Definition of Terms

Accreditation — Colleges in the United States have been accredited by one of six regional accrediting associations.

A.C.T. — The American College Testing program serves much the

same purpose for Kentucky Colleges and Universities as the C.E.E.B. Tests serve some private colleges.

C.E.E.B. — The College Entrance Examination Board offers a program of tests required for admission by some colleges. (The tests consist of a three hour Scholastic Aptitude Tests (S.A.T.) and a series of Achievement Tests.) These are administered at regional testing centers.

High School Rank — This shows the relative position of the student in comparison with his fellow students in the same class. High School Rank is usually expressed in percentile scores. A percentile rank of 80 indicates that the individual has done better than 80 per cent of his classmates.

Scholarships

Special Scholarships ----- Since students in Berea College pay no tuition, each one is the recipient of a scholarship concerning the usual tuition. A limited number of special scholarships are available to students who have demonstrated good school citizenship after a semester or more in Berea. A student needing financial aid should make application to the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women after he has been accepted for admission to the college.

Grants

Student Aid Grants ----- These are grants of money to students without obligation to repay. They may be given to any student who is considered deserving of such financial assistance. Some grants are general in nature while others are for specific purposes or programs. Each Dean (men and women) has a specified amount of student aid money which may be allocated to the students in his or her area of responsibility.

Loans

Short-Term Loans ----- Short-term loans may be granted to any student to help him meet an urgent need for financing essential school expenses. These loans should be repaid as soon as possible; they must be repaid before the end of the semester in which they are granted. No interest is charged on these loans if they are repaid on schedule.

Long-Term Loans ----- Long-term loans may be granted to qualified students who have satisfactorily completed one semester at Berea College. In most cases no interest is charged while the student is still in school. These loans may be repaid in monthly installments over a two to five year period following graduation. The approval of parents or guardian and satisfactory recommendations from at least two people from the applicant's home community are required before a long-term loan will be considered by the Loan Committee, which gives final approval of such loans.

Federal Programs ----- Berea College participates in the following federal government aids: National Defense Student Loan Program, College Work-Study Program of the Economic Opportunity Act, Economic Opportunity Grants. To qualify for any of these programs, students must make formal application after acceptance and must meet certain standards which have been established.

Self-Help

Labor Program ----- The most substantial form of financial aid to the students is the Labor Program which provides opportunities for each student to earn a part of his school expenses and at the same time keeps those expenses at a minimum.

The College has received a large number of labor grants in funds of \$1,000 or more which assist in paying for student labor.

The student with a normal academic program earns enough to pay from one-third to one-half of the term bills for board and room and school fees.

Special Work Program ----- If he needs more financial assistance he may apply for the "Special Work Program," reducing his classes to approximately three-fourths of the normal class load and increasing his labor to twenty-four hours each week. Each person on the Special Work Program is given a student aid grant in the amount of \$100.00 at the end of each semester provided the SWP Contract has been satisfactorily completed. The Special Work Program enables a student to meet all essential school expenses, and summer earnings should take care of personal needs.

----- Ministerial, missionary, and Christian service grants are given to ministers and children of ministers who are in good standing and who depend upon the ministry or a minister for a part of their support. These grants are given to students who have made public announcement of their intention to enter the ministry or to do missionary work, and who present statements from their local churches, approving them for the amount of the grant. The amount is \$25 per semester.

Honor Scholarships ----- Any high school student who has or will graduate in the top five per cent of his class may submit an application for an academic scholarship to Campbellsville College. The application must be submitted to the scholarship committee at least six weeks before the student plans to enroll. The student will be notified of the action taken on his application at least one month before the date of enrollment.

Music Scholarships ----- A limited number of scholarships are given after an audition with the Head of the Department of Music.

Loans

Students of superior ability who maintain high records in scholarship and character but who find it impossible to continue their education because of financial limitations may receive assistance in the form of loans from different loan funds.

Self-Help

Each year a limited number of students are employed for campus jobs consisting of office work, library assistantships, cafeteria, dormitories, bookstore, custodial work in the buildings and on the campus, and services in the Student Inn. It is the policy to distribute these jobs on the basis of need.

The student industry program enables worthy and able students who need financial assistance to attend college. A committee of the faculty approves all applications for the industry program. A curriculum has been arranged so that these students may take classes three days per week and work three days per week, including the summer term. This plan provides opportunity for the student to complete two years' work at the end of two academic years including the summer term. The number of hours per day and days per week are to be worked out in accordance with existing provisions made for students in college.

George F. Baker Scholarships-----Baker Scholarships are awarded to men only. Through these awards the George F. Baker Trust seeks to encourage a high quality of leadership, especially in business and industry, by making possible a college education for promising young men. These Scholarships are awarded annually to four to eight entering freshman men whose academic records, leadership qualities and character reveal promise of future leadership.

Honor Scholarships ----- Twenty-five valedictorian and salutatorian scholarships are available for first-honor and second-honor graduates of accredited high schools. The valedictorian or first-honor student scholarships are \$100 per year. The salutatorian or second-honor scholarship is \$50 per year. (Only one-half of the salutatorian scholarship may be made to apply on any one semester).

- Ministerial Family ----- Depending upon financial need, sons and daughters of Baptist ministers engaged in full-time church work may receive scholarships up to \$50 per semester. Application for such scholarships must be made in writing. These scholarships, on the same basis, are available to children of home and foreign missionaries.
- Other Scholarships ----- Additional scholarships are awarded on the basis of competence and demonstrated need. These vary from a minimum of \$50 per year to a maximum of \$600 per year.

Scholarships

- Presidential Scholarships ----- These scholarships are usually reserved for students in the top ten per cent of the graduating class. Presidential scholarships provide assistance equivalent to the student's registration fee. The scholarships are for one semester and renewable upon review and recommendation to the Scholarship Committee by the Director of Student Financial Assistance.
- Alumni Scholarships ----- The Alumni Association offers a limited number of scholarships. These scholarships provide assistance equivalent to the student's registration fee. To be considered for an alumni scholarship an applicant must be nominated by a member of the Alumni Association. The recipient must maintain an acceptable academic standing as reviewed by the Scholarship Committee. All inquiries should be directed to the Director of Alumni Affairs.
- The Music Scholarship ----- Grants are made to students who graduate in the upper 25% of their high school class, who show exceptional ability in the field of music, and who declare a major in music. Grants are renewable each semester up to four years of academic study. Eligibility is determined on the basis of audition, interview, and high school record.

Myrtle Critchfield Mitchell

Scholarships -----

Eastern Kentucky University has been provided funds from the estate of Mrs. Myrtle Critchfield Mitchell to provide scholarships of \$500 each to be known as the "Myrtle Critchfield Mitchell Scholarships." Criteria for the awarding of these scholarships is currently being developed by the Scholarship Committee.

Phi Delta Kappa Scholarship-----

The Epsilon Rho Campus Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa, an education fraternity for men in education, awards a full tuition scholarship each year to a full-time male graduate student. Applications and information may be secured by writing to the Graduate Office. Applications must be submitted no later than July 1, of each year.

ROTC Scholarships -----

Under the provisions of Public Law 88-647, a limited number of two-year ROTC Scholarships are available for outstanding military students who have completed the basic ROTC course. These scholarships provide for payment of tuition, fees, book costs, laboratory expenses and subsistence pay of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per month. Selection of individuals will be based on criteria established by the Secretary of the Army and by action of an on-campus board consisting of a Professor of Military Science and other designated faculty representatives.

University of Kentucky Library

The Music Workshop ----- Grants are made to any student in the University who shows talent in a performance (instrument, voice or piano). Students are expected to perform with a major ensemble, bands, orchestra, choirs, or serve as accompanists. Grants are renewable each semester up to four years of academic study. Eligibility is determined on the basis of audition and interview.

Under this program full-time undergraduate students may borrow up to \$1,000 per academic year. These loans carry an interest rate of 6% beginning with the date on which the loan is made. Repayments begin on the first day of the 10th month following graduation.

The Student Aid Society Inc.
Loan Fund ----- This fund was created by gifts from individuals and organizations and is used to grant small loans to students to assist them in times of financial emergency. Loans are made on the basis of a personal note and provide for a legal rate of interest.

