A Flashback to 1922

Ladies and gentlemen this is Station CATS broadcasting from the wooden bleachers of Stoll field on the beautiful University of Kentucky campus. Some day this university hopes to have a concrete stadium seating 10,000 persons but right now there is little hope that this dream ever will materialize.

The Kentucky Wildcats are playing a great University of Alabama eleven which, only last Saturday knocked Pennsylvania out of the National championship race by a 9 to 0 defeat, by virtue of which the undefeated Crimsons from the Capstone have replaced the Pensylvanians in the picture. If Alabama wins this game the Red Elephants should go on through their season without a defeat and if they do they will be acclaimed as the National champions.

This is the second time Kentucky and Alabama have met on the gridiron, the first game, in 1917, re-

sulting in a 28 to 0 victory for the lads from the deep South.

The second half of the game is about ready to begin and the score is nothing to nothing at this minute. During the first two quarters the Kentuckians amazed their supporters by holding the visitors scoreless and if they can continue at this rate and gain a scoreless tie with Alabama it will be a moral victory for the 'Cats. Every dangerous threat of the Alabama lads in the first half was repulsed by a fighting Kentucky line. Up to this point Kentucky has not entered Alabama territory.

Bartlett, Alabama's quarterback, and "Country" Oliver, the other Crimson halfback, have been un-

able to do a great deal of damage despite their reputations.

The Kentucky band has just finished playing "My Old Kentucky Home" and the students are being chased off the field after their usual snake dance between halves. Here come the Wildcats. They are getting a tremendous cheer from the record breaking crowd of 6,000 fans who have overflowed the bleachers and are crowding close to the sidelines. Just listen at them cheer the boys who have staged such a game fight against overwhelming odds.

Oh, boy, what a ball game this has turned out to be. Little David against Old Man Goliath. Horatio at the bridge and all that. Even your announcer, who is supposed to be neutral, can't help but hope that

these game Kentuckians are able to hold on for two more quarters.

Now the Alabama team is on the field. Another burst of cheers from the crowd. In one minute, ladies and gentlemen, the second half will start. We have just time enough to give you the Kentucky line-up before the kickoff. Here they are:

Colpitts and Holowell are the ends; Ramsey and Russell are the tackles; Captain Pribble and Martin are the guards. Kelly is in at center. Gregg is the quarterback. Fuller and Ferguson are the halfbacks and

Sanders is the fullback

I haven't time to give the Alabama line-up but keep your eyes on "Shorty" Probst, Alabama center. He is an all-Southern, but Kelly is giving him an awful battle this afternoon.

Kentucky's coaches, "Injun Bill" Juneau and Jack Winn have taken their seats on the bench with the Kentucky subs. Kentucky is lining up for the kick-off. Alabama will receive and HERE SHE GOES. It's a fine kick, going to the goal line and Hubert has the ball. He picks up five, ten, fifteen, and he's nailed on his own twenty. It was a beautiful tackle by Birkett Pribble, who is slated to become freshman coach at Kentucky after his graduation.

Hubert has the ball off right tackle and he's a way. He looks like he's going through the entire Kentucky team for a touchdown but he's stopped on his own 40-yard line. Wow what a run. The Wildcats are on the run. It looks bad for the home team now. Again Hubert takes the ball. He makes four yards through the line. There goes Hubert again but he makes only three yards this time. It's third down and three to go. There goes Hubert again but he is stopped at the line. That Wildcat line is battling in there now. It's fourth and a little over two to go. Bartlett is back in punt formation but again Hubert takes the ball on a fake and he plows into the line. I believe it's first down. They are going to measure it. They FAILED to make first down and it's Kentucky's ball in mid-field.

Gregg is back to pass for Kentucky. He throws it and Colpitts takes it. He is pulled down on Alabama's 20. Kentucky is still in the ball game. This is the first chance the Wildcats have had to score. Can they do it? I doubt it. That Alabama line is too sturdy for them. There goes another pass. This time it's to Holowell and he caught it but he's stopped on Alabama's 8-yard line.

First down and eight to go. It looks like another pass coming up. Gregg has the ball. No he hasn't. Bruce Fuller, the law student has it and he is running off tackle. There's a big hole for him. The Alabama line has cracked. Fuller goes over for A TOUCHDOWN. Kentucky has scored. Gregg is back to try for the extra point but his drop kick is a failure.

