MOVEABLE FEAST: 100,000 MEALS SERVED

In October 1998, Moveable Feast Lexington opened its doors in humble quarters in the basement of St. Augustine's Chapel. That first day, Moveable Feast served 25 households in Lexington/Fayette County, delivering food to people who were infected/affected by HIV disease.

On December 4, 2002 Moveable Feast delivered its 100,000th meal. Over the four years, more than 2,000 volunteers helped prepared and deliver hot, freshly cooked dinners, lunches and twice-weekly grocery bags. This nutritional support program has improved the lives of many people living with HIV disease and their dependent children

On a typical day, Moveable Feast delivers meals to 75 households. A core group of 200 volunteers puts in 200+ unpaid hours per week doing everything from food preparation to delivery and kitchen clean-up. From kindergarten-age children to great-grandmothers, from Kentucky natives to Indonesian international students, from gays and lesbians to Christians and Jews, volunteers have come in all shapes and sizes to help provide this essential nutrition service. We always can use more volunteers, call us at 254-2867.

Moveable Feast Lexington receives funding from a wide variety of sources and supporters. While a small amount comes from federal grant funds, Lexingtonians open their hearts and their pocketbooks to give more than \$60,000 annually. Through events such as Dining Out for Life and regular donors in the Kitchen Sink Brigade, Moveable Feast continues to deliver meals.

"Moveable Feast succeeds because Lexington and our volunteers see firsthand the need for hot nutritious meals for those living with HIV/AIDS in our community," said Michael Thompson, executive director of the organization. "Our volunteers and donors see every day the effort and the love that we collectively put into Moveable Feast," Thompson added. "Our clients see it in every hot meal they eat."



Do Sodomy Laws Affected You? by Asha Leong

This is a historic moment for our community -- the U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to hear Lambda Legal's challenge to Texas's "Homosexual Conduct" law, which criminalizes oral and anal sex by consenting gay couples and is used widely to justify discrimination against LGBT people.

In the middle of the night, John Lawrence and Tyron Garner were dragged out of John's apartment, arrested, and forced to spend the night in jail, after officers responding to a false report found the men engaged in private, consensual sex. John and Tyron were frightened, shocked, and humiliated. Once convicted, they were forced to pay fines and are now considered sex offenders in several states.

We now have a tremendous opportunity -- a chance to convince the nation's highest court to address the widespread

harms caused by Texas's law and others like it. Sodomy laws are used as an excuse for generally denying basic rights and equal treatment to LGBT people. We are branded as criminals and treated as second-class citizens.

These laws are also widely used to justify discrimination in our everyday lives -- to deny us employment, to block custody or visitation with our children, and even to intimidate us out of exercising our First Amendment rights. Now is the time to strike the final blow in a decades-long struggle against these laws and for justice and equality.

We need your help. Tell us how sodomy laws have affected you. Speak up. Speak out. Make history.

NABWMT Opposes "Blackface" Drag Performance

The National Association of Black and White Men Together, Inc. have released a statement opposing the "blackface" performances of female impersonator Chuck Knipp. Mr. Knipp, a white gay man from Mississippi, is currently touring the United States, performing in blackface makeup as one "Shirley Q. Liquor." Mr. Knipp describes Ms. Liquor as an "ignunt" unmarried woman, raising 22 "chirren" on public assistance.

"We find the Shirley Q. Liquor performance objectionable on three fronts." stated NABWMT National Co-Chair Wendell Reid. "First, this performance resurrects distorted racist caricatures common to the blackface performances that became popular in nineteenth century American vaudeville. Second, the Shirley Q. Liquor character is constructed on a negative and degrading image of women Third, the character is based on the classist stereotype that people who need public assistance are fundamentally lazy. On all three counts, this act offends current sensibilities of what is appropriate."

"Although we recognize Mr. Knipp has a right to free speech, we also recognize that the owners of the performance venues where he is being scheduled have the right to refuse this kind of speech," added NABWMT National Co-Chair Paul Cloutier. "Particularly given the LGBT community's collective experience with heterosexist oppression, we call on establishment owners in our community not to extract monetary profit from such a racist, sexist and classist performance."