Self-Help

Institutional Work-Study Program -----

The Work-Study Program provides financial assistance and job experience to those students who do not qualify for the Federal Work-Study Program. The student must give first priority to maintaining a satisfactory academic standing, preferably must offer skills and previous work experience, and must at all times show an attitude for accepting responsibilities.

Federal Work-Study Program-----

Eastern Kentucky University is a participant in the College Work-Study Program under the provisions of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. In order to be eligible to participate in the Federal Work-Study Program a student must:

- a. Maintain a minimum of 2.0 out of a possible 4.0 academic point standing, and be enrolled for at least three-fourths of the normal academic load.
- b. Be eligible to participate in the Work-Study Program as determined by the guide lines relating to Financial assistance furnished by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Considerations are made for number of dependent children, medical expenses, and losses due to fire and flood. Child care payments made to enable the parents to work will also be considered.
- c. Complete the necessary application forms for employment. These applications may be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Assistance.

Scholarships

Academic Scholarships ----- A substantial number of scholarships are available to students who can demonstrate a potential for unusual achievement. Scholarships will be awarded on the basis of academic potential, financial need, and the demonstration of a capacity for leadership. An applicant must be in the upper 15% of his graduating class and must provide the committee with his ACT scores.

The Woman's Association Scholarships ----- The Woman's Association of Georgetown College has established a scholarship fund for women students. Application should be made not later than April 15 to the Scholarship Chairman of the Woman's Association of Georgetown College, Georgetown, Kentucky.

Loans

College Loan Fund ----- This fund, designed to afford temporary relief to students, operates on a yearly basis. A qualified applicant may borrow up to a maximum of \$500 per year but not in excess of a total indebtedness of \$1000. The loans bear 3% interest per annum.

United Student Aid Fund -----The College participates in the United Student Aid Fund, Inc. This organization endorses loans with favorable interest rates to students through their hometown banks.

National Defense Student Loan...This loan fund authorized by the NDEA of 1958 provides opportunity for needy students to borrow on reasonable terms. The maximum amount for one fiscal year is \$1000, and the total amount during the duration of the program is \$5000. No interest accrues prior to the beginning of the repayment schedule which begins one year after the borrower ceases to be a full time student.

Grant-in-Aid

Christian Service Grants -----A grant carrying a stipend of \$100 per year is available to any Baptist student preparing for a church-related vocation, and to the son, daughter, or wife of a Baptist minister. His application must be accompanied by a letter from his church substantiating his application.

Athletic Grants: -----A limited number of grants are awarded to outstanding athletes. Application must be made through the College coach of the sport involved.

Scholarships

Presidential Scholarships ----- A limited number of these full tuition scholarships are available each year to qualified students. They are granted without regard to proven financial need. The scholarships are renewable for eight trimesters, providing a 3.5 grade point average or above is maintained by the student. Applicants must rank in the top 5% of their graduating class, have a cumulative high school grade point average of at least 3.8, a total score of 1400 on the SAT and be recommended by the high school personnel.

Trustee's Scholarships ----- High school seniors are invited to visit the K. S. campus to participate in a competitive examination for scholarships. Dates for these programs are available through the Financial Aids Office of the College. The amounts to be awarded are as much as \$300 per trimester.

Key Club Scholarships ----- Two scholarships to outstanding members of the high school key club are offered each year. Applicants must be from Kentucky and the K-T section of Tennessee. The potential value of each one is \$300 per trimester.

(Service Award) ----- The recipient must have a high school grade point average of 3.0 and must maintain the same average at Kentucky Southern. Information is mailed to the presidents of active key clubs.

Designated Scholarships ----- A number of designated scholarships and aid funds are available through K. S. C. The financial supplements are established by various organizations and families to aid worthy students who qualify. Additional information may be obtained from the Director of Financial Aid.

Loans

National Defense Loans ----- This loan is designed primarily for those entering the teaching profession; however, any qualified student may borrow from it if funds are available. A maximum of \$500 per trimester may be borrowed. The maximum total amount is \$5,000. The interest rate is 3%. The interest and repayment begin ten months after the borrower ceases to be a full-time student and is to be completed within 10 years.

Guaranteed Loan Programs ----- The guaranteed loan program, operated through a student's home town bank and based on family income, is available. The student should contact his local bank regarding this program.

Applicants for aid are required to submit a parent's confidential statement to College Scholarship Service, Box 176, Princeton, New Jersey.

All students seeking aid should apply for admission to the college and apply for financial aid on the earliest possible date.

Scholarships

The college maintains a Committee on Scholarships and part-time student employment. Any student seeking aid should file proper application(s) along with an application for admission to the college. Applications for any type of financial assistance should be filed not later than June 1 for proper consideration by the Committee for assistance the following September. Students who have been assisted previously must re-apply each year.

It should be noted that expenses connected with attending Kentucky State College are the most reasonable that can be found in any institution of equal rank and prestige. Even so, the college maintains the following program of financial assistance for those who cannot meet these expenses in whole or in part.

Loans

National Defense Student Loan Fund -----

Kentucky State College is a participating institution in the National Defense Student Loan Program which was established during the National Defense Education Act of 1958. This program seeks to give assurance that no student of ability will be denied an opportunity of higher education because of financial need. Low-interest loans may be made to students in need thereof to pursue their courses at the college.

While making the loans available to needy students in the field of study in a participating institution of higher education, the Act specifies that "in the selection of students to receive loans, special consideration shall be given to (a) students with a superior academic background who express a desire to teach in elementary or secondary schools, and (b) students whose academic background indicates a superior capacity of preparation in science, mathematics, engineering, or a modern foreign language."

These loans are available to qualified, prospective students who have never attended the college before. Graduating high school seniors should file applications before graduation. Applications and further information may be secured from the President of the College.

Work-Study Opportunities

Office of Economics College

Work-Study Program -----

This is a Federal aid program. Students who qualify may work part-time and carry a full program of college studies.

College Part-time

Employment Program ----- Participation in this program is available to a limited number of deserving students.

Scholarships

Honor Scholarships ----- Three honor scholarships paying General Instruction Fees of \$100 are awarded annually. One is held by a member of the Sophomore Class, one by a member of the Junior Class, and one by a member of the Senior Class. These scholarships are awarded on the basis of scholastic attainment and character. The scholastic basis is the work of the preceding year.

Freshman Scholarships ----- Honor scholarships amounting to \$100 per semester are awarded for the Freshman year to first honor graduates and to second honor graduates of accredited high schools upon certification by the principal of the high school or superintendent.

General Scholarships ----- General scholarships of \$25 per semester are awarded annually to students who have maintained a standing of 2.5 ("B" plus) during the preceding year. To be eligible, students must carry not fewer than 15 semester hours each semester. The grant will be withdrawn at the end of the first semester if the grade standing for the semester falls below 2.0 ("B").

Art, Drama, Music Scholarships... A limited number offered. Students audition before members of the college faculty. Awards vary from \$25 to \$100 per semester.

National Methodist Youth Scholarships ----- Three scholarships are offered with a maximum value of \$500 each year by the Division of Educational Institutions of the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church. Awarded on basis of character, scholarship, leadership and need.

Ministerial Service Discounts ----- 25 per cent discount of General Instruction Fees (not to exceed \$50 per semester) given to children of ministers, missionaries active in the field, retired ministers and children of widows of ministers of the Methodist Church.

Loans

Students of real intellectual interest and ability may find help through loans and advances-in-aids.

The General Board of Education of the Methodist Church makes loans to worthy students according to a schedule established by the General Board.

Friends of the college provide funds supplementing the loan funds of the college. Write the President of the College for information pertaining to these loan funds.

Self-Help

Workshops ----- Aid granted in the form of assistantships to a limited number of students. Full-time regular students may apply for assistantships in music, art, drama, athletics, natural sciences, library, business, dining room service, maintenance of building and grounds, and other areas. Available places are assigned in accordance with the merit and need of the applicants. Students must live on the campus to receive an assistantship unless exempted from this regulation by the Student Aid Committee.

University of Kentucky Library

Off-Campus Employment ----- Students who desire off-campus employment in the business concerns of Owensboro and vicinity will be given assistance in finding part-time jobs. (Students with on-campus or off-campus employment requiring more than 20 hours of service per week shall not be permitted to enroll for more than 14 semester hours of work.) Applications should be filed in the office of the Dean of the College and have the approval of the Student Aid Committee. Students who obtain employment without the aid of the College must have the work approved by the Student Aid Committee.

