

KENTUCKY vs. MISSISSIPPI

Coach John Vaught's Ole Miss Rebels come to town today with fire in their eyes after a stunning, 27-17, upset at the hands of Memphis State last Saturday at Memphis.

They'll meet an equally determined group of Kentucky Wildcats, who are still smarting from an opening, 12-10, defeat by Indiana at Bloomington.

The Wildcats lost on a "basketball" play when their safetyman tipped an Indiana pass high in the end zone and Hoosier end Al Gage grabbed it for the deciding marker.

Mississippi, displaying some opening game jitters, fumbled its game away as Memphis State capitalized on mistakes and also made its own breaks.

The Wildcats, starting nine sophomores, got off to a 10-0 lead and unveiled a good running attack and some fine defensive work.

Roger Gann, sophomore tailback from Fayetteville, N. C., picked up 122 yards and scored one touchdown (56 yards) in 16 carries in the opening minutes of play while David Weld made good his only extra point and field goal (33 yards) tries.

Dicky Lyons and Terry Beadles saw equal action at quarterback for the Wildcats while substitute tailback Dick Beard, flanker Joe Jacobs and senior fullback Donnie Britton rounded out a good backfield combination.

They'll go against an Ole Miss defense bolstered by such proven performers as tackles Jim Urbanek and Dan Sartin and linebacker Jimmy Keyes when the two teams open their SEC season this afternoon on Stoll Field.

Expected to lead the Rebel running attack is Steve Hindman, junior tailback who carried 20 times for 80 yards and one touchdown against Memphis State. He also caught two passes for 28 yards.

Quarterback Bruce Newell completed eight of 17 passes for 121 yards and end Mac Haik caught five of them for 82 yards.


A big play for the Rebels was an 89-yard kickoff return in the third quarter by sophomore Bo Bowen. The Tigers had a similar play when Nick Pappas took a Rebel kickoff on the seven and scampered up the field 93 yards for a touchdown just before the first half ended.

Memphis State actually had only one touchdown as the result of a sustained drive. One came from the aforementioned kickoff return, another from a 75-yard punt return.

Another was set up when an Ole Miss fumble of a Memphis State punt was recovered on the three-yard line.

Mistakes of both teams could perhaps be due to opening game jitters and Vaught and Kentucky's Charlie Bradshaw undoubtedly will have their charges ready and keyed for their opening Southeastern Conference game today.

Alumnus Governor Boosts Wildcat Gridders . . .

Edward T. Breathitt, at 42, is the nation's second youngest Governor. A Hopkinsville attorney, he continues a family record of distinguished public service that dates back to pre-Civil War days when an ancestor, John Breathitt, served as the state's chief executive.

Governor Breathitt, who in his capacity as Governor, also serves as chairman of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, began his career as a lawyer and public servant immediately upon graduation from the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1950. At the age of 27, he was elected to the State House of Representatives. Later he was State Personnel Commissioner and a member of the State Public Service Commission before being elected to Kentucky's highest office in 1963. Unable to succeed himself, he is in the final months as the state's chief executive.

While a student at the University of Kentucky, where he also obtained a degree in Commerce, he proved his capacity for leadership. While there, he was president of Lamp and Cross, senior men's honorary, and ODK, men's leadership and scholarship honorary fraternity.

His distinguished background also includes three years in the Army Air Force during World War II and the state presidency of the Young Democratic Clubs of Kentucky.

A native of Hopkinsville, he is married to the former Frances Holleman of Mayfield. They have four children—Mary Fran, who is 17; Linda, 16; Susan, 10; and Edward III, who is 8.

Governor Breathitt continues to be one of the most enthusiastic boosters of his Alma Mater and its football team.



University's President Knows Value of An Athletic Program . . .

When Dr. John W. Oswald became the sixth president of the University of Kentucky on Sept. 1, 1963, he brought to the position most unique qualifications that have since aided immeasurably in his administration of one of the nation's foremost and fastest-growing educational institutions.

John Oswald's background reflects the highest standard of excellence in educational preparation and also includes experience in athletics at both the player and coach levels.

The background of this 50-year-old educator, who took a firm grip on the presidential reins of Kentucky's state university four years ago, almost uniquely qualifies him for leadership of an outstanding institution now well into its second century.

Following a World War II stint in the Navy as a PT boat captain and division commander, he returned to UC as a professor in his special field and later rose through the administrative ranks to the position of Vice-President for Administration.

