TO THE PRESS-RADIO-TV

Here is your copy of the 1980 Kentucky Wildcats' Football Facts Book that we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U of K football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Information Office (606) 257-3838.

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information window in Memorial Coliseum, except on game days, when they will be moved to the ticket window at Commonwealth Stadium.

TELECOPIERS—A Telecopier station equipped with dorm-type telephones that take only collect or credit card calls is provided in the press box for use of out-of-town writers. A fee of \$15 will be assessed for use of a telephone.

PRESS BOX—Limited to working personnel. Kentucky Sports Information will service play-by-play quarterly, half-time and final statistics, scoring summary, lineups and coaches' comments. Food is available in Commonwealth Stadium Press Box upon presentation of meal ticket.

RADIO—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the UK Network. One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the UK Director of Broadcasting, John Henderson (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used.

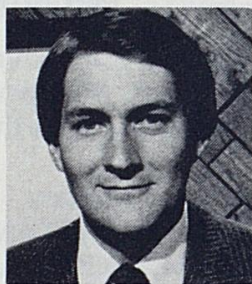
The U.K. Sports Network, a division of the Kentucky Network, is in its second year of a three-year contract to broadcast UK sports. The network was expanded last year to 81 markets with more than 100 stations in Kentucky and across the country. Fans in more than 40 states hear the games on the network's two 50,000 watt stations—WHAS-Louisville and WCKY-Cincinnati.

Co-ordinator of the network is D. J. Everett, a 1969 graduate of the University. The "Voice of the Wildcats" is Cawood Ledford, now in his 29th year of covering Wildcat sports. Assisting Ledford is Ralph Hacker, president and general manager of radio station WVLK-Lexington, who is in his 10th year as color commentator. Tom Stevens mans the network's wireless microphone on the sidelines while Tom Devine is technical director for the broadcasts.

In the network studios, Harvey Combs, Stan Cook, Steve Bowles and Jerry Snapp are on hand to handle engineering, production and scoring.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learn in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the ten years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in 20 different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Seventeen other members, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Director of Athletics Cliff Hagan.

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN
Athletics Director

The story of Cliff Hagan's reign as chief of the UK Athletics Department has been one of fine attendance at the two big revenue-producing sports, increased attendance in Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

The most recent physical improvements include a new baseball grandstand behind home plate, new lockers in the football dressing rooms and construction of a new equipment shed for track, all at Shively Sports Center.

On the institutional side of the ledger, the University will be host to the SEC Basketball Tournament in March of next year and the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985, along with renewal of the UK Relays during the past spring.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

A few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics under Hagan include;

- Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful players' lounge at Shively Sports Center.
- New carpeting in the stadium football offices.
- New food service equipment in the press box at Commonwealth Stadium.
- New basketball offices in Memorial Coliseum for both the men and women.
- Re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a complete revamping of the track facilities at Shively Sports Center.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of

implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

The wrestling team repeated as conference champion the following year, the basketball team finished with a 26-4 record and the football team won seven of 11 regular season games and defeated North Carolina in the Peach Bowl. It was the best UK football record in 23 years and the Wildcats' first post-season appearance since the 1952 Cotton Bowl. During the past year, the football team finished 10-1 (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) and the basketball team won the NCAA championship.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Office in Memorial Coliseum have been modernized and Hagan is looking forward to the day when he can put on the drawing board an Olympic swimming pool, and plans for the expansion of Commonwealth Stadium.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors three years ago when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force

Base, Washington, D.C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

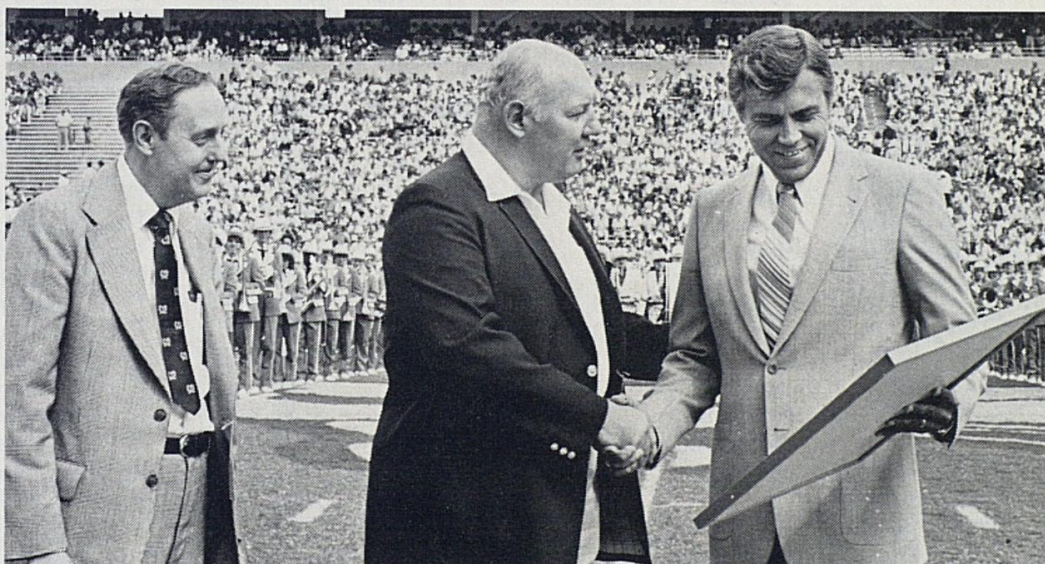
He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington.

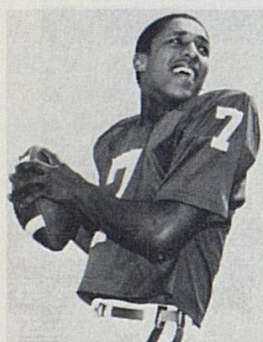

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY FOOTBALL PROSPECTUS—1981

Youth and inexperience will still be a factor, although not as critical as in 1980, as the University of Kentucky football team returns 40 lettermen, mostly sophomores and juniors, for the 1981 season.

Among the key persons lost from last season are All-Southeastern Conference center Ken Roark, defensive tackle Tim Gooch, linebacker Chuck Smith and safety Chris Jacobs.

The most difficult position to fill will be that vacated by Roark, who was a strong anchor in the offensive line for the past two seasons. Entering spring drills, only Steve Hricenak, a senior guard who missed all of last season with a broken arm, was the only veteran listed at center.

Gone with Gooch is Earl Wilson, another starting DT who transferred to Cameron University in Oklahoma with QB Larry McCrimmon, who was starter at QB the latter part of last season. Offensive lineman Mickey Cochran also transferred.

A plus factor will be the return of some key players hampered by injuries, including junior FB Shawn Donigan, who had a shoulder operation in the summer of 1980; junior Kevin Kearns, NG and DT who underwent knee surgery after missing games in the latter part of the last two seasons, and junior RB Chris Jones, recovering from a knee injury received in the 1980 Indiana game.

Also returning after a one-year absence are senior DE Don Fielder, a starter in 1979, and RB Tom Venable, who gained 460 yards (92 carries) as a substitute that year.

The injury to Jones in the third game of last season wiped out practically the entire backfield of the preceding year, when Donigan led all rushers with 187 attempts for 847 yards and four TDs, followed by Jones with 142 carries for 770 yards and five TDs.

Jones had carried 33 times for 122 yards when he received the knee injury, which was so severe that an operation and a long period of rehabilitation were to follow. His situation is doubtful.

The loss of McCrimmon, who earned the starting QB position in mid-season of last year, returns the signal-calling chores to sophomore Randy Jenkins and junior Terry Henry, who both have had starting positions two seasons.

Jenkins, who was not charged a year of eligibility after receiving a broken ankle in his first starting assignment—against Maryland in 1979—completed 61 of 127 passes for 782 yards and six TDs last year, finishing second to McCrimmon (137-69-1,060 yds., 5 TDs). Jenkins threw 15 interceptions, McCrimmon 10. Sophomore Tom Boyle is back after playing in some Jayvee games last season.

Among the returning offensive backs are junior Richard Abraham (33 for 137), who was switched from DE to FB in mid-season; junior Rodney Francis (28 for 144) and senior Henry Parks (28 for 107).

Missing is RB Randy Brooks, leading rusher with 166 carries for 578 yards and three TDs and fourth receiver with 17 catches for 180 yards and one TD.

