## Musical chairs

### Bugle corps moves to Lexington from Alabama, gets new start

A different beat marched into Lexington yesterday.

The Southwind Drum and Bugle Corps, a group of 128 musicians ages 15 to 21 who perform and compete throughout the world, announced its relocation from Montgomery, Ala., to Lexington.

The move will allow UK students, who have traveled across the country to participate in such corps, to play without having to travel nearly as far for weekend camps.

"The whole traveling as-

pect sometimes keeps people from going different corps," said Mark Hunter, a music education sophomore who travels to Chicago to play percussion in a different corps.

"I have to travel here and back ... a full weekend once a month," he said.

Several UK students and other Lexington residents traveled from Kentucky to play in the corps when it was in Montgomery, said Brett Owens, a UK doctoral student in educational policy studies and evaluation, who does consulting for the corps.

The group is still accept-

ing applications for the 150 positions in its December camp. The corps had already received about 300, he said.

The corps will hold weekend camps once a month during the winter and then perform all summer, Owens said.

Next summer, the group will perform more than 35 times in front of audiences that range from 2,000 to 20,000 people. The corps plans to perform in Lexington in the 4th of July parade and on several days in mid-July.

"When they're on the road, their schedule more or less will be ride the bus to a location, practice all day, put on a uniform and perform, ride the bus to a location, practice all day," Owens said.

When Madison Drum Corps Association took over the management of the corps earlier this year, the group decided to move the corps to a more central location in the country.

Lexington was chosen instead of Louisville and Knoxville, Tenn., in part because of UK students and other Lexington youth who have participated in the corps. Access to major interstate highways and its central location were also factors.

Southwind will bring 7,000 to 15,000 spectators to Lexington for an annual Drum Corps Midwest Competition. In addition, six to eight corps will be participating. A DCM World

## Putting money into the brains

Investing in the future: Higher ed group developing new scholarships for grads

Kentucky ranks 48th in the country in the percentage of adults with a bachelor's degree or higher.

Less than half of Kentucky's high school graduates enter college the fall semester following their graduation from high school, far below the national average of 67 percent.

Gov. Paul Patton shared these statistics - what he called "sobering evidence" - at the Governor's Conference on Postsecondary Education Trusteeship on Sept. 27.

The "sobering evidence" proved that Kentucky needed to encourage more graduates to seek higher education. This has prompted the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) to develop what is known as the Kentucky Education Excellence Scholarship (KEES).

The scholarship awards high school students with a grade-point average of 2.5 with automatic scholarships to Kentucky colleges or technical schools.

If students continue to make good grades in college, the scholarship can be retained. Students who are enrolled in high school for the 1998-99 school year will be the first students who earn scholarships based on their high school performance.

Members of the graduating class of 1999 will be eligible for scholarships based on the senior year GPA and bonus awards based on their ACT score.

High school juniors who graduate in 2000 will receive scholarships based on their GPA for their junior and senior years and a bonus based on their highest ACT score. Grades earned before the 1998-1999 school year aren't considered.

Students must have an annual 2.5 GPA for the base amount of the scholarship and a 15 or better ACT score or equivalent SAT score for the bonus award.

Amounts are subject to future adjustment based on availability of funds. Bonus awards of up to \$300 are given to those with a 28 or above ACT score. Those who score a minimum amount of at least 15 also receive a bonus of \$21.

Students do not even have to apply for the scholarship. Each high school will provide information about eligible students to the Kentucky Department of Education who will then give the student data to KHEAA. KHEAA will send award notifica-

## Students incensed over death

Beating death of Wyoming student prompts hard reactions from UK students, group

So great are the implications of the crime committed against University of Wyoming student Matthew Shepard, UK students have been not only shocked and saddened, but also deeply touched.

Shepard, a political science freshman, was beaten and left hanging on a fence until a passer-by found him and took him to the hospital, where he later died from his injuries. The Albany County Sheriff's office would not comment on whether Shepard, who was gay, was singled out for the attack because of his sexual orientation, according to the Branding Iron, the student

newspaper at the University of Wyoming. Regardless, UK students are reacting strongly to this crime.

"I think it's disgusting that anybody would kill somebody just because of the way they led their lives," said Stephanie Bakies, a family resource management and consumer studies senior at UK. Bakies also said the idea of killing someone just because of an individual's choice was particularly frightening.

"If people start succumbing to that notion, everyone could just start going around and killing each other," she said.

As the world moves into a new millennium, it is critical for people to come together as

a diverse community, said Joshua Worthington, the president of UK Lambda, a campus organization for gay, lesbian and bisexual students.

"What people don't understand they fear, and what they fear, they attack," he said. "This petty bigotry has got to stop."

Though many students think either enacting new hate-crime legislation or strengthening laws already in place would be a good move, some don't see the need for a separate hate-crime law.