Dr. Oswald's athletic experience, that now stands him in good stead as president of a university boasting an ambitious athletic program, came as a player in his collegiate days at De Pauw as he played guard on the football team for three years and later at California's Davis campus—where he tried his hand at coaching (by avocation) the grid team for a brief period.

In 1962, he was named by Sports Illustrated on its Silver Anniversary All-America team, composed of former football players who achieved special prominence in their chosen professions.

Dr. Oswald is a staunch supporter of Kentucky's athletic teams and advocates a fairminded approach that lends proper emphasis to the athletic program. UK athletics flourish within the proper perspective as an equal part of the total university.





Bernie Shively — A Veteran Administrator . . .

Administering "big-time" collegiate athletics today is big business in the fullest sense and takes a firm guiding hand to direct its course along a proper and profitable path.

Assuring patrons and participants of a fair-minded guidance of sports activities at the University of Kentucky is the long-time presence on the scene of able administrator Bernie A. Shively.

In the post of Director of Athletics at Kentucky since 1938, "Shive" (as he is familiarly known to thousands of fans) has gained nationwide respect for his ability in administering September to June activity in 10 different sports and involving use of facilities valued at several million dollars.

The tall, silver-haired, former gridiron All-American is credited with keeping pace with a growing University and increased public patronage by directing expansion of the school's physical facilities for sports. Under his supervision, a four-million-dollar coliseum was constructed, a spacious Sports Center prepared to take better care of spring sports teams as well as to provide unequaled football practice facilities, and seat-

ing capacity of Stoll Field doubled. In the planning stage is a new football stadium which would release the present site for much-needed academic expansion.

Shively's first claim to fame came during undergraduate days at University of Illinois as he achieved All-America recognition as a guard on the 1926 grid team made famous by teammate Red Grange. The future UK Athletic Director also won the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling title and lettered in track.

Following graduation in 1927, he accepted a position at UK as a line coach in football to start a long-time association. In the days since, he has served as head football coach for one year (1945), track and baseball coach and headed the physical education department.

Shively also has found time to be active in civic and alumni affairs and has attained national prominence through dedicated service in national athletic organizations. He currently holds membership on the powerful NCAA Executive Committee. He completed two terms as chairman of the University Division NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and formerly served with the NCAA Summer Baseball group.





Wildcat Coaching Staff

A blend of the old and new and plenty of Wildcat blue characterize Charlie Bradshaw's coaching staff as the 77th season of football gets underway at the University of Kentucky.

football gets underway at the University of Kentucky.

The lineup of assistants is the same as last year with the exception of William (Moon) Conde, who is no stranger to the Wildcat scene.

Conde lettered for the Wildcats in 1949-50-51 before working with Bradshaw at Sidney Lanier High School in Montgomery, Ala. He also played under **Clarence (Buckshot) Underwood,** who was line coach for the Wildcats from 1948-55.

Underwood, a native of West Virginia, had a sparkling coaching career (77-26-6) at Thomas Jefferson High School in Port Arthur, Texas, before returning to the Wildcat ranks in 1966. He is in charge of co-ordinating defense and working primarily with interior defensive personnel. Other responsibilities include the varsity housing and co-ordinating the study program.

The defensive staff is rounded out by three promising and proven young coaches.

Leon Fuller, former All-Conference defensive back and academic All-America at Alabama, came to Kentucky last year from Oklahoma State, where he was an assistant for three years. He was a foursports standout at Nederland (Texas) High School before attaining junior college All-America honors at Tyler, Texas. He played his final two years under Bradshaw, then an assistant at Alabama.

Doug Shively, an end for the Wildcats from 1956 through 1958 and co-captain his final year, returned to his alma mater last season after one year as an assistant to Underwood at Port Arthur and six years as an aide at Virginia Tech. He is in charge of linebackers and head of out-of-state recruiting.

Charley Pell, who joined the Wildcats last year as a defensive interior line coach, completed a military obligation in time for fall practice.

George (Chink) Sengel, another veteran with a solid Wildcat background, is in charge of co-ordinating the offense. Extra curricular activities include lining up summer employment for the Wildcats. Sengel's collegiate career at Kentucky spanned the same years (1942-46-47) at Bradshaw. He began his coaching career as a freshman assistant at UK in 1949 and had coaching and athletic director tenures at Clay County High in Green Cove Springs, Fla., and Apoptka, Fla., before returning to his home town as end coach for Louisville Male High. He joined Blanton Collier at UK in 1961.