Scholarships

Honor Scholarships ----- Both valedictorian and salutatorian in high school with over 75 graduates are eligible for tuition scholarships of \$175 per semester. These students must enter Lees in the semester next following their graduation. The student may retain such scholarships by maintaining a B standing and remaining in school for continuous semesters. In high schools of less than 75 graduates only the valedictorian will be eligible for such scholarships.

- Sons and Daughters of
Presbyterian Ministers ----- A scholarship of one half tuition charge may be granted to sons and daughters of ordained Presbyterian Ministers upon satisfactory application. In addition, students preparing for full time Christian work in the Presbyterian Church may receive a similar scholarship of one-half tuition secured by a promissory note and acceptable co-signer. Such note will be cancelled upon entrance of the student into such Christian service.

Scholarship ----- A scholarship of \$100.00 is given annually to a student chosen from a family of a Bureau member.

Women's Scholarship ----- This scholarship of \$150.00 is given annually by the Women of the Anchorage Presbyterian Church.

Scholarship Fund ----- A fund of \$5,000.00 established by the family and friends of John B. Priest of the First Presbyterian Church of Henderson, Kentucky provides a scholarship of approximately \$200.00 annually to a qualified, deserving student.
- Joseph D. Hall Scholarship ----- Two scholarships of \$200.00 each are awarded annually by Mrs. Jane Bailey Hefner, in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph D. Hall.

Student Loan Fund ----- This fund was established by bequest of the late Miss Sudie Jane Bowman to the amount of \$10,000.00. Individual loans are limited to \$500.00 annually to qualified students.

Charles J. Copplock Loan Fund... This loan fund of \$1,000 was established by Mrs. Josephine Copplock in memory of her husband. The fund to aid worthy qualified students is limited to the monies on hand.

La Jolla Cliffs Chapel
Foundation ----- Revolving loan fund is available to students whose conduct and activities reflect their Christian beliefs. Students who plan to teach science will receive special consideration. Limited to monies on hand.

Loans

National Defense Student Loan... By act of Congress the College is allotted varying amounts annually for students who qualify. The funds are loaned at a low rate of interest and the student is given time to start earning after graduation before repayment is required. If the student enters education or teaching field, part of the loan is erased.

Self-Help

Much of the work in the operation and maintenance of College facilities is done by students who may use funds to defray part of their educational expenses.

Students work under supervision in the dining room, kitchen, library, business office, and in maintenance of buildings and grounds. The College seeks to help a maximum number of students by combining loans, scholarships, and workships.

Students may earn up to \$150 per semester. Applications for workships must be received and approved by the College at least three weeks prior to registration.

In addition, for students of low income families who could not otherwise attend college, a summer-work project is and may continue to be available.

Scholarships

The Valedictorian and Salutatorian Scholarships ----- Scholarships amounting to \$250 per year for the Valedictorian and \$200 per year for the Salutatorian are available. These students must enter college at the beginning of the semester following their graduation. They must maintain a B standing each semester and must remain continuously in school.

Ministerial Scholarships ----- Licensed ministers of The Methodist Church will be given a scholarship amounting to one-half of the instruction fee. The scholarships for other ministerial applicants will be determined in the light of their needs.

Minister's Dependents Scholarship--A scholarship amounting to one-half the instruction fee will be granted to the children of Methodist ministers who are full-time pastors of churches in Kentucky.

Columbia Rotary Club
Scholarship ----- Two \$50.00 scholarships are given annually to Adair County students. Applications should be made to the president of the Columbia Rotary Club, or the President of Lindsey Wilson College.

Delta Kappa Gamma Scholarship,
Iota Chapter ----- A \$100.00 a year scholarship is given a girl majoring in education who plans to make teaching a career. This award is determined by faculty members of the Society based on scholarship and need.

C. C. Chaney Scholarship ----- A scholarship in the amount of \$400 a year is awarded to a Methodist ministerial student, or a person preparing for full time Christian service. The selection of the candidate will be made by the Admissions Committee in cooperation with the Department of Religion. This scholarship has been made possible by the will of Mr. C. G. Chaney of Glasgow, Kentucky.

Dr. Howard A. Smith Scholarship--A tuition scholarship for a worthy Methodist student from Michigan, recommended by Dr. Howard A. Smith, and approved by the Admissions Committee.

Marvin P. McClure Scholarship-----A scholarship in the amount of \$400 will be awarded to a Methodist ministerial student who is a resident of the Kentucky Conference. Nominations for the scholarship are to be made by any one of the District Superintendents of the Kentucky Conference. The final selection of the candidate will be made by the Admissions Committee of the college.

Darlington Scholarship -----A tuition scholarship for a worthy Methodist student from Ohio, recommended by Dr. Darlington and the College of Arts and Sciences of Ohio Northern University, and approved by the Admissions Committee.

Christian Vocations Club
Scholarships -----Two \$25.00 a year scholarships awarded students of worth and need, who have maintained at least a "C" average in high school or college. The students' need and worth are to be determined by the President of Lindsey Wilson College, and approval is to be given by the sponsor of the Christian Vocations Club.

Men's Residence Hall
Scholarships -----A scholarship in the amount of \$100.00 per year was established by the Men's Dormitory Council 1965-66, to aid worthy students. The recipient must be a male student who has completed twelve semester hours of course work at Lindsey, with at least a 1.3 grade point average to be eligible. Qualified persons should apply to the Admissions Committee.

National Methodist Scholarship---Two scholarships amounting to tuition and fees are awarded each year to two qualified Methodist students who rank in the upper fifteen per cent of their high school graduating class and are capable leaders.

General Scholarships -----A limited number of general scholarships are awarded worthy students who are not able to continue their college education without financial assistance. They are granted on the basis of need and are approved by the College administration.

Loans

National Defense Student Loan Fund -----Available to qualified students. Repayments and interest on loans begin a month after a student leaves college. Persons have several years to repay loan, and those teaching in public elementary or secondary schools or colleges may have up to 50% of the loan cancelled if they teach for five years.

Columbia Kiwanis Club Loans----A \$135.00 loan is available to an Adair County student, an entering freshman, who has attended Lindsey Wilson College one semester. Application should be made to the Dean of Lindsey Wilson College.

Further information concerning the scholarships and loan funds may be secured by writing the college.

Physically handicapped students may be approved for college training through the Bureau of Rehabilitation Services, Department of Education, Frankfort, Kentucky. Financial assistance is awarded through the Bureau.

Self-Help

Each year Lindsey Wilson College assists a number of worthy students to achieve a college education through the granting of workshops on the college campus, in the library, dormitories, classroom buildings, office and farm. Workshops require an average of two hours per day. The value of the workshops may vary in accordance with the task to which one is assigned.

These workshops may be cancelled if the task assigned is not performed satisfactorily. In this event, the unearned portion of the workshop grant must be paid by the student immediately. Students applying for workshops should be able to pay at least two-thirds of their expenses. Normally students are not given both workshops and scholarships. Application for workshops should be made on a form secured from the college office.

Five curriculums are university-parallel; liberal arts, teacher education, commerce, nursing and home economics. Terminal programs are provided for students not planning to continue beyond the junior college.

Scholarships

The cost for each student is adjusted according to her ability to pay. Each student will earn part of this amount through the campus work program. Students who cannot pay the full amount may receive grants from the endowment funds or from Church, individual or club gifts.

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need. At least average academic achievement is required. Extensive scholarship assistance is available.

Self-Help

Every student participates in the work program of the school, earning part of her room and board costs. There are limited opportunities to earn additional spending money.

MOREHEAD STATE UNIVERSITY

Scholarships

A number of scholarships are available to worthy students. To qualify for these various grants the applicant must be (a) recommended by high school principal; (b) have a superior high school record; and (c) establish evidence of need for such assistance. Unless otherwise noted, all scholarship awards are made on the recommendation of the Committee on Fellowships, Scholarships, and Student Aid and the right is reserved by this Committee to administer competitive examinations to applicants.