"If you beat somebody and they die, it doesn't matter if they're black, white, gay or whatever," said Paul Atkisson, a Russian and Eastern studies junior.

But Worthington said more hate-crime legislation would provide gay groups equal footing. "It wouldn't provide special rights; what it's promoting

is equal rights," he said.

One student said he thought people such as the alleged abusers of Shepard follow a dangerous philosophy. People sometimes tend to look at an individual's lifestyle and assume that he or she is a bad person because of it, said Todd Harrett, an undeclared freshman.

UK Lambda will be holding a candlelight vigil tonight at 8 p.m. in the Free Speech Area behind the Student Center. "It will be a chance for us to remember Matthew Shepard and pay him respect as well as show everyone that we as a community are not going to tolerate this type of violence in our city," Worthington said.

"It will be a chance for people to voice their feelings about what has happened."

William Wharton, the director of the Lexington Human Rights Commission will be among the guest speakers.

## Light caused building fire

A fire in the UK Police Department Monday night was started by the ballast of a fluorescent light, said Lexington fire officers.

None of the six to eight people inside the building, at the corner of Rose Street and Euclid Avenue, were injured, said Maj. Jim Wells.

The fire that started around 9:40 p.m. when paper in the basement of the building caught on fire, said Maj. Michael Bossert of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Fire Department.

Fluorescent lights generally do not get hot, but certain parts can become very hot when they get old, Bossert said.

"The papers were stored too close to the light ballast," he said. "It also could have been that they've never stacked stuff there and ... didn't realize the ballast got hot."

Firefighters contained the fire in about five minutes.

## Female police officer killed

**HARRODSBURG** — The only female police officer in town history was killed in an exchange of gunfire outside an automotive parts factory early yesterday morning.

Officer Regina Woodward Nickles, 45, was shot twice while investigating a report that a man was crawling around the parking lot at Trim Masters Inc., which makes car-seat covers.

The suspect, John Paul Works, 22, had been awaiting trial on August charges that he attacked his roommate with a golf club, held a gun to his head and threatened to kill him.

Works was hospitalized in fair condition at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington after being shot by Officer Eric Barkman.

Nickles, a mother of two and a stepmother, was the Republican nominee for Mercer County sheriff on the November ballot. Nickles was the first female officer killed in the line of duty in Kentucky, authorities said.

## Teen sentenced in rape case

**LAS VEGAS** — A former high school honor student appealed for forgiveness yesterday before he was sentenced to life in prison without parole for molesting and killing a 7-year-old girl in a casino bathroom.

Jeremy Strohmeyer, 20, read a 22-page, typed statement detailing events of the night in what was then the Primadonna Casino in Primm, saying he was in a "drunken and drugged haze" when he took Sherrice Iverson into a stall in a women's restroom, sexually assaulted her and then strangled her to "stop her pain."

"Can you imagine the fear, the panic, the sickness that rushes over you as you realize that somehow, you have done something to this little girl to cause her to be dying, yet you don't remember anything?" Strohmeyer said. "This is what happened to me."

## Firefighters' death explored

**WASHINGTON** — Money problems and "a lack of attention to detail" are hampering the District of Columbia's fire department and contributed to the death of a firefighter, the department's chief said Wednesday.

The shortcomings were among more than 30 departmental problems listed in a report Fire Chief Donald Edwards released on the death of Fire Sgt. John Carter. Edwards ordered an internal investigation after the 15-year department veteran died Oct. 24, 1997, in the basement of a burning grocery store, the first district firefighter to die on duty in 13 years.

Carter drowned after he fell through a floor into the basement and his colleagues kept pour-

ing in water. The report said the glass on the front of his emergency mask slipped away from the rubber seal, and he was found with water in the mask up to his eyes.

## Officials need help

**WASHINGTON** — Federal officials pleaded for the public's help to find Eric Robert Rudolph as they added major charges — the 1996 bombing at the Olympics and two other Atlanta attacks — against the man who has eluded a massive search for nine months.

Attorney General Janet Reno told a Wednesday news conference the complaint charging Rudolph with the Olympic blast and the 1997 bombings of a gay bar and an abortion clinic was filed with a federal court. New evidence against him was kept sealed to protect "the safety of witnesses who have come forward," she said.

Two people died and scores were injured by the six bombs Rudolph is charged with planting. "Eric Rudolph is on the run" from earlier charges that he bombed a Birmingham, Ala., abortion clinic Jan. 29, Reno said. "We're not going to rest until we bring him to justice."

She re-emphasized the \$1 million reward posted when Rudolph was put on the FBI's 10 most wanted list last May.

## McDougal witness a no show

**SANTA MONICA, Calif.** — Attorneys in Susan McDougal's embezzlement trial angrily clashed Wednesday over evidence that requires testimony from a witness who refuses to come to court.