The receiving corps returns TE Jim Campbell, a senior who led the team with 33 catches for 394 yards and four TDs, and junior Allan Watson with 30 catches for 536 yards and one TD. Campbell set a school record with 11 receptions against Bowling Green.

With Fielder returning to join juniors Dave Lyons and Don Roe, and sophomore Steve Willis, the defensive end position should be stronger this year. Senior Effley Brooks has played both tackle and noseguard while sophomore Keith Martin saw

spot duty at tackle last year. Help must be found in this position.

The thin linebacking corps is led by junior Scott Schroeder, who led the team with 82 solo tackles and 62 assists last year. Junior Ben Ansley and sophomore Kevin McClelland saw reserve duty at that position.

Returning in the secondary are senior SS Greg Long, who was third leading tackler with 62 solos, 31 assists and four tackles behind the line, senior HB Venus Meaux and junior S Andy Molls.

The kicking game returns intact, with punters Jenkins (45 for 1,783 yds. — 39.6 avg.) and Chris Poulton (14 for 511-36.5) and placekickers Tom Griggs (9x11 FS, 16-16 xpts) and Rick Strein.

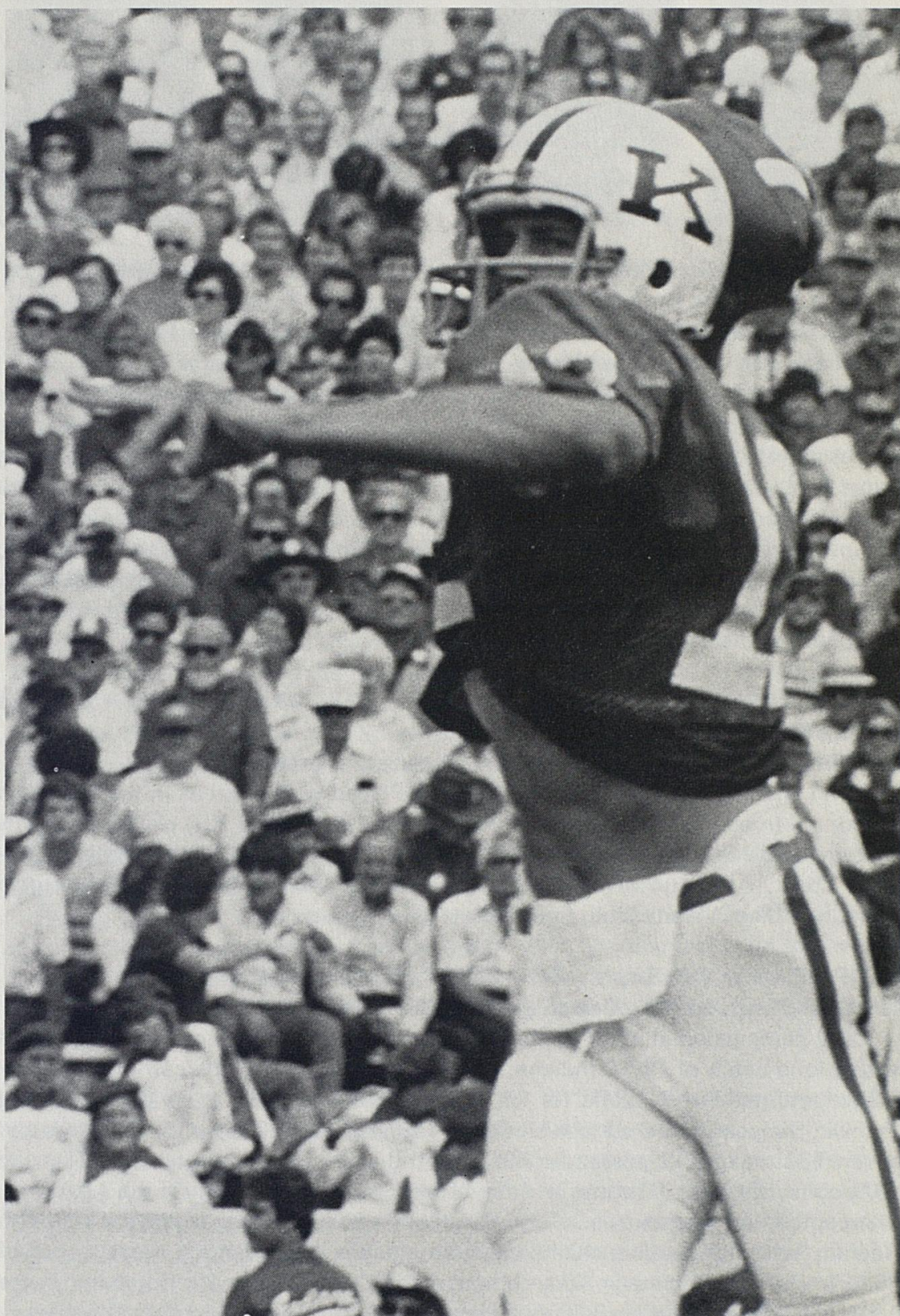
ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

GALS' COACH FIRST UK MENTOR

Prof. A. M. Miller, who became Kentucky's first football coach in 1892, was chosen because he had learned about the game from sideline observations while a student at Princeton. His only previous coaching experience was at a girls' school in Pennsylvania. He coached four games and yielded to Jackie Thompson for the remaining three games.



FRAN CURCI, HEAD FOOTBALL COACH
University of Kentucky
(8 years at UK: 44-43-2; 78-62-2)

With his second good recruiting crop in a row, Fran Curci enters his ninth year as University of Kentucky football coach with hopes of returning the Wildcats to their fine back-to-back seasons in 1976, when they finished 8-4 and were Southeastern Conference co-champion and Peach Bowl champion, and 1977, when they finished 10-1 and were undefeated in conference play.

Curci's victory total at UK now stands at 44 (44-43-2), second only to the 60 victories registered by Paul Bryant (60-23-3, 1946-53) and ahead of the 41 by Blanton Collier (41-36-3, 1954-61).

Youthfulness, inexperience and injuries took their toll of the Wildcats last year, when four games were lost in the closing seconds, including two with no time left on the clock, en route to a 3-8 record.

During his tenure at UK, Curci has been named SEC "Coach of the Year" by both wire services—UPI in 1973 and AP in 1977—and has finished high in the national balloting (1977).

He has produced four All-Americans and three Academic All-Americans at UK, which did not have an All-American of any type during the nine years before he came to Lexington. He also has produced 10 All-SEC players named 15 times to the honor squads.

Curci came to UK from the University of Miami, FL, where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after earning All-American honors as a quarterback for the Hurricanes in 1959 and playing QB for the old Dallas Texans in the AFL.

Curci went to Tampa as head coach in 1968, putting together a 7-3 season that included victories over Mississippi State and Tulane and earned him the Florida

Sports Writers Association's "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 1969 team finished 8-2, while his 10-1 record in 1970 included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking. Curci was runner-up for the College Division "Coach of the Year" honors.

He coached the Hurricanes in 1971 and 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, PA, Curci played his high school football in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At Miami, where he was known as the "Mite-y Magician," he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving All-America honorable mention in 1957.

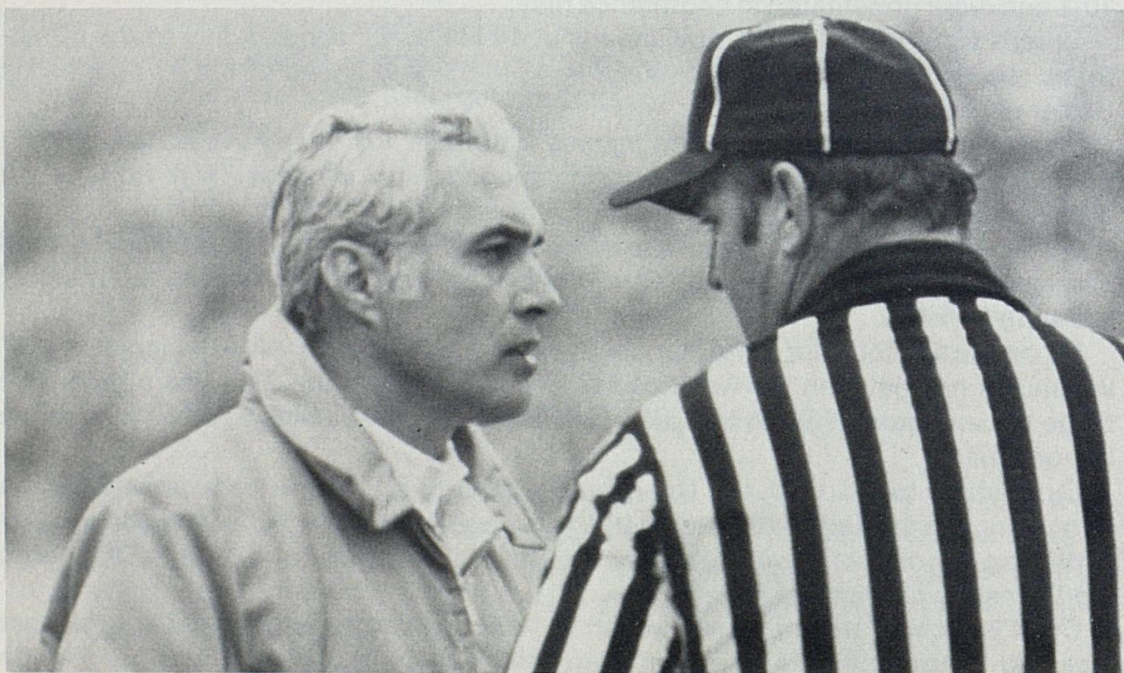
He set Hurricane seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained passing. He was co-holder of the record for most passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades. He captained the Hurricanes his senior year and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset of Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year for the Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

