# **Bombs target communications**

In Baghdad: U.S. airstrikes hit Information Ministry, telecommunication centers and Republican Guard units

Fire taged yards away from a shopping mall named for Saddam Hussein's birth-day pouring smoke into the sky after a pre-dawn airstike Monday targeted the Iraqi Information Ministry.

Recorded calls of "God is great" from mosque minarets alerted the people of Baghdad to another night of bombings Sunday, followed by a massive

explosion and then the streaks of anti-aircraft gun-ners' tracers across the sky.

In the past few nights, the mosque loudspeakers have been used instead of air-raid sirens—with the all-clear signaled by another minaret announcement: "God is great, they are gone."

### Suicide attacker's family rewarded

Suicide attacker's family rewarded BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq gave \$34,000 to the family of an Iraqi army officer who killed four U.S. soldiers in a suicide attack, and the leader of the militant group Islamic Jihad said Sunday its volunteers had gone to Baghdad for similar bombing missions against the 'American invasion.' All Jaafar al-Noamani, a noncommissioned officer with several children, was posthumously promoted to colonel and awarded two medals for the attack in Najaf that killed the unidentified Americans, Iraqi state television reported. His family reportedly was given a fortune by Iraqi standards: 100 million dinars, the equivalent of \$34,000.

Iraq decentralizes military forces
BAGHDAD, Iraq — Saddam Hussein set
up a system giving his most trusted lieutenants and local tribal leaders the power to
mount a guerrilla campaign or other military measures without waiting for his orders. Saddam reorganized his chain of command before the war so that he need not
give every order and thus make himself vulnerable to U.S. electronic detection. U.S. officials, however, see the absence of Saddam's
strong hand on the battlefield as a sign that
he may be dead or wounded. Although Saddam may not be issuing all the orders, his
prediction of a tough ground fight is on the
mark, and his defensive measures appear to
be paying off. "I don't know whether the
leader of this regime is dead or alive," Cen.
Tommy Franks, the U.S. war commander,
said in Doha, Qatar.

### Iraqi city's holy sites complicate invasion

**Touchy:** Damage to Islam's most sacred shrines could inflame terrorism; strategy for city unclear

NEAR NAJAF Iraq — The 101st Airborne Division en-circled the Shiite holy city of Najaf on Sunday preparing for a possible door-to-door battle to root out Saddam Hus-sein's fighters — but leery of damaging some of the faith's

sein's fighters — but leery of damaging some of the faths most sacred shrines.

To the north, Army brigades crept closer to Baghdad, advancing 10 miles with little resistance, though battles with the Republican Guard loomed. To the south, Marines launched "search-and-destroy" missions to clear the road to Baghdad of Iraqi attackers.

But it was at Najaf — a city of 300,000, 100 miles south of Baghdad — that U.S. military leaders were faced with a discount of the south of the south

It is in Najaf that Ali, son-in-law of the prophet Muhammad, is buried at an extraordinary shrine, its gold dome and twin minarets gleaming for miles. It is surrounded by low buildings and narrow streets, a nightmare of an urban bat-

Other Muslim prophets are buried there and at the vast al Wadi es Salaam cemetery — one of the world's largest — that forms a semicircle around the city Officers speaking on condition of anonymity said some of the Iraqi fighters were hiding there.

A battle that destroyed these holy places could inflame passions of Shities in Iraq and elsewhere, most notably in the passion of the place of the place

passions of Shiites in Iraq and elsewhere, most notatoly Iran.

Ihrahim Khalili, a prominent Iranian Shiite clergyman, said: "I don't think that anyone dares to attack a holy site in Iraq. An attack on holy shrines will only provoke the unconvolled anger of Muslims, especially Shiites, with serious consequences to the attackers."

Capt. Micah Pharris, an attorney in the 101st Airborne's judge advocate general's office, said some locations in Najaf are on the military's "no targer" islst—to be fired at only in self defense.

"We take our responsibility to these things very seriously and treat them with the utmost respect," he said. So the Army still held out hope that the battle could be avoided. Using loudspeakers mounted on Humvees, U.S. solders on Najaf's perimeter will soon beseech its townspeople to turn over Saddam's zealots.

# War protests take place across U.S., around world

**'Who Would Jesus Bomb?'** Protesters use creative methods of voicing their disapproval for the war in Iraq

PITTSBURGH — War protesters blocked traffic and some were pepper-sprayed and arrested during a snow demonstration in Pittsburgh on Sunday while thousands of protesters marched through Philadelphia in a cold rain.

In Philadelphia, several housand people braved the weather; many wearing buttons that read "Bring Our Troops Home." Interspersed in the crowd were plain-clothes officers wearing police armbands.