The dispute centers on Kate Bell, who was the bookkeeper for conductor Zubin Mehta and his wife, Nancy, before Mrs. McDougal took the job. Defense and prosecution lawyers both acknowledge that Ms. Bell is refusing to come to the courthouse and will not return phone calls.

Deputy District Attorney Jeffrey Semow said Ms. Bell is desperate not to testify — although he does not know why.

"She will say or do anything to avoid having to come to court," Semow said.

## Polka king Yankovic dies

**TAMPA, Fla.** — Frankie Yankovic, the accordion-playing Polka King from Cleveland who had folks rolling out the barrel and asking who stole the kishka for generations, died at his home Wednesday. He was 88.

Yankovic wowed dance-hall crowds throughout the Midwest for more than 60 years with his rollicking, toe-tapping performances, won the first Grammy ever awarded for polka in 1986 and more recently reached a whole new generation by teaming up with TV's Drew Carey and "Weird Al" Yankovic, who was thought to be a distant relative.

"His appeal, it was the same thing as Elvis Presley," said Joe Miskulin, a Nashville recording artist who started playing with Yankovic at age 13.

In 1991 and 1992, Southwind won back-to-back Division II World Championships. In 1995, the corps placed 17th in the Division I World Championships.

The corps will become a member of the DCM, one of the best drum and bugle corps regional circuits in the nation.

# Stickler sticks to scoring role

Wildcat forward looks for openings, receives passes from teammates and closes on goals

A target forward: The player who gets into the open near the goal and takes the crossing passes from a speeding midfielder or wing and eludes the defense to put the ball in net.

Michael Stickler is a target forward.

"People play around me near the goal," he said. "They distribute the ball to me."

And Stickler does the rest. He sinks the goals.

It is a skill that nabbed him the Mid-American Conference Player of the Week award last week after a two-goal, three-assist game against Western Michigan.

"I was there at the right time to finish," Stickler said.

The UK forward struggled early in the season. He went 13 games and more than 14 shots on goal without a score. As the season progressed, Stickler's role, and his understanding of that role, evolved.

"He has gotten a little meaner around the goal," assistant coach Jeff Chaney said.

Chaney said the award was a surprise, not because Stickler is incapable, but because of his scoring slump.

While he was unable to finish many of the opportunities provided during his slump, Stickler said, the opportunities were there.

Stickler broke out of his

drought against Marshall, and has scored four goals over the last four MAC games. He assisted on the game-winner against Marshall on Oct. 2, and sunk the game winner against Western Michigan on Oct. 4.

"Early in the season he was letting people push him around," Chaney said. "Now people are having a hard time containing him."

In a streak-breaking, heart-breaking loss to Akron on Oct. 11, Stickler shined. He dominated in the air, winning every header he competed for, Chaney said.

"I have a new attitude," Stickler said. "I'm just going out to have fun."

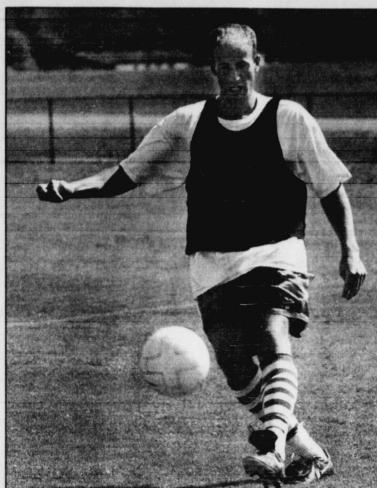
The change in attitude has taken the pressure off the UK forward and enabled him to concentrate on scoring goals.

Two goals have always dominated Stickler's thinking. His first goal was to play soccer for a strong college team. That goal was accomplished when he started for UK.

His second goal is to play professional soccer. Stickler's favorite team, the one he dreams of playing for, is Major League Soccer's Columbus Crew.

"If it happened, it would be great," Stickler said. "I'm not banking on it, but it is always a thought."

Stickler reached his first goal without trouble and if he keeps playing with the fire of

his last few games, that second goal may not be out of reach.

"He's hot," Chaney said.

Stickler does not live for the accolades of the fans or for trophies like the MAC Player-of-the-Week.

"I do what it takes to help the team, to win," he said.

His importance to the team is apparent: They call to him on the field.

The team knows he is a power striker and with the new attitude he is showing, the team passes the ball to him with growing confidence.

"He is playing well within our system," Chaney said.

The coaching staff will be looking to Stickler more in the

upcoming battles in the MAC. The team faces off against the number two team in the nation, Indiana, at the UK Soccer Complex on Oct. 21.

The game promises to be a hard fought and physical. Stickler's dominance in the air will be a key factor, Chaney said.

The MAC Tournament, with the first two games played at the UK Soccer Complex on Nov. 6-8, will provide Stickler with ample opportunity to showcase his teamwork and his finishing skills.