On offense, **Conde** will handle linemen and co-ordinate the responsibilities of student coaches. Conde will also direct the student managers. He came to Kentucky from Virginia Tech, where he was a defensive line coach seven years. He has also been head coach at Louisville Manual, Charleston (W. Va.) Catholic High School and Male High.

Another former Wildcat, **Jim Poynter** (1959-60), had a great schoolboy coaching career (40-10-1) at Glasgow, Clark County and Henry Clay before joining Bradshaw's staff last year as offensive backfield coach. He has the responsibility for the running backs, co-ordinates the FCA program and heads up the in-state recruiting program.

Working directly with the quarterbacks and the passing game is Wally English, who moved into an assistantship last year after serving as a graduate assistant in 1965. He was quarterback three years (1955-56-57) at Louisville and was an assistant at DeSales High School in 1959 and head coach four years at Bishop David High School in Louisville and one year at Mt. Carmel High in Houston, Texas. He is also responsible for all film exchanges, perpetual inventory of football equipment and co-ordination of the visitation program for high school and college students.

Phil (Duke) Owen, who joined the Wildcat staff in 1964 after a highly successful schoolboy career at Mt. Sterling, coached the Wildcat freshmen two years before receiving his first varsity assignment, working with backs on both offense and defense, last year. He is in charge of centers on offense and the kicking game and will also continue to work with the freshmen.

Bradshaw said the combination of experience, enthusiasm, and Wildcat ties has resulted in a staff which should work together in harmony.





Wildcat Coach Sets Winning Tradition . . .

When Charlie Bradshaw took over the grid reins of his Alma Mater in 1962, he made no rash promises on the subject of a timetable for rebuilding the shattered foundation of Kentucky football. He stated simply and forthrightly: "If I did not think I could get the job done, I would not be here."

After five hectic seasons of working at the unenviable task, Coach Bradshaw still adheres to his hard-work philosophy without setting a target date for production of the all-winning combination that both he and Wildcat fans would like to see. The job of building a consistent winner for the alumni and the hustling, talented aggregation a coach cherishes has been beset by countless problems of varying magnitude that would have discouraged a less dedicated individual, but Bradshaw has forged steadily ahead.

His reward is yet to come—and may not arrive this season. But there are encouraging signs that Charlie Bradshaw and Kentucky football have "turned the corner" on the path to better days.

Among these good omens that seem destined to breathe new life into the old Wildcats are increasing numbers—a more abundant supply of material to provide vitally-needed depth to match opponents—and more talented personnel—as re-

flected by a 15-3-1 record posted by the first five freshman crops recruited by Bradshaw and his staff.

Exemplifying the faith placed in his hard work philosophy and procedures is the unique "lifetime" contract tendered the youthful and determined ex-Wildcat upon the successful (6-4) completion of an adversity-plagued 1965 season. The new pact, believed unique to college-coach relationships, assures Bradshaw of tenure similar to that given academic personnel. At such time as he ceases to perform his current coaching duties, he will have the opportunity to take another position on the University staff.

The magnitude of the repair job being engineered by the 42-year-old former UK end and assistant coach likely will never be fully understood by anyone less closely associated with it than the self-sacrificing Bradshaw. Only a dedicated gentleman could take a positive approach and—more importantly—stick with it in the face of increasing obstacles.

Charlie Bradshaw is more than a good football coach. He is the personification of qualities of inner fortitude, outwardly serious demeanor, ability, confidence, integrity and quiet determination. He is an inspirational leader.

Who That Horse Is

ESERVED," proclaims a sign on the back of a chair in the basketball press row at the University of Pittsburgh. "Field House Atzerverator."

The Field House Atzerverator is Leo Chester Czarnecki, commonly known as "Horse," a thick-set, square-shouldered man of 43 with a spiky blond crewcut. "When I first came to work here, they called me a janitor," he says.

"Field House Atzerverator" is a self-bestowed title. Horse Czarnecki operates the scoreboard at basketball games and he found that to leave his seat in the press row, even for a minute, was to lose it.

"I'd come back and some big, fat walrus would be in my chair," he says. "I needed a word to scare them off, a word that had no meaning but sounded important. So at breakfast one morning I took a handful of alphabet cereal and threw it on the table." Thus Horse became the world's first and only atzerverator.