General Scholarships ----- The University has provided a limited number of scholarships carrying a stipend sufficient to cover the registration fees for a semester. These scholarships are available to students who meet the institutional requirements for such awards.

Morehead State University Alumni
Association Scholarships ----- The Alumni Association has initiated a plan for a number of scholarships to be made available to worthy students. Application for these scholarships should be made directly to the Director of Alumni Affairs, Morehead State University, Morehead, Kentucky. Each application must be endorsed by an active member of the Alumni Association. These scholarships are continued for four years provided the recipient maintains a satisfactory academic standing and continues to establish need for such assistance.

Music Scholarships ----- A number of scholarships are offered in the field of music, and these are awarded to students who show proficiency in music. The amount of the stipend varies, depending on the need, proficiency and interest. These scholarships are administered by the Department of Music, School of Humanities.

Home Economics Club
Scholarship ----- The Morehead Home Economics Club makes a scholarship grant of \$100 per year to an outstanding prospect in the field of home economics.

Debate Scholarships ----- A number of scholarships are offered to high school seniors who have displayed proficiency in debating and who wish to continue in debating at the University. The amount of the stipend varies, depending on need, proficiency and interest. These scholarships are administered by the Division of Communications, School of Humanities.

Art Scholarships ----- A number of scholarships are offered to high school seniors who have displayed proficiency in art. The amount of the stipend varies, depending on need, proficiency and interest. These scholarships are administered by the Art Department, School of Humanities.

Button Memorial Scholarships-----The Alumni of the Morehead Normal School, the forerunner of Morehead State University, provides for two scholarships which pay the regular registration fees for two worthy students of their own choice. These scholarships were established in memory of Frank C. Button who served as president of both Morehead Normal School and Morehead State Normal School and Teacher's College.

Fenton T. West Scholarship -----This scholarship is awarded each year to the most outstanding sophomore or junior science or mathematics major as determined by the faculty of the School of Sciences and Mathematics. The amount of the scholarship is one hundred dollars, which is to be applied to the next year's expenses at Morehead.

Ross C. Anderson Scholarship -----The Ross C. Anderson Scholarship is awarded to an outstanding business student at the beginning of the senior year. The recipient, who is selected by the business faculty on the basis of scholarship and financial need, receives \$50.00 a semester for two semesters. The money for the scholarship is furnished by the Kappa Mu Club and other donations.

Joseph Daniel Coker Memorial Fund -----This fund provides a \$200 loan to a senior business major. The recipient of the loan must have a 2.5 overall average and a 3.0 average in his business major. The loan is payable within one year after graduation, and is non-interest bearing. The recipient of the loan will be determined by the business faculty.

The Mocabee Scholarship ----- Mr. W. D. Mocabee of Greenup, Kentucky, has established a scholarship fund at Morehead State University for the graduating seniors of the Greenup County High Schools. One graduating senior is selected from each of the schools in Greenup County by the authorities of the high schools. The recipients of these scholarships receive a stipend of \$200.00 per year to be applied to their expenses as students at Morehead State University.

Gamma Beta Phi Scholarships----- These scholarships are offered to twenty of the top Beta Club members in the state. It is a collegiate extension of High School Beta Clubs and the selection is made by the Gamma Beta Phi Society of Morehead. Recipients become a part of the University's Honors and Pre-Honors Program.

Blue Key--Cardinal Scholarships-- Scholarships offered to ten of the top National Honor Society members in the state. Part of the Honors and Pre-Honors Program at Morehead State University. Selection is made by the Blue Key and Cardinal organization of Morehead.

Athletic Scholarships ----- A number of scholarships are offered in the field of athletics. Football, basketball, wrestling, swimming, track, baseball, golf, and tennis are included in these. The awards are given strictly in compliance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the Ohio Valley Conference. All applicants for athletic scholarships should be made directly to the Director of Athletics.

Education Opportunity Aid

The University has made it possible for a limited number of students to earn a part of their expenses, such as board and room

rent, or both, by doing various kinds of work. The work opportunities available are in the cafeteria, dormitories, offices and various buildings. Other students may find employment of various types in Morehead. Students desiring employment should apply for information to the Dean of Students.

Financial Aids

Morehead State University has a well-organized Financial Aid Program designed to aid those students who have the ability to satisfactorily pursue a college curriculum, and who are in need of financial assistance to do so. By combining the various financial aids available, we are able to provide substantial aid to those students with ability and who are in need of financial assistance. The University offers The N.D.E.A. Loan Program, University Work-Study Program, Educational Opportunity Grants, and Guaranteed Student Loan Program.

Scholarships

General Scholarships ----- Any student who ranks in the upper 20 per cent of his high school graduating class is eligible to apply for a scholarship. The scholarship committee expects a student's class standing to be supported by comparable scores on ACT tests. The American College Test should be taken at the first fall testing date.

Board of Regents Scholarship ----- These scholarships are for \$150 a year and are awarded only to incoming freshmen. They are not renewable. Since university funds are used for these scholarships, they are granted primarily to Kentucky residents. Persons wishing to apply for a Board of Regents Scholarship should apply to President Harry M. Sparks,

Miscellaneous Scholarships ----- Non-renewable \$100 scholarships are granted by the following organizations: Industrial Arts Club (upperclassmen); First District P. T. A. (elementary education majors-graduating seniors); Murray University Association for Childhood Education (education majors-sophomores and juniors); Delta Lambda Alpha (freshmen education majors); Students National Education Association (education majors); Delta Kappa Gamma (education majors-upperclassmen); Donald H. Sylvester (junior or senior chemistry majors); Murray University School P. T. A. (Murray University School graduates); Sock and Buskin (drama students-upperclassmen); Pershing Rifles (military students from Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, and Tennessee).

Alumni Scholarships ----- Several Alumni Scholarships of \$400 each are awarded annually. They are given to incoming freshmen and are not renewable. Generally speaking, an applicant should be a valedictorian, salutatorian, or should rank in the top 5 per cent of his class and have attained a composite standard score on the ACT of not less than 25. Applicants must be approved by their high school principals, guidance counselors, or an alumnus of Murray State. Only one application from a high school will be considered. Application forms must be requested of M. O. Wrather, executive secretary, Murray State Alumni Association.

Business Scholarships ----- The University's School of Business will award seven or more \$200 scholarships to incoming freshmen. The grants go to students who will study in the School of Business. An applicant should rank in the top 10 per cent of his class and should have attained a composite standard score on the ACT of not less than 24. Applications for these scholarships should go to Dr. Thomas Hogencamp, dean, School of Business.

Music Scholarships ----- A number of scholarships are awarded annually to students who participate in the university band and orchestra. Special scholarships for qualified string players are also available in addition to the band and orchestra grants. Students are not required to major in music to play in the band or orchestra. Two \$100 grants (Richard Farrell Scholarships) are awarded to music students annually as well as a \$50 grant given in honor of L. R. Putnam, music professor, emeritus. Sigma Alpha Iota and Phi Mu Alpha, music fraternities, offer a number of scholarship grants of variable amounts to talented students in music. All music scholarships are awarded by auditions and/or recommendations of high school music teachers. All applications for music scholarships should go to Richard Farrell, chairman, Department of Fine Arts.

Social Science Scholarships ----- Three \$200 scholarships have been made available by the Social Science Department. Recipients must major in some phase of social science or in pre-law. The regular university scholarship application should be submitted to the scholarship committee. Academic excellence and extent of interest in social science will be the main criteria used in selecting recipients.

Education Scholarships ----- The Education Department awards a number of scholarships annually. Five \$100.00 grants are awarded to upperclassmen. These awards are based upon grade standing and participation in leadership activities within the department. A \$200.00 Scholarship is given to a beginning elementary education major. This grant is based upon the applicant's high school record. Rank in class and test score results are very important. The ACT test is used to measure as objectively as possible the scholastic aptitude and promise of future success of scholarship applicants. The regular university scholarship application should be completed. The scholarship committee will select and announce the winners.

Art Scholarships ----- The Murray State Art Division annually awards three to eight \$200.00 scholarships as well as a number of smaller grants to incoming freshmen. All applicants for these awards are required to submit a portfolio of their art work along with the regular scholarship applications. Applications should go to Miss Clara Eagle, chairman, Division of Art.

