Dear Sister;

Will take time out and pen you a few lines before I finish my cards. Wind blowing a gale out side and raining some began to rain about 9⁵⁰ P.M. last night, a clap of thunder & has rained most of the night. Turned warmer Sunday & was it icy Monday morning? melted in a lively rate Monday & most everything gone by yesterday morning, glad for the rain as they were priming the pump again. Bad ice jams at the bridges tho. They did some dynamiting in Col. Monday night. So much has happened since I wrote. It was Ed Taylor that fell instead of Elbert & cracked his rib. Mrs Shultz had another real bad spell last Friday evening, so bad the Dr. tried several things & finally had to give a little Chloroform before he could get her quiet. Jim Franklin went to the White Cross Hospital Monday to have his knee scraped again, he hasn't been out since Christmas. Dr. Brubacher is looking after it. Moll was about sick with a sore throat so much of it seems to be going around. I am feeling some better this 9¹¹ A.M. my heart has been off for a day or two. Laura went to the Basket Ball Tournament Sat. Powell beat Center, Galena was beaten by Orange. Sunbury beat Ashley by 1 point. Berlin beat Ostrander & I don't know the rest. Finish up this next Sat. Gail & I went to Col. I did not go last Wed. so I stopped at the house & got some material. Dr. Lewis had left before he went to Ala. he is in St. Louis, this week will be back the last of the week, do not know when I will see him again as it seems everything

keeps me from working at that work. We went on out
to Kidner's Uncle is working again. Auntie was so homesick to see
some one Lizzie had a letter from her Fri. I thought I better go
to Col. Sat + go out + get the saw as I could make the grade cards
out easier at night than go to Col. We got back about 3⁰⁰ P.M.
John + I, John went to W- as we went down + got his hair cut
+ Gail staid + got his cut when we came back, he got a ride
out about 5³⁰ I did some washing + made pies, etc. and
it was about midnight before I went to bed on the lounge as
Laura staid over her with Marjorie M. Elver + just as I was
dropping off I heard a machine horn out south of the house
I got my slippers on + it was Mrs D. Bell, wanting to call
Ible, they had been in an auto accident down by the Dairy
Barn. Joe Montgomery driving Dan Slacks car, without
lights + drunk at that ran into them + turned the car over
threw Evelyn out first + Mrs kept the Mr staid in, he was
bruised + shaken up + Mrs was cut a little on her right hip
+ a small cut on her right arm, but Evelyn had both elbows
+ legs larked ^{read} deep a cut on her forehead + one in the
back of her head, near where it fastens on the spine, they
but 4 clamps in + her back was larked + bruised where she
hit the bricks. She was taken into Huffs + the only Dr they
could get was Lawrence. He got her stapled up + they called
Stockdale to bring her home, they got in about 11⁰⁰ P.M. she was

some more treatment. I don't know just what they are doing,

stopped on the way home from Church + left a night gown
I had taken one over in the morning + she was resting a little +

morning, a stroke Dr. B. told me. Uncle Georges

but her dresses were out on the bed so they
did not get in. Wright said Leroy said to tell
me anything he didn't get he would be there
on his way to Col some time soon + he could

told John, but that is all I know.

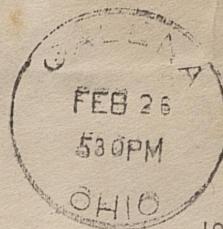
Hope you have a good meeting there

John had a W.P.S. meeting and in the course of human events told the Pres (Zena Belle) that he would send her a sheet and some other things that was on his heart. Now are they teasing him. You can't guess what I am doing while I write. Eating a sandwich of cold potatoes and turnip Kraut. Can you beat it? Had a good Conf Miss service tonight.

I do so want to get this letter off to you so I'll write it if I can before I go to bed. They are going to bed so I'll have to hurry.

I wonder what I should write you. There is such a hub-bub but I can't think but it may be worse at least for awhile tomorrow.