Curci has been selected seven times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game five years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charlie McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America game and has also appeared at the North-South Game, Japan Bowl, East-West Game and Hula Bowl.

He was elected to the Miami Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky has managed only one victory and a tie in 29 games since the series with Alabama began in 1917. The Tide got off to a fine start, blasting a weak UK team, 27-0, in Lexington. Five years later, sophomore fullback Curtis Sanders caught a 20-yard pass and gained nine crucial yards in three carries to set up a seven-yard run by Bruce Fuller as the Wildcats defeated the Tide, 7-0. Alabama won the next 16 games before the Wildcats, behind Eral Allen and Noah Mullins, came from behind for a 7-7 tie in 1939. The Tide won seven more consecutive games before the series was interrupted in 1947 and then started the renewal off with a 35-0 victory in 1972 and a 28-14 victory in 1973. The Tide won easily last year in Birmingham.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 4, 1980 (Birmingham) UK 0 UA 45—Kentucky held the Tide at bay, so to speak, in the first half as Alabama rolled to a 14-0 lead on field goals of 28 and 38-yards by Peter Kim in the first quarter and a one-yard plunge by Major Ogilvie, followed by a Don Jacobs-to-TE Bart Krout pass for two points. Kim hit a 35-yard field goal midway of the second half; a few minutes later, freshman

the greatest football teams in UK history. Wildcat tackle Bob Gain, slated to win the Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman, blocked a NTS punt, picked up the ball on the 30, and returned to the 19, to set up a TD plunge by Vito "Babe" Parilli, who also would make All-America that year. Parilli completed only four of 11 passes in that game, but some were dropped by receivers. The Kentucky players agreed that North Texas State had a good football team . . . five of the Eagles later would play professional football. Kentucky outscored its opponents, 393-62, that year.

MEMORIAL

Kentucky's athletic complex off Cooper Drive was named "The Bernie A. Shively Sports Center" in April, 1969, in memory of the distinguished Wildcat director of athletics who died of a heart attack at his home December 10, 1967.

Shively joined the Kentucky staff in 1927 as football line coach, following a brilliant athletic career at Illinois. An All-American as a blocking guard for Red Grange, he also was Big Ten heavyweight wrestling champion and a track stand-out. He was named to the Helms Hall of Fame in 1972.

In 1933, he was appointed head of the UK Physical Education Department, and five years later became director of athletics. He continued coaching until 1946, handling football, track and baseball at various times. Among other honors, he was inducted into the Kentucky Hall of Fame.

COMMONWEALTH STADIUM

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972, and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium.

Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July 1973, and this was replaced with Bermuda in 1974. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium—that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University. Soon after the first sections of the concrete stadium on Euclid Avenue were completed Sept. 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville Oct. 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium Nov. 1, 1924.

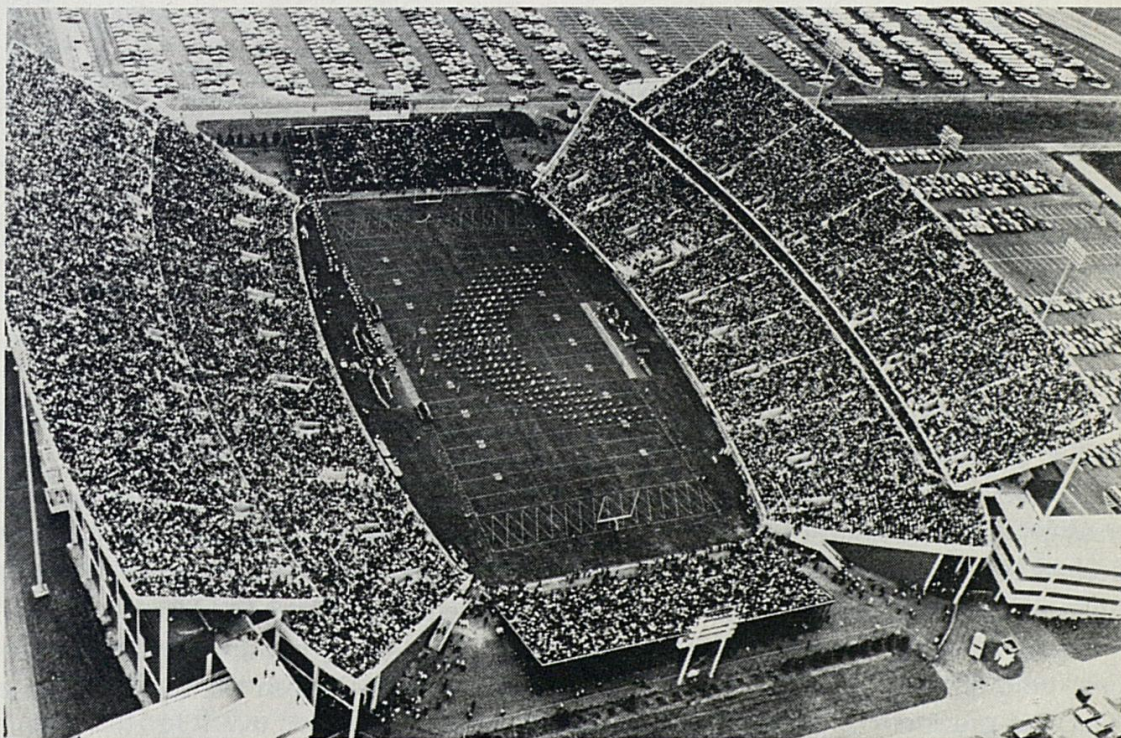

INTERESTING FEATURE—Lower section all pre-cast concrete; upper part all structural steel columns, beams, risers, etc. Each section independent of other. No connection between the two.

PARKING—6,000 places in four lots, with two lots blacktop, other two grass and gravel.

PRESS BOX—From 30 to 30-yard-line. Serviced by two elevators. Two VIP booths on each end; six booths for radio, scoreboard, timekeeper, coaches to field setup; two food-serving lounges; regular working space with approximately 105 seats; two Telecopier service areas; camera deck across entire front of box.

He worked for Vince Lombardi as special assignment scout and then produced four championship teams in the Continental League at Charleston and Orlando, earning league Coach of the Year honors.