"It will be an interesting tournament," Stickler said, "especially since it's on our own turf. That is a big advantage."

## Tiger Stadium is one of SEC's most daunting backyards, perfect place for program arrival

Welcome to the jungle. Don't forget to enjoy your trip.

When UK (4-2, 1-2 in the Southeastern Conference) invades Baton Rouge this Saturday night, they will find an angry and dangerous pack of Bayou Tigers and the most hostile crowd most of the Cats will have ever seen.

"It's a lot like Florida," senior defensive lineman Marvin Major said. "The crowd will be riled up, throwing shit, like water and ice."

Major, who missed the Cats' last trip to Louisiana in 1996, isn't exaggerating. The LSU fans have a reputation of being less than hospitable to their guests, even to the point where it isn't uncommon to see various objects hurtling towards the field from the bleachers above. Senior center Jason Watts, who did travel to Death Valley in 1996, said the Swamp in Florida can't hold a candle to the 80,000-seat Tiger Stadium.

"It's louder than Florida by a lot," Watts said. "It's the loudest place I've ever been. The fans are just crazy. They party pretty hard before they come

into the games."

But not all the Cats are exactly sure what gives LSU (3-2, 1-2) such a home-field advantage.

"It's a lot like Florida," senior wide receiver Craig Yeast said. "What separates it from Florida is that the fans are a lot louder. I know it's hostile, but I don't know if those fans are drinking or what."

It doesn't matter if the fans have been drinking or not, when Saturday nights roll around on the Bayou, it's time to get raucous. So raucous, that several years ago, a nearby seismology laboratory registered a minor earthquake after the Tigers scored a touchdown.

For UK to emerge from the jungle unscathed, it must take the crowd out of the ball game, planting a seed of doubt in their minds, Major said.

"We've gotta be prepared," Major said. "The biggest part is focusing and not letting the crowd take us out of our game. At Florida we kinda took the crowd out of the game early on. They were worried that we could win."

UK's experience in the Swamp should help the younger guys deal with the noise and have a crowd like LSU's can create, Yeast said.

"From the Florida game, we have a pretty good idea (of the noise)," Yeast said. "The only difference is, LSU will be a little louder."

Watts agreed. "The younger guys are ready for it," Watts said. "After Florida, they are ready. We won't have to say much until right before game time, then we'll tell them it will be loud."

To combat the noise problem, UK will practice with loud speakers in the background on Thursday to try and simulate the experience. Major said he hopes the practice will help, but knows the Cats must be prepared to play under the duress.

"(The noise) is rough," Major said. "I know on about 10 plays against Florida we couldn't hear the play, so we just were just like 'Damn, play base D'. For this week, we have our base defense and if we don't get the call, we'll just play like hell."

The Cats know a win over mighty LSU in Baton Rouge, something UK has accomplished only four times in 25 attempts, would send their dreams of playing in a major bowl to a whole new level.

"(A win) would be tremendous," Watts said. "It would be a turning point in our season and help us in our bowl quest."

Yeast is confident in the Cats. "It's a win we can get."

# Madness ready to rumble

Tubby Smith's second Midnight Madness kicks off Friday at Memorial Coliseum with professional wrestling theme

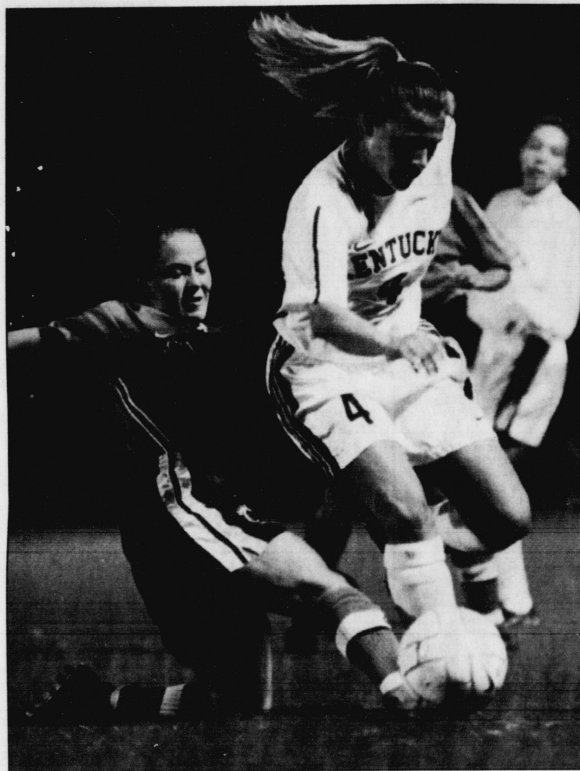

Ladies and gentlemen, let's get ready for "The Main Event." For thousands of people across the Bluegrass State, Friday at midnight marks the greatest day of the year. Is it Christmas in October? Bah humbug. Is it your wedding anniversary? Nope. When the clock strikes 12 Friday night, fans can stop crossing off the days on their calendar, because UK Basketball officially begins this weekend. The Madness is here. The theme to this year's Midnight Madness will be "The Main Event," as the Cats hit the practice floor at Memorial Coliseum, pro-wrestling style. UK Media Relations Associate Di-