I gave my 22nd talk on Home Missions last Sun night. A week ago Sun A.M. I talked at Findley and before I got up the Lord poured into my soul a vision I've never had before of the needs of the mountains and the vastnesses unexplored from

a missionary standpoint. So many places need to be evangelized. I'd love to go west and do something in the Black Hills and hand it over to Bro Thompson. I felt like I'd almost burn up under it. I'm going to S. Dak. but just waiting for the Lord to tell me when. The more I pray that the Lord make known His will, the closer the call comes and the Lord certainly clearing up things. My X Ray is paid and yesterday I got a letter from Dr Bauer with the receipt in it for my Dr bill some one had paid it. That is the last thing that troubled me.

I keep on getting better too. I'm doing up six Vorkies' sewing for her and she certainly does appreciate it. Poor soul! I pity her for she can't sew and isn't able into the bargain. Dorothy sent the girls some goods. Sis Vorkies best dress has a patch on each elbow. Sis Stratton tried to keep me there but I knew Sis Vorkies needed me so much and I felt that I was done in Dindlay I told her I'd come back when I finish here if I can.

Got such a good letter from Grace Davis. She had performed her second wedding. Her younger brother and she was so jolly in her letter. It

seemed so good to have her joke again. She ended by saying she was so broken hearted about not going back to Ky.

I hope you will forget as much as you can of what I said for it was wrong from me by nervous tension. Please be sure to keep my confidences. I've asked the Lord to forgive but, Momma, it can't be that a whole crowd of spiritual people should be wrong. If I were so far off the Lord wouldn't open several other places before I'm even able to go. I'll be so glad when I can forget the whole thing. Please pray that I may. Two of the girls as you know, wrote such an appeal to D.C. The burden has been so heavy again lately. If there isn't something done soon the tongues will get the whole thing. I'm pleading for the souls of the students and the neighborhood.

Was so glad to get Grace and Lizzie's letters. Am so glad Bro Wright is getting such help. May the Lord richly bless him!

We had a good altar service Sun. Bro V. is getting desperate. We went up to pray for a

Revival and Zena Belle got so desperate for herself and got lots of help. The Lord is moving. But the hold up that has been the heart burden doesn't move.

Hope you have a very good meeting after Sat. Keep addressing me here. They will follow me wherever I am.

I had Leroy bring my trunk up but he got it and nothing else. My rope, music stand, dresses and picks under the bed. I'm in another dicament. As soon as I find where and when I'm going I'll write Grace for them then send her the postage.

My dear, keep praying for me. I'll come out O.K. somewhere. The Lord can answer.

Dear Miss Rogers:

When our Committee met yesterday to consider various matters that were before us as a Missionary Society, we were very conscious of the fact of the Lord's presence. I am sure He very definitely answered the prayers of our Ohio friends as well as yourself and many others who were interceding in our behalf at that time. Several members of the Committee expressed themselves as feeling very restful and satisfied over the decisions which were reached. We feel the Lord is pleased.

I am not sure whether you know of recent spiritual experiences which Arthur Ford has passed through or not, but he has written us very frankly stating that he found, under the illumination of the Spirit, that he was in a backslidden condition. Early in February he prayed through to reclamation and a couple of weeks later to sanctification. Since that time he lost the experience once but has regained it again. He, himself, suggested that we should wait until he has had an opportunity to prove the genuineness of his experience. We have real confidence in him and Mrs. Ford and believe that the Lord has a great ministry for them on the Africa field.

I am also wondering how much you know about the proposition which was presented to Brother and Sister Ford by his father, who is a missionary under the Friends' Board in Africa. The Friends missionaries on the field have been authorized by their home Board to employ a man to teach in one of their schools while another missionary comes home on furlough. This is only a temporary need on their field, and inasmuch as we could not possibly send out two couples at this present time, on account of lack of living quarters on our new site, it seems very providential that Brother and Sister Ford go to their father at this time to assist in the Friends' work with the thought that they should come to us after another year or so.

