# UK denies open records request

Privacy: UK officials say race, gender and date of birth a private matter; local, national media experts disagree

and Ashley York

Only a few weeks after UK created committees to study diversity and gender issues at the university, officials would not release the gender and race of UK employees in a salary database requested by the Kernel. Only a few weeks after UK created

the Kernel.

On Aug. 2. Summer Editor in Chief
Scott Sloan, now news editor, requested a
database that included the name, gender,
race, date of birth, salary and job title of
every UK employee. UK officials denied
the request for gender, race and date of
birth, saying their release would justify
an "unwarranted invasion of personal pri-

vacy."

"It seemed to me we could be accused of violating someone's privacy," said UK

President Lee Todd.

In July, Todd created two committees
— the Commission on the Status of
Women and the Commission for Diversity
— to study equity issues at UK.
Under state law, a public employee's
salary is considered public record.
Sioan wanted the information to analyze the equity of pay based on gender,

Sloan wanted the information to analyze the equity of pay based on gender, race and age. The Kernel staff also wanted the information for use in any other similar issues that may arise.

Newspapers have long used gender, race and date of birth information to explore its effects in salaries, hiring practices and other situations.

The Kernel then appealed UK's decision to the state attorney general's office. The attorney general's written opinion, 01-0RD-147, said UK had not violated the open records act, which allowed UK's decision to stand.

"We found those (gender, race and date of birth) to be matters in which people have an expectation of privacy," said James Ringo, the assistant attorney general who authored the opinion.

Despite the opinion, UK can still release the information, said Jon Fleischaker, an attorney for the Kentucky Press Association.



#### Battle between CNN and Fox heats up

Battle between CNN and Fox heats up NEW YORK — The bitter rivalry between CNN and Fox News Channel spread to Afghanistan Sunday, where a veteran CNN correspondent stationed with forces fighting the Taliban abruptly switched networks. Steve Harrigan, a 10-year CNN correspondent based in Moscow, told CNN he was leaving on Saturday and by Sunday morning was delivering reports via videophone from Afghanistan on Fox News Channel. #### Television ratings resurfaced last week

Television ratings resurfaced last week NEW YORK — For television executives, it's safe to exhale. They worried that depression over the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks would drive people away from prime-time TV. Instead, based on ratings from the season's opening week, the opposite is true. "Obviously, none of us knew what to expect." NBC entertainment president Jeff Zuckers said. Zucker chose his last word for its double meaning, NBC's "Friends" was one of the week's notable successes, with 31 million people tuning in Thursday to see which of the three female characters was pregnant. Prime-time viewing in general was up 4 percent over the last two years during the first few nights of the season, said top CBS researcher David Poltrack.

#### Satellites help police watch offenders

Satellites help police watch offenders SCRANTON, Pa.— At any time of day, offi-cials can find out where an offender is, thanks to the Global Positioning System, a network of 24 satellites orbiting 12,000 miles above the Earth. Originally developed for the military, GPS is used for land surveying and as portable units for hikers, and is available as an option in cars to help motorists navigate unfamiliar areas. Now it also is being used in at least 20 states to keep con-stant track of more than 1,000 offenders, many of whom have committed crimes involving sex or domestic violence.

#### FAA says Americans returning to skies

FAA says Americans returning to skies WASHINGTON — Americans are slowly returning to the skies and while security remains tight and time-consuming, the federal government is allowing some airports to resume one timesaving measure curbside check-in. Air travel still is well below levels prior to the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Federal Aviation Administration spokesman William Shumann said airlines are flying 80 to 85 percent of their pre-attacks schedules. But the Air Transport Association, a trade group for the major airlines, said preliminary estimates showed 665,714 passengers flew on domestic flights Thursday, compared to domestic flights Thursday, compared to 181,765 the Thursday before. The flights were 46 percent full, up from 39 percent a week earlier. A year ago, airplanes carried around I million passengers a day and were around 70 percent full.