rector Brooks Downing said this year's team has taken a liking to the theme. It should come as no surprise, though. After all, senior forward Scott Padgett did list WCW Wrestling as one of his favorite TV shows in last year's media guide and has made no secret of his career aspirations as a professional wrestler. "We've never had the players take to a theme like they have to this one before," Downing said. If the past is any indication, Friday's Madness should have its fair share of surprises. In '95, seniors Tony Delk and Walter McCarty dressed up like the caped crusaders to support the theme of "Cat Fan Forever." And last year, coach Tubby Smith

made his appearance on top of the score board with a spotlight shining up on him. Rick Pitino once came riding in on a Harley. Like last year, tickets were given out a week before hand to make it easier on the fans. So if you lack a ticket, don't bet on getting in. Some 7,000 tickets were distributed in 45 minutes last Saturday, Downing said, and about 100 fans were turned away. While having fans camped out and lined around the block until the night of the event looked good, Downing said, the new system has worked out for the better. "We felt like C.M. Newton wanted to make it easier for those who support their high school football," Downing said. "Our approach is to make this as fan friendly as possible." Now that fans have their tickets ahead of time, they can show up just be-

fore the event and walk in. The doors will open tomorrow at 10:30 p.m., and festivities start at 11 p.m. The Cats take the floor at midnight, and they'll run some drills and scrimmage for about 45 minutes. If you missed getting tickets, the Madness will be broadcast state-wide on UKTV beginning at 11:30 p.m. This year's hosts will be Sam Dick and Barbara Bailey of WKYT-TV. Saturday marks the day Division-I schools can officially conduct team practice. Midnight Madness is a UK tradition, dating back to 1983 when coach Joe B. Hall started it. "(It's) the real first chance to get all 14 players together as we set out to win another title," Downing said. Yes, it's basketball season in the Bluegrass, and all is right with the world. UK's theme has only one question: Are you ready to rumble?

## Losing streak ends

UK overcomes tough stretch for 3-0 victory against Evansville; gunning for SEC wins

It's gone. The black cloud of a three-game losing streak for the UK women's soccer team has dissipated. Now, after a 2-0 victory on the road Tuesday against Evansville, a new streak has emerged: a winning one. The win over the Purple Aces, following a win over Cincinnati at home Friday night, propelled UK (5-5-2) back to the .500 domain. The Cats took just four shots to down the Aces for their first win in Evansville. Freshman Aimee Brown tacked on the first goal at the 19th minute of the first half off an assist from Jennifer McMaster. After UK went up 1-0, the nets for both sides were quiet for nearly the rest of the game. But junior Brooke Hergesell wouldn't let the game end before scoring her first goal of the year. McMaster earned her sec-

ond assist and UK went home with the shutout. "They were both really big wins," Hergesell said. "Both puts us in good standing for the NCAA tournament." The new streak officially started with the win over Evansville, but the first task was to end the old streak by beating Cincinnati on Friday. The much anticipated UC match didn't disappoint UK's fans. A 1-1 tie at the end of regulation sent UK into overtime for the fifth time this year. Overtime had meant shaky ground for the Cats, having only picked up one win in four OT appearances this season. Sophomore Jaime Dellbringe, however, secured a more stable hold for the Cats. Dellbringe's first goal of the year with just three minutes left in the OT period, capped a 2-1 victory over the Bearcats. The game had the typical feel of a UK-UC matchup, ac-

ording to Hergesell. "It was mentally as well as physically challenging," she said. "It's such an emotional game when we play them." Senior Kate Erdei put UK on the board first with her first goal of the year, one of three UK players to score her first goal in the past week. Tina Matlock, UC's leading scorer, picked up her 10th goal of the year to even the side, but it would be the Bearcats' only goal. Erdei was delighted to earn her first goal, but says the scoring distribution helps the whole team. "It's good to have more of a team effort," she said. "It's a confidence booster." Confidence that the Cats will need for their next four Southeastern Conference games, three of which are on the road. The next game kicks off at 4:00 p.m. at Georgia. Then, after its last home game against Vanderbilt, UK is back on the road for the last two regular season games. "If (the two wins) builds camaraderie," Hergesell said. "Road games are harder to play, so it was good to get these wins."

# Leaders praise act

Education officials, students pleased about paying less back to U.S. government

Education leaders are praising the new Higher Education Act that President Bill Clinton signed into law last week. The new law, signed on Oct. 7, lowered the interest rate on federal student loan balances almost a full percentage point.