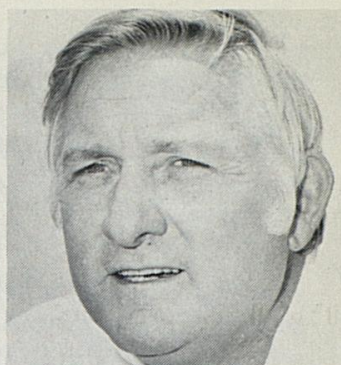
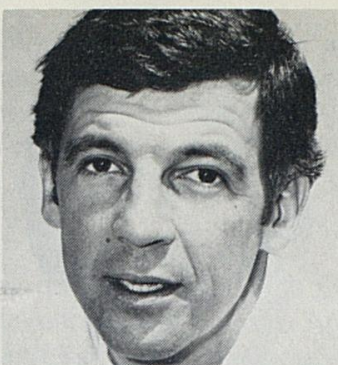
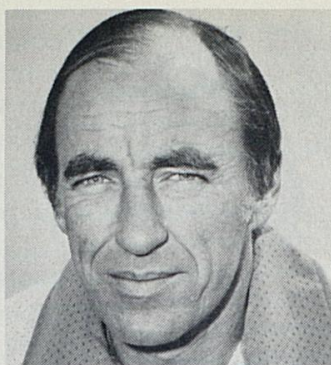

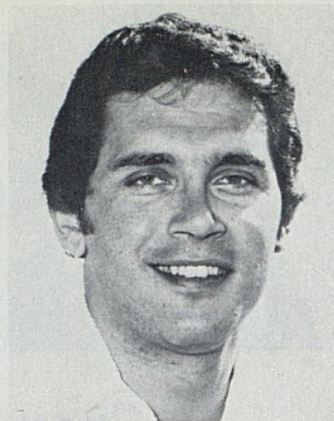
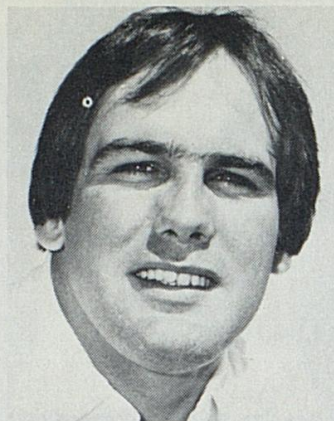
BILL GLASER, DEFENSIVE ENDS

He earned his bachelor's degree at Purdue and his M.A. there in 1969. A three-year letterman, he earned the Noble E. Kizer Academic Award his senior year and was co-captain and outstanding defensive back on the Boilermakers' 1967 Rose Bowl team.

After being drafted and trying out with the Philadelphia Eagles, he returned to Purdue to serve two years as a graduate assistant and then was at Middle Tennessee and Louisville. He came to UK in 1977. He returned to Purdue in 1971, working with the secondary.

Linnie Patrick gained 60 yards through UK's middle to set up a two-yard plunge by Mitch Ferguson and put the game out of reach at 24-0. A total of 16 Alabama backs got to carry the ball as the Tide rushed 69 times for 427 yards. Kentucky's lone thrill came on the next-to-last play of the first quarter, when QB Randy Jenkins rambled for 42 yards on an option. The series died with a fumbled snap on a FG attempt from the UA seven.

1981 OUTLOOK: The Tide will pull out all stops as Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, with 305 coaching victories in 36 years, seeks to pass Amos Alonzo Stagg's record of 314 during a 57-year career and Glen (Pop) Warner's 313 during 44 years as a coach. Although the Tide lost its entire offensive backfield via graduation, there are still plenty of fine horses in Bryant's stable, which included QBs Ken Coley and Walter Lewis and RBs Linnie Patrick, Joe Carter, Jeff Fagan, Ken Simon and Mark Nix. Returning starters are SE Jesse Bendross, TE Bart Krout, C Steve Mott and RT Bob Cayavec. The interior of the offensive line is young and relatively inexperienced. On defense, the Tide should be pretty good one-deep, with returning starters Jackie Cline (T), NG Warren Lyles, LB Thomas Boyd and DBs Tommy Wilcox and Jeremiah Castille. PAT & FG kicker Peter Kim, who had a fine day against UK in 1980, returns after leading the team in scoring in 1980 (35 of 37 extra points; 12 of 18 FGs). The list goes on. "The Bear" is loaded as he takes his shot at the record.

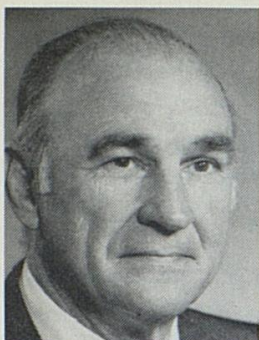

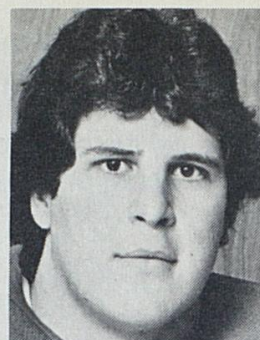

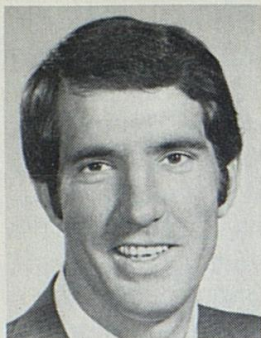

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky and Kansas met for the first time on the gridiron in 1975, with the Jayhawks capitalizing on three crucial Wildcat mistakes to take home a 14-10 victory. Kansas had scored first in the first half after Eric Franklin got off an electrifying 77-yard run, fifth longest in Jayhawk history, before being brought down by tackle Jerry Blanton. Nolan Cromwell scored from the seven. The Cats launched a second half comeback, erasing the 7-0 deficit on a 47-yard field goal by John Pierce and a four-yard touchdown by Derrick Ramsey with 11:09 left. Kentucky had possession, third and seven on its own 41-yard-line when Ramsey was hit at the point of exchange on a tight end reverse to Vin Hoover and fumbled. Chris Golub recovered for Kansas. Five plays and two critical penalties later, the Jayhawks scored as Laverne Smith went 16 unmolested yards around the Jayhawk right end. The following year, Kansas won, 37-6, on a sweltering day in Lawrence to give the Jayhawks a 2-0-0 lead in the young series.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 18, 1976 (Lawrence) UK 16, Kansas 37—Before a sweltering Band Day crowd of 50,170 fans, Kansas controlled the line of scrimmage

both offensively and defensively while QB Nolan Cromwell ran the offense to perfection and runningback Laverne Smith had a field day. UK's first two plays from scrimmage produced two fumbles, the second leading directly to Kansas' second TD. On their second possession of the game, the Jayhawks marched 69 yards in nine plays, with 49 of that total credited to Smith, who scored from the 10. After recovering a UK fumble on the 'Cat 34 less than five minutes later, the Jayhawks marched to the six, where Smith again scored. Trailing, 14-0, the 'Cats countered with a sustained drive of 67 yards highlighted by Joe Dipre's 14-yard midfield jaunt. Ramsey capped the march with another 14-yarder to paydirt. After surrendering a 19-yard FG to Mike Hubbard, UK was called for pass interference on its own six, setting up a six-yard TD by Bill Campfield with 48 seconds left in the half. The 24-7 lead was more than the 'Cats could overcome as they fell, 37-16.

1981 OUTLOOK: With back-to-back solid recruiting years, Coach Don Fambrough feels encouraged and optimistic about the coming season, although the Jayhawks have several key holes to fill on both sides of the line. Among the talented skilled players returning are freshman TD Kerwin Bell, the league's "Offensive Newcomer-of-the-Year," freshman QB Frank Seurer and all-conference punter Bucky Scribner. Anthony Penny, Cedrick Alexander and Kurt Mueller head the linemen recruited for the year, while the Jayhawks grabbed Chris Emerson, a junior college transfer, and Harvey Fields to help in the backfield department. Overall, Fambrough feels the big thing is the excitement about the program.

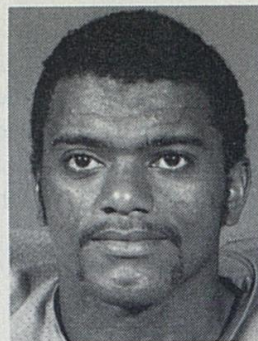

SERIES HISTORY: Clemson teams of the past apparently like to visit the Heart of the Blue Grass, although for the most part they were not satisfied with the results. The first six games between the Wildcats and the Tigers were played in Lexington, with the invaders notching only one victory, a 14-0 shutout in 1938. The series was begun in 1925, with Coach Fred J. Murphy's Wildcats winning, 19-6, en route to a 6-3 season. Captain of that team was A. D. (AB) Kirwan, who later became Wildcat coach, dean of men and president of the University. Four years later, the Wildcats defeated the Tigers, 44-6, for their fifth win in a row for Coach Harry Gamage. Up to that time, no team had crossed the Wildcat goal line and Gamage's forces had scored a total of 151 points. The Wildcats lost to Alabama, defeated VMI and tied Tennessee for a fine 6-1-1 record. Clemson returned to Lexington again in 1934 and was on the short end of a 7-0 score; the Wildcats that season under Chet Wynne had a 5-5 record. Two years later, Wynne's forces won, 7-6, over the Tigers. Another two years lapsed before Clemson returned to town and blanked Kirwan's forces, 14-0. Clemson's last appearance in Lexington was in 1952, when Paul

Bryant's Wildcats won, 27-14. The Wildcats won, 13-10, at Clemson in 1971 for a 6-0-1 lead in the series.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 11, 1971 (Clemson) UK 13, CU 10—Sophomore Doug Kotar, stumbling and fumbling at first, took the opening kickoff of that opening game of the 1971 season and ran 98 yards to paydirt. Tom Kirk connected on the extra point try and the 'Cats were ahead, 7-0, with only 13 seconds missing on the clock. That was the only time UK could cross the Tiger goal line. The rest of the time it was up to Kirk to get the points. He came across with two field goals, from distances of 34 and 27 yards, scoring his first three-pointer as the horn sounded to end the first half and the game-winner with 4:57 left in the game. The Tigers settled for a 38-yard field goal by Eddie Seigler in the first half and then tied the score, 10-10, late in the game when a Dale Henry punt went flying by UK's Buzz Burnam, who touched the ball just before it landed in the end zone and then lost the scramble to Smiley Sanders.

