Olshewsky was involved in controversy during the first full Senate meeting of the semester.

During voting on whether to table SGA President Lance Dowdy's budget bill, Olshewsky became upset when he believed he had been slighted by Ken Luthy, who was filling in for the Senate clerk.

Olshewsky said he thought Luthy, SGA National Issues Forum chairman, read his name as "Olshit-

sky" and mocked him after calling

sky" and mocked him after calling out the name. Olshewsky became upset and yelled, "F--- you, man. F--- you. You're lucky you are wearing glasses" and left the Senate meeting in 212 White Hall Classroom Build-

After he made the comments, Senate Pro Tempore and Senate at Large Misty Weaver said if the Committee on Committees could find a way to purge him, it would.

"I have nothing against those oung people," Olshewsky said.

# Center offers advice to undeclared majors

## Service aims to decrease dropout rate

University advising is one of the key factors in decreasing UK's attrition rate, or the rate at which students drop out of school, UK administrators and advisers said.

advisers said.

"National studies always name advising as either one of the major factors or the main factor in student attrition," said Mary Sue Hoskins, director of UK's Central Advising Service.

"So, when universities thin some

"So, when universities think about remedying attrition in some way, one of the first things they are turning to is advising."

About 23 percent of UK students drop out before their sophonore year, Dean of Undergraduate Studies Lou Swift said, adding that the national average is around 24 percent. "UK's attrition rate is approximately in line with all other large research institutions," Hoskins said. "But that is much higher research institutions," Hoskins ham most large institutions think it should be."

"Rose Street, as I see it, is a pe-destrian area and needs to made into a pedestrian area," said Mims, a candidate in the Lexington may-or's race.

Mims said the proposal to close
Rose Street was brought to an Aylesford Neighborhood planning
group, a committee that he belonged to, by an engineer about five
years ago. He said he favored the issue then and still favors now.

Rose Street is a highly congested area and poses a potential threat to pedestrians and bikers, Mims said.

Mayor Pam Miller is strongly opposed to closing Rose Street, saying it will cause many problems.

The main concern is that Nicholasville Road, which is slaredy congested, would be even more heavily traveled.

## Gathering honors man shot by cops

Jacob Owen said he would like to see at least 200 UK students this weekend in Mt. Vernon, Ky., site of the Gary Shepherd Memorial and Peace Rally.

"I have talked to a lot of students and I expect a good turnout," said Owen, a member of the Rainbow Family

Family.

"It's only about an hour drive, so it will be a good road trip for students. We're going to make it a weekend thing. A lot of people are going to be camping out."

On Aug. 8, police officers shot and killed Shepherd, 45, while he was protecting a marjiuana patch, the Kentucky State Police said.

Shepherd was hit by a barrage of gunfire when he brandished an as-

He died in the emergency room at a Rockenstle County hospital. Deputy Coroner Roy Martin said.

The altercation began when members of the governor's marijuana task force were scouting southeastern Kentucky for marijuana plants. They found a patch of marijuana in Shepherd's back yard.

A helicopter landed near the home, and task force members told Shepherd they were going to cut down the plants. Shepherd went into his house and came out with an assult rifle, Acciardo said.

A special-response team was called in from Frankfort. When the team arrived, Shepherd was sitting in a lawn chair holding the rifle.

Shepherd was shot when he raised his rifle in a threatening manner toward the state troopers, Accirado said.

"What they did to him was unbelievable," Owen said. "He was a disabled Vietnam veteran who was to this story.

for many students, and, for some, cheating appears to be an easy way out.


The Student Rights and Responsibilities handbook gives the following definition of what UK considers cheating: "Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the wrongfully giving, taking or presenting any information or material by a student with the intent of adding himself-herself."

Plagiarism includes: reproducing someone else's word, whether it be published article, chapter of a book, or a paper from a friend, the handbook also details the actions that will be taken and the punishments given if a student is caught cheating. In addition to these measures, the English department also has incorporated plagiarism and cheating as a part of the curriculum in the introductory courses.

Thomas Blues, writing program director, said the definition of plagiarism and exercises in identifying it are found in each class syllabus, and teachers go over it in class.

# Singer pumps punk into pop

# Sweet's fourth effort melds beast & wimp

Matthew Sweet is a pretty odd character; he's a popster of effortless genius who also likes to play 
punk rock.

On the first count, Sweet doesn't 
need any help — the man could 
write gorgeous hooks in a coma — 
but because he's kind of a wimp, he 
can't fulfill the second part of the 
bargain by himself.

So what does he do?

He goes out and hires Richard

Quine (ex-Voidoids), two of the classiest guitar-slingers in all of punk, to graft some real fire onto Altered Beast, Sweet's fourth solo album and the follow-up to Girl-friend, the breakout album that finally made record executives stop saying "Who's that?" when his name was mentioned.

Sweet turns his hand from punk to Sweet turns his hand from punk to pop with equal facility, placing bigfun guitar stomps like "Dinosaur Act" (a jibe at artists like Pink Floyd and The Rolling Stones, who soldier on long after they stopped being interesting) and "In Too Deep" right next to shimmering, lovingly crafted melodies like "Somoone To Pull The Tringer," a meditation on suicide, and "Time Cansule".

In addition to Quine and Lloyd, who could rightly be called the Hendrix and Clapton of punk, Sweet has gathered more top-grade talent for Altered Beast.

Mick Fleetwood shows up be-hind the kit on one track, and pia-nist Nicky Hopkins pops up three or four times.