"This will save students hundreds of dollars a year," said Jamie Poeschel, legislative director of the U.S. Student Association, a lobbying group, in a statement. Not surprisingly, students like the idea of having less to pay back.

"I like anything that reduces loan rates, because I wouldn't be able to go to college without the loans," said Tricia Lewis, a communications senior, who pays all of her tuition with the help of student loans.

Some restrictions in the act could actually hurt graduating students and alumni who are attempting to consolidate

their loans under the new rate.

"The window in which students with multiple loans can consolidate those loans under the new rate will be closed after four months," said Ivan Frishberg, a higher education advocate for the U.S. Public Interest Research Group.

This means alumni or students graduating this semester must consolidate their loans by Jan. 31, 1999 if they want to benefit from the lower interest rate.

The new act also includes a freedom of information provision pertaining to campus crime reporting. Most public schools were already required to provide limited crime information when requested, but the act made full disclosure a standard requirement for both public and private schools.

The provision requires campus officials to keep logs of campus crimes, and the logs must be made available to interested parties within two business days of filing a report.

Also new is a requirement

about statistics on hate crimes. These crimes must now be categorized by type of prejudice.

The provision does allow campus officials to withhold information if it would jeopardize an investigation or the confidentiality of a victim. The school must provide "clear and convincing evidence" that the release of the information would jeopardize the investigation or confidentiality.

Further changes made by the act render a student ineligible to receive federal student aid if convicted of possessing or selling drugs.

It also includes terms to cancel a portion of a student loan debt if a student enters the teaching profession and serves in a low-income school for at least three years.

The act likewise forgives student loan debt for child care providers.

The act, which had been debated in Congress for the last two years, had been put on hold because of the Lewinsky scandal. The original act was passed in 1995, and is new only in the sense that it is reviewed and amended about every five years.

KHEAA. KHEAA will send award notifications after the end of each school year.

The students must also be full-time students to receive the maximum scholarship. Those attending part-time receive a proportionate amount.

Biology senior Heather Stockdale thinks the program was too long in coming.

"The program will definitely benefit incoming freshman, but everyone that has been working toward a degree for years is cheated," she said.

"I was salutatorian, and I didn't get anything. What happened to all the lottery money that the Governor promised would help education years ago?"

"I think this is another example of how the government drags its feet and doesn't deliver what is promised," she said.

David Prater, associate director of Student Financial Aid, agrees that students might feel slighted, but "there will always be those that feel slighted."

"I think the program is excellent, but there will always be those that feel like they lose out," he said. "Any time money is allocated by the government, there must be a starting point."

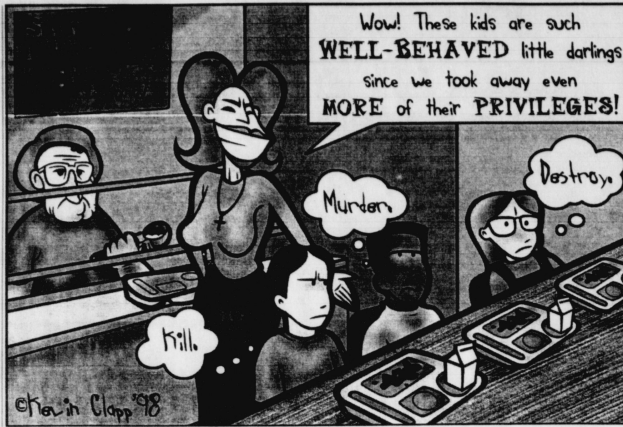

# Fighting poverty

Conference meets to address concerns over universities helping aid hunger, homelessness

More than 500 students from 125 campuses have gathered together at the University of Wisconsin-Madison for the 11th Conference of the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, which runs from today through Oct. 18.

The conference will be the largest of its kind in the country. "It teaches attendees how to mobilize volunteers and turn their concerns into action," said Julie Miles, executive director of the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness.

"The conference is designed to give students the skills and plans to tackle the problem of hunger and homelessness."

Students will be joined by top national leaders involved with the fight against hunger and homelessness. Martha Pickett, the executive director of Second Harvest, the nation's largest network of food

banks, will be one of the speakers. Homelessness and hunger are issues in Lexington as well.

"I think student involvement is important educationally, not only for the students themselves, but simply because the homeless problem has become larger, (and) at the same time it has become less visible. People need to know the truth," said Walter May, communications director at the Hope Center, a Lexington agency that deals with homelessness and poverty.

He said 1995 figures estimate that 1,000 people in Lexington are homeless. Part of this problem, he said, was the decline in the number of affordable housing, yet the increase of people living below the poverty line.

Jennifer Hecker, a field organizer for the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, said one of the goals of the conference was to educate students about food-salvage programs, such as Kentucky Har-

vest, and try to get them to establish chapters on their campuses.