In the meantime, they have some support from the Friends' Board, also from Mrs. Ford's home church in Michigan, and other gifts from friends. Money for their outfit and traveling expenses to the field is already in their possession, having been supplied through their father in Africa. Thus they are provided for for the present time and in his last letter to

us Brother Ford said that the N. H. A. Missionary Society would be responsible for none of their finances until they should come to labor with us in Africa.

I have been thinking of the pledge of the Ohio State Auxiliary. We know you will want to assist in a very definite way in some phase or phases of the work this year, and since the support of Brother Ford will not really begin for another year, we would like to suggest that the gifts of the Ohio Auxiliary be applied to other phases of the work. No doubt you would prefer to assist in the work on the Africa field, inasmuch as Brother Ford and his wife will be laboring there. Possibly the Ohio Auxiliary would like during this year to contribute toward a building fund for the erection of a building ^(Missionary Home) on our next site in Africa. We are hoping the new site will be in the Vatende district, and it is in that district that we desire to have Brother and Sister Ford labor, inasmuch as the dialect which Arthur speaks is practically the same as the Vatende. If this suggestion meets with your approval, we will be happy to have you let us know, or if you have any suggestions to make or any questions to ask, we will be happy to have you write us in detail.

I do not know just how soon Brother and Sister Ford will go to the field, but think that they plan to go in the very near future, possibly within three or four weeks. We are happy indeed to have them do so and are looking forward to the time when they will be laboring with us on the Africa field.

May the Lord graciously bless you as you continue laboring for the salvation of precious souls.

LATEST NEWS



MRS. A. B. RICHARDS writes, "We are rejoicing here at Tungchangfu because of the large number of new inquirers that we have here as a result of the gospel tent having been pitched in some of the villages not far away. One Sunday not long ago there were fifty new inquirers out to the services....All of these people have prayed and confessed their sins and sought the Lord..."

Under the heading 'Bible School Notes', REV. KENNETH P. WESCHE writes "Rev. Alice Watts has taken over Miss Aggola's duties as dean of women and treasurer of the Bible School. Miss Aggola is now making an evangelistic trip through the Shantung field with the Africa Missionaries (Misses Day and Ferneau) and will no doubt be in America before this article is printed. She has with her the blue print of the plans for the new Bible School buildings. How we long to start building this spring! God is able. Let us seek His will and early pray the prayer of faith."

Concerning two of the graduates from the Tientsin Bible School, REV. W. A. SMITH says, "With full hearts they went forth to sow and reap for the Master. The harvest was plenteous and the laborers few. Then one day they were unexpectedly called home by their parents. Their families are unbelievers and have no sympathy with Christians and their ideals....They were forbidden to leave home again at the cost of being disowned by their families. Both men are the only sons in their homes....In view of the super-sacredness of the parent-son relationship which prevails in China our two young friends feel compelled to fall in line with their parents' wishes temporarily. They believe, however, that God will release their captivity in His own time and desire the earnest prayers of God's people that their witness may be bright and fruitful in their home communities."

Shortly after his arrival in the Shantung field, MR. EARL NEWTON wrote, "With the new tent our workers did not need to fear the winds that are prevalent at this time of the year. With the one tent they could not have gone out again until spring, but with the new one they prepared and went out the day before Christmas and stayed out over the New Year. Even frozen ground which defied the stakes did not stop them, for they found some trees and there set up the tent, using fewer stakes and more trees. The weather was cold, but even so there were some fifty persons who received definite help at that time."



Writing from the new Sotik field in Africa concerning special meetings at the New Year season, MRS. ROBERT K. SMITH says, "All the services from the early 6:00 A.M. prayer meeting to the afternoon testimony and praise service were well attended, and when the songs of praise rose, one could shut his eyes and almost imagine himself back in the old U. S. A. at a holiness campmeeting. New Years dawned a beautiful African day. The Lord was very present in the prayer service and in the examination of those in the Baptism Class. There were seventeen in the class and in answering their questions many became so blessed they could not answer for tears of joy were running down their cheeks!"