1981 OUTLOOK: With the return of 53 lettermen, including all 11 offensive starters, there is more depth in Tigerland than at any time in recent years. Homer Jordan had a fine sophomore year at QB, breaking Steve Fuller's total offense record by running and passing for 1683 yds. He completed 49 percent of his passes and had four 200-yard total offense games. Jordan's favorite target in 1981 will be Perry Tuttle, Clemson's top All-America candidate who last year led the ACC in receiving with 53 receptions for 915 yards. The Tigers have a very balanced running attack featuring Chuck McSwain, who had 544 yds. and a 4.8 avg. as a sophomore and now is only 13 yards shy of 1000 heading into his third season. TB Brendon Crite was fifth team rusher with 220 yds. Lee Nanney is an All-ACC selection at OT. On defense, the Tigers return LB Jeff Davis, leading tackler with 160 in '80. Five players return on the defensive front, including Jeff Bryant, a 260 lb. tackle. The Tigers appear strong at all positions.

SERIES HISTORY: In the first meeting between the two teams in 1937, UK's Bob Davis had one of his fine days as Kentucky defeated the Gamecocks, 27-7. Davis first brought the hometown fans to their feet with a 49-yard sprint to the six early in the first quarter; then he carried it over from the one four plays later. He had a 40-yard punt return in the second quarter and scored on a 63-yard rush on the second play of the second half. The Wildcats scored two touchdowns in that third quarter and a final one on an 88-yard march by the reserves. The 'Cats had to fight off the Gamecocks three times in the second period. South Carolina finally got on the board with a scoring drive climaxed by Capt. Jack Lyons scoring with less than three minutes remaining in the game. The teams fought to a 14-14 tie in their next meeting at Columbia in 1978.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 17, 1978 (Columbia) UK 14, SC 14—George Rogers, who would win the Heisman Trophy in 1980, carried 19 times for 63 yds., but the Gamecocks got only one touchdown in a game that featured several key UK mistakes, especially in the kicking game. Veteran punter Kevin Kelly twice flubbed his kicks, the second leading to the SC touchdown, an eight-yard pass from Garly Harper to Willie Scott that gave the Gamecocks a 14-7 lead in the third quarter. Carolina got on the board with a 25-yard field goal by Eddie Leopold, who followed that with a 36-yarder a short while later. In the first quarter, UK went the length of the field in 13 plays despite a 15-yard penalty for holding. Key plays were a 15-yard run by Hill and a 16-yard pass from Deaton to Hill on second-and-11 at the UK 30. The final 42 yards were covered on a screen pass from Deaton to Randy Brooks. UK tied the game early in the fourth quarter, beginning an 82-yard march on the ensuing kickoff. Chris Hill set up the TD with a 42-yard scamper before being caught a foot short of the goalline. Two plays later, Randy Brooks dived over and got the score before fumbling. Tom Griggs' conversion kick tied the game with 12:31 left.

1981 OUTLOOK: Coming off their second consecutive eight-win season and post-season bowl appearance, the Gamecocks will have to replace seven starters on offense, five on defense, plus the placekicker. The problem begins at QB, where Coach Jim Carlen must replace a three-year starter. The No. 1 candidate is Gordon Beckham, who missed spring drills because of surgery. The loss of Heisman Trophy TB George Rogers has changed the Tiger offensive preparation to perhaps a four-back offense. Leading the runners is Johnnie Wright, a starter last year who is eighth on Carolina's all-time rushing list with 1,755 yds. Flanker Horace Smith was second-leading receiver last fall, hauling in 26 passes for 455 yds. Three of five starters on the interior offensive line return, but the Gamecocks lost two outstanding veterans. On defense, they lost both starting LBs, three-year regular Chuck Allen from their five-man front, three-year starter Mark Bridges in the DB and two kicking game regulars. However, they have some quality personnel returning at all positions.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats started the series with shutout victories at Baton Rouge in 1949 and in Lexington the following year. The Teams played on a pretty even keel until LSU took command with a 21-0 victory at Lexington in 1957, won the next two in a row, lost to the Wildcats, 3-0, and then won 13 in a row until the 1974 Wildcat squad won, 20-13, in Lexington. The Tigers bounced back, 17-14, the following year at Baton Rouge. Kentucky won the next two games and then lost the past three years.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 18, 1981 (Lexington) UK 17, LSU 10—Kentucky got inside the LSU 10-yard-line three times without punching across a touchdown. The Tigers got on the board at the beginning of the game, driving 69 yards and scoring on a one-yard plunge by Hokie Gajan. On the third play of the second quarter, UK got a 27-yard FG from Tom Griggs, but David Johnson hit a 45-yarder to give LSU a 10-3

lead on the final play of the first half. Randy Jenkins tied the score by plunging off right guard for two after a 35-yard drive midway of the final period. LSU took the kickoff and marched 80 yards in 13 plays. Johnston kicked the extra point for a 17-10 lead with 0:41 remaining.

1981 OUTLOOK: The loss of such stalwarts as Lyman White, Benjy Thibodeaux, George Atiyeh, Chris Williams, Marcus Quinn, Greg LaFleur and Hokie Gajan has created voids that second-year coach Jerry Stovall may find hard to fill. There are only six seniors on the squad; three are starters—CB James Britt, SE Orlando McDaniel and OG Tom Tully, while David Johnson earned a placekicking role late last year. QB Alan Risher was an unknown at this time last year, but has proved his ability during one year of competition. The Tigers lettered six runningbacks in '80, but only Gajan is gone. Jesse Myles, who received a broken leg in the Auburn game and missed the final five games of the season, returns as the top rusher in 1980. James White, a brilliant prospect as a frosh, is back at TE along with McDaniel. The offensive line, anchored by center Mike Gambrell, will be experienced, as will the defense, which has seven starters returning, including LB Tydell Malancon, T Ramsey Dardar and NG Leonard Marshall.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats broke a seven-year drought by defeating the Bulldogs, 12-7, at Athens in 1973 and then lost three in a row before coming back with a convincing 33-0 win at Athens in 1977. The two schools have met almost annually since 1939, with Georgia leading, 23-7-2. During the 22 years that Wally Butts coached the Bulldogs, Georgia won nine of 14 games; however, Butts' four SEC champions managed an average win of only 11 points over UK. Georgia won the past three years.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 25, 1980 (Lexington) UK 0 UG 27—The Kentucky defense "held" Georgia's heralded freshman Herschel Walker to 131 yards on 31 carries, but the eventual national champions had too much offensive balance and defensive strength for the 'Cats. All-America DB Scott Woerner set up the first 'Dog score by intercepting a Randy Jenkins' pass on the UG 39 and returning it to the UK 32. Buck Belue led an eight-play scoring drive that culminated with Walker going off right guard from the six. He carried six of the eight times, gaining 22 of the 32 yards. The

'Dogs scored twice in the second quarter on field goals of 50 and 47 yards by Rex Robinson. They added another TD on a three-yard sweep by Belue in the third quarter and a nine-yard Belue-to-Amp Arnold pass in the final period.

1981 OUTLOOK: While the return of All-America TB Herschel Walker and All-SEC performers QB Buck Belue, DG Eddie Weaver and DT Jimmy Payne give reasons for optimism, the 'Dogs will be hard-pressed to fill the void left by the more than 20 seniors who formed the heart of the '80 national champions. The most devastating losses were in the offensive line, defensive secondary and kicking game. That includes All-America CB Scott Woerner, also the nation's leading punt returner; consensus All-America placekicker Rex Robinson; Tim Morrison, All-SEC and second team All-American OG; All-SEC OT Nat Hudson; All-SEC safety Jeff Hipp, and others. The offensive line will be totally rebuilt. On defense, the interior line will be led by returning starters Weaver, Payne and Tim Crowe. The PK spot will be decided among returnees Stan Charping and Paul Frate and newcomer Kevin Butler.