He also has an official title at Pitt—superintendent of maintenance and grounds. Tom Hamilton, who was Pitt's athletic director at the time, conferred it upon him in 1951. "It don't make me any more than I was," Horse once said. "Everybody who wears a necktie is my boss."

Actually, Horse bears full responsibility for the upkeep of Pitt's athletic plant. To prepare Pitt Stadium for certain football games, a 50-man crew works an eight-hour shift the night before. "People don't know this," says Horse. "They figure a couple of guys with a broom can take care of it."

If the public remains unenlightened, the fault is not his, for Horse Czarnecki brings to his job a poet's touch, an inventor's creativeness and an ad man's flair.

Where squads of police could never save the goal posts from the mobs always bent on tearing them down, Horse was successful single-handed. At the base of each upright he installed a sprinkler system that thoroughly drenches all who come near.

Near-sighted fans are grateful to Horse for the super-legible, four-foot-square yard markers at Pitt Stadium. Across the top of the goal-line marker, the words "Pay Dirt" appear, with an arrow pointing in the appropriate direction. It is meant as an exhortation to Pitt. "How many times do we go down to the 10-yard line and stop?" Horse demands. "I said to myself, 'Why not put up an arrow and show these guys which way to go?'"

Horse's inspirational messages sometimes fail to inspire. Before the Pitt-West Virginia game two years ago, Horse put up a photograph of Mountaineer Quarterback Allen Mc-Cune in the locker room. "When you are on your back," read the vividly-printed caption "the only place you can throw is up. Make him an airplane watcher." That Saturday, Mc-Cune passed for 320 yards and five touchdowns.

Turning to alphabet cereal once more and to rhyme, Horse lettered and authored a sign that declared: "We Don't Choose/To Ever Lose/It's Fragmitious." The sign was on display at the Pitt-West Virginia basketball game last season, but Pitt lost fragmitiously, 102-78.

To dramatize a campaign against smoking at Pitt, Horse put up a sign above the four-lane board track in the Field House: "Confucius Say Longer You Smoke, Shorter You Run." The campaign had the backing of the university administration.

"It came from the top," said Horse. "If they told me to climb the Cathedral of Learning and take the ball off the flagpole, that ball would be on the chancellor's desk in the morning. I found out how to spell Confucius and the rest was easy."

What Horse couldn't figure out was why nobody took the cigarette machine out of the locker room.

In his younger days, he could move a cigarette machine by himself. As the new man on the ground crew, he pulled the iron-wheeled wagon with the field cover in it by himself, and Tom Hamilton, seeing him do it, cried, "Who's that horse over there?" The name stuck.

Horse had quit high school in the eleventh grade to go to work in a canning factory and help out at home, and Hamilton now wanted him to finish. "You're college football material; we can use you," Hamilton said. But after the big snow of 1949, Horse had a future as an executive.

The snow fell the week of the Penn State football game, immobilizing the whole city, and Hamilton told Horse: "We can't disconnect the plumbing. You know what has to be done." In charge of five men, Horse spent four days and four nights in the stadium, flushing toilets to keep the pipes from freezing.

"From now on, you're a foreman," Hamilton said.

Before long he was superintendent and under Frank Carver, Hamilton's successor, Horse sits in on staff meetings. "Anything done here is taken up with Frank Carver first," Horse says. "We're the spokes and he's the wheel.

"Quote me on that so he'll know I said it."







COMMON PENALTIES ACCORDING TO SIGNALS



- 1. Offside—infraction of free kick or scrimmage formation; interference with opponents or ball. (5 yds.)
- 2. Illegal Procedure, Position or Substitution—substitution rule infraction; putting ball in play before declared ready; free kick out of bounds; player out of bounds when ball free kicked or snapped; more than 2 steps after fair catch; illegal snap; false start; player on line receiving snap. (5 yds.)
- 3. Illegal Motion—offensive player illegally in motion at snap. (5 yds.)
- Illegal Shift—failure to pause full second in shift play.
 yds.)
- 5. Illegal Return—of disqualified substitute. (15 yds.)
- 6. Delay of Game—team not ready to start either half, (15 yds.); excess time out, crawling; failure to remove injured player; more than 25 seconds putting ball in play after declared ready; unfair tactics. (5 yds.)
- 7. Personal Foul—tackling or blocking fair catcher; kicking; kneeing; elbowing; striking with open hand; grasping face mask; piling on; hurdling; tripping; tackling out of bounds; running into opponent obviously out of play; blocking or tackling after ball becomes dead; ramming or butting in head, face or neck. (15 yds., possible disqualification)
- 8. Clipping—running or diving into back of opponent other than runner. (15 yds., possible disqualification)
- Roughing Kicker or Holder of Place Kick—(15 yds., possible disqualification)
- 10. Unsportsmanlike Conduct—non-contact foul (unsportsmanlike conduct); invalid fair catch signal; infraction

