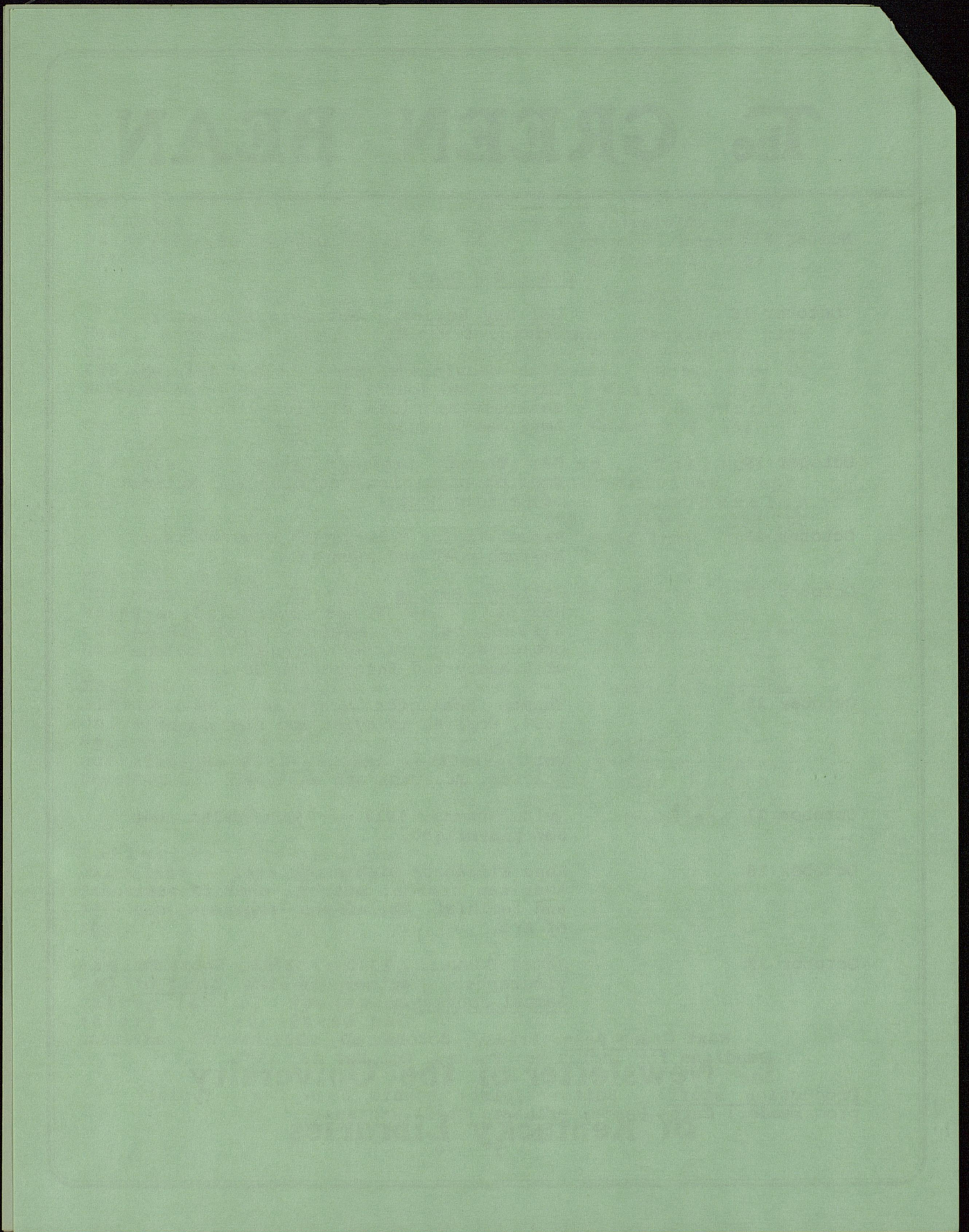

LS/2000 PST (PRODUCT SUPPORT TRACKING) REPORT

The Systems Office learned at the LS/2000 Users Group meeting in Raleigh that OCLC Local Systems Support Center is starting to work on non-critical PSTs sent in April of 1987. Many of UK's outstanding PST problems fall into this category. As a PST is resolved, the Systems Office will send you a note that contains information on the problem and a word or two about the way OCLC fixed it. So far not many of these have been sent out except to people with locked item records and patron records that have ghost fines. Data corruption is considered critical by OCLC and these two problems fall into that category. OCLC has resolved many problems for us, but most involve the MV10,000 minicomputer and its hardware and software problems.

Please continue to send PSTs to the Systems Office. When you do send in a problem, please put your name and department on the form. You may use either the formal PST form or the old Problem Report Form.

LOST YOUR F16 AUTOLOGON KEY?

On October 6, Local Systems "fixed" the TV955 terminal handler and wiped out all of the autologon keys and extra programmed keys in the TV955 OPAC terminals. Although we had them correct the problem immediately, the keys that were wiped out had to be reprogrammed individually. Mark Cetrulo, the Systems Office student worker,

reprogrammed the keys in most of the libraries. Since this took time, some libraries were without autologon for most of a day.

Listed below is a clip-and-save description of how to reprogram function keys F8 through F16. F16, the autologon key is used as an example.

1. Hold down the <SHIFT> key and hit the <SET UP/NO SCROLL> key. This puts you in the terminal set-up mode.

2. Use the right arrow key to move the highlighted bar to PROGRAM and hit the <SPACE BAR>.

3. Make sure the first highlighted bar displays SAVE ON. If it does not, hit the <SPACE BAR > once.

4. Use the right arrow key to highlight F1= /ES <CR>. (<CR> is a symbol substitution for the way the TV955 displays the <RETURN> key in its function key programming. When you are programming function keys in this area, you hit the actual keys you would use to perform the operation if there were no function keys. The TV955 will display characters or leave spaces on this line to show what key strokes it will perform when the function key is hit.)

5. Hit the <F16> key to edit the <F16> function key.

6. Hit <CLEAR/SPACE> and <CE> keys to clear the current information in the function key programming area for the function key you are

programming.

7. Type 1<CR>LIV<CR>LS2K<CR>TV955<CR><CR>JQP<CR>LIBCAT<CR> just as if you were logging on. Remember the <CR> represents the return key. Do not type <CR> as four characters!

8. Hit the <ENTER> key on the numeric keypad to lock the program in place.

9. Hold down the <SHIFT> key and hit the <SET UP/NO SCROLL> key to exit the set-up mode.

10. Hit y<RETURN> to save your data.

Now test your <F16> key. Make sure you have logged off prior to testing. (Both submitted by Tari Keller.)