Biology Scholarships ----- Two scholarships of \$200.00 each are awarded annually to outstanding high school seniors who plan to study biology or pre-medicine. The regular university scholarship application should be completed. Recipients will be notified by the scholarship committee.

Home Economics Scholarships ---- The K-T Distributors, Inc., of Union City, Tennessee, annually award one \$225 scholarship to an incoming freshman who plans to major in home economics. The Home Economics Department also awards some \$100 grants to beginning home economics majors. Applications should go to Dr. Beverly D. Fowler, chairman, Department of Home Economics.

English Scholarships ----- One scholarship of \$200.00 is awarded on the basis of academic ability to a high school senior who plans to major in English. This grant is given by the English Department. The regular university scholarship application should be submitted to the scholarship committee.

Grants

Educational Opportunity Grants ---- Only students of exceptional financial need are eligible for this program. Grants may be made in the spring and summer to high school seniors who have been admitted for freshman registration in September. Upperclassmen are also eligible for this program. Students must carry a full schedule and show evidence of academic or creative promise. No grant may exceed half the estimated cost of attending school. The amount of the grant is determined by the expected parental contribution. These

calculations are based on guidelines supplied by the federal government. All grants must be matched by college or private funds other than the student's own income or that of his parents. No grant can be made for less than \$200 nor for more than \$800 an academic year (half those amounts a semester).

Loans

National Defense Education Act---The largest source of student loans at Murray State is the National Defense Education Act. This federal program makes it possible for students who show academic promise to borrow up to \$4,000 during their undergraduate years. All inquiries should be addressed to Johnny McDougal, coordinator of the student aid program of Murray State University, Murray, Kentucky.

Loans for Student Nurses-----This is a federal program. These loans require the same qualifications and follow basically the same rules as National Defense Education Loans. A student must be accepted into the nursing program before submitting an application for one of these loans. Inquiries should go to Miss Ruth Cole, chairman, Nursing Department.

Production Credit Association

Loan Funds -----Both the Western Kentucky PCA in Hopkinsville and the Jackson Purchase PCA in Mayfield offer Murray State agriculture students interest-free loans. Repayment of loans will begin a year after graduation. Inquiries on PCA loans should go to E. B. Howton, chairman, Murray State Agriculture Department.

Thomas P. Norris Student
Loan Fund -----

The Norris Loan Fund is for short-time loans of small amounts. Any student at Murray is eligible to apply. Inquiries should go to J. Matt Sparkman, dean of students.

Miscellaneous Loans -----

Several other small loan funds are available for Murray students. Among these are the Mary Moss Carr Fund (for girls); The Wesley Foundation Fund (for Methodist students); the A. Carman Fund (for agriculture students), and the University School F. F. A. Fund (for University School graduates).

Self-Help

Murray State University offers employment to more than 700 students each year. Students may work up to 15 hours a week. Applications for regular college student employment may be obtained from Mr. P. W. Ordway, business manager. In addition to the regular university employment, Murray State is also participating in the Federal Work-Study Program. Applications for employment for this program may be obtained from John McDougal, coordinator of student aid.

Honor Scholarships -----

Nazareth College will admit, as Nazareth College Honor Students, girls who have attained high scores on the scholastic aptitude test of the College Entrance Examination Board and who have records of high achievement in high school. Financial aid will be given only on the basis of need.

Teacher Education Scholarships-----The Archdiocese of Louisville, through the Catholic School Board offers a number of scholarships to students in elementary education who will agree to teach for a specified time in the parochial school system. Application for these awards must be made to the office of the Catholic School Board.

Loans

National Defense Student Loan Program -----This program permits a student to borrow up to \$1,000 per year with three per cent interest. The law requires that each borrower must be a student capable of maintaining a good standing in the entire course of study. The loan must be secured by a note. Repayment of the loan plus interest begins nine months after graduation or when the student ceases to carry at least one-half of a full-time load. Ten years is allowed for repayment of the loan.

Self-Help

Student Assistantships -----There is a limited number of positions—in offices, library, laboratories, cafeteria, etc.,—in which a student may earn up to \$250 per year. Application is to be made to the Director of Financial Aid.

Christian Service Aids

Students applying for a Christian Service Aid must meet the following qualifications: (1) have a high school average of C or better; (2) show a record of active service in his home congregation, which must be a Church of Christ; (3) provide three acceptable character references; (4) write an essay stating his or her intention to enter the ministry, become a missionary, teach in a Christian school or engage in some type of full-time Christian service sponsored by the Cooperating Churches of Christ.

To remain eligible for this loan, the recipient must continue active in some form of Christian service while at Southeastern and must take an additional eight hours of Bible or related subjects, above the twelve hours required of all students.

The following financial arrangements shall be made between the college and the recipient of the assistance. At the beginning of his college program, the student shall sign a note for the amount of his tuition. This loan is to become due one year after he completes or stops his undergraduate education. If, at that time, he or she is engaged as (1) a fulltime minister, i.e., preaching a minimum of twice a week at a cooperating Church of Christ or (2) a missionary sponsored by such a cooperating church; or (3) a teacher in a Christian school supported by such a church; he or she shall be forgiven the note at the rate of 20% per year over a period of five years of service.

Grants-in-Aid

A limited number of grants-in-aid will be awarded to students showing a particular talent or ability in certain fields such as athletics, music, creative writing, etc.

In order to be eligible for a grant, the student must (1) have maintained a high school grade average of C or better; (2) express his intentions of taking an active part in the activity for which the grant is given; (3) be recommended by the member of the faculty concerned with the area in which the aid is granted.

In addition to the general stipulations listed below, the student must take an active part in all practice sessions, meetings and performances of the group for which the grant is given. He must fulfill all rules governing the group and the school.

Loans

The National Defense Loan ----- Southeastern participates in the National Defense Student Loan Program. Any student accepted by Southeastern may qualify for a loan so long as he is in need. The student may borrow for college expenses in one year a sum not ex-

ceeding \$1,000 and during his entire course in higher education a sum not exceeding \$5,000. The borrower must sign a note for his loan. The repayment of the loan begins nine months after he completes his full-time course work and then extends over a 10-year period. Interest at 3% per year begins to accrue at the beginning of the repayment period. If a borrower becomes a full-time teacher in an elementary or secondary school a maximum of 50% of the loan (plus interest) may be cancelled at the rate of 10% for each year of teaching. Other loans may be obtained through: The First Security National Bank and Trust Co. of Lexington, Kentucky, or, The Tuition Plan of New Hampshire, Inc., 18 School Street, Concord, New Hampshire.

United Student Aid Fund ----- A private non-profit corporation which endorses loans made by hometown financial institutions to deserving individuals.

Self-Help

Workshops may be provided to students who meet the following qualifications: (1) have a high grade average of C or better; (2) present three references one of which must be from a person who has supervised the work of the student in the past.

Federal Work-Study Program----- To qualify a student must make application to the college and must meet certain standards which have been established.

Scholarships

- Merit Scholarship ----- Tuition scholarships to any entering freshman who was valedictorian of his high school graduating class and who enters the first year regular semester after graduation. Granted for freshman year.
- Work Scholarships ----- The College grants a limited number of work scholarships each year. Workshops require an average of two hours a day and a student can earn between \$200 and \$300 on his board for the academic year. Workshops are granted on the basis of need and may be cancelled if the work is not performed in a satisfactory manner. Application should be made in advance for workshop aid.
- Individual Scholarships ----- A few individuals and/or organizations each year make available scholarships for worthy students. These are granted on the same basis as above.

Loans

- Kiwanis ----- A loan fund for students. Apply to the College.
- Methodist Student Loan ----- A student who is a member of the Methodist Church, is 17 years old, is a person of Christian character and educational promise, may apply. Must have "B" average during high school and "C" average in College.
- National Defense Student Loan ----- Entering student must present "B" average in high school work, and maintain a 2.5 average in College.

TRANSYLVANIA COLLEGE

Scholarships

Transylvania College seeks to recognize and help promising and worthy students through scholarships, consideration being given to academic aptitude, personal character, and qualities of leadership and citizenship. The stipend is determined by the financial need of the applicant relative to that of all other applicants.

All awards are made by the Scholarship Committee. In some cases, students receive more than one type of award, and all are made for the duration of the stay at the college provided the conditions explained in the letter sent to each successful applicant are observed. These conditions relate to the applicant's scholastic standing and financial situation.