of rules during intermission; side line coaching; persons illegally on field; illegal return of disqualified player; abusive or insulting language; conceal ball beneath clothing; substitute article for ball; defensive use of words or signals which obviously disconcert opponents; failure to remain in team area; player leaves field during one minute intermission, unless replaced by substitute. (Penalties vary with type of infraction.)

- 11. Illegal Use of Hands or Arms—holding; illegal use of hands or arms by offense or defense. (15 yds.)
- Intentional Grounding of Forward Pass—(5 yds., plus loss of down or safety).
- 13. Illegally Passing or Handing Ball Forward—2 forward passes made beyond scrimmage line; forward pass by team after change of team possession. (5 yds., plus loss of down if by offensive team before change of possession.)
- 14. Interference—with pass receiver or defender (1st down at spot if by defense; 15 yds. and loss of down if by passing team); or with opportunity to catch kick. (15 yds.)
- Ineligible Receiver Down Field—(15 yds., from previous spot)
- 16. Illegally Touching Free Kick; Batting or Kicking Free Ball—(offended team's ball at spot); also, Ineligible Receiver Touching Forward Pass (penalty varies with spot of foul); and man who has been out of bounds touching pass (loss of down).
- Incomplete Forward Pass on Penalty Declined—(loss of down); or No Play or No Score.
- Helping Runner—runner grasps teammate; or his teammate grasps, pushes, lifts or charges into runner to gain ground; or Interlocked Interference (15 yds.)





Education Writer Reports On "Real Medicine"

Harry Salsinger, president of the Education Writers Association of America, was guest of the University Alumni Association recently. On his return to his newspaper, The Detroit News, he wrote the following article on the community medicine program.—Editor's Note.

In these days of medical specialization, the University of Kentucky has found a way to give its Medical School graduates an idea of what "real" medicine is like.

They call it the Community Medical Program, or the "hospital without walls."

Every fourth-year student is required to spend six weeks learning what medicine means to people, not to professors.

Whether in an urban ghetto here or a "holler" in Appalachia, each doctor-to-be learns what his profession is or is not doing for the disadvantaged.

"When freshmen come to medical school they are concerned about people and want to serve them," said Dr. Hugh S. Fulmer, of the University's department of community medicine.

"But for four years all they see are specialists and they tend to forget that it is the people who need their skills.

"We are not trying to make them into general practitioners, but we find quite a few do decide on general practice after they have been trained in the field."

Students are attached to a practicing physician in the community but they are not, Dr. Fulmer

said, in a teacher-student relationship.

"The student is to observe the physician, see what his practice is and how he handles it.

"But that is only part of what he is to observe. He must also look at the whole community, discover what its health problems are and whether health needs are being met.

"In short, he is there to learn what a community as a whole demands of the medical profession and how the profession is meeting that demand."

One student who found he had learned a lot in the community is Frederick Holmes, a native of Oyster Bay, N. Y., who is about to start his internship.

"It didn't convince me that I should be a general practitioner," Holmes said, "but it did teach me that a physician should have a community sensitivity.

"It's a revealing experience to follow a patient into his home and see how he lives, how he transports himself and what needs he has that he doesn't realize.

"We make unreasonable demands on patients by telling them to go here or go there without ever knowing whether they have a car or the money for a taxi.

"I visited a tar paper shack near the railroad where there were three or four children living in one room and all were anemic. We discovered it because two received health examinations in the Head Start pre-school program.

"There was medical help available for these people," Holmes said, "but the parents couldn't read and no one had bothered to explain it to them."

As his special project, required of all the medical students, Holmes studied health records of all first graders—about 400—in Kentucky's Pulaski County.

"I learned some startling things," he said.

"We think we are doing a good job until we see how much we fail to do.

"One thing this experience taught me is that a doctor can't just treat a disease that walks into his office. He has to treat an entire family that may be poor, ill-fed and ignorant as well as sick."
