



Dear alumnus-a,

For the demands upon college students of our nation's all-out war effort threatens to discourage the activities, even the very existence of League chapters. Nevertheless, the gospel testimony must go forth in time of war as well as peace. Now is not the time to surrender it.

Not only must there be no retreat, the League must advance and expand. The League must evangelize now as it never has before, unless it is satisfied to expect a post-war demoralization that would throttle all Christian witnessing and living.

But trying as the prospects are, the Lord is blessing the League. For instance, He is blessing the work of the chapter at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. Enclosed you will find evangelistic literature used there to good effect. We need more of this, in many colleges.

What can you do to help? As an alumnus of the League, interested in the spiritual welfare of Christian students and the evangelization of unbelievers, you should (1) fill out and return the attached membership application, (2) send in annul dues of one dollar, (3) if possible, send a contribution, (4) let us know of evangelical students and League alumni, (5) interest others in the work of the League, (6) pray for the Lord's blessing on the League, and a real revival on the college campuses.

What Provision is Made for Group Membership?

Any three or more students in an institution of higher learning, who are eligible for membership, may form a chapter on applying to the General Secretary for recognition.

What Can the League Do for its Members?

In accord with the policy outlined above, the League offers (1) Bible study materials, (2) apologetic literature, (3) evangelistic methods that have been put into practice and found worthwhile, (4) finances, insofar as the national treasury will allow, to support evangelism on local campuses, (5) a Regional Secretary, where feasible, to guide regional activities in the most fruitful channels and provide a personal ministration to students, (6) advice on organizational problems, (7) a national fellowship of students fostered by newsletters and by national and regional conventions, (8) the backing of an able Board of Trustees and a large Alumni Association.

What About the League of Evangelical Students?

Why Was the League Started?

The L.E.S. was organized in 1925 to raise up a student protest against modern unbelief and to take a stand for the defense and propagation of the gospel of everlasting salvation through the sacrificial death of God's only begotten Son.

Has the League Remained True to its Original Purpose?

By the grace of God, the League has remained true to its purpose, for it stands today as in 1925, soundly evangelical. Modernism has not entered the League. The League is still zealous in its defense and propagation of the gospel of Christ.

Has the League Been Evangelistic?

The League has always been militant against modernism. But is the League evangelistic as well as apologetic? On the one hand, the L.E.S. has discouraged methods of evangelism that by reason of their dependence on emotionalism and sensationalism cheapen the gospel in the eyes of intelligent students and academic administrators. On the other hand, it has tried to encourage a type of testimony that is based upon and centered in the Bible. However, there is much room for improvement; evangelistic zeal must be ever more passionate and effective.

What Kind of Apologetics Does the League Now Have?

It is intended to continue the high academic standards of the past. But in addition, there is being emphasized a particularized apologetic—one that will be adapted to the respective needs of the seminary, college and high school. Each student should study the Bible and its system of doctrine with reference to his particular needs.

What Kind of Evangelistic Program Does the League Now Have?

The League will continue to encourage methods of evangelism that are suited, in dignity, to the student level. But also the League will more and more encourage evangelism that is passionate and efficient. Zeal must be aroused to evangelize every student in the colleges to which the League every student in the colleges to which the League effort throughout the land. And with zeal must go knowledge, so that resources and energy will not be wasted in misplaced efforts. Student evangelism must be scientifically studied, conscientiously applied, and systematically pursued. It must be conjoined with thorough Bible study and experienced, personal counselling.

How Does the League Execute This Program?

In three ways: (1) by recognizing the division of the student world into several fields, i.e. seminary, college, Bible school, high school, etc.

Activities of League chapters, then, will be oriented to the situations and needs of these divisions; (2) by appointing qualified Regional Secretaries who, with the support of evangelical seminaries, colleges and churches in that area, supervise evangelistic activities, and provide Bible study and personal counselling; (3) by the coordinating activities of the General Secretary and the national executive committee. By this means the programs both of the various student levels and of the geographic regions must be welded into one mighty evangelical testimony.

Is the League Distinctive as a Student Organization?

While the League gratefully acknowledges the testimony of other Christian student organizations, it is distinctive in that it is intended to be (1) national, (2) inclusive of all the student levels, (3) staunchly apologetic, and (4) passionately and methodically evangelistic.

What Provision is Made for Individual Membership?