Named Scholarships ----- Scholarships are awarded applicants whose secondary school record and entrance examination scores meet the high standards set by the Scholarship Committee. These awards carry a minimum stipend of \$100 per year and may include an additional amount relative to need. Income from endowment provides the funds for about twenty awards. In addition, approximately eighty scholarships are awarded from other funds on the same basis as named scholarships.

Transylvania Community Scholarships ----- Three full tuition scholarships are available to graduates of the Lexington and Fayette County High Schools. The recipients will be selected on the basis of high school records of excellence in academic achievement, leadership, character, test scores, and personal interview. Applications for full tuition scholarships will be submitted to the

Office of Admissions for consideration and in turn reported to the Committee on Student Aid and Scholarships for approval.

Presidential Scholarships ----- For Kentucky schools only. The valedictorian of any high school is eligible for a \$1,000 scholarship (\$250 per year); any student in the top 1% is eligible for \$800 (\$200 per year); any student in the top 5% is eligible for \$600 (\$150 per year).

Grants

Activity Grants ----- Available to applicants who definitely are able to contribute to athletic, music, dramatic, and publications activities. The applicants usually will be interviewed on the campus by the director of the activity concerned and the Scholarship Committee will follow his recommendations closely.

Hillel Grants ----- Two grants of \$800 (\$200 per year) are available to Jewish students possessing high intellectual ability and character and who show promise of contribution to inter-faith relations.

Ministers' Children ----- Sons and daughters of ministers and missionaries of any denomination receive a grant of \$1,200 (\$300 annually).

Faculty Children ----- Children of faculty and staff are awarded grants amounting to 80 per cent of tuition with a maximum of \$50 to be paid to the college in any one quarter.

Faculty Wives and Husbands ----- Tuition Remissions may be extended to wives and husbands of full-time faculty and administrative personnel amounting to 80 per cent of tuition with a maximum of \$50 to be paid to the college in any one quarter.

Loans

Loans are available through the National Defense Education Act student loan program for all students who qualify.

The Guaranteed Loan Program, operated through a student's hometown bank and based on family income, is available.

Loans are available to upperclassmen through the United Student Aid Funds, Inc.

Self-Help

There are certain job openings on the campus which can be filled by students working part-time. Student employees are paid at an hourly rate and their wages are deducted from the basic college charges following the quarter in which the work was done. One can earn up to \$400 during an academic year. Students are employed as dining hall helpers, library assistants, clerical assistants, dormitory monitors, and assistants to faculty members. Earnings may be paid in cash. Opportunities through the Federal Work-Study Program are also available.

Scholarships

Union College Honor
Scholarships -----

Honor Scholarships in the amount of \$500 for the academic year are available to select graduates of accredited high schools who enter Union College the first regular semester after graduation. The first or second place students in graduating classes of more than fifty the first, second and third place students in graduating classes of more than one hundred, and the first, second and third and fourth place

students in graduating classes of more than one hundred fifty are eligible for these scholarships. An applicant for an honor scholarship must not only meet the qualifications of class rank listed above, but he must also rank in the upper quartile on the College Qualifying Test given in Kentucky high schools or on an equivalent test based on national norms. Evidence of these scores should accompany the principal's recommendation for an honor scholarship.

A number of scholarships will be given to those persons who rank above the eighty-fifth percentile on the College Qualifying Test or its equivalent. A person ranking above the ninetieth percentile will automatically receive a scholarship upon the recommendation of his principal. A person between the eighty-fifth and ninetieth percentile will be considered for a scholarship on his individual merit and upon the recommendations of his principal.

Honor scholarships will be renewed for the sophomore year if the recipient maintains a 3.0 average during his freshman year. The Scholarship is renewable for each succeeding year as long as the recipient maintains an overall quality point standing of 3.3.

Alumni Scholarships -----

The Union College Alumni Association awards an annual \$400 scholarship to a needy student with great promise of future usefulness. The recipient of the scholarship is selected by the Scholarship Committee of the Alumni Association.

Barbourville Kiwanis

Scholarships ----- The Kiwanis Club of Barbourville, Kentucky, has supplemented an educational fund originated by Mr. C. F. Heidrick and established a scholarship fund at Union College for promising students from Knox County, Kentucky. The number and size of the scholarships vary, being intended for emergency use by needy students.

John A. and Hannah P. Black

Memorial Scholarship for
Christian Workers ----- Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Black of Johnson City, Tennessee, have endowed a scholarship that provides an annual stipend of \$300 for a promising student who plans a life of service in the Methodist Church.

Mr. and Mrs. James F. Blair

Scholarship ----- Mr. and Mrs. James F. Blair of Nashville, Tennessee, have endowed a \$250 scholarship for students from Knox County, Kentucky. It is awarded annually to a student in the sophomore, junior or senior year on the basis of need, scholarship, character, and promise of future usefulness.

Cherokee Indian Scholarships ----- Union College maintains a scholarship fund to aid Indian students from Cherokee, North Carolina. The awards vary in size and are made on the basis of need, scholarship, character, and promise of future usefulness.

Henderson Settlement

Scholarship

Scholarships in varying amounts are available to high school graduates from the Henderson Settlement School in Frakes, Kentucky, upon the recommendation of the superintendent of the settlement and the high school principal. Qualified persons should apply to the Director of Student Aid.

Junior College Scholarship

Union College has established four honor scholarships for graduates of Sue Bennett Junior College and the same number for graduates of Lindsey Wilson Junior College. Two graduates from each institution will be eligible for full tuition scholarships, valued at \$500 per year and two will be eligible for half-tuition scholarships valued at \$250 per year.

To be eligible for this scholarship a student must graduate in the top twenty per cent of his class at the junior college and be in need of financial assistance. The junior college will nominate the four persons to receive the scholarships and Union College will decide the amount of the scholarship for each student. These scholarships will be renewed for the senior upon the approval of the scholarship committee. Inquiries should be made at the junior college which the applicant is attending.

Additional Junior College

Scholarships ----- Scholarships in the amount of \$500 each, for one year, are awarded to outstanding students from a selected group of junior colleges upon the recommendation of the junior college president or academic dean.

W. B. Landrum Memorial

Scholarship ----- Mr. John B. Landrum of Harrodsburg, Kentucky, provides annually a scholarship of \$250 for a promising Methodist ministerial student in memory of his father. The student benefited by this scholarship must exhibit outstanding personal attitudes of religious sincerity, devotion and earnestness in purpose. Demonstrated failure to exhibit these qualifications to a high degree will result in the forfeiture of the scholarship.

London Laundry Scholarship----- The London Laundry & Dry Cleaners, London, Kentucky, has established an annual \$300 scholarship to assist a student graduating from a high school in Southeastern Kentucky during his Freshman year at Union College. The scholarship is awarded on the basis of scholarship, character and promise of future usefulness.

Methodist Home Scholarship----- Scholarships in varying amounts are available to high school graduates from the Methodist Home in Versailles, Kentucky, upon the recommendation of the superintendent of the Home and the high school principal. Qualified persons should apply to the Director of Student Aid.

Middlesboro Trinity Methodist
Church Scholarship -----

The Trinity Methodist Church of Middlesboro, Kentucky, provides annually a scholarship of \$100 for a needy senior Methodist ministerial student.

Dr. Paul Muncy Memorial Scholarship for Henderson Settlement and Methodist Children's Home Students -----

The Reverend I. S. Pineur of the Kentucky annual Conference provides an annual scholarship of \$50 for a needy student from Henderson Settlement, Frakes, Kentucky, or the Methodist Children's Home, Versailles, Kentucky. This scholarship is given in memory of Dr. Paul Muncy, Union College Trustee and loyal Methodist layman in the Kentucky Annual Conference.

National Methodist Scholarships-----

The Board of Education of the Methodist Church makes available annually to several Methodist students scholarships covering tuition and fees. The awards are made on the basis of character, need and scholastic ability. Only students having at least a "B" average are eligible.

Sims Scholarship Fund -----

The Reverend and Mrs. Harry C. Sims of West View, Kentucky, have established a scholarship fund at Union College to aid worthy students preparing for the Methodist ministry. The income from the fund will be awarded as a scholarship to a student, each year on the basis of need, scholarship, character and promise of future usefulness.