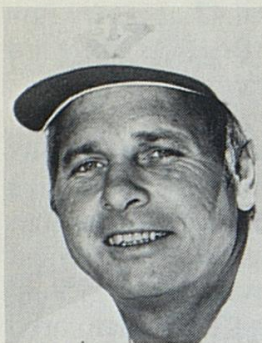

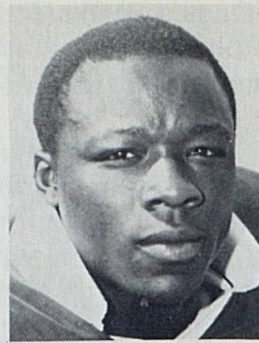

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats hold a 9-3-2 edge in a series that began Oct. 30, 1926, with a 13-13 tie on old Stoll Field. Led by John (Shipwreck) Kelly. Kentucky won 20-6 the following year and did not play Tech again until five years later. The series was resumed in the war years with UK winning, 37-14, at Louisville, and then settling for a 21-21 tie at Roanoke. After a 21-year intermission the series resumed with UK winning, 33-14, at Lexington. Coach Jerry Claiborne, a UK alumnus, brought his team to Lexington in 1966 to beat the Kentucky team that was coached by his old teammate and friend, Charlie Bradshaw. The Gobblers won, 24-14, the following year to tie the series. Kentucky has been on a winning streak since then, defeating the Gobblers seven games in a row.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 14, 1978 (Blacksburg) UK 28, VPI 0—Kentucky scored on two long scoring strikes by QB Larry McCrimmon, plus a lightning-strikes-again

punt return of 88 yards by Larry Carter at Lane Stadium. The 'Cats had four TDs, three missed points, a field goal and a successful point after attempt. They open the second quarter with a 45-yard TD pass from McCrimmon to Henry Parks. Carter had his punt return TD in the third quarter and McCrimmon's bomb to Hill came in the final quarter. Substitute QB Mike Shutt tossed a five-yard scoring pass to Robert Hawkins as time ran out. The Wildcat shutout was preserved by a pair of goal-line stands, a timely interception by Carter, and a Tech field goal attempt that sailed wide to the left from the 38-yard-line.

1980 OUTLOOK: Led by talented DE Robert Brown and TB Cyrus Lawrence, Tech enters the season with great optimism. Although 19 graduating seniors are lost from the 1980 squad that finished 8-3 and played in the Peach Bowl, Coach Bill Dooley has 13 starters returning, eight on offense and five on defense. A major problem is the defensive backfield, which was depleted by the loss of four seniors. In addition to the 6-foot-2, 237 lb. Brown, other bright spots on defenses are LBs Ashley Lee and Mike Johnson. Offensively, Steve Casey, a two-and-half-year starter at QB, should be headed for a banner season. He passed for 1,119 and 13 TDs last season. Lawrence set a school rushing record at TB with 1,221 yds. and wound up eighth nationally. FBs Scott Dovel and Tony Paige return to add punch to the offensive line. Kicking game is a question mark.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Commodores first met on the gridiron in 1896 in a series that is one of the South's oldest from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. The record stood solidly in Vandy's favor in the early going as the Commodores registered 12 shutouts in the first 20 years. Kentucky finally got into the win column in 1939 and since that time has won 20 of the last 31 games. However, the Commodores still lead the series 27-22-4 and hope this year to end a five-game Wildcat winning streak.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 8, 1981 (Lexington) UK 31, VU 10—On their initial possession of the game, the Wildcats drove 57 yards in seven plays, with Larry McCrimmon throwing complete to Greg Wimberly for 42 yards to set up an eventual one-yard plunge by Randy Brooks. The Wildcats got on the board again midway of the second quarter when McCrimmon threw a three-yard strike to Jim Campbell to

cap a nine-play, 40-yard drive. Kentucky drove the opening kickoff to the Vandy 19 and settled for a 37-yard FG by Tom Griggs. Vandy got on the board with an eight-play, 39-yard scoring drive, with QB Whit Taylor going over from the three. The Commodores cut the margin to 17-10 on a 42-yard FG by Mike Woodard, but UK came back and scored on both its next two possessions on an eight-yard pass from McCrimmon to Charlie Jackson and a two-yard end sweep by Randy Brooks.

1981 OUTLOOK: Vanderbilt counts five offensive starters and seven defensive regulars among 32 returning lettermen, not including Marcus Williams, who has been switched from TB to CB, or Karl Jordan, who has moved from OT to DT. All-American candidate Ken Hammond, 6-4, 278, a runnerup for the Jacobs Blocking Trophy last year, keys the offensive line from his quick guard spot. Whit Taylor, a heady junior, had an outstanding spring at QB. Letterman Norman Jordan finished spring drills as the No. 1 TB. Junior college transfer Ernie Goolsby (6-1, 229) gives Vandy a big FB. Senior Wamon Buggs ranked second in the SEC in receiving last year (37 catches 448 yds.), but will have to fight off JuCo transfer Gino Wynter at SE. The Commodores defense will be built around MLB Andrew Coleman, 6-1, 225 lb. senior who has led the team in tackles the past two years. Senior Tim Moore is the only returning veteran in the defensive line. The secondary, where three freshmen started last fall, is expected to show considerable improvement with sophomore Leonard Coleman anchoring the group.

SERIES HISTORY: A Gator victory last season cut the Wildcat lead to 16-15-0 in a series that began with a 52-0 UK victory at Lexington in 1917. Kentucky held a 12-4 advantage through 1956, with Florida managing only a pair of victories prior to 1952. An unusual moment occurred in 1955 when Delmar Hughes, Wildcat QB sidelined earlier in the game with a broken nose, came off the bench and kicked a 20-yard FG to give UK a 10-7 decision. A year later, Lou Michaels kicked a rain-soaked ball 34 yards with two seconds remaining in the first half to put the Wildcats ahead to stay. Since 1956, Florida has defeated UK 10 out of 14 games. The 1974 Wildcats defeated the Sugar Bowl-bound Gators, 41-24, in a game that included a school record 52-yard FG by UK's John Pierce. The Wildcats have won three of the last five games.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 15, 1980 (Lexington) UK 15, UF 17—Kentucky went ahead on a 20-yard field goal by Tom Griggs midway of the first quarter, but the Gators took the ensuing kickoff and marched 79 yards in 11 plays, with FB James

Jones scoring from the one. Griggs kicked a 36-yard FG early in the second quarter for a 7-6 UK lead, but again Florida took the kickoff and marched 85 yards in 11 plays, with freshman QB Wayne Peace hitting Young for a 15-yard TD. The Gators took a 14-16 halftime lead. Griggs got his third FG of the game, a 40-yard strike, on UK's first possession on the first half. The score stood at 14-9 until Charlie Jackson went around left end for six yards after Chuck Jones had recovered a Florida fumble. UK's try for two failed. Florida won the game on a 34-yard field goal by Brian Clark with 0:06 remaining.

1981 OUTLOOK: Florida anticipates an improved offensive unit in 1981 but heavy losses off the defensive team will have to be replaced in order for the Gators to continue the climb started in 1980. The quarterback situation is solid for the first time in years with Wayne Peace and Bob Hewko both having proven they are capable performers. Fullback James Jones, split end Tyrone Young and tight end Chris Faulkner are also top-rate athletes. Coach Charley Pell is hoping for improved play in the offensive line, and anticipates it. The defense, however, must come up with an almost entire new front seven, plus strengthen a secondary which was last in the SEC in 1980. The kicking game appears solid.

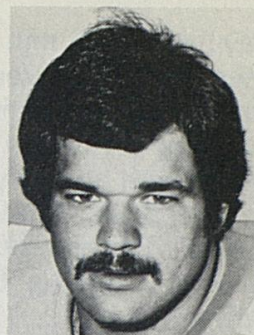

SERIES HISTORY: The Vols hold a 45-21-9 edge in a series that is among the oldest football rivalries in the nation, dating back to a 56-0 Wildcat victory Oct. 21, 1893, in Knoxville. Except for three war years (1917-18, 1943) the schools have met annually on the gridiron. The Wildcats pretty well held their own in the early games but the tide began to turn after the 1925 season, when the best the Wildcats could do was tie UT twice in the next nine games. After UK won, 27-0, in 1935, Tennessee put together 12 straight victories, fought UK to a 0-0 tie and then won three more and tied one before the Wildcats also won three in a row in 1957-58-59 and tied UT in 1960, but the Vols won 13 of the next 15 before UK won in 1976 and 1977. Tennessee has won the three games played since that date.