The album cover comes in five colors, so choose carefully when you buy. I picked the blue one. The yellow one kinda looks like phlegm, so I'd avoid it.



The Wildcats (6-0) will face Montana, Pepperdine and Texas Tech in the two day tournament.

"We are expecting pretty solid play from all three teams. They are all on about the same level. If we play our termpo and control then we should be OK," head coach Fran Ralston-Flory said.

"Our goal is to be very consistent on our side of the net this weekend and maintain our intensity level regardless of who is on the other side of the net."

UK opens the tournament with Montana (6-2). The Lady Griz have not had a difficult early season schedule, as they have only played one top 25 opponent in their first eight matches, losing to Georgia last weekend.

Montana is led by junior middle blocker Karen Goff, who leads team in both kills per game with 3.59 and blocks per game with 3.13. Senior outside hitter Jennifer Moran is a close second with 3.55 kills per game and should force the

# Lodge residents treated equally

It suggested that the residents of the lodge, mostly baskethall players, were housed at the Campbell House Inn during construction because of their special status. In contrast, the residents of Keeneland Hall, who were kept out of their hall in the spring because of their hall in the spring because of a "gas leak," allegedly were forced to sleep on the floors at Jewell and Boyd halls. No one can deny the fame and notoriety enjoyed by UK's basketball team. It has been earned through a tradition of excellence in playing and coaching, but the fact is the Kentucky Kernel's criticism is ill-placed.

Second, the residents of the lodge were forced to stay at the Campbell flouse Inn because of the late start by the contractor, not because University Housing wanted to turn a motel into a residence hall. Again, the cost of this was borne by the Athletic Association.

This move created a hardship on both the residents of the Wildcat Lodge and its staff. Even after the residents moved in, the lodge barely was inhabitable. Sawdust and boards were lying everywhere.

In fact, the sinks were not operational, and the residents had to brush their teeth in the kitchen sink. Such a situation would not occur in those halls fully maintained by University Housing.

Third, the description of the crisis at Keeneland Hall in the spring and how it was handled by University Housing and Residence Life needs some correction.

First of all, there was not a "gas leak" as suggested by the Kentucky Kernel. In fact, the inability to verificate of the control of the con

ple. No one slept on the floor as described by the Kentucky Kernel. The point is this: The University, through the Offices of Housing and Residence Life, actually performed at a superior level. Though safety was the principle consideration, everyone had a place to stay and great care was given to the individual's comfort. At 10:30 p.m., it was preposterous to assume that booking a motel was feasible. Since everyone knew that it would be for only one high. I suspect very few would have chosen that alternative. Had the crisis at Keeneland been more catastrophic and enduring, University Housing would have honored its contract and found a permanent solution for those who would have been displaced. We value our residents highly. Yet it is reasonable to question why we, as a society, value our athletes (as entertainers) as much as we do. Extremely high salaries and the willingness of children to kill for the brand of shoes worn by certain star-athletes should cause alarm.

However, the finger of blame should not point at the student-athlete, but to ourselves as fans, parents and friends.

# **Group holds ceremony** honoring MIAs, POWs

ROTC cadet says soldiers gave all for United States

During a chilling ceremony on the lawn in front of the administra-tion building yesterday, prisoners of our and those missing in action from the Vietnam War were hon-ored by the UK Air Force ROTC as part of an annual retreat. The American flag was lowered while "Taps" was played as part of the tribute.

Cadet Todd Tobergte, who spoke on the behalf of UK ROTIC, said, "There are currently 2\_253 Americans still unaccounted for from the Vietnam War.

"These soldiers, who we bonot oday, gave their all and in many cases their lives to defend our country and our way of life. They are ordinary people like you and I, but they have given the greatest sacrifice for our country."

Tobergie said the issue of POWs and MIAs was brought to the attention of the public through the efforts of the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing Soldiers in Southeast Asia.

"After the issue was brought out, 20 Americans were recovered during 1982 and 1984, President Reagan's first term. One hundred and forty-five were recovered during his second term," Tobergte said.

President Clinton has voiced his concern and has called for a "full accounting of the POWs and MIAs," Tobergie said, but the number of Americans recovered has decreased greatly during 1992 and 1993.

"We must continue to push for the return of our fellow Ameri-

Hoskins said advisers should be able to provide career advice and long-range advising in a student's major as well as helping to identify the student's strengths and weak"They should be able to provide an overview of where the student will stand in the society with a de-gree in X," she said.

will stand in the society with a de-gree in X." she said.

Hoskins also said most advisers are overloaded with appointments just before advance registration.

If students planned appointments at other times during the year, they could receive more attention.

"If any student walked in right now and said "I want to sit here and talk for 45 minutes." we would say 'Pull up a chair," "Hoskins said. She said if the same student came to the advising service during the first week in November, he or she probably would have to wait in line and not be able to spend an ade-quate amount of time with an advis-er.

Hoskins said UK's small colleges

Hoskins said UK's small colleges are better able to meet the advising needs of their students.

In small colleges, she said, students are more informed about where to go for advising, while students in large colleges must inform themselves of their options.

Loys Mather, who advises stu-dents in Agricultural Economics, said the College of Agriculture's smaller enrollment "helps us in terms of keeping track of our stu-dents".

He also said agriculture upper-classmen have a tendency to drop by for informal visits.
"The real help in advising comes when they begin to drop by. You can get into career counseling and help them think in advance what kind of courses they should be taking." Mather said.