Union National Bank

Scholarship

The Union National Bank of Barbourville, Kentucky, has established a \$485 scholarship at Union College to aid worthy students from Knox County, Kentucky. It is awarded to a student graduating from high school in Knox County for the freshman year, at Union College on the basis of need, scholarship, character, and promise of future usefulness.

O. H. Viall Memorial

Scholarships

Mrs. O. H. Viall and family of Barbourville, Kentucky, have established a memorial scholarship fund at Union College to aid worthy students. The number and size of the scholarships vary, being intended for emergency use by needy students.

Other Scholarships

Other scholarships are often available for students of exceptional academic ability and/or great financial need. Inquiries should be made to the Director of Student Aid.

Grants

Ministerial Loan-Grant

Ministerial loan-grants amounting to \$250 for the academic year are available to students studying for the ministry. To be eligible for this aid the student must have a license to preach, or produce satisfactory evidence of the intent to obtain such license before the beginning of the next academic year. Applicants qualified for the loan-grant must sign a note for the amount received each semester. These notes will be cancelled after the individual has entered into the

full-time ministry. If the student changes his plans and enters another field of endeavor, the notes become due and payable.

Loan-grants amounting to \$500 for the academic year are available to Methodist Local Preachers who agree to serve four years in the Kentucky or Louisville Annual Conferences. These notes will be cancelled after the specified service has been fulfilled.

Grants to Children of Ministers---The unmarried children of ordained Methodist Ministers in good standing who are employed in the service of the church may receive a grant of \$250 for the academic year.

Union College Employee Grants---The dependents of full-time employees of Union College may receive a full tuition grant at Union College or a tuition grant at other Colleges participating in the Tuition Exchange Program.

Educational Opportunity Grants---Direct grants are awarded to students with exceptional financial need who show academic or creative promise.

Elizabeth L. Gates Loan Fund---Mrs. Waldo Brown of Knoxville, Tennessee, has established a loan fund in memory of the mother of Mr. John B. Gates, a former student of Union College. The resources of the fund are available to senior male students preparing for the ministry.

Rev. and Mrs. Erwin King
Loan Fund ----- Reverend and Mrs. Erwin King have established a loan fund to aid worthy ministerial students in their junior or senior years at Union College. To qualify for a loan the students must possess high qualities of character and scholarship.

University of Kentucky Library

Guy H. Williams Loan Fund-----Dr. Guy H. Williams of Cleveland, Ohio, has established a loan fund in memory of his wife, Anna Williams. The resources of the fund are available to worthy students who have spent two years at Union College and have a "C" or better average.

Book Loan Fund -----The Senior Class of 1957 established a loan fund with the hope that future classes would add to its capitalization. The resources of the fund are available to full-time students on short-time loan basis for the purchase of required textbooks.

Other Loan Funds -----Student Loans are available from a number of funds not specifically designated for Union College students, but for which Union College students are eligible. Specific information may be obtained from the Director of Student Aid.

Self-Help

Assistantships -----Several Senior Assistantships are made available annually, one in each of the academic divisions. The assistantships are open to students of outstanding scholastic ability who exhibit great promise of future usefulness and who are considering graduate studies with a view of entering college teaching. The duties of the Senior Assistants include occasional classroom lectures, research, remedial work with beginning students, assisting in laboratories, etc. The Assistants are expected to spend a minimum of twelve hours per week on the work assigned. The awards are made by the Scholastic Com-

mittee upon recommendation from the Division Chairmen. Senior Assistants receive a stipend of \$400 per year.

Workshops -----

The College seeks to employ as many students as possible for jobs on the campus. Such jobs consist of stenographic work in college offices, science laboratory assistance, service in the dining room and kitchen, in the library, gymnasium, and on the campus grounds. Each workshop student is under the supervision of a faculty member or other college employee who makes a monthly time report to the Business Office where credit on an hourly basis is entered on the student's account. The remuneration is fifty cents per hour uniformly for all jobs. The Director of Student Aid can withdraw the workshop at any time if student performance or attitude is unsatisfactory.

There are generally two types of assignments: a full workshop requiring about twelve hours of service per week, and a one-half workshop requiring about six hours of service per week. A full workshop enables a student to earn about \$200 for the academic year, and a one-half workshop enables a student to earn about \$100.

Financial Aid to Students

All of the young men and women of a particular state are a

primary concern of the University of that state. The University of Kentucky is particularly interested, however, in those students of unusual capacity for intellectual endeavors, students who are strongly motivated toward a University education, and students who display a high degree of orientation toward self-help. It seeks in every possible way to aid students possessing these characteristics who, because of limited resources, find it difficult to finance a University education.

The University views financial assistance to students as a partnership in the investment in youth. If parents contribute to the maximum of their ability toward the cost of education; if the student through summer work, through part-time employment while at the University and from other sources makes his contributions; then it is possible for the University to complete the partnership through its program of scholarships, loans and part-time employment.

The Office of Student Financial Aid administers the University's program of financial aid to students, including the Community Colleges, with the Committee on Student Financial Aid acting in an advisory capacity. Students attending or planning to attend one of the Community Colleges should contact the appropriate director regarding financial aid.

The University's program of student financial aid includes Institutional Scholarships, Educational Opportunity Grants, National Defense Student Loans, Nursing Loans, Health Professions Loans and Scholarships, College Work-Study, and Part-Time Employment.

Applications for Student Financial Aid are distributed to all Kentucky High Schools in November. Interested students will receive consideration for all types of assistance for which they may be eligible by filing a single application for financial aid. All applicants for financial aid must:

1. Take the ACT no later than the December testing date in their senior year.
2. Submit a Parents Confidential Statement to College Scholarship Service designating the University of Kentucky as the recipient.
3. Submit an application for Student Financial Aid to the Office of Student Financial Aid no later than February 1. (Applications are available from the high school principal or counselor.)

Currently enrolled University students and students transferring from other institutions should request applications from this office

during the month of March. To receive consideration, the applicant must be in good standing.

Scholarships

J. B. Speed Senior

Scholarship ----- This scholarship is awarded annually each spring to a Louisville resident junior, \$100 to be applied on fees when a senior.

J. B. Speed Junior

Scholarship ----- Annually each spring to a Louisville resident sophomore, \$100 to be applied on fees when a junior.

J. B. Speed Open Scholarship ----- \$150 to non-resident student applied on fees the following year.

Esther and Morris Flexner

Scholarship ----- To needy student who gives promise of useful life and whose record makes him or her worthy.

Bernard Flexner Scholarship ----- Several awarded on basis of recipients being in upper 20 per cent of their graduating class, and on basis of University entrance test scores.

Nettleroth Scholarships ----- Awarded annually to full-time students in College of Arts and Sciences. These scholarships are awarded on the basis of need and high scholastic standing. The amount of the grants varies from \$200 to \$700 per year.

Inge Hirscheimer Berman
Memorial Scholarship ----- Presented annually by the Delta Phi Epsilon Alumnae to a worthy, needy student with scholastic standing of at least 1.5.

Alpha Kappa Alpha
Scholarship ----- Awarded to needy and worthy sophomore or junior women. Recipient must meet requirements of Student Aid Committee.

The Thomas Scholarships
in English ----- Awarded annually for outstanding scholarship to a junior in the College of Arts and Sciences or the University College.

Allen R. Hite Art
Scholarship ----- Several (partial and full) scholarships to students majoring in creative art or history of art. Submit samples of work and take an examination. Full details obtained from Room 210, Administration Building, Director of Allen R. Hite Art Institute. Students receiving full tuition scholarships are obligated to take 3 hours of work per week for the Department of Fine Arts.

Humphrey Centenary
Scholarship -----

Awarded to senior student for post-graduate study at a University in the United Kingdom. Candidates selected upon recommendation of the President and Board of Trustees; acceptance by the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford with final approval by Trustees of the Scholarship.

President's Scholarship -----

Twelve for graduates of Louisville and Jefferson County High Schools. Awarded on basis of competitive examination. Each worth the amount of tuition for freshman year.

Trustee's Scholarships -----

Awarded on the basis of scholastic achievement and covers full tuition for one year. Recipients must have done all their work at the University of Louisville. In the College of Arts and Sciences, nine such scholarships are awarded; in Speed School, four; in the School of Business, one; and one in the School of Music.