In opposing the Shirley Q. Liquor performance of Chuck Knapp, the National Association of Black and White Men Together joins more than 60 community organizations that have taken a similar position.

Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. 1929 - 1968 by mary crone

Every January we celebrate the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. I am glad it has become a national holiday and yet every year I sense the man and his beliefs becoming more distant, replaced by a simplified version of who he was and what he stood for. And his message was narrowed even during his life time.

King was a charismatic leader of the civil rights movement of the late fifties and sixties. Not the only leader by any means, but the one that the press and the white power structure in general seemed to be the most comfortable with. Some people believe that he was not radical enough, did not call for fundamental change, or softened his words when speaking to power. I disagree. King spoke compellingly, about many issues, chief among them racism, classism, the immorality of war, and the importance of nonviolence. Non-violence in itself is such a revolutionary concept that it is difficult to grasp in a world dyed red with the blood of humanity

Dr. King made me proud to be human. Here are some of his words, selected from a variety of sources, to stir your thoughts during this month in which we honor him.

"In the final analysis, the rich much not ignore the poor because both rich and poor are tied together. There is nothing new about poverty. What is new however is that we now have the resources to get rid of it. A nation that continues year after year to spend more money on military defense than on programs of social uplift is approaching spiritual death.

"All too many of those who live in affluent America ignore those who exist in poor America. To ignore evil is to be an accomplice to it. The contemporary tendency in our society is to base our distribution on scarcity, which has vanished, and to compress our abundance into the overfed mouths of the middle and upper class until

they gag with superfluity.

"There is nothing but a lack of social vision to prevent us from paying an adequate wage to every American citizen...There is nothing except shortsightedness to prevent us from guaranteeing an annual minimum-and livable-income for every American family."

"I received a letter this morning from a white brother in Texas which said: "All Christians know that the colored people will receive equal rights eventually...(but you expect too much too soon.) The teachings of Christ take time to come to earth." All that he said here grows out of a tragic misconception of time. It is the strangely irrational notion that there is something in the very flow of time that will inevitably cure all ills... I am coming to feel that the people of ill-will have used time much more effectively than the people of good will. We will have to repent in this generation not merely for the vitriolic words and actions of the bad people, but for the appalling silence of the good people. We must use time creatively, and forever realize that the time is always ripe to do right. Now is the time to make real the promise of democracy, and transform our pending national elegy into a creative psalm of brotherhood. Now is the time to lift our national policy from the quicksand of racial injustice to the solid rock of human dignity. (MLK, Letter From a Birmingham Jail")

"The ultimate weakness of violence is that it is a descending spiral, begetting the very thing it seeks to destroy. Instead of diminishing evil, it multiplies it... Through violence you may murder the hater, but you do not murder hate. In fact, violence merely increases hate.... Returning violence for violence multiplies violence, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

Join the march on January 20. More importantly, discuss his words, work for justice, affirm his vision.

National Freedom to Marry Day -February 12th -- is a time to call attention to
the ever-growing support for ending discrimination in marriage. Linking the
themes of equality and love, as we remember Abraham Lincoln's birthday and
Valentine's Day, NFMD is a great chance to
engage and educate allies about this part
of the civil rights movement. One of the
best vehicles for educating and enlisting
support is the process of requesting an
endorsement of the Marriage Resolution, a
one-sentence statement of support for the
freedom to marry.

This year the call to action emphasizes families. We suggest that LGBT organizations ask families to endorse the Marriage Resolution, announce their support, and have them speak publicly during the week of February 12th, educating others and joining with similar efforts taking place around the country.

Families speaking about their personal experiences can help others understand the importance of the freedom to marry. Civil marriage is the legal safety net that our society provides to support committed couples. Same-sex partners share the same responsibilities as heterosexual couples, and they deserve the same rights and protections.

Recognizing same-sex couples' right to marry strengthens all families and the community. Supportive heterosexual couples can reinforce this message by speaking right alongside same-sex couples at educational events and press conferences.

ACTIONS STEPS

Start a family endorsement campaign. Identify people in your area that will endorsement the Lambda Legal Marriage Resolution. Fax endorsements to Lambda Legal, the national clearinghouse for Marriage Resolutions, at 212-809-0055 (or

mail them to Lambda Legal, 120 Wall Street, Suite 1500, New York, NY 10005).