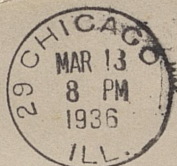

KIRKPATRICK says, "We had a wonderful break in one of our lukewarm outschools in which over sixty came to the altar in one service....Things are very encouraging along many lines. I trust my visit was not in vain, in helping her to see some things. Had a lovely visit with her mother, too. A lady evangelist was there holding meetings at the U.B. church, so we attended services that night. I thanked the Lord over and over that I was not a real young person now meeting the temptations which come to young folks. It was bad enough in our day, but seems so much worse now. She told me about a lot of things, which the ordinary church member has no idea of among the things of the world, and the folks of the world in the younger set. Well, our Saviour can meet every problem, and solve them, too. Our trio are singing a song next Wed. A.M. "The Saviour Can Solve Every Problem". You'll like the words. 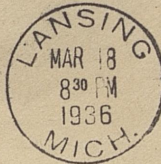

Dear Miss Rogers:

Thank you very much for your letter of the 16th inst. which came in today's mail. What you say regarding your leading in connection with the plans for ^{my wife} Arthur Ford confirms our thought, or rather I should say, our conviction, that the Lord would have him go and labor with his father for the present. I am sure that the members of the Ohio band will understand. This plan seems to be very satisfactory to Jefferson Ford and his son, Arthur, and wife, as well as the Smiths on the Africa field, Miss Clara Ford, and the members of our Board. Surely the Lord has been leading clearly.

Now as to the building on the Vatende site. As you know, we do not yet have a site there. We have heard indirectly that the Catholics have established an outschool on the very spot which our missionaries selected for a site. We are not sure, however, that this is true. If we cannot get a site on the Kenya side of the border, we will endeavor to get one on the Tanganyika side, which, of course, would mean we would have to work through a different set of government officials. Until the site is actually granted, we cannot make any definite promise regarding the erection of buildings, and if funds are raised for Vatende, I think it would be better to say, "for our next site". This, then, will leave the Board and the missionaries on the field free to use the funds for a building on our next site, whether it is in Vatende or in some other district. Of course, we are hoping it will be in the Vatende district.

In this connection, I think it would be well not to say definitely that the house is to be occupied by Arthur Ford and his wife. This also is what we are anticipating, but until plans in this regard are definitely made, I believe it will be best not to announce that the house is for them. You can see how it would be very embarrassing if the plans for Brother and Sister Ford should not work out as we now expect them to. It will be very difficult to get in touch with the various contributors again and get the matter fully straightened out.

Objective: "The Whole Gospel for the Whole World"

Miss Shryock took her medical examination yesterday and the doctor recommends sending her to the field.

Miss Barnum just came into the office, so I will show her your letter. We are sorry to learn of the death of Mr. Miller, but trust his home-going may be made a means of blessing to others and that those who are under conviction may see their need of praying clear through.

As soon as the Ohio bands make their decision, we will be happy to have you let us know.

In connection with the above matters it seems to me that perhaps the stronger appeal for the present should be in connection with the Sotik site, since the building program there has already been started and there is need of funds to complete the homes for our missionaries who will be there. I doubt if our missionaries will feel they should put forth any special effort to secure a second site until the occupation of the first site is nearly completed. In other words, it may be better not to turn the attention of our Ohio friends to a site which we have not yet been granted when there is great need in connection with the site which was secured last June in Sotik. These, however, are only suggestions, and we trust you will proceed according to the Lord's leading.

May His rich blessing rest upon you in the remaining meetings of the campaign at Dorr.

My dear Miss Rogers:


We were very sorry to hear that your pictures were not satisfactory to you and your friends. We thought they were fine and we expected only words of praise for them.