#### Hate crimes a tiny percent of offenses

WASHINGTON — Crimes motivated by hatred for a person's race, religion or other characteristics remain a tiny percentage of all offenses,
he government reported Sunday. The suspected
hijackers — and those in the al-Qaida network
believed to have masterminded the deadly attacks — are mostly Middle Eastern and Muslim.
The government has said the hijackers lived in
U.S. communities, sometimes for years, while
preparing for the attacks. Since the attacks, hundreds of Americans of South Asian and Middle
Eastern descent — or just people with dark skin,
beards, turbans or veils that make them appear
to fit that profile — have been victims of threats,
beatings and even killings. Muslim mosques and
temples have been vandalized and fire hombed.
FBI Director Robert Mueller said Thursday the
bureau was investigating about 90 hate crimes.

#### Bones taken for testing from the dead

Bones taken for testing from the dead LONDON — Thousands of bones were removed from dead British children without their parents' consent during Cold War-era nuclear tests, the nation's Atomic Energy Authority said Sunday. The femurs of about 4,000 young Lidden were removed from 1954 to 1970, agency spokeswoman Beth Taylor said. The bones were used in tests to measure the effects atmospheric explosions of hydrogen bombs were having on humans and the environment.

Callahan said even if UK doesn't have the best numbers regarding gender and race, it shouldn't withhold the data from the public. She said UK should provide the information so people can raise questions about the issues.

"Even if that means changing the law to get them," she said. "Laws need to be questioned and defended."

Bill Fortune, a College of Law professor, declined to comment on the issue because of his role as president of the University Senate.

"This should be considered by the faculty as a whole," he said.

The facts about open records

The Kentucky Open Records Act (Kentucky Revised Statutes 61.870-61.884), enacted during the 1976 General Assembly, applies to all public records of public agencies. Accroting to the Act:

"The General Assembly finds and declares that the basic policy of KRS 61.870 to 61.884 is that free and open examination of public records is inthe public interest and the exceptions provided for by KRS 61.878, or otherwise provided by law, shall be strictly construed, even though such examination may cause inconvenience or embarrasement to public officials or others. KRS 61.871.

\*\*Coording to the Act, anyone may examine any public record that is not exempt from inspection by the law. The exemptions are listed under KRS 61.871.

#### Open records decisions

In rejecting the Kernel's appeal, the office of the Kentucky attorney general cited two previous open records decisions written by Assistant Attorney General James Ringo — 96-0RD-232, relating to race and gender, and 99-0RD-12, relating to date of birth.

Reproductive ethics may change for parents, allowing them to choose the sex of their child

Though the issue of sex selection is not new to the realm of reproductive medicine, the concept of pre-selecting a baby's sex may now become available to all. The American Society for Reproductive Medicine, which determines the ethical standards for the field, has backed away from this issue in the past. The chairman for this group, however, may give the go-ahead for certain couples to pre-determine the sex of their child for non-medical reasons.

Pre-conception sex selection includes two methods: the use of stifficial insemination and invite festilization. Inviter fertilization.

artificial insemination and in-vitro fertilization. In-vitro fertilizaartificial insemination and in-vitro fertilization. In-vitro fertilization is almost 100 percent accurate from testing the genetics of
cells from already formed embryos. Artificial insemination involves separating differing forms of sperm to be used for impregnation. This method is a little more risky, with an 85 percent accuracy rate for girls and a 70 percent rate for boys.

The main purpose behind sex selection right now is to avoid
gender-linked genetic diseases. Couples at high-risk for such diseases are the only ones with justifiable reasons to pre-select sexes.

eases are the only ones with justifiable reasons to pre-select sexes. Determining a sex for any other use but medical reasons cannot truly be justified. Rather, it can easily be deemed selfish, and perhaps even a form of sex discrimination.

Gender biases found in countries like China and India now face problems resulting from the lack of equal numbers between sexes. And while the possibility of such an issue arising may not be relevant at this time, it is certainly not beyond becoming a problem in the future.

The amount of money spent on these techniques is adequate. With that said, the couples who currently use the process to avoid hereditary diseases should have the right to choose which sex they want their child to be.

Yet, even as the issue continues to be debated by ethics groups, sex selection cannot be condoned simply for the fact that it so close to the edge of the discriminatory elipsone stopp.