The League welcomes as member that student who expresses faith in the Bible as the infallible Word of God, and acceptance of the fundamental truths of the Christian religion, such as: the Trinity, the virgin birth of Christ, His divine and human natures, His substitutionary atonement, His resurrection from the dead, and His coming again. Application should be made to the General Secretary.

This folder has been prepared by the P. C. P. & S. Chapter of the League of Evangelical Students, especially for the students at this college. What Can He Believe?

It seems somehow that the more one learns, the less one is supposed to believe. Are not the college and the graduate school far removed from the credulity of the high school age? Particularly skeptical is the graduate school of science: the school of engineering, of medicine, of pharmacy. Here, only that may be believed which can be analyzed in the test tube, and expressed by a mathematical formula. Surely there is no comfort, then, for an evangelical Christian student in such an atmosphere. What can such a student believe?

What Should He Believe?

But for the Christian, the real question is, what should he believe? He can believe, for he sees no valid reason why he should subject his beliefs to a laboratory test. To do this were to make the test tube ultimate and God merely a subject for analysis. Rather, the important question for the Christian is, what should he believe? In all honesty to the name "Christian" which he professes, he must believe in that for which the name stands—the historic, orthodox doctrine of Christianity.

But how is he to tell what is orthodox? By the Bible, which is the only infallible rule, or standard of Christianity. A Platonist is one who believes and accepts the writings of Plato; much more must the Christian believe the Bible, the Word of God.

How Should He Believe?

It is naturally assumed that the Platonist, believing the writings of Plato, first of all studies and understands them. So also the Christian should believe intelligently. There is no excuse for blinders in a graduate school of science. Only the most highly integrated system of belief can survive the dissecting atmosphere of such a school. But Christianity is just this. Therefore the Christian student needs no blinders.

However, the Christian student should believe not only intelligently, but dogmatically. That is, his belief, while it is rational in the highest sense of the word, transcends the Christian's reasoning and finds its ground in the ultimate rationality of an infinite, eternal God. Consequently, the Christian should not expect to resolve every difficulty; only in God is there complete and perfect rationality. It is the responsibility of the Christian student to believe just that which the Word of God teaches, and interpret all things in the light of that teaching.

Why Should He Thus Believe?

To many students this may seem a contradiction; the Christian student is to believe intelligently, but he is also to believe that which he cannot prove experimentally, or reason through entirely. Why should the Christian believe in a creation out of nothing, for instance, when an intelligent grasp of modern science ought so clearly to teach evolution? How can the two elements of the Christian's belief, the intelligent and the dogmatic, be reconciled in this case?

The Christian believes in the creation that the Bible teaches, because it is a fact of divine revelation. Others may think this arbitrary, but what mortal is in a position to deny divine revelation? Further, to put the shoe on another foot, what right has anyone to assume the "fact" of evolution or any other "fact" for that matter, when, as it were, all his "facts" rest on thin air? If the all-wise, all-powerful God of the Bible is not the creator and sustainer of the universe, what does give coherence and rationality to all things?

The Christian student thanks God through his Lord Jesus Christ that he need not apologize for his belief but can stand squarely upon the gospel of Christ and the Word of God.



Dear Miss Rogers:


This acknowledges with thanks your communication urging the establishment by federal statute of prohibition of all alcoholic liquors in or near our military and naval camps.

I share fully with you your deep interest in the welfare of our young men in the service. I do this both from the point of view of the individual serviceman and of the country. I served two years in the infantry in the last war, including front line service. I have two sons in the Navy now and have given close attention to the legislation in which you are interested.

In answer to my inquiry, I am advised by Brigadier General F. H. Osborn, who is a competent officer appointed from civilian life, in charge of these matters, that the standard of conduct now being maintained in the army and navy is unusually high and compares favorably, not only with past experience in those services, but with current experience in civil life. Much constructive work is being done in the armed forces, as well as in civilian life, to bring about that understanding which leads to temperance.

Within the camps, I believe that the already strict army and navy regulations are adequate and beneficial. Outside of the camps, I believe that, except in some areas of scant population where there may be no adequate law-enforcing officials, the local laws of the states, cities and villages provide the most practical and fair way to meet the issue. Those laws express the sentiment of those localties, and experience has shown that personal conduct legislation succeeds best when it springs from and is supported by the majority opinion of the areas affected.

The action which has been taken by the Senate as to the Lee Amendment is to refer it to the Committee on Military Affairs with special instructions that hearings be held on it and that the committee report its recommendations to the Senate as soon as practical.