Work Scholarships -----

Many are provided to help deserving students and awarded on basis of need and promise of scholastic ability. Student recipients are obligated to do a stipulated number of hours of work in offices and different departments of the University. The amount earned is applied to the student's tuition.

Band Scholarships -----

\$50 each semester awarded after an audition by the Director of the Bands. Write to Department of Bands, University of Louisville, Belknap Campus, Louisville 8, Kentucky.

University of Kentucky Library

Top-Ranking Senior

Scholarships ----- Awarded to top-ranking graduates of accredited public Louisville and Jefferson County public high schools. Full tuition for freshman year. If top-ranking graduate is unable to accept the award, it then becomes available to second-highest graduating senior of that school. High school principals are asked to report to the Chairman of the Student Aid Committee before the close of the school year, the names of students eligible to receive these awards.

General University

Scholarships ----- Awarded on basis of scholastic achievement and need of students in any case of the undergraduate schools of the University.

Alumni Scholarships

----- The College of Arts and Sciences has ten scholarships for freshmen above average ability who have demonstrated leadership qualities in high school.

P. E. O. Scholarships

----- Awarded by different chapters of P. E. O. to needy women students of high scholastic ability and exemplary character.

Anna H. Settle

Scholarship ----- Awarded annually by Altrusa Club of Louisville to needy, scholastic ability women students. Awarded by the Student Aid Committee on recommendation of the Dean of Women, with approval of the Altrusa Club.

Highland Mother's Club

Award ----- Awarded annually to a woman student in College of Arts and Sciences.

National Secretaries

Association Scholarship ----- Awarded semi-annually to an outstanding student in the School of Business who is a Secretarial Science major. This award covers half tuition for two years.

Loans

Financial Aid is available to students through various loan funds. Small amounts are lent without interest, for short periods of time. These loans are administered by the Office of the Dean of Men.

Federal funds are now available. Any full-time student in good standing may apply. Students may borrow up to \$1,000 a year for five years. The money is to be paid back over a 10-year period, beginning one year after graduation at 3 per cent interest on the unpaid balance.

Self-Help

The many industries located in the Louisville Metropolitan Area afford the student a unique opportunity for obtaining work experience related to his academic training. The University Placement Service contacts the various industries in this area to secure job leads for students interested in part-time, evening or night work. Students interested in business careers can find employment in various offices. With every field of study represented in some phase of Louisville business or industry, the Placement office makes a constant effort to help the student find employment that will help him to further his education as well as to defray the cost of going to school.

Scholarships

Tuition Scholarship ----- Four-year and one-year tuition scholarships are awarded on intellectual ability and achievement. SAT scores, good high school record, recommendations, and financial need are criteria for selection. Application deadline is February 15.

National Merit Scholarship ----- Four-year scholarships are awarded to selected students who are semi-finalists in the NMST program. These cover tuition charges for a maximum of sixteen semester hours per semester.

Loans and Grants

National Defense Student

Loan ----- An undergraduate student who has been accepted for enrollment and who needs financial help is eligible to apply for a loan. A student may borrow up to \$1000 each year. The loan bears interests at the rate of 3 per cent per year and repayment may be extended over a ten-year period. Application should be made by March 31.

Guaranteed Loan Program ----- A student may borrow from a bank or other financial institutions as much as \$1000 a year. A student from a family with an adjusted income of less than \$15,000 a year pays no interest while he is in college. Repayment of principal and interest begins when the student has ceased his course of study. Direct inquiries to Director of Student Finances.

United Student Aid Funds ----- USA Funds is a private, non-profit service corporation which endorses low-cost, long-term loans made by local banks to needy college students. Students may borrow up to \$1000 a year. Applications are made through the Director of Student Finances.

Self-Help

Work-Study Program ----- Students from low-income families who need a job to help pay for college expenses are eligible for employment. They may work up to 15 hours weekly attending classes full time. The basic pay rate is \$1.25 an hour. A student must be enrolled and be in good standing, or be accepted for enrollment as a full-time student.

On campus jobs include work in dining halls, laboratories, libraries, and offices.

Student Staff Plan ----- This plan affords ambitious residence students an opportunity to earn tuition, board and room expenses. A limited number of students may work approximately thirty hours a week in the cafeteria or elsewhere on campus. A program of class work has been arranged so that the staff student may earn her degree in five years and two summer sessions.

Deferred Payment Plan ----- For those parents who prefer to put tuition payments on "a-pay-as-you-go" basis, the college participates in two deferred payment plans. Information will be sent to students who have been accepted for enrollment.

The Parent's Confidential Statement of the College Scholarship Service is required with all financial aid applications. Submit the Parent's Confidential Statement at least two weeks before the application deadline to the address designated on the Parent's Statement. The Parent's Confidential Statement may be obtained at your secondary school or by request from our Financial Aid Office.

VILLA MADONNA COLLEGE

Scholarships

Tuition Scholarship ----- The College also awards four four-year and eight one-year tuition scholarships. These are based on the American College Test (October and December tests only), plus an evaluation by the faculty of each candidate's high school.

Additional Scholarship ----- Full or partial scholarships are awarded annually both to incoming students and to students presently enrolled. These are based on academic performance, contribution to the college, and financial need. Financial need is evidenced through submission of a Parents' Confidential Financial Statement.

Loans and Grants

Educational Opportunity Grant Program ----- The Educational Opportunity Grant Program is to assist students of exceptional financial need who, for lack of financial means of their own or of their families, would be unable to enter or remain in college.

A grant stipend may not be less than \$200 nor more than \$800 for the academic year. The student's and his parent's income, assets, and resources are considered by the college in determining student eligibility and the size of the grant stipend.

The application deadline is February 1, and application information should be obtained at the Student Financial Aid Office at the college.

National Defense Student Loan

Program

National Defense Student Loans, which are granted on the basis of financial need, may range up to \$1000 a year. There are no restrictions and these one-year loans are granted both to incoming freshmen and to current students.

None of the principal and interest (3%) needs to be paid until the student terminates his course of studies. Portions of the loan may be forgiven for those who enter the teaching profession after graduating from college.

The loan application deadline is February 1, and application information may be obtained at the Student Financial Aid Office at the college.

The Guaranteed Student

Loan Program

The Guaranteed Student Loan Program enables a student to borrow up to \$1000 a year and is available to incoming freshmen and current students.

If the student's adjusted family income is less than \$15,000 a year, the first repayment of principal and interest is not due until nine months after a student terminates his course of study.

The loan application deadline is February 1, and application information may be obtained at the Student Financial Aid Office at the college.

Insured Tuition Plan ----- Available to students is an insured tuition plan through Education Funds, Inc. of Providence, Rhode Island. This plan offers a budget provision whereby college expenses may be divided into monthly installments. It also provides insurance for the parent, thus assuring continued education for the student despite the death or disability of the parent.

Currently Western provides approximately 1,100 job opportunities on the campus, working both with the regular and the work-study programs, and also provides summer employment for approximately 150 students on a full-time basis under the work-study program during the summer.

Other Programs

Working with industry located in this area, Western has developed a program of cooperative education wherein a student may be in attendance during alternate semesters after the freshman year and working with industry during the alternate terms in order to attend college. This program is administered by Western's Bowling Green College of Commerce.

Western works closely with the state in the Rehabilitation Program and applicants interested in this program should contact their local Bureau of Rehabilitation representative.

The University also cooperates with the Veterans Administration in extending benefits to qualified veterans as well as the administering of their other related programs.

The financial aid program is administered through the Financial Aid Office under the direction of Mr. A. J. Thurman, Post Office Box 265, College Heights, Bowling Green, Kentucky.

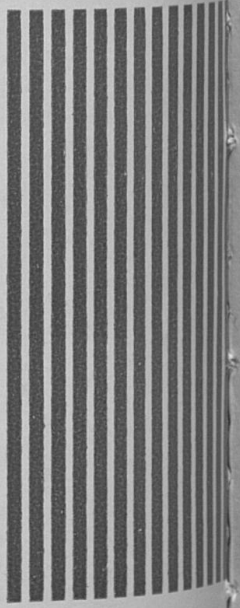