Plan an educational event for the week of February 12th. Announce your success with the Marriage Resolution, listing supporters as families or individuals. Have couples speak about their support for marriage equality. For more ideas, visit the Marriage Issue page at www.lambdalegal.org. Let Lambda Legal know how you are participating.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

Personalize the issue with stories of real same-sex couples. Prepare talking points in advance addressing typical concerns and responses. Tailor the Marriage Resolution endorsement request to the audience, such as pointing out the many individuals and organizations that have endorsed the Marriage Resolution from Coretta Scott King to the California Council of Churches.

Soulforce In Lynchburg Lisa Davison Stands Firm


Last October, the Rev. Dr. Lisa Davison, a professor at Lexington Theological Seminary, along with

hundreds of GLBT people and allies from around the country, gathered outside Rev. Jerry Falwell's Thomas Road Baptist Church in Lynchburg, Virginia for a prayer vigil. Soulforce volunteers stood for four hours in an attempt to bring the truth about gay people to Falwell and the members of Thomas Road Baptist Church. The day before, members of Soulforce organized "OUT and ABOUT in Lynchburg," the first-ever pride festival in Jerry's hometown. Hundreds of people attended, including several groups of students from Lynchburg-area high schools and colleges.

"The purpose of the weekend events was to alert, educate, and begin to mobilize the residents of Lynchburg to stand up and speak out against the toxic rhetoric spoken by Christian fundamentalists like Rev. Jerry Falwell," said Rev. Mel White, co-founder of Soulforce Inc.

"The pride event celebrated who we are and who God created us to be. The vigils called attention to the fact that fundamentalist rhetoric leads to violence and suffering for God's GLBT Children." Rev. Mel White and his life-partner Gary Nixon moved into a home across the street from Thomas Road Baptist Church September and have been attending morning worship services there every Sunday. Rev. White had ghost-written the autobiographies for Jerry Falwell and other Christian fundamentalists before he reconciled his sexual orientation with his Christian faith

During "OUT and ABOUT in Lynchburg" Dr. Davison addressed the issue of people



using the Bible to condemn and shame GLBT people. As anti-gay hecklers yelled at her, Dr. Davison took a strong stand for truth and defended gay people from Bible abuse - urging people to study the scriptures.

Returning to Lynchburg and was especially important for Dr. Davison because she is originally from Virginia and completed her undergraduate work at Lynchburg College in 1988. Dr. Davison joined the faculty at Lexington Theological Seminary in 1996. She is ordained by Disciples of Christ denomination and occationally is in the pulpet at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Lexington.

ALTERNATIVE HEALTH INSURANCE

Many people are doing without health care insurance or are paying monthly fees that are very high. Now there is an alternative to traditional health insurance which allows individuals to pay a small monthly membership fee, and to have access to reduced rates for all of their medical services. Under this plan one fee covers the whole family including significant others or domestic partners, and the monthly fee stays the same for the duration of the plan.

The company offering this plan is Care Entrée, a six year old firm started by Judith Henkels, who worked in the headquarters of a major health insurance firm. When she saw the reduced rates that insurance companies were able to get from the doctors, hospitals and other medical service providers, it occurred to her that these same low rates should be passed directly to the consumer, eliminating the insurance company's role as a "middle man".

Under the a Care Entrée plan, you sign up for a "membership" which gives you to access to medical providers at reduced rates. The monthly fee is either \$49.95 for all services excluding hospitals, and \$64.95 to include hospitals. These fees cover the entire household, and include reduced rates on prescriptions, dental, vision, hearing aids, chiropractic, doctors and ancillary. Both plans also come with a

\$2000 accident policy.

Care Entrée members access a network of providers, just like insurance policy holders do. The network has over 200 participating doctors in Lexington. Hospitals that participate in the plan include Central Baptist, St. Joe's and Lexington Clinic. Prescriptions are provided through Kmart, Kroger, Walmart, Eckard Drug, Rite Aid and Medicine Shoppe. There are also vision care providers.