LAST MEETING: The Wildcats made a game of it at Neyland Stadium for a half, but then everything collapsed as the Vols found an offensive punch that they had been lacking all season. Willie Gault ran the opening kickoff 92 yards for a TD, but the 'Cats didn't fold. On their third possession of that initial quarter, they marched 74 yards in 11 plays, with Larry McCrimmon sneaking over from the one. Three pass

plays of 17, 26 and 13 yards from McCrimmon to Jim Campbell highlighted the drive. Freshman Vernon Phillips plunged over from the one early in the second quarter, but UK came right back and drove 80 yards, with Terry Henry sweeping from the seven. On UK's next possession, Randy Brooks, who had missed two games with an injury, came in and fumbled on his first play. Tennessee recovered on the UK 28, drove for a TD and led 21-14 at the end of the first half. Tennessee scored on its first four possessions of the second half and had its final drive stopped on the UK 15. The 'Cats ran a total of 19 plays, including four punts, in the second half.

1981 OUTLOOK: Coach Johnny Majors has two big rebuilding areas in his defense—the secondary, where he lost three starters and two key substitutes, and at linebacker, where he lost both starters. On offense, the Vols lost two tackles and a guard. The QB post fluctuated between Steve Alatoree and Jeff Olszewski last season, but Alatoree emerged to post big victories over UK and Vanderbilt. Foremost among a fine group of receivers is Anthony Hancock, a senior who caught 33 passes, averaging almost 18 yards a catch, in '80. He also carried 17 times for 143 yards on end-around plays. Willie Gault, who caught 14 passes for 240 yds. and ran back three KO's for TDs, also returns. The defensive secondary is led by Bill Bates, a heavily acclaimed soph last season. Lee Jenkins and Carlton Peoples gained some playing time last season. UK fans breathed a sigh of relief when placekicker Alan Duncan split the uprights for the last time against the Wildcats last year. He will be hard to replace.

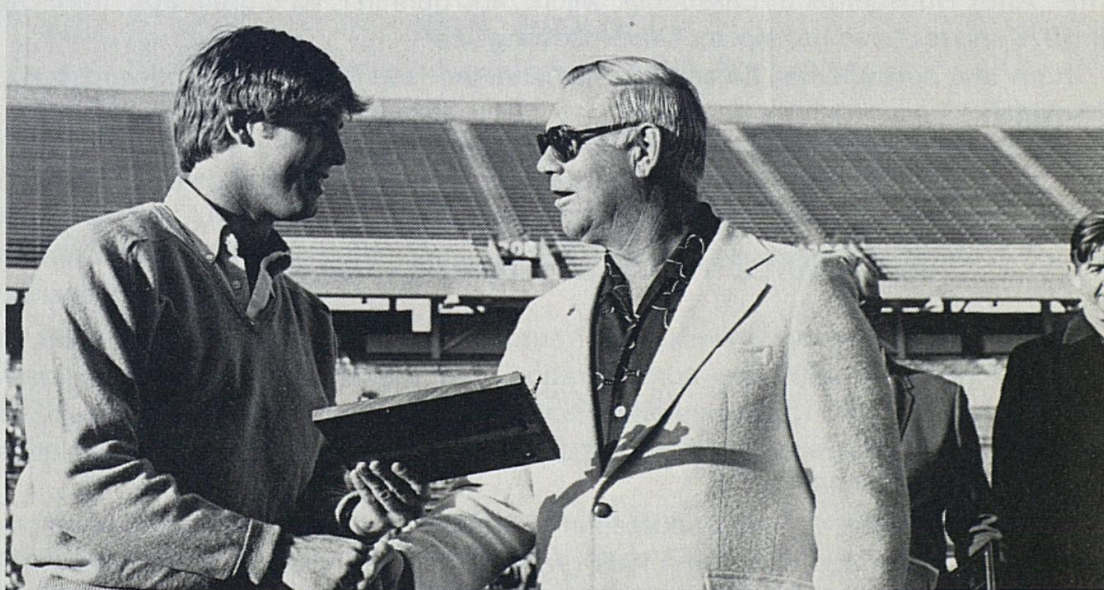

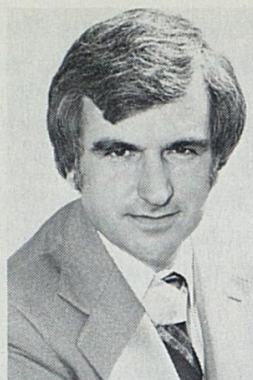

RUSSELL RICE Sports Information Staff Director

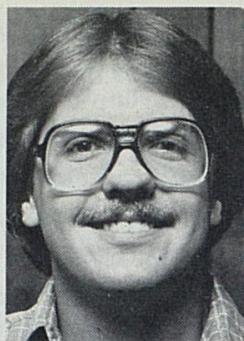

Footnote A — Although numerical scoring had not yet been introduced in Rugby football, either here or in Great Britain, when Kentucky and Transylvania (then known as Kentucky University) played their series in 1881, persons in charge of the games obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning values to the various scoring plays. Records never existed and men who played in the games are now deceased. All we can do is accept the scores printed in the newspapers and surmise that a touchdown perhaps counted 1/4 point and that a goal or an end-kick (a punt into the modern end zone) counted 1. That seems logical, since in the ratio scoring of that day, a touchdown was worth one-quarter of a goal. The end-kick, a British heritage, undoubtedly was introduced because all realized that green players would score few goals, if any.

Footnote B — The football rules took no official position on the score of a forfeited game until 1908 when it was pegged at 1-0 to make it differnt from any other score possible in the game. By common consent, forfeited games prior to that were entered into the records as victories by 6-0 for the offended team—everywhere, that is, except in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, predecessor of the Southern Conference and the Southeastern Conference. In the S.I.A.A. the 6-0 practice was followed unless the offended team had a greater number of points. In that case, the offended team won by the greater score to nothing. Thus, Kentucky's forfeiture to Central University in 1900 is 6-0, since Kentucky led by 11-0 at the time. Kentucky led Cumberland by 12-11 in 1905 when the Tennesseans forfeited. The Blue and White, under S.I.A.A. rules, gets credit for a 12-0 victory.