While UK does not have a chapter for the National Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, students can seize opportunities at UK to deal with such issues.

The experiential education department at UK has a section devoted to volunteering in various community projects, with the focus being that students should learn something from their experience.

"We encourage students not to just serve a meal, but to question why there is homelessness (at all) in an affluent society. We want students to examine issues so that they might affect social change," said Louise Stone, the department's director. "I think the conference in Madison is doing that."

While no students from UK were able to attend this conference, UK is still on the campaign's list of target schools, ones they would like to see involved with the campaign, Hecker said.

The campaign holds events throughout the year, and any interested students should call (800) 664-8647.

### Lexington has much to offer in local bands

Local music in Lexington covers all genres and styles from local bluegrass roots to punk rock and funk. But many people cite numerous problems with music in Lexington.

For starters, many bands think the local areas are good but aren't getting enough airplay and coverage.

"WKQQ runs a contest for local bands, but after it's over you never hear the music again," said Jamie Eads, a member of the band Funnel.

The only real outlets for local bands are Z103 on Sunday nights and WRFL.

The second problem is the age conflict. Apparently, if you're not 21, you must not be mature enough to participate in the Lexington music scene. The only true place to hear music is in bars.

Lexington has a desperate need for an 18-and-over or all-ages club that could expose new bands, and at the same time, entertain all types of audiences.

Many bands try to involve more audiences by playing in Richmond. Or as some bands have tried to do make alcohol-free warehouses that are friendly to all ages.

So while the local band scene flourishes in some respects, more could be done to foster the talent the city has.

### Funnel

Funnel, a relatively new band, was one of the few local bands to play Z-Fest and is the winner of the WKQQ Decent Exposure contest.

"Our music is original rock; something between Matchbox 20 and Aerosmith," said drummer Jamie Eads.

Eads would like to see the local music scene get more recognition and airplay.

"Local music around here is so great. Somebody has to do something for it," Eads said.

### The Schuers

Mostly acoustically driven, the Schuers are influenced by Dave Matthews Band, Indigo Girls and other mellow groups.

"We're mostly vocally driven and do more of acoustic type pop," guitarist Danny Baker said.

Brothers Kevin and Jamie Schuer have been singing together since they were young.

"We're not going to change the world with our guitar playing, but singing is our strong point," Baker said.

### Peace in the Jones

Peace in the Jones is a more of a moving jam band, if it must be classified a "hippie" sound. Peace in the Jones does an excellent cover of Phish's "Tweezer" that seems to be a crowd-pleaser. It also played with more than 15 other bands from all over Appalachia and the Southeast at the Russell Fork Rendezvous in early October.

Peace in the Jones is known for playing free or practically free shows at Lynagh's and should be easy to catch.

### Union City Allstars

"We're a combination of bluegrass, country and rock and roll. We play a lot with alternative country bands even though we draw our sound from a variety of different places," said drummer Hugh Bartling.

Their entourage includes the basic variety of drums and guitars with member Jason Burton playing the mandolin, banjo, fiddle and accordion. Union City Allstars (left) is one of the few local bands to participate in the movement of involving country and bluegrass music into a more mainstream and younger audience.



### The Yonders

One of the veteran bands of Lexington, the Yonders (above) have been together since 1992.

Their music is "American music," a combination of traditional country and folk rock. They do mostly their own stuff, but also cover famous greats such as Johnny Cash and Nick Drake.

The Yonders do private gigs at Lynagh's, as well as their usual Sunday night hangout, Cheapside, where they play from 8 p.m.-11 p.m.



### Born Cross Eyed

Born Cross Eyed is a different type of band that focuses on Grateful Dead covers and Grateful Dead spin-off bands. Its song list consists of more than 200 Dead songs that range from just about anything the Dead has written or covered. # Food-2-Go

### Green Chili Stew

- 3 pounds lamb or pork boneless shoulder
- 1 large onion, chopped (1 cup)
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon dried juniper berries, crushed
- 3/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon Gold Medal® all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup water
- 4 medium poblano chilies, roasted, peeled, seeded and cut into 2-by-1/4-inch strips
- 2 tablespoons grated lemon peel

Cut lamb into 1-inch cubes. Cook and stir lamb, onion and garlic in oil in Dutch oven until lamb is no longer pink; drain. Stir in broth, salt, juniper berries and pepper. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer about 1 hour, stirring occasionally, until lamb is tender. Shake flour and water in tightly covered container; stir into lamb mixture. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Stir in chilies. Sprinkle each serving with lemon peel.