Ladies and gentlemen, only one minute left to play. Alabama is desperate. Bartlett has been filling the air with frantic passes ever since Kentucky scored in the first part of the second half. There goes the gun. The game is over. Kentucky has defeated Alabama by 6 to 0 in the greatest gridiron upset of the

CHESTER A. WYNNE HEAD COACH AND ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

A gentleman and a scholar, former member of the Nebraska State Legislature, one-time star fullback at Notre Dame University, lawyer by profession and football coach by choice—that is Chester Allen Wynne, "The Chetter."

A Kansan by birth, Chet Wynne received his higher education at Notre Dame, where he was a star pupil of the immortal Knute Rockne, absorbing not only a profound knowledge of the game and how to play it, but also a deep seated ability to pass on to others the knowledge which he has gained. Coach Wynne was called to the University of Kentucky last spring to take supreme command of athletics after a disastrous football season had all but destroyed interest in the gridiron game here. He was selected by the Athletic Council after his record as a please and as a coach had been studied.

He was selected by the Athletic Council after his record as a player and as a coach had been studied carefully, and after a series of personal interviews had convinced the Council that if anyone could

carefully, and after a series of personal interviews had convinced the Council that if anyone council place Kentucky on a high football plane, that man was Chet Wynne.


The Council decided that Kentucky needed an experienced football coach who had already won success at other institutions. Chet Wynne met that requirement. He already had led Creighton to a Missouri Valley Conference championship, and then he took a down-trodden Auburn team which had not won a conference game in several years, piloting the Plainsmen to a championship of the newly-formed Southeastern Conference.

Now Chet Wynne is at Kentucky. He is that quiet mannered gentleman on the bench in civilian clothes. He has a big job on his hands here. Kentucky never has won a conference championship in football. Victories over high class football teams have been few, despite the fact that a gradual improvement has been made in recent years.

It is up to Wynne to build up Kentucky still more, but in order to make a success, he must have the cooperation of students, players, alumni and those lovers of the game who are eager for Kentucky to win. Let's everybody pull together for Wynne and the Wildcats.

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

DANIEL BOONE

As this is the bi-centennial year of the birth of Daniel Boone, whose name is synon-ymous with early Kentucky history, it is fitting that the University of Kentucky Athletic Association should honor this great pioneer in the football program.

Trail blazer, colonizer and defender, Boone took a leading part in carving this Commonwealth out of the wilderness, and in so doing, contributed to the establishment of the University of Kentucky. Had there been no Boone there may never have been a Kentucky. Had there been no Kentucky, there certainly would have been no football game here today.

Every Kentuckian is familiar with the heroic exploits of Daniel Boone. What Kentucky boy has not, in his dreams, walked hand in hand with Boone as he crossed the mountains at Cumberland Gap; battled the painted savages with him, sorrowed with him at the death of his son who fell mortally wounded at the Battle of the Blue Licks; exulted with him at the recapture of his daughter who had been carried off by the Indians, and thrilled with him in his numerous narrow escapes from death at the hands of savage beasts and still more savage red men?

Kentucky claims Daniel Boone as her own, although he was born in Pennsylvania and spent his last years in Missouri. Not only did he lead the way for the first settlers, pointing out to them the richest lands, and buildnig forts for their defense, but he also remained to help make their laws and to lead their military forces in the Revolutionary War.

RULE CHANGES FOR 1934

The rule changes for 1934 are minor in nature in so far as the spectators are concerned. The principal changes are in the dimensions of the ball, in the forward pass regulations covering an incomplete pass on, above or behind the opponents' goal lines, and some changes in definitions and penalties.

- 1. The circumference of the ball, short axis, is changed to "not less than 21 1-4 inches." This is a smaller ball than formerly used.
- 2. "The first forward pass in any series of downs (except on fourth down) which becomes incomplete by striking the ground, a second originally eligible player of the passer's team or any obstruction on, above or behind the opponents' goal line shall be penalized as though it became incomplete in the field of play. Any other forward pass which becomes incomplete in any of these ways on, or above or behind the opponents' goal line, is a touchback."

"Any forward pass which becomes incomplete by striking an ineligible player inside the opponents' 10-yard line may be a touchback if the opponents so elect."

Formerly a forward pass into end zone became a touchback on any down.

This year there is no penalty for an incomplete forward pass, except the loss of a down.

He has been connected with the University of Kentucky as football coach, basketball coach, graduate manager of athletics, gymnasium teacher, programme manager or general major domo for so many years that many believe he is one of the founders of the institution.