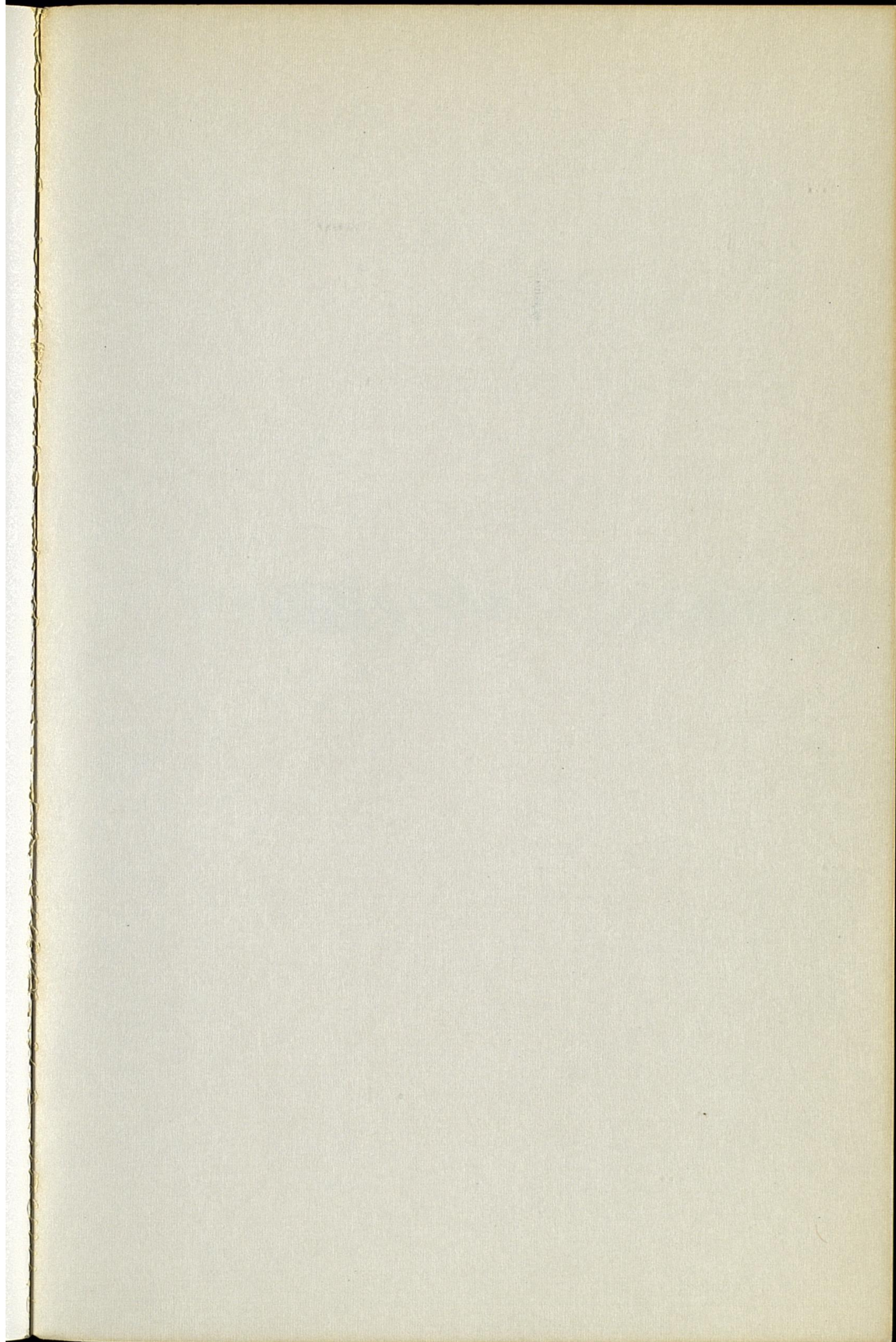

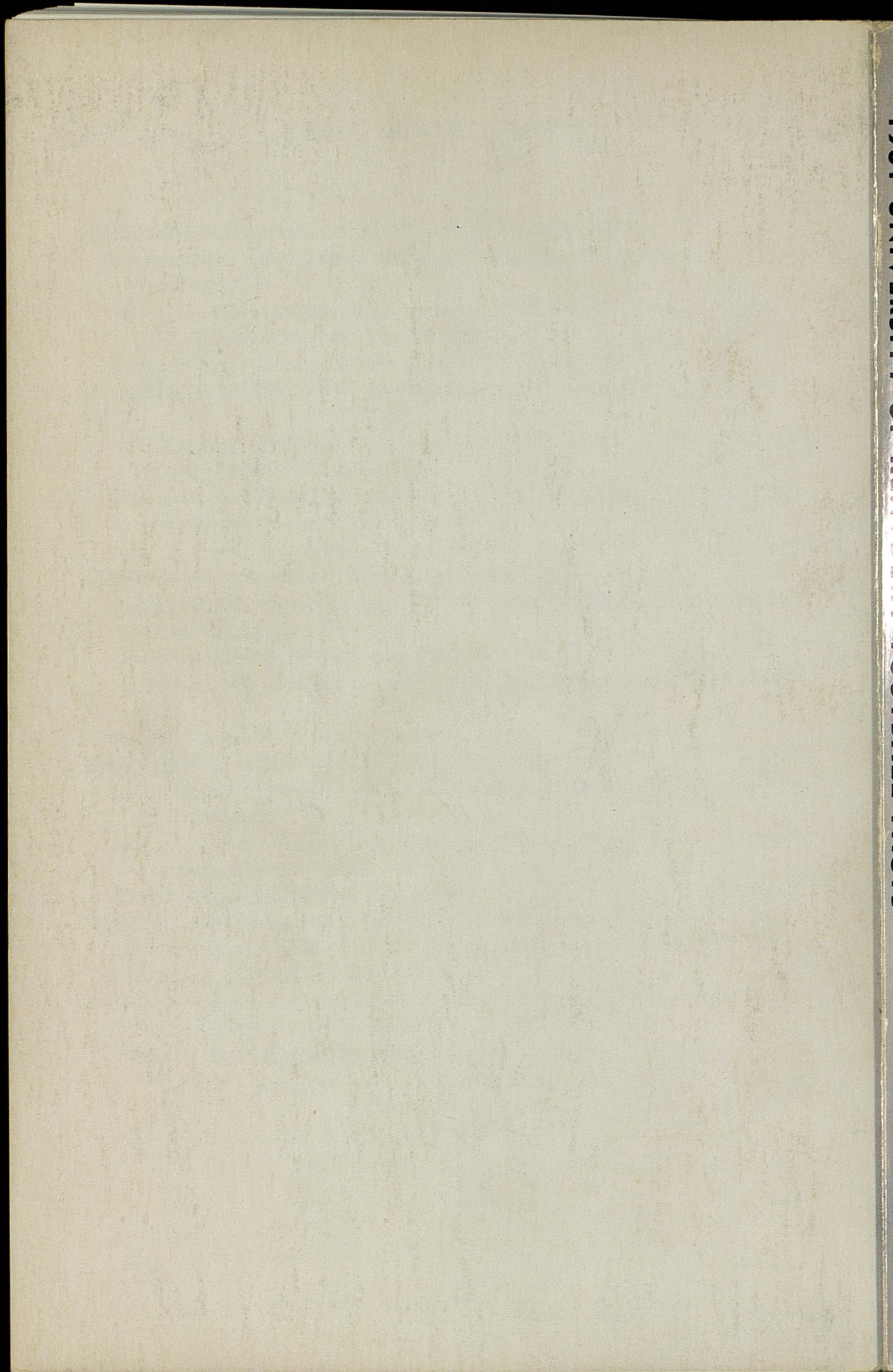

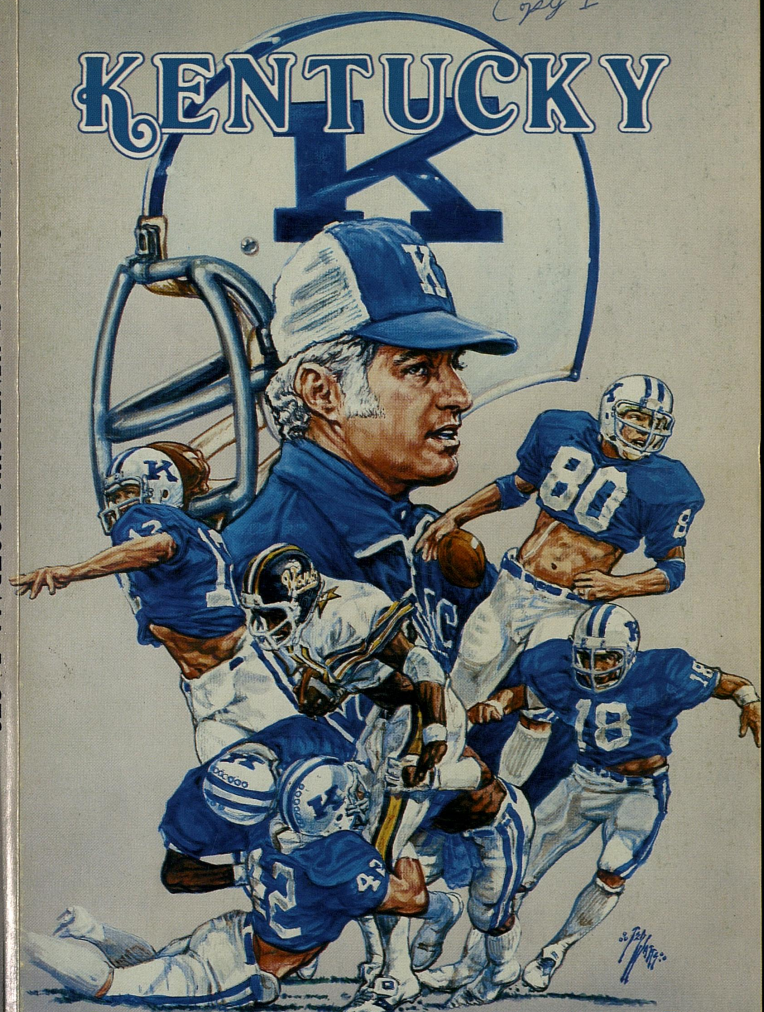
