assuming that I can do the same.

Like "Alum", I completed my undergraduate work at the University of Kentucky in 1950; therefore, I imagine that we had many of the same teachers. Perhaps it is not too sinful to differ with one of your letter-writers, so I must admit that I enjoyed some examples of politics mixed in with my psychology. I know of no better means of illustrating the workings of the human mind than through the interaction of citizens in political situations.

I chose to do my student teaching in one of the county high schools near to the University, so I do not feel that I can comment relative to "Alumis" remarks about the University School. All that I can say is that I received my student teaching experi-

ences in about as "normal" as situation as could be found. I should add that this directed teaching, plus the seminars which parallel that experience, were the most helpful parts of my program of prantion for teaching. It is possible, of course, that one's own point of view and attitudes could also have something to do with what a person gets out of a course.

I believe that "Alum" and I must have been in the same class at least once. He says, "One instructor spent the entire course citing examples of maladjusted children and why it had happened. The instructor did not once, however, advance any ideas as to how to aid or eradicate these same problems."

I am not quite certain to what "it" refers in the first sentence above, but if "it" refers to reasons for maladjustment, then I should like to submit that those same reasons are good indications of means which may be utilized to eradicate these types of maladjustments. At least, I have been successfully using those discussions in the way indicated above.

I suppose that I am just a guilible, old country boy, but I can't help but feel that my instructors in the College of Education have taken a personal interest in me, and from what I have been able to learn from other teachers now in the field, they have the same feeling. Although I am located some distance from the University campus, two of my

former instructors have taken the time and trouble to visit with me and to help me with some of my problems. The Dean of the College of Education has also checked with me and my principal to help me and to find ways in which the program of preparation might be improved in the future.

At the present time, I am located near three other institutions which prepare teachers. Two of these institutions are not Kentucky schools. After observing rather closely both the programs of these colleges and the products of the institutions, I am more firmly convinced than ever that the University of Kentucky has just cause for being proud of its College of Education. I am always pleased to be able to state that I received my training at the University of Kentucky.

Dear Editor:

In March each year I feel like rededicating my life to the organization that did the most for me during World War II in Europe, the American Red Cross. They made life much more comfortable and happier for me both in European war areas and in the states. I used almost all of their many different

services. Some examples are too important not to mention.

Before I went overseas the Army Engineers lost my allotment papers. My mother went to the Red Cross home service office and they prepared, without charge, notice and identification papers. More received her allotment without any error from then on-including the time I was in Europe.

When Christmas came, the Red Cross arranged for us to send cablegrams home for almost no charge. When it was decided that I could do more good teaching in the Douglas Aircraft Army Service School, than in the army, it was the Red Cross that handled the proof papers for my return to the states for that important duty.

In North Africa, Italy and France, the American Red Cross provided services similar to our Student Union here at the University. I recall eight different services given. Space will not permit my describing them.