No football programme would be complete without him and here he is.

In the ante-bellum days, Daddy Boles wore a moustache and a high-necked sweater. The sweater finally went to pieces. The hirsute facial adornment went out of style. But Daddy goes marching on in his easy-going way, making friends and keeping them.

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
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Best Band Dixie

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
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Kentucky's Coaching Crew





Although the University of Kentucky Wildcats have been defeated twice this season, there is more spirit on the Kentucky campus than there has been in many years. Student pep meetings which attracted 300 students last year, have drawn an average of 3,000 students and townspeople on the eve of each home game this fall. The popularity of Coach Chet Wynne is held chiefly responsible.

Sheldon "Honus" Wagner, star University of Kentucky tackle, has a habit of outshining opposing linemen who have been highly publicized. In the Kentucky-Duke game a year ago it was Wagner and not the All-American Freddie Crawford who attracted attention in the line. In the Kentucky-North Carolina game this year, Wagner outshone Barclay, Carolina's nominee for All-American guard. Wagner blocked a punt and a place kick against North Carolina.

Only 20 yards in penalties were called by the officials in the Kentucky-North Carolina football game this fall at Chapel Hill. Each team was ruled off-sides twice and each team was set back a total of 10 yards. Officials who worked the game said it was the cleanest game they ever had witnessed.

Ted Twomey, line coach at the University of Kentucky, played on the same team with John Law at Notre Dame in 1929. Law now is coach of the Sing Sing Prison team in New York. He writes Twomey that the alumni provide no interference with his work and that training regulations are easily enforced.

Sam Potter, regular guard on the University of Kentucky football team, gained National prominence as a halfback in 1930, when, as the star leather lugger of the Whitesburg, Kentucky, high school team, he led the Nation in scoring. Potter accounted for 234 points that year. As a sophomore at the University of Kentucky, Sam was used as a blocking back. This year he was converted into a guard by Coach Chet Wynne.

Only two touchdowns have been scored on the University of Kentucky football team in six games this season. Washington and Lee took advantage of a blocked punt in a rainstorm to score, and North Carolina scored on a long pass.

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
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

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Kentucky's Basketball Squad

Kentucky can well afford to be proud of the Wildcats in basketball, especially since genial Adolph Rupp, the carefree Kansan, came to the Blue Grass as commander of the Wildcat basketeers.

Since Coach Rupp came to Kentucky his basketball teams have won 67 games and lost but nine, probably the greatest record held by any university in the country. Most of the games lost were by one or two points.

Kentucky now is recognized as the leader in southern basketball. For three consecutive years the Wildcats have ended the regular playing season at the top of the Southeastern Conference, while for the past two years they have been undefeated in the conference during the regular season, although losing their initial game in the post-season tournament last spring.

Kentucky holds the world's record for consecutive basketball games won by a major university, having won 24 games in a row, beginning in the latter part of the 1932-33 season and ending with the tournament of 1934. The Wildcats won 17 straight games last year and ended the season undefeated, but there had to be an end to the chain and so they lost to Florida in the first game of last spring's tourney. There was no reason for losing but they lost and no Kentucky supporter voiced any disappointment. Most Kentuckians considered the Wildcats as conference champions at the end of the regular season and saw no reason why they should be called on to risk their title in a tournament which finally was won by Alabama, a team which Kentucky whipped twice during the season.

Kentucky won the tournament in 1933.

Out of 20 all-conference players selected in the past four years, 11 of them have been Wildcats, while the All-American teams of 1932 and of 1933 each contained a Kentuckian. Forest "Aggie" Sale, Kentucky's great center, was selected as forward on the All-American team twice, an honor never before conferred on a Kentuckian.

The Wildcats who have been selected on all-conference teams in the past four years were Sale, twice; DeMoisey, twice; Johnson, twice; Yates, Spicer, "Little" McGinnis, Bronston and Davis. Of these great stars only one, Bill Davis, still is a Wildcat.

Now a word about Coach Rupp. A star basketeer at the University of Kansas, Adolph lives and breathes basketball, and he is recognized throughout the country as an authority on the game. He never had coached a college team before coming to Lexington, but had won success coaching the high school team at Freeport, Ill. He not only knows basketball but he also knows boys and how to handle them. The Wildcat basketball players fight for Rupp as they do for Kentucky.


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
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
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
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