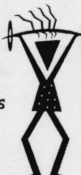

# Hole returns with new image, album 'Skin'

**Hole lotta love:** Courtney Love continues to ride the waves of stardom with her band's latest album

Virgin and soiled. Light and dark. Beautiful and repulsive. All of these things are stark contrasts. Sometimes, however, music can embody them both at the same time, creating an overwhelming tension that tears the emotion of a song in two. Such is the tension felt in the songs on Hole's new album, *Celebrity Skin*. Not surprisingly, that same tension is embodied by Courtney Love, the raspy voice behind all of Hole's musical efforts. Love's life

has been well documented, constantly under the microscope of the popular media. But what you think when you look at and listen to Love is never really clear. Is Courtney Love beautiful, or is she repulsive? Both. Are Hole's songs laced with hate or softened by kindness? Both. Does Hole's music uphold virtues or propagate moral destitution? Both — that's what creates the tension. You listen to their songs one time and say, "Man, this girl is angry!" Then you play the song again, seething for more of Love's

hate — but the second time through, it sounds as though Love and Hole are a group of high school virgins, masterfully performing the sweetest little heavy ballads you've ever heard. That tension, though, makes Hole one of the best bands playing in the nation today. Anyone who has listened to the radio the slightest bit in the past few weeks has heard their latest single, "Celebrity Skin." The tune's lyrics capture the tension of Hole with such wordplays as "hooker waitress." Yet another mesmerizing song is the second track, "Awful." God forbid someone to assert what the song is really about (and if my premonitions are accurate, it would label the Kernel if I expressed them). Nonetheless, the song has an attractive texture, peppered by an oc-

asionally distorted chord or two and sugared with Love's voice in an uncharacteristically sweet and high tone. Still, the lyrics make you ponder the songs meaning, as does the title, to the point that you find yourself torn between a state of bliss and a state of despair. "We set out to alter the skyline," Love says of the new album, "to build a monument to our past and to the present. And — almost as a joke at first — to redefine the California sound." I'm not so sure that the California sound is redefined, but Hole's latest release is definitely some solid rock — and it makes you think. Is Hole's music beautiful or repulsive? Tension is the whole Hole aura.

# Local rock trio Supafuzz strikes all the right chords on debut

The Lexington trio Supafuzz has an intense sound much like Metallica, which has put it on the fast track to fame and fortune with its self-titled debut album. Supafuzz is coming off of its recent success at Z103's Z-Fest, where it opened for Candlebox and Third Eye Blind. The band found popularity through college radio stations and regional press. Playing in relatively small venues, Supafuzz gained a devoted fan base who call themselves "Supafreaks."

In the midst of this early success, demo tapes were swapped with many a radio station. The intensity and sheer energy that has characterized the band's sound finally caught the attention of Gotham Records. Supafuzz has a wide range of sounds. From heavy guitar riffs to strange but weirdly fitting cello interludes, Supafuzz can take a sometimes blaring sound and turn it into pure listener satisfaction.

With Dave Angstrom (recently of Black Cat Bone fame) on vocals and guitar, Dean Smith on bass and Chris Leathers on drums, the trio has received much airplay with their new release. The music the band puts forth is both electric and carries a strong beat. The explosive track "Superstar" starts off the album, with loud music and edgy vocals. "Pretty Blank Page" relays a relatively unique sound, as well as the beginning of "Downed." Through thick guitar and a strong beat, Angstrom lets loose with an intense voice. The lyrics are strong, revealing emotion through the way they are spoken, not necessarily through the words that make them up. As the band's popularity grows, they have earned airplay in cities like Cincinnati and Las Vegas.

Lexington stations WYXZ and WKQQ play the bands music, as well as a variety of other stations across the Ohio River Valley. If you're into rock or alternative, this album is for you. ### Jodie Foster: \$15 million woman

Hey, diapers don't grow on trees, you know.

And so new mom Jodie Foster is closing in on a movie deal that could net her a \$15 million pay-off, reports say. The reputed eight-figure contract would represent the most any actress not named Julia Roberts has ever earned on a film.

On the downside, if the deal is the real thing, it means Foster, Roberts, et al. are still \$5 million shy of that most elusive of Hollywood cliques: The \$20 million Club. (That so far) boy-only outfit counts among its members action stars Sylvester Stallone and Bruce Willis.

Reports say Foster's paycheck would come for a drama called *Anna and the King*, yet another screen retelling of the 19th century saga of a British schoolteacher and the King of Siam.

### Superman flies again

The latest Superman film project, hit by Kryptonite in April when Warner Bros. turned down a new script by director Tim Burton and Dan Gilroy and a budget in excess of \$100 million, may now be alive again.

Producer Jon Peters has told Cinescape Online "We're working on Superman now, which we're going to probably make next year. ... The status of Superman is basically that the script is good."

The script, he indicated, will be credited to Gilroy; a previous one by Kevin Smith (*Clerks*, *Chasing Amy*) had been rejected early on. "I wanted an Academy Award-winning actor. I didn't want just some beautiful, tall, handsome guy," Peters said.
